MOST SPECTACULAR sight ever has to be a new light cone suspended nightly over Eastland, marking the town with its beacon. Best location to see the phenomenon is driving northward from Carbon on Highway 6 after dark. As far out as four or five miles, you'll see the inverted searchlight effect pointing to our town. As you drive further in, you'll find at the Int. 20 - 6 interchange, that the light is not from above, but from four powerful beams near the ground, and spotlighting the new Gulf sign at the Reuben Gaeta Service Station at the interchange. City Meet Set Friday At 2:30 P. M.

A special called meeting of the Eastland City Commission has been set for 2:30 p.m. Friday at which details for a new Farmers Home Administration which can finance up to two-thirds of library

community center projects will be discussed.

Marion Porter, Project Officer for the Soil Conservation Service of Stephenville, will be the speaker. H.V. O'Brien has announced. O'Brien was named

by the commission to secure data on federal programs.

The public is cordially invited to attend the meeting. Mr. Porter will also make a brief report on the City Park plans.

Shopping List Could Exceed \$440,000 Now

Total price for the assortment of items now on Eastland's shopping list could reach nearly \$440,000 if all are given greenlights along the way.

The City is committed on a couple of projects, semi-committed on others and toying with the idea for the others. These figures do not include financing costs, assuming bonds, loans or other means, either of which would result in paying for the use of money, as in any financing.

Most definite commitment is the \$92,000 revenue bonds already passed for construction of a new sewer treatment plant, final government approval for which is now pending. This amount however would be retired from revenue sources without tax increases. The City recently raised the sewer fee to 50¢ and it is hoped that when payments of some \$750 a month on this issue begin, they can be made without taking much, if any from other funds.

(News picked up Friday indicated that recent legislation, if carried through could reduce the city's cost on this from \$92,000 to perhaps as low as \$50,000 which would be a boon to the city funds.)

The two definite commitments the city has are to provide water and sewerage to the Interstate 20 interchange east of town where the 72-unit Ramada Inn will begin construction soon. Upon completion, it and several other firms and individuals in that area will be taken into the city limits.

Roughest kind of guestaments put the cost of taking a sewer line east in the \$30,000 category, while the water line will probably run somewhere around \$10,000.

The City wants to take a sewer line north to serve that area and the cost could be some \$12,000 -- assuming permission can be obtained from the T&P Railway Co. to bore under their right-of-way. (Word Friday was that

maybe T&P is ready to cooperate in getting this done.)

In this sewer-package arrangement, the City plans to secure engineering data on providing sewer service south to the Int. 20 - Highway 6 interchange, in order to be ready to move in the event a request came in the future for that area.

City's participation in the development of Crestwood Living Center, the new development west of town, could run as high as \$7,000 plus use of city labor in fulfilling obligations for improvements there.

Big ticket item for the city could be the library-community center project which presently has a tag of some \$215,000, furnished and ready to go. The Commission has agreed to call an election on that fact, but no specifics have been worked out. At the last meeting of the Mayor's Library Committee, at which he and one other Commissioner were present, it was the general consensus of opinion among the committee members that they were in favor of calling an election on the total package on a go, or no-go situation. However some feel that such a total package might not pass on a vote and fear that the library's chances might suffer on other votes.

Some have expressed opinion that perhaps the library-community center project could be modified a great deal in view of the announcement of the Ramada Inn's locating here, which is to have substantial meeting room facilities.

It has been established that there are government programs available which could be utilized for the library-center concept provided certain guidelines are met, and it is presumed that these guidelines are within the scope of the community's goals.

As much as two-thirds of the cost could be secured from federal help. Another big ticket item which

awaits any kind of action, is development of the City Park.

The Parks and Wildlife Dept., through the Soil Conservation Service, has given the city a master plan for development of the park, and steps could be initiated soon. Printed cost figure on the plan calls for some \$75,000, but two major items (revamping of the bath house facilities and community meeting room, both from the present Firemen's Hall Building) are left unpriced because they would involve architect's work. Guess is that these two items could be handled for some \$25,000, bringing the total Park cost to about \$100,000, half of which would be financed through government help, so the city's cost would be about \$50,000 for a first-class park facility.

