A winner feels strong enough to be gentle; a loser is never gentle - he is either weak or petty tyrannous by turns.

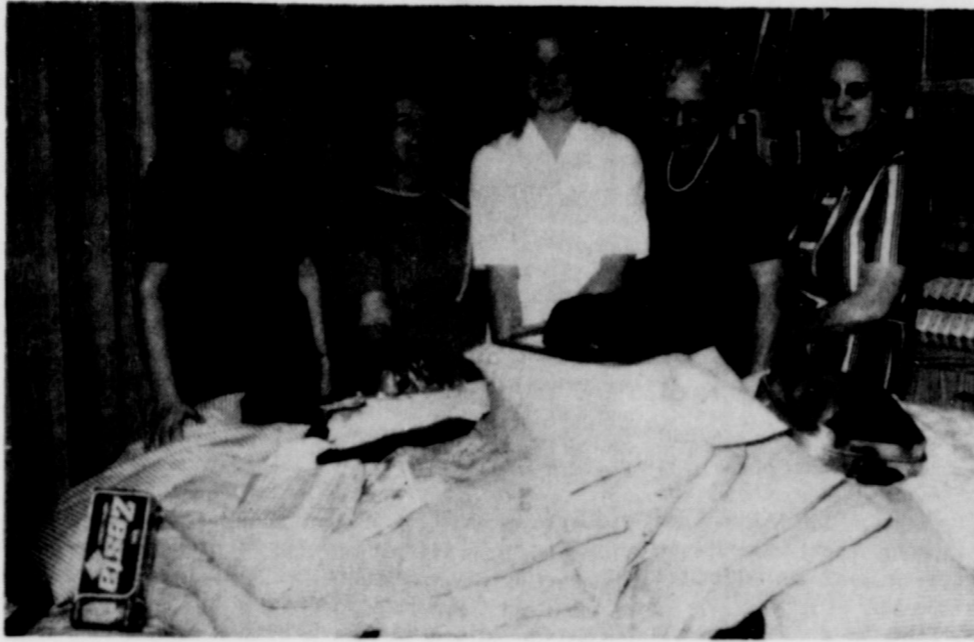
A winner respects those who are superior to him, and tries to learn something from them; a loser resents those who are superior to him, and tries to find chinks in their armor.

Phone Subscribers Favor Extended Dialing, 4 to 1

Response to date indicates that four out of five telephone subscribers are in favor of an additional rate increase in exchange for unlimited toll-free dialing to certain points within the county.

The rate increase is in addition to that recently approved for Southwestern Bell in Cisco and Eastland, and under consideration in Ranger.

Commissions in each town have asked the company for feasibility studies on the metro-dialing, and details are to be announced at a joint meeting to be held in the near future between the commissions, it was reported.

pay an additional rate (50c per month) for unlimited toll-free dialing with Cisco, Ranger, Olden, and Carbon. Eastland already has toll free dialing with Olden and Carbon.

Ranger customers would pay an additional 25c per month residential for unlimited calling to Eastland, Olden and Carbon.

Cisco customers would pay an additional 25c per month residential for unlimited calling to Eastland, Olden and Carbon.

Southwestern Bell reports very little existing traffic between Cisco and Ranger, and therefore it probably would not be economically feasible to offer that as toll free dialing.

To date, Eastlanders have voted ten to four in favor of the additional service in this newspaper's informal survey. More survey returns are welcomed and will be tabulated.

(One woman voted Yes to the service and volunteered this comment:

"I have talked to quite a number of people in Ranger, Cisco and Eastland about this small increase and everyone of these people are in favor of the increase in return for the toll free dialing."

With the negative reports in Eastland, came these additional comments:

"If the list of towns included Abilene, I would definitely be for it."

"Why would a widow (and the town is full of them) have to pay 50c a month on some other person's bills? I have been here 18 years and have called Cisco four or five times. I never called Ranger or Carbon."

"It might be worse than it is now."

If adopted, the service could take up to 18 months to install. District Manager John McGowan reports.

Absentee Balloting Underway For June 3 Election Run-Off

Absentee balloting for the June 3 Primary Run Off Election got underway at the County Clerk's office Wednesday and ends Monday.

Voters in Eastland, Ranger, Carbon, Gorman and Desdemona will be making decisions in state races including: U.S. Senate; Governor; Lt. Governor; Comptroller; and State Senate, 22nd district.

In Rising Star, voters will also choose between run off candidates Curt Smith and L.T.

Owen, who are both seeking nomination as County Commissioner, Precinct, 3; and Constable, Justice Precinct, No. 3, which pits Run Off Candidates W.H. Kornegay and Arley Bibby.

In Cisco, voters will have the state choices and a run off decision between S.E. Parkinson and B.W. (Bill) Carr who seek nomination as Constable, Justice Precinct No. 4.

