"B" CARNEY Marsh of Denton said Monday he will support the candidacy of Tom Creighton for election as State Senator in District 22.

"After much prayerful consideration, I have decided to endorse the candidacy of Tom Creighton", Marsh stated.

Marsh, Creighton and Rep. Tom Holmes sought election to the Senate in the May 6 Democratic primary. Holmes, a member of the House for the past eight years, and Creighton, who is fifth ranked in Senate seniority face a runoff election June 3.

Marsh who polled almost 12,000 votes in his first bid ever for public office, also stated, "I would like to take this opportunity to thank the many persons throughout the district who voted for me."

"I hope that those who saw fit to vote for one of my two opponents, will again check the records of Mr. Creighton and Mr. Holmes. I am concerned about Rep. Holmes relationship with Speaker Mutschers crowd, and conflicts between his business interests and his legislative committee assignments. Holmes also has failed to explain how he disposed of \$4,600 in the taxpayer's postage stamps. If those who supported Rep. Holmes can still fully agree with his record in Austin, I will certainly respect their opinion," Marsh said.

BY CHARLOTTE MASON The Eastland Mavettes finished the best season in their history by placing a first, second, fourth and seventh, scoring 26 points in the state U.I.L. Girls Track and Field Meet held in Austin May 13.

Although the Mavettes did not win a team title in District or Regional they were third in District and a strong second place in Region I track meet by scoring 56 points.

There were only eight contestants in each event from all over the state of Texas. So it was a real honor to even be a qualifier for the meet. JoAnn Crawford started off at 10:00 a.m. Saturday morning by

placing 7th in the Broad Jump with a jump of 16'3 1/4"

The next Eastland contestant was Dollie Mosley who ran the 60 yd. dash in 7.1 which was fine enough for second place. First place time was only one tenth of a second faster. Runner up is a tremendous honor for any young athlete.

Our next entry was our 880 relay team, in which each of the four girls ran a 220. The relay team ran an excellent race placing fourth place, which could have just as easily been a second or third place.

The members of the relay team are Dollie Moseley, Jerri Simms, Karen Jones and Jo Ann Crawford. Three are

sophomores and one junior on the team - Jo Ann is the only junior.

The last event and last chance Eastland had for a state champion was Audrey England

in the 880 run.

Audrey's best previous time had been a 2:23.8 at the district track meet in Snyder.

There were eight contestants in all and Audrey had the third best time going into the race. The finish was as exciting as any 880 race in the past three years Audrey has run.

She won the race by out kicking the previous state champion and one other runner in the last 100 yards - which is Audrey's trademark. She ran an outstanding time for a high school athlete of 2:19.6

The existing national record is 2:18.6 for high school girls. Needless to say these five

young ladies who participated in Austin at the first U.I.L. sponsored state track meet for girls represented Eastland in the highest honors possible - a state champion, a runner up to the state champion, a fourth and seventh place and a total of 26 points. A job well done Eastland Mavettes.

Bell Okayed; Lone Star Asks 10%, Offered 6%

Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. got their second reading of a rate increase ordinance and Lone Star Gas Co. got a county offer, during a marathon City Commission Meeting Monday evening at City Hall.

The Commission heard a formal complaint registered by a citizen regarding the relocation of the cement plant, and conducted a multitude of other business during the meeting.

Mayor Pro Tem W.Q. Verner presided in the absence of Mayor Durel Reid who was attending the Mayor's Convention in San Antonio, and all other commissioners were present.

City Manager Lewis Tiner reported that the Water Quality Board still shows concern for the condition of the dam at Lake Eastland, and said the District Soil Conservation Service Manager Marion Porter has inspected the site, and will work with the board.

On a request from the school, the commission approved a 10 miles per hour speed limit on the loop at the Elementary School.

Tiner asked for approval of certain civil rights forms and maps showing the location of minority groups in Eastland, necessary in connection with the city's application for funds to construct the new sewer plant.

Permission was granted to Bob King to irrigate from one of his tanks into which spill over from Eastland Lake runs.

Lewis Wayne Bailey was given a quick claim deed for in correction previous deed for a lot at the corner of Sadosa and Connellee Sts., where a small store is reportedly to be built.

Tiner announced that the Texas Municipal League District meeting will be in S Stamford on May 22.

Commissioners decided to examine some lots in the south part of town owned by the city, and sought by a citizen who wants to buy them for horse pasture. The lots are low and thought of no building use.

Mrs. Ruby Whaley appeared before the commission and registered an objection to the relocation of the cement plant from the southeast part of town to north of town. She expressed concern for the area.

John McGowan, district manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., appeared and requested a second reading on his company's request for a rate increase. After brief discussion, the reading was given.

D.L. May, local manager for Lone Star Gas Co., appeared and requested a 10 percent rate increase. After lengthy discussion, the city fathers offered a six percent increase, including the approval of the new rate adjustment plan, already approved by the Railroad Commission. Mr. May was confronted first off with a copy of his company's recent stock holders report which showed record earnings. He

explained that other segments of the giant company are showing profits, but that the gas distribution system in some 300 towns are not making their fair rate of return.

Commissioners reminded that the company was granted a 20.6 increase in 1969 when the company asked 25 percent. It was agreed that Lone Star would be granted a rate increase equal to those given the other utilities. Mr. May did not accept the offer but reported that he would relay the information to his company. It

remains to be seen whether the figure will be accepted.

"In addition," stated D.L. May, "Lone Star has a commitment to its customers to vigorously compete for supplies of natural gas to keep its reserves in a favorable position.

Approval of the company's application would increase the average monthly residential gas bill by approximately 72 cents.

Lone Star serves more than 1600 customers in Eastland.

The occasion served as a farewell from Mrs. Jones to the girls, as she has served for the past three years as their sponsor for the Sub Deb Club.