Another definite figure that the city is paying on right now and will for about 12 more months at \$1,000 a month, is the tractor bought for and being used in the city's landfill operation south of town.

And so there's a lot of things to be considering, and it's assumed that the commission will be using sharp pencils to figure the amount of available monies when this year's spending is completed, so as to determine the amount of available money to be used for projects next year.

Of course the day-to-day work of the city goes on. This includes the sewer and water connections of new houses being built, as well as the 1,001 other day-to-day maintenance and operational procedures which keeps the city growing and functioning.

Excluding the \$92,000 sewer plant obligation, the cost for the other items could total up to \$336,000.

This figure could be reduced with federal assistance provided that route is accepted.

Information provided by Marion Porter, project coordinator, indicates that the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has a program known as the

Voter registration is continuous now, but voters must be registered 30 days before an election to be eligible. This period enables the tax office to get names added to the poll lists through the data processing system now used.

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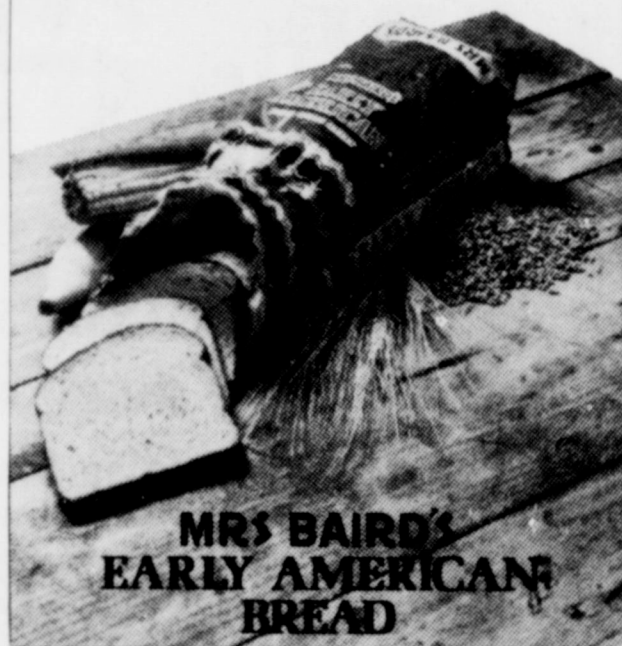

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Murder Trial Under Way In 91st District Court

Jury selection began Wednesday morning at 9 a.m. for the trial of Harold Ray Powers. Monday in the 91st District Court, the jury found Powers, 25, of Brownwood mentally capable to stand trial for the murder of Gordon Bengston, 45, of Boston, Mass. The six - woman, six man jury took approximately ten minutes to find Powers sane. The trial was moved to Eastland County from Brown after Power's former defense attorneys, Levi Olds and Gordon Griffin, testified their client could not get a fair trial in Brownwood, due to pre-trial publicity. Powers is being tried for the murder of Bengston who was allegedly shot, and then beaten with parts of a rifle and finally having his throat cut. Dec. 1, 1970, at Brownwood Lake. Bill Wright of Cisco, court appointed attorney for Powers said his client was not, in his opinion, mentally competent to stand trial at this time or

His wife, Moonyene, represented Holy Trinity as delegate to the convention in Dallas, September 30. OKLAHOMA CITY - U.S. Air Force Airman First Class Herbert R. Casey Jr., son of H.R. Casey of Rt. 1, Eastland, has returned to Tinker AFB, Okla., after helping sample the wind field in and above urban areas of Illinois.

Airman Casey, a weather observer with the 6th Weather Squadron (Mobile) at Tinker, and 25 other squadron members deployed from the Oklahoma base to Scott AFB, Ill., to support the Illinois Water Survey project.

The airman's weather team helped determine the characteristics of the wind field by providing low-level pilot balloon and radiosonde observations in the planetary boundary layer of the earth's atmosphere. More than 1,000 balloon releases were completed to an average height of 9,000 feet and an additional 116 radiosonde timed aerial soundings were made from 10 different sites. The information obtained will help in the prediction of pollutants dispersion and in determining the transport of heat and moisture into the atmosphere from urban areas.
