## City Closes 'Utility Session For Awhile, Hopefully

The Eastland City Commission hopefully put its public utility tramas behind it at the regular Monday evening meeting and launched into projects for the future including development of new housing west of town.

After a five-month discussion, the City passed on second reading, an ordinance granting Lone Star Gas Co. permission to raise rates by eight percent. This will go into effect in 30 days and will result in an average increase of 57c per month to the average residential user. Local Manager D.L. May reports.

In other utility action, the commission "removed" the six-month stipulation and gave a second reading to an ordinance asking for toll-free dialing between Cisco and Ranger. This will take some 18 months, Local Manager John McGowan reports. The measure has given final approval in Cisco, but lacks passage in Ranger to become effective. Eastland

rates will increase 50c per month for this additional service, which when in effect will give Eastlanders toll free dialing to Cisco, Ranger, Carbon and Olden. Ranger will have free dialing to Eastland, Olden and Carbon. Rate increase in Cisco and Ranger will be 25c per month.

Motion for the Lone Star approval came from H.V. O'Brien with a second by Dale Bakker. The vote was unanimous. Both Cisco and Ranger have already passed the eight-percent increase. The Eastland commission was reluctant to pass the increase because a 20.6 increase was granted the company in 1969; however the company still reports itself some 12 percent deficient, but originally asked only 10 percent increase, and then compromised down to eight percent. Eastland on two occasions offered six percent but this offer was rejected by

## Variety of Magic Menu Names Sparkle From V-C Eastland Plant

"What's in a name?" If the names of restaurants served by Eastland's V-C Menus are an indication there's really quite a lot. Ranging from the whimsical to the geographical to the names of the owners all are directed toward getting attention and selling food!

One operator, using his initials as a restaurant name, prominently proclaims that his place is mortgaged, his wife is its president, he is athletic director (the only restaurant with such an officer) and that he supports his family and a fair game of golf from his business.

A Pennsylvania operator probably having misgivings about a new business venture called his restaurant "Wonder Why!"

A Family Affair, a Minnesota restaurant, suggests family togetherness and home cooking while the Alibi Supper Club and The Back Door border on the more worldly instead of the domestic. Around the Corner seems to answer the question "where's a good place to eat?" while Across the Street announces a nearby place for a sandwich and coffee.

The Whale's Tail of New Bedford, Massachusetts & The Black-ode Runner of Myrtle Beach, S.C. recall sea adventures as in the hills of eastern Oklahoma the Belle Starr Restaurant keeps alive

the memories of the lady bandit of the Kiamichis.

Colors represent a large group of restaurants. Blue, for instance, appears in the name of many places in many ways. From Texas' Blue Bonnet, the Blue Goose, Jay, Grass, Hill, Palace, Marlin, Peak, Quail, Ribbon, Star, Front and Top all bid the hungry patron to come in. The color green is represented in each state by the ubiquitous Green Frog Restaurant.

A cartoon yellow canary chirps from the menu cover that Cooney Twitty Restaurant sells Twitty-Burgers in Oklahoma City. Black Angus Restaurants vie with Sir-Lion Steak Houses each emblazoned with pictures of tremendous Black Angus or Hereford bulls. And each hopefully giving the impression that their tender progeny is offered for sale rather than the bulls. Inside the covers further naming of items carry out the theme. A popular item on many menus is the combining of a filet mignon and lobster tail. In some restaurants these items from the steak & seafood sections served in this manner are said to "be married."

Nuptials completed restaurant operators bestow diverse names on this dish, each denoting origins of the entrees. Surf and Turf is very popular. Hoof and Fin has a small following. Beef and Reef is catching on while Sea and Lea,

though accurate, smacks of snobbery and isn't used.

Truck Stops offer children's plates to "Little Tractors and Truckerettes" and Western Hills, Skies, Trails, Grills offer the same Kiddie Menu or Korner to Little Cowboys and Cowgirls. In both cases the offer is made because "they are our customers of tomorrow."

Regional and famous names and edifices are popular and are sometimes in strange places. A Winkie Restaurant may appear in stark West Texas. A Chinese Pagoda sells chow mein on the Kansas plains as Colonial, Castas, Carriage Houses and Savoy's abound in unlikely places. In Mesilla Park, New Mexico there is Bonnie and Clyde Restaurant. To order from the menu of the Bam-Bay Bicycle Club one must be in Memphis, Tennessee.

These restaurants and thousands more represent the tremendous impact the food business has on the economy of the United States. The Joe's, Pete's and Bob's Diners along with Bird of Paradise, Camelots and Countabouts contribute millions of dollars in pursuit of feeding the American diner.

VC Menus with a mailing list approaching 20,000 serves the above restaurants and many more through production of its menus and Radi-Clips.

LEGAL NOTICE

AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE

TO BE CHARGED FOR SALES OF NATURAL GAS TO RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF EASTLAND, EASTLAND COUNTY, AND PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATE MAY BE CHANGED, ADJUSTED AND AMENDED. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered from and after thirty (30) days from the date of final passage of this ordinance, the maximum general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial

consumers within the city limits of Eastland by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date; gross rate shall be applicable thereafter.