In Olden, voters will make the statewide choices and also pick between Dick Hodges and Jim Everett for Democratic Precinct Chairman, Precinct No. 2. Neither name appeared on the May Primary ballot, but both men received write in votes.

Highlights and Sidelights

From Austin

AUSTIN, Tex. - State agencies received a recent warning to renew efforts to recruit minority group and women employees "before they are confronted with ultimatums and deadlines" from Washington and federal courts.

The agencies were reminded by the Governor's Committee on Human Relations staff that jurisdiction of the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission has been extended to cover local and state governments.

EEOC will be giving "very critical examinations" to state employment practices. Committee on Human Relations Director James R. Ray wrote the agencies and departments.

Federal law goes farther than the state statute making it unlawful to discriminate against a person because of race, religion, color or national origin. The U.S. law also bars discrimination on the basis of sex.

Each state agency, advised Ray, will have to submit a detailed action plan to prove non-discrimination.

"In other words, you will not be able to prove non-discrimination without a federally approved plan for recruitment of minorities and women for all levels of employment in your agency or department," the state units of government were told.

"Historically, the main concern of (EEOC) has been with numbers or quotas, and claims of recruitment difficulties have been summarily rejected as valid excuses," the Human Relations Committee staff maintained.

"Significant steps" were applauded within the state government during recent years to achieve equal employment opportunities.

However, department heads were placed on notice they must be sure each house "is in order and can stand the test (of non-discrimination) in federal court."

AG OPINIONS - County taxing bodies do not have authority to levy a fee on a mixed-beverage late-hours permit and a caterer's permit for the first three years of a permit, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

- Creation of a salary grievance committee for public employees in each county is constitutional.

- The county tax assessor-collector is generally immune from liability on claims of third parties where title is issued in good faith and within the scope of his official authority under the certificate of title act.

- A Midland County domestic relations court judge is entitled to the same salary as that paid the 142nd district court judge.

COURTS SPEAK - Third Court of Civil Appeals held a full trial is necessary to develop facts for a standard by which Trinity River Authority can set a rate to be charged rice farmers for irrigation water from Devers canal system.

State Supreme Court upheld a lower court finding that the

State Board of Medical Examiners acted properly in revoking the license of San Antonio Dr. J.J. Martinez for alleged sexual assaults on patients and an attempted abortion.

Third Court of Civil Appeals has reversed a district court judgment that Nueces County Water District No. three has no authority to change the use of irrigation waters to municipal and domestic purposes for Robstown without prior approval of Texas Water Rights Commission. The court also reversed a lower court decision that TWRC had authority to adjudicate additional water rights to the City of Corpus Christi at the expense of WCID No. three.

COURT OVERHAUL RECOMMENDED - A task force composed of legal professional leaders, judges and legislators has joined in recommending modernization of the Texas court system.

The group, headed by State Supreme Court Chief Justice Robert W. Calvert, released a draft of its proposal at a meeting here. Highlights include:

Merging the State Supreme Court and Court of Criminal Appeals, giving courts of civil appeals authority to hear criminal as well as civil cases, merging overlapping district courts and providing a single district court with multiple judges for metropolitan counties, creating a statewide system of new county-level courts with judges who are lawyers to replace all present courts below district level, setting up a system of administration by a statewide administrator and deputies under the chief justice of Texas, selection of judges in non-partisan elections or by gubernatorial appointments and requiring that all judges be lawyers.

FIFTY - ONE COUNTIES NOW POVERTY AREAS -

Fifty-one counties are now designated as poverty areas for Hill Burton hospital construction aid. Those counties may receive up to 90 percent of money for constructing hospitals and related facilities from the federal program.

The original 13 counties designated were Starr, Zapata, Kinney, Jim Hogg, LaSalle, Dimmit, Willacy, Presidio, Brooks, Real, San Jacinto, Houston and Duval.

Added to the list under the new interpretation were Maverick, Falls, San Saba, Robertson, Red River, Kenedy, Fayette, Lavaca, Grimes, Hidalgo, Lee, Trinity, Irion, Leon, Edwards, Mason, Goliad, Llano, Shelby, Franklin, Marion, Hamilton, Rains, Cottle, Hudspeth, Burleson, Motley, Camp and Coleman.

SCREW WORM INFESTATION WORSENS -

Texas Farmers Union has warned that a screw worm fly infestation will get worse rapidly between early summer and the first frost.

TFU says it is imperative that Gov. Preston Smith ask increased state appropriations for the control program at the special legislative session. Congressmen have been asked

for more federal aid to increase sterile fly production to the maximum level at the production plant in Mission and for fly drops in outbreak areas.

Ranchers and farmers have been urged to report all suspected cases of screw worm outbreak in their animals to county agents. Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association joined in the warning to livestock producers.