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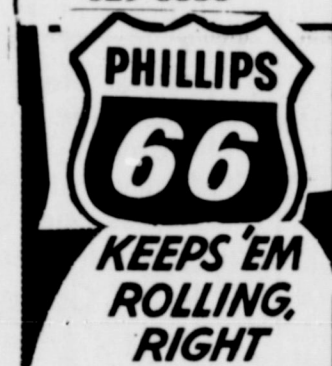

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

Now Is Time To Control Casebearer

Now is the time to control the pecan nut casebearer in Eastland County.

Judging from the insect activity in pecan orchards and groves, County Agent, De Gordon predicts that May 17th through May 20th will be the best time to spray pecan trees.

Gordon emphasized that the insect development will vary from one place to another in the county. Growers should check their own trees for egg deposits and feeding of newly hatched larvae to determine the optimum time to spray. When one to two percent of the young nuts have been punctured by the casebearer it is time to spray, the agent said.

Gordon urged commercial pecan growers to have their sprayer and insecticides ready and make daily checks in the orchard or grove to observe egg deposits and feeding of the small worms.

Adult mothers deposit small eggs - barely visible to the naked eye on the tips of the pecans. Eggs hatch in four or five days and the young larvae migrate to buds below the nuts to feed. After a day or two, they enter the nuts at the base. The insecticide should be applied when a majority of the eggs are hatching and before the young worms enter the pecans.

The insecticides that can be used for the control of these casebearers are Guthion, Thiodan, Malathion, and Toxaphene. Use these insecticides according to directions given on the label of the container.

Through coverage is essential for the control of this insect. Be sure that the spray is

applied to the tree to the point of run-off.

To get effective control a second spraying may be needed seven to ten days later.

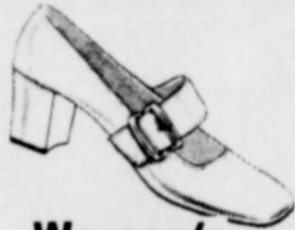

Angley Detained At Local Meet; Issues Statement

Mr. Maurice Angley Jr., Republican candidate for State Treasurer was unfortunately detained and unable to attend the 10 a.m. reception in his honor on Friday at the Bank Conference Room.

Due to the heavy rains, roads between Wichita Falls and Eastland were impassable. Realizing that he would be unable to keep his appointment Mr. Angley tried in vain to call. Apparently the storm Thursday night had put the telephones out of order.

Mr. Angley conveyed his sincere apology and regret at this delay.

Mrs. H.J. Bulgerin, hostess, said it was impossible to reschedule the reception.

Mr. Angley arrived in Eastland after lunch and during an interview with this newspaper said:

"While it was Mutscher, Shannon and McGinty who were found guilty of bribery conspiracy charges arising from the political loans of Frank Sharp, it was State Treasurer James who provided Sharp with the lendable funds."

"No other State Treasurer in the history of Texas has ever played so fast and loose with the taxpayer's money as did State Treasurer James at the now defunct Sharpstown State Bank."

"By means of multimillion dollar transfers of State Deposits to Sharp's bank in the months preceding the loans to those involved in the bribery conspiracy, the State Treasurer put up what bankers refer to as the 'compensating balances' for the loans."

"Almost the entire increase in total deposits at the Sharpstown State Bank as shown by that bank's Statement of Condition during the period preceding these political loans was attributable to the blatantly preferential treatment given Sharp by State Treasurer Jessie James 4."

"Throughout the period when Mutscher and the others borrowed hundreds of thousands from Sharp so that they could buy National Banker's Life Stock, Treasurer James maintained State Deposits at Sharp's suburban bank of \$10,034,875.00," Rep. Angley said.

Angley pointed out that these deposits amounted to approximately one-seventh of the total deposits at the now defunct Sharpstown State Bank.

"Ask any banker in Eastland County if he has ever heard of any bank here having such huge State Deposits and he will tell you that he hasn't...no other bank in history ever received such preferential treatment from the State Treasurer of Texas."

"This sort of political preference in regards to State Deposits, in and of itself, is a gross abuse of discretion by Treasurer James."

"However, to most of us what is of more concern is that because of James' mismanagement of State Deposits at Sharps bank the state lost over a million dollars in revenue."

"James deposited \$6,000,000 in the Sharpstown State Bank at 5 percent interest, but the balance, \$4,034,875, was left for well over two years sitting parked in a checking account earning no interest whatsoever."

"The effective rate of interest James earned on State Deposits at Sharp's bank was only 2.93 percent when he could and should have earned the prevailing rate of 7 percent...the difference amounts to over a \$1 million loss for the people of Texas," Rep. Angley said.

"As your State Treasurer I intend to put an end to such 'political preference' deposits of State Funds. All funds in excess of what is necessary to pay to our State's bills on a current basis should be invested in interest bearing accounts earning revenue for the people of Texas."

"Proper management of Treasury Deposits will produce an increase in state interest earnings of over \$10 million dollars a year, which means that we will need that much less in 1973," Rep. Angley concluded.

Rep. Angley, on a week long tour of Texas cities has spoken in Brady, Eden, San Angelo, Ballinger, Coleman, Abilene, Albany, Breckenridge, Throckmorton, Snyder, Sweetwater, Vernon, Wichita Falls, Henrietta, Bowie and Jacksboro and is scheduled to speak in Cisco, Rising Star, Goldthwaite, Midland and El Paso.

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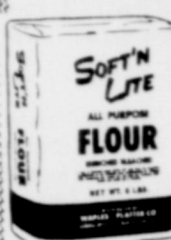

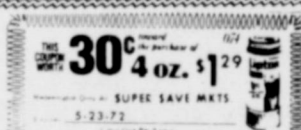
