

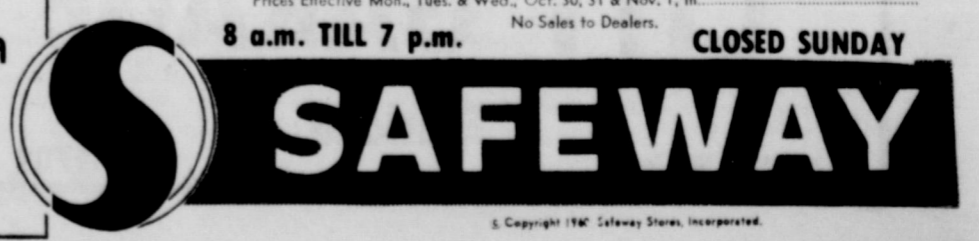

Combination Car Show Bazaar Seen For Next Year '73

A combination New Car Show and Senior Citizens Bazaar appears to be the recommendation for next year. Both events have just had successful runs in Eastland this past week.

Chamber of Commerce President Marcus O'Dell called the new car - farm equipment and sidewalk sale held last Saturday in Eastland a success, and was the County Senior Citizens Bazaar held Thursday and Friday of this week. Speaking to the chamber board of directors, he recommended that the two main events be combined for an even bigger project next year. 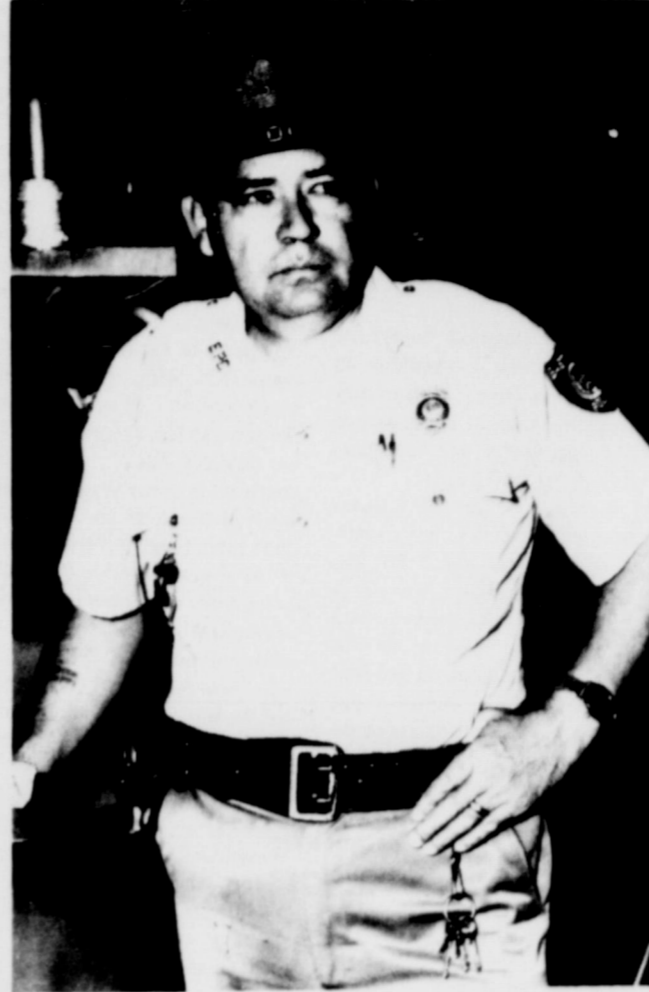

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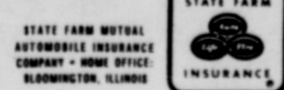
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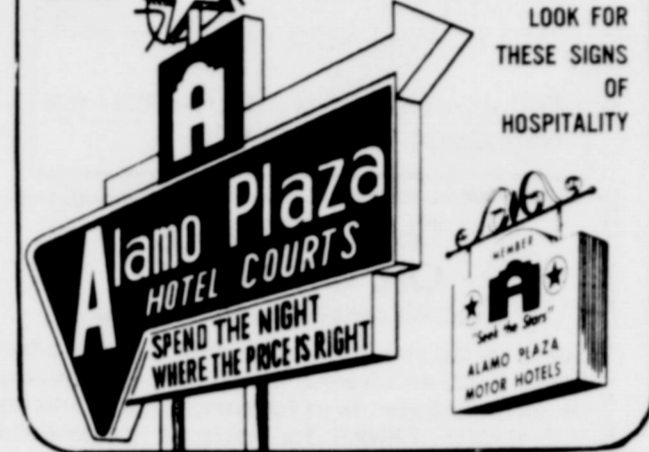

I have lived in Eastland for forty years, a good many have come and gone but this I have observed that though perhaps few in number, our city fathers and civic leaders helped us to stand tall in thinking and pulling together to do a big job.
WPA years were lean years for us all but a City Park (now Legion Hill) grew out of it - a beautiful water fountain cost money then too. Our Cemetery had a face lifting and has maintained it with the help of the City - - - All of this was more or less just handed to us - but it did not make weaklings of us that we expect everything good to come to us. Work is sometimes a cure - all for a lot of illnesses and Eastland has come through without the scars.

I do not relish a remark made (not in our town) that we are not "progressive enough to want and carry through our present plan of building a Center with Library included."
I'd like to point out that bigger things than the above have been attempted with success.
First: a Hospital where the townfolk worked shoulder to shoulder as one: A community effort that won for us an award of \$10,000.00 for our togetherness. **YOU DID IT!**
Second: The Eastland Telegram, Feb. 3rd, 1963, carried a fine article by the then new Editor, Mr. H.V. O'Brien regarding the proposed \$525,000.00 Bond issue for the Elementary school. It carried regardless of tax increase and now 10 years later it is our pride and joy to show prospective residents and industries. **YOU DID IT!**
Third: The new gym, which was a MUST for our school, though the efforts of the School Board and our present Superintendent quote: \$44,000.00 put up by the school

and arrangements for \$50,000.00 more at 3 percent to buy up the old bonds. All this after a declared bankruptcy 22 years earlier - - - our school was out of debt. **YOU DID IT!**
Feb. 3rd issue stated that there were 1,679 qualified voters. Minimum wage then was \$1.25 per hour. 1970 Eastland census is 43 average age and the average salary is \$5,742.00.
A pack of cigarettes is now doubled in price, a permanent wave was \$6 - \$8 or \$10. Now the same is \$10, \$12, or \$16.50. If we buy cat food or four cokes - it is about 40 cents. Now some of these things I feel we don't have to have if the saving of 12 1/2 cents per week can mean a better environment and advantage for children today - adults tomorrow.
Do you remember when we had to buy our school books? Your tax dollar and mine supply these things today - would you have it otherwise?
A lot of us needed that craft center and a handy research Library when we were young - it will take so little to give it now. **WE CAN DO IT!**
That window in our house is not meant just to let out the

stale air or smoke but also to let the fresh air in!
These lines, for me, are the Secret of Life.
Tired? Yes. Then work and work.
Blue? Yes. Then laugh, don't shirk.
Disgusted? Yes. Then do some kindly deed.
Unhappy? Yes. Then give time to sober thought and need.
Don't do only what you like to do.
Try to like what you have to do.
We'll do it again when we build our new Library and Youth Center with a wonderful auditorium! Let's have it for the Centennial!