The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per meter per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations in effect.

No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.

ADJUSTMENTS  
The amount of each net monthly bill computed at the above - stated rates shall be subject to the following adjustments: Plus or minus the amount of any increase or decrease, respectively, above or below the 42.5 cents per Mcf level in the intracompany city gate charge as authorized by the Railroad Commission of the State of Texas of other regulatory body having jurisdiction for gas delivered to Lone Star Gas Company's distribution system for sale to residential and commercial consumers where such changes are caused by increases or decreases in the cost of gas purchased by the Company; plus an amount equivalent to the proportionate part of any new tax, or increased tax, or any other governmental imposition, rental, fee or charge (except state, county, city and special district ad valorem taxes and taxes on net income) levied, assessed or imposed subsequent to April 1, 1972, upon or allocable to the Company's distribution operations, by any new or amended law, ordinance or contract. Each gross monthly bill shall be adjusted proportionately. Company, at its option, may forego the application of any adjustment if such adjustment would result in an increase in the monthly bill; however, failure of Company to apply any adjustment shall not constitute a waiver of Company's right from time to time, or at any time, to make any adjustment, in whole or in part, in any subsequent current monthly bill that may be applicable to such bill.

SECTION 3. It is hereby found and determined that the meetings at which this ordinance was passed were open to the public, as required by Texas law, and that advance public notice of the time, place and purpose of said meetings was given, and that this rate ordinance is in compliance with the applicable general criteria issued by the Price Commission under the Economic Stabilization Act of 1970, as amended.

PASSED AND APPROVED on first reading on this the 17th day of July, A.D. 1972.

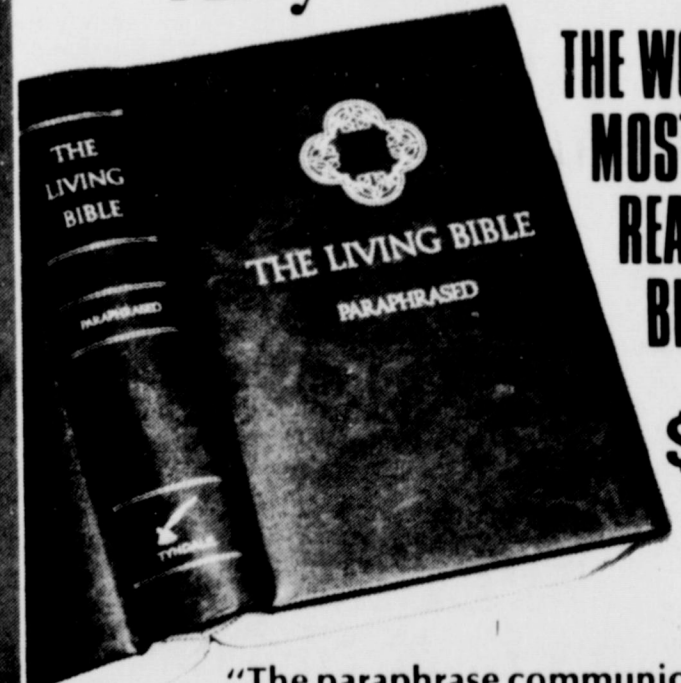

Coach Jack Waggoner, who has fashioned a 15-6 record in his four years at the helm of the DeLeon Bearcats, welcomes back one of his slimmest rosters of veteran performers for the '72 season. But, still, there is little reason to believe the defending Dist. 10-A champions won't be right back in the thick of things.

"We lost a total of 17 players who helped us," Waggoner says, "but traditionally the DeLeon Bearcats come to play. If our young kids come along like they can we could be in there."

Four offensive and three defensive returnees will form the foundation for the '72 club which will be hard pressed to duplicate last year's 8-3 season and 5-

0 league record. Back to direct the wins and information attack will be quarterback Gary Park (5-10, 150, Sr.). He'll be joined on the offense by regulars Robert Gilder (6-1, 175, Sr.) at tackle and Buzzy Mahan (5-8, 150, Jr.) at center.

Junior John Swint (5-7, 160) looms as a strong candidate at tailback while Gary Didd (5-8, 150, Jr.) and Mike Riggs (5-9, 150, Soph.) could solve the guard problems. Bidding for the vacant tackle spot will be Les Bailey (6-0, 160, Soph.) and Joey Boxwell (6-1, 180, Soph.). Jerry McKillip (5-10, 150, Soph.) will provide back-up strength at center and possibly guard.

Defensively, tackle Budd Golden (5-10,

210, Soph.) and halfback Monte Stewart (5-9, 150, Sr.) is back and will again double as fullback on offense.

Newcomers slated for yeoman duty include Myron Adams (6-0, 170, Sr.) and Don Paul (6-0, 170, Jr.), both tackles, linebacker Jeff Brinson (5-10, 170, Soph.), halfback Scott Weaver (5-8, 145, Jr.) and end Glenn Boyd (6-2, 185, Jr.). Boyd or Park will handle the kicking chores.

