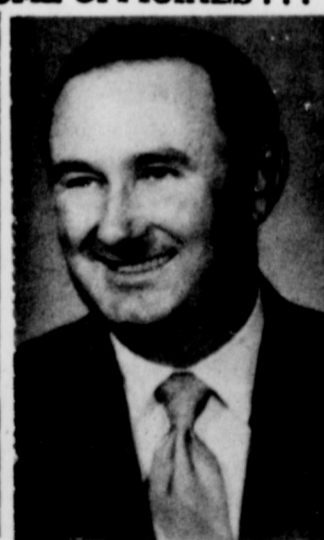

Judge Bailey To Speak At Law Enforcement Meet

Editor:
It is hoped that when it comes time for Eastland taxpayers, and non-taxpayers, to vote Oct. 31, on the proposed civic center and library issue, that a resounding representation of both "pros" and "cons" turn out.

I personally feel that Eastland needs some sort of a modern, properly equipped, gathering place, whether it be a "civic center" or a Coliseum such as Snyder and Brownwood have. And, it is apparent that we do need bigger and better library facilities.

What I AM against, though, is the proposed manner of paying for the \$215,000 bond issue, what with added interest means we'll be paying over one-third of a million dollars over the suggested 16 year pay period.

I also feel there has been some misleading information put out about how much tax increase the "average" taxpayer will be faced with. However, it is true this letter that was mailed to certain persons in Eastland could have been the product of an innocent effort on the part of those who devised it.

I also object to the manner in which the election was called and foisted on the public in not following State laws and guidelines at the time the City called the election. Article 6252-17 of the Texas State Code, called "Notice of Public Meetings", states specifically that all duly elected governing bodies, whether they be City Commissions, School Boards, Water Supply Districts, etc., shall post with the County Clerk's office a notice, filed a minimum of three days in advance of a called meeting, the purpose of which (in this case) was to discuss the calling of a bond election to spend taxpayers money.

No such notice was filed with the Eastland County Clerk's office prior to the called session of the Eastland City Commission when it met in called session October 9, 1972. The County Clerk's records also do not reflect that a notice was filed prior to any of the special sessions which preceded the Oct. 9 session.

Actually, the County of Eastland is about the only entity that is solvent at the present time, and able to finance such a project as a County Coliseum.

I feel that the proponents of the Civic Center and Library are being a little too hasty, and in their haste have not delved deeply enough into the possibility of obtaining Federal assistance.

Consequently, I feel that when all the votes are tallied Tuesday night, Oct. 31, the issue will fall in defeat.