APPOINTMENTS - M.M. Vicars of Brownsville was appointed by Governor Smith to the Good Neighbor Commission to succeed the late Jack H. Drake of Lweslaco.

Smith picked Arthur Busch of Dallas and Z.T. Craver of Marshall for assignments to the Texas Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations.

He appointed Chester W. Kyle of Kingsville to the Real Estate Research Advisory Committee.

Charles Kirkham of Dallas was selected chairman of the Legislative Property Tax Committee.

COMPANIES MUST PAY -

State Board of Insurance announced it has received complaints that some insurance companies are requiring customers to pay costs of physical examinations before renewing coverage.

"Physical examinations used for automobile insurance underwriting by licensed Texas companies have a similar purpose to that of securing credit reports, and as such must be directly paid for by the insurance company con-

cerned," the Board stated in an official memorandum to companies writing auto insurance.

FLOOD DISASTER ASSESSED - Governor Smith said after a helicopter tour of flood-ravaged Hays, Comal and Guadalupe counties he will press for a federal disaster declaration and all necessary aid for those areas as well as Caldwell and Webb counties.

Smith said he was "shocked and dismayed" by the amount of the damage. He had already stated he would ask that portions of South Central Texas be designated a disaster area, and Sen. Lloyd Bentsen urged the White House Office of Emergency Preparedness to expedite the request. Preliminary estimates place private property damage in the five counties (where at least 16 died) at \$15 million, damage to public facilities at \$2.5 million.

SHORT SNORTS

State Sen. Barbara Jordan, a new congressional nominee and the first black elected to the Texas Senate since 1883, will serve as governor - for a day June 10.

Bureau of Mines forecasts June demand for Texas crude oil of 3,460,000 barrels daily, an increase of 700,000 barrels over May.

The state has paid out \$846,783 to 197 counties for writing voter registration certificates for 2,164,224. Fifty-seven other counties, including the three largest, have not filed

reports requesting their 40 cents for each voter registered.

Secretary of State Bob Bullock urged county political party chairmen to hurry return of forms detailing anticipated expenses for the June 3 runoff primary.

Thirty-three criminal justice action grants totaling more than \$1.1 million received recent approval of Criminal Justice Council executive committee.

The U.S. Department of Transportation has accepted Texas' agreement for carrying out the highway beautification act, preventing loss of \$24 million to the state.

Sale of \$8.9 million in bonds for universities at San Angelo, Huntsville, San Marcos and Alpine is scheduled June 1.

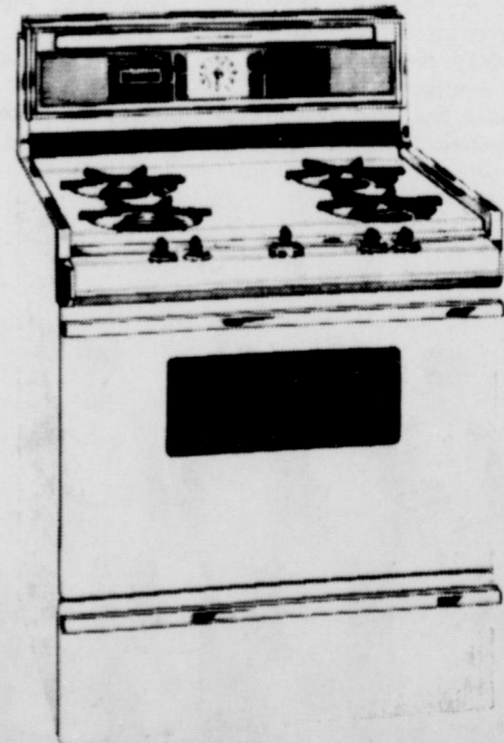

President De Gordon presided and Otis Coleman was program chairman and introduced Mr. Wilson.

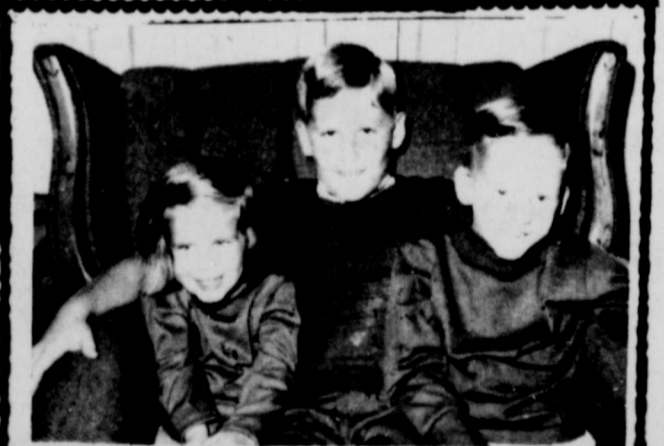