Look for the Bearcats to return to the brand of passing they showed two years ago, forcing the opposition's defense into guarding a wide-open style of attack.

# Wranglers Down Rangers 22-0

Cisco, as it has in 12 of 13 Peanut Bowl meetings, buried the Rangers again Saturday night, this time by a 22-0 score.

But the game itself was an unbelievable, sometimes comical, sometimes frustrating series of events which would defy the imagination of an imaginative fiction writer.

When it was all over, the game had produced an amazing 14 turnovers — nine of them by the Rangers, who lost six of 17 fumbles and threw away three more in the air. Cisco managed to hold it down to four fumbles and an interception.

In the bizarre first half the Rangers had 135 yards total offense to Cisco's 70. Ranger had a 51-yard punt return and several other plays that came within inches of breaking the distance. Still, the score was 15-0. Cisco. It takes a bit of head scratching to figure out how that happened.

You can start with the first four fumbles which the Rangers lost during the opening 30 minutes. This doesn't take into consideration several others which caused the Ranger offense to take several steps backwards.

At any rate, nothing came of it. Cisco had a 25-yard field goal stray to the right. Of course, it didn't go into the end zone. Ranger wound up with it at the seven — and promptly fumbled when Glenn Printers' halfback pass to Dorsey McGuire was good, only to be fumbled by McGuire.

It didn't matter. Cisco fumbled it right back, and Ken Robinson recovered for Ranger. This just allowed the Rangers to sever another artery. On fourth down Jim Whitley's punt was blocked by Alvin Walker, plucked out of the air by Rickey Parr—who proceeded into the end zone for a touchdown with 55 seconds left in the half.

Mark Johnson, who had earlier kicked a 31-yard field goal, missed the PAT. It was 15-0, and that's the way it stayed until the second half.

Cisco scored its first three points at the 7:04 mark of the second quarter. Prior to that, Ranger had seen Dean Zachary's field goal attempt blocked from 27 yards out. Ranger then held Cisco only to fumble away a 43-yard punt when Joshua Thomas failed to hold on to the football.

Cisco responded, covering the football at the Ranger 20. After one first down the Rangers settled for Johnson's 31-yard field goal.

Ranger continued to move through the Cisco defense, but quarterback Jody Duke fumbled at midfield and Cisco took over. Following a 24-yard draw play by Dick Austin, who fumbled, Ranger took over—and fumbled it right back to Cisco—who promptly turned it back over to Ranger via an interception. Har-

grove's pass was stolen by McGuire at the Ranger 20.

Ranger ran a few plays and tried to punt. It didn't work. Bob Shea blocked the punt, and Cisco took over at the Ranger 12. Three plays netted only three yards, but Ranger managed to jump offside and the ball moved half the distance to the goal. Austin then bumped ahead for a yard, and that was enough for the first down. The Wranglers finally put the Rangers out of their misery three plays and another penalty later. Hargrove rolled to his left, kept and scored from the nine. With 14 seconds to go, Eddie Geter of Ranger managed to block Johnson's kick.

Cisco took complete control in the second half, though still managing a couple more fumbles of its own. Ranger picked up right where it left off — fumbling on its first offensive play of the second half. Irwin Johnson recovered for the Wranglers.

Following a couple of exchanges, Cisco took over at its own 15 and proceeded to drive 85 yards, grind out five first downs and score seven more points. Austin had the big play — 42 yards through the heart of the anger defense. Earl Zachery got 12 more the same way. When the offense bogged down, Ranger came through with Cecil Nelson jumping offside on fourth and two at the six. This moved it to the three, and in just three more plays Cisco scored. Zachery divin gaver from the one. Johnson kicked it to 22-0.

The Wranglers were also the recipients of some timely penalties against the Rangers—like the time when Wrangler quarterback Walter Hargrove fumbled the ball after being severely bashed by Floyd Jones before Duke got another pass picked off at the 12, this one by Parr. Cisco got it and fumbled it back to Ranger, who in turn fumbled it back to Cisco. Johnny Foreman recovered Ranger's, and Zaachery Cisco's.

And so it went until the clocked finally ticked off. It's back to the drawing board for both teams.

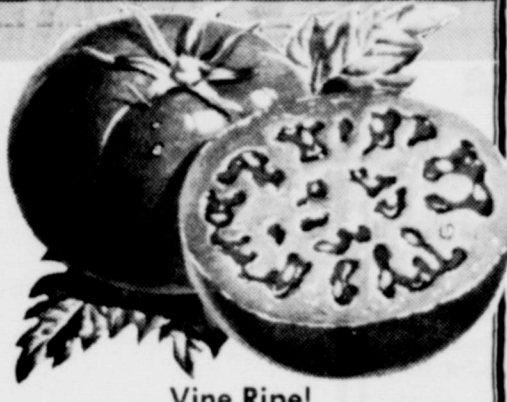
