CITY'S FIRE RATING IS IMPROVED

Eastland has gained another five percent increase in its fire rating, Fire Chief Billy Jack Johnson was notified this week.

Chief Johnson said he had been notified by Eugene Sanders, director of fire prevention for the State Board of Insurance, that this city will have a 15 percent credit rating beginning April 1.

Eastland's present fire rating is 10 percent. The best rating possible is 25 percent and it is possible to have a minus 15 percent rating.

Sanders said Eastland's insured losses during the past year totaled \$18,621 while premiums paid here totaled \$35,252.

The credit rating is based on a five year period.

California Man Suffers Third Degree Burns

A California man suffered second and third degree burns on his hand Thursday night when a tarpaulin on his truck caught fire in the 1300 block of West Commerce.

Calvin Jackson was given emergency treatment at Eastland Memorial Hospital. His attending physician, Dr. M. A. Treadwell, said some of the burns were probably third degree. Jackson left for California after emergency treatment.

Eastland firemen answered the alarm and damage was slight. It is believed a cigaret caused the blaze.

15 DRIVERS LOSE LICENSE

Fifteen Eastland County drivers had their drivers licenses suspended in 1958, according to statistics released by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Out of this number, 10 licenses were suspended when the driver was charged with driving while intoxicated. Other suspensions were due to aggravated assault with motor vehicle, habitual violations, accident responsibility and other violations. Five licenses were denied due to DWI charges.

A total of 27 convictions resulted for failure to file or show financial responsibility in 32 county accidents.

Dallas County led the state with 1,828 convictions from 2,718 accidents. Second was Harris County with 1,077 convictions resulting from 4,824 accidents.

State totals show 15,131 convictions resulting from 23,184 accidents. A grand total of 24,121 drivers licenses were either suspended or denied in the state, during the year. Of this number 8,066 were suspended and 4,417 were denied for DWI.

Another 6,945 were suspended and 19 were denied for habitual violators.

District Governor Gives Challenge to 140 Lions

An estimated 140 persons heard Judge Marvin Simpson Jr., District 2-E governor of Lions International, speak at a county-wide banquet held in his honor Thursday night in the Fellowship Hall of the First Methodist Church in Eastland.

Lions and their wives from Eastland, Cisco and Ranger were on hand for the occasion.

Governor Simpson urged Lions not to become complacent and self-satisfied with their accomplishments.

"It is a challenge to us... to look forward to the opportunities in our communities," he told his fellow Lions.

He called on Lions to try to make "this world and this

community a little better place in which to live." Pointing out that Lions International is now 41 years old (the club was founded in Dallas), he said the civic organization has clubs in 92 countries and geographic locations with more than 590,000 members and 24,000 clubs.

"Lions are men with a new look," he stated. "We often talk of outer space in this day and time, but you, as Lions, are working on inner space."

Gov. Simpson, who serves as Tarrant County judge, said that Lions are busy the world over trying to get people and countries back together.

Calling attention to the Lions' pin, the banquet speaker told his listeners it "... represents the fact that you care." He explained that the pin has two Lions' heads on it, "... one looking backward, but the other forward."

"Lionism will never replace religion," Gov. Simpson emphasized, "nor will it cure your economic ills." He quickly added that practicing the Lions' code would make better Christians out of Lions.

Eastland County residents bought \$48,605 in U. S. Savings Bonds in January to come in third in District 16.

In the first month of 1959, the county achieved 8.9 percent of its goal which has been set at \$545,000.

Taylor County came in first with sales amounting to \$158,393, or 11.2 percent of its goal. Second was Jones County with \$63,881 sales for 13.1 percent of its '59 goal. Fourth was Haskell county with sales of \$47,004 or 14.6 percent of the goal.

January sales in Texas totaled \$16,147,649, a figure representing 8.8 percent of the goal for the year.

Willacy County got off to a good start for 1959, attaining 90.4 percent of their sales goal during the month of January.

The Fort Worth Area sales came in second in the state, but percentage-wise achieved more of its 1959 goal. Sales totaled \$2,822,764 for 9.7 percent. The Houston area sales totaled \$2,869,232 for eight percent.

In the fall of 1946, 16 Eastland residents with like belief bought the Assembly of God building at 701 South Lamar. Dec. 3, 1946, the church was officially organized. The only charter members still in the church are Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Smith of Eastland.

Rev. H. F. Pruitt began his ministry 23 years ago at Grand Junction, Colorado. He held pastorates in Throckmorton, Lometa, Wink and Hamlin, before coming to Eastland three years ago. Rev. and Mrs. Pruitt have two sons and one granddaughter.

At the present time, this church is operating as section work under the direction of the Abilene Sectional Board. Therefore, there are no deacons or trustees and the church is not open for membership. However, plans are being made to organize the mission into a church and then the congregation will be a sovereign body, handling all decisions without aid.

The church secretary is R. E. Ridgeway, Eastland.

The Sunday School is well organized with approximately 50 members. It is under the direction of superintendent Allen Jackson, Cisco, and Assistant Superintendent Howard Thomas, Olden.

Teachers are: adults, the pastor; young people, Harvey Basham; Juniors, Mrs. Bobbie Sullivan; Primary, Mrs. R. E. Ridgeway; and Beginners, Mrs. Lois Byrum. The literature is published by the General Council of Assemblies of God in Springfield, Missouri.

A man who accepts God's call to the ministry must serve two years as an Exorter. After two years of proven ministry, he is licensed by the Sectional Board. He serves two more years before he is ordained by the Sectional and District Boards. A minister must not have been divorced, nor is he ever allowed to perform the marriage ceremony for any divorced person. His ordination authorizes him to perform the marriage rites in ordinary circumstances, to preach and to administer the ordinances of his church.

Baptism is given in the name of the Trinity by immersion only. It is not essential for salvation or membership in the church. The church accepts any baptism performed in obedience to command and in the name of the Trinity, if it was performed after the public confession of faith by the individual.

The Lord's Supper is observed strictly as a symbol of the Divine suffering on the cross. The members come forward as a body and kneel at the altar for prayer. The pastor administers the bread and the cup. The Assembly of God does not hold close communion.

The members speak in foreign tongues following conversion. This is not necessarily a part of the salvation experience, but is the Holy Ghost Baptism which gives the believer the power to live for Christ.

Membership in the church may be withdrawn at the discretion of the Board. This is usually done in case of a person who uses liquor in any form, but may be extended to cover such circumstances as excessive indulgence in movie or other worldly institutions.

The main tenets of faith are: 1. The Trinity is recognized. 2. The Bible is considered the inspired Word and, as such, is the infallible rule of faith and conduct, being superior to conscience and reason, but not contrary to reason.

3. The church is seen as the body of Christ. 4. The ministry of the Assembly of God is Divinely called and Scripturally ordained. 5. The church believes strongly in Divine healing, but does not oppose doctors and medicine, considering them the instruments of God.

6. The church believes in the Millennial Reign of Jesus and in everlasting punishment for unbelievers.

7. The church believes in a rapture of all the Saints, prior to the Anti-Christ reign.

The pastor says, "The Scriptures teach a life of holiness without which no man shall see the Lord. By the power of the Holy Ghost, we are able to obey the command. Thus, the Assembly of God Church subscribes to the doctrine of entire sanctification, but believes this is a gradual process as the believer grows to be more like Christ. This is the aim of our church in Eastland—to guide our members in His footsteps."

The Women's Association meets Tuesday morning at nine-thirty o'clock. The Minister continues the leading of studies in The Book of the Acts.

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
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
