Perhaps one of Eastland's best after-dinner speakers is Larry McGraw, although he would quickly deny the charge. McGraw can take a subject the average person wouldn't attempt to and make an interesting talk on it.

Rotarians get to hear McGraw about once a year, and it is always a look-forward to event, much like Donald Kinnaird's annual speech for Eastland Lions. Larry this past week came out with the dry subject, "My Hobby," and then came forth with one of the most humorous, and at the same time inspiring, talks you could hope to hear.

McGraw's hobby turned out to be slogans, or as he said, "Slogans, adages, proverbs, mottoes or whatever you care to call them."

Larry threw around slogans faster than anyone could possibly take them down, but we would like to pass along a few of them to you. You can laugh or nod your head in agreement with the wisdom of his sayings as you see fit.

It seems that his father was in the auto business long before Mr. Mac was pushing Plymouths and Dodges at folks around here. And it seems that times haven't changed too much. Larry told about the time his dad decided a customer of his was getting a little far behind in his payments so he mailed him a picture of "... Dad, Mother and our six kids." Across the face of the photo he wrote, "Sam this is why I need my money." Sam sent him back a picture of a ravishing blonde and across it was written this notation, "This is why I can't pay you." Larry's slogan for this situation: "The thing that keeps a lot of men broke is not the wolf at the door but the silver fox in the window."

"I would not live in a community that I could not be a part of," McGraw quoted Benjamin Franklin as once saying. Then he added his own words of wisdom, "Probably this is why you give of your time to Chamber of Commerce work, Rotary Club, Lions Club, various other civic activities, yes, even the Eastland County Water Supply District."

Many slogans stem from someone else's, Larry pointed out. For instance it was Shakespeare, Hamlet, who originated the thought that, "The recollection of quality remains long after price is forgotten." From that have been born such jewels as "A product is no better than the company that sells it," and "We are as interested in our product once you own it, as we are in selling it to you."

Larry pointed out that many of the companies which have these fine slogans "could be likened to the rancher who didn't want all the land in the county, just the ranch adjoining his."

"Kim Novak, in speaking of her success in the movies, said she enjoys being a leading lady and she puts it in this phrase," McGraw said. "When you have success you are too busy sustaining it to enjoy it." He pointed out that that's just another way of saying "Man on top carry heavy load" or "Work is the penalty of leadership." You probably remember that "man on top" slogan. It's the one Larry talked about so much in the recent football wars.

"When the going gets tough, the tough get going," he explained. He added one word of caution, however, "It's hard for a man to burn the candle at both ends and still keep his wife in the dark."

Joe Davenport, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Davenport of Eastland, and a journalism major at North Texas State College, was winner of the top news picture of the year award for newspapers in cities having less than 75,000 population, it was learned here this week.

Davenport, a Denton Record-Cronicle staffer for more than a year, won the coveted award for his action picture, snapped during the summer election seasons when Warren G. Harding was doused by the Denton Fire Department, for spooking too long at a political rally.

Winners of the annual Texas Associated Press awards were announced over the weekend at the annual convention of the managing editors association. Managing Editor Carl Stuart of the Oklahoma City Oklahoman and Times judged the picture contests.

Davenport is a senior student at NTSC. The Texas AP awards are one of the highest honors a Texas daily newspaper or writer can receive. The Denton paper has a program of giving North Texas State journalism students on the job training. Three other staff members, all of them students, won honorable mention in the statewide contests. On top of that eight other NTSC ex-students won prizes. One of those winners was Miss Mary Ann Jennings, now a camerawoman for the San Angelo Standard-Times.

CISCO — The Cisco National Guard unit, of which many Eastland men are members, received a rating of "Excellent" on the annual general inspection conducted Jan. 10 by Col. Charles C. Fargo inspector general, Fourth Army.

It is the second straight excellent rating received by the unit and reflects the high morale and efficiency in training of individual members of the organization.

Col. Fargo especially complimented recruiting and training activities of the unit, maintenance of equipment and supplies, and efficiency of full-time personnel.

County Superintendent Urges More Graduates To Consider Teaching

Superintendent H. R. Garrett of the Eastland County School District today urged college graduates in this area to give serious consideration to opportunities available to them in the teaching profession.

Superintendent H. R. Garrett explained that the need for teachers is especially critical in some areas of the State and that more than 2,000 persons have had to be assigned to teaching positions this year on the basis of emergency teaching permits.

"I especially want to call your attention to the state-wide teacher education courses now being presented over television," County Superintendent H. R. Garrett said. "A person with a college degree can enroll in the Let's Teach television series and begin his preparation for teaching. Even though a teaching vacancy may not be available to you at the present time, credit for the Let's Teach series will enable you to qualify for an emergency teaching permit which will be valid from one to

three years in any school district in Texas which has been unable to find enough fully qualified teachers."

The state-wide Teacher Recruitment and Education by Television project is sponsored by the Texas Education Agency through the cooperation of local school and college officials, television stations, and with the assistance of a grant

The Tigers had another close one against Spur. Eastland paled that one out of the fire with just 30 seconds left on the clock.

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Bill Would Mean Big Raise for Eastland Judges

A number of judges in Eastland County would benefit greatly financially if a bill introduced by State Senator Willis of Fort Worth is approved.

Willis' bill would raise the pay of judges of the court of civil appeals by \$5,000 a year, from 12,000 to 17,000 a year, and the pay of district judges from \$9,000 to \$16,000 annually.

Protect Hogs from Lice and Mange Mites

COLLEGE STATION—Lice and mange on hogs are more troublesome during the late fall and winter months and early control is recommended. Dr. C. M. Patterson, extension veterinarian, says chief reasons for the increase can all be traced to the weather.

Animals are concentrated in barns or shelters during the cold months and parasites can easily spread from animal to animal by direct contact. Too, the longer and heavier hair coat on the animals at this season gives protection to lice and mange mites.

Patterson cites another reason

which is also influenced by the weather. Lice and mange increase when hogs have a low intake of vitamin A. The prolonged drought has reduced green grazing in most hog pastures to the vanishing point, and therefore, Patterson suggests that hogs be watched carefully for vitamin A deficiency symptoms.

Hogs which are restless and rub themselves frequently should be checked for lice and mites. Mites usually are noted first around the eyes, nose and in or around the ears. Lice are more frequently found on the tender skin of the flank or on the innermost side of the leg.

If the parasites are found, Patterson recommends immediate treatment. He says a one-tenth (.1) percent lindane or gamma BHC solution used as a spray or dip or a five (5) percent toxaphene spray or dip or a five-tenths (.5) percent chlordane spray will give good results. Recent tests, he adds, shows that lindane does the best job of getting rid of mange. When this insecticide is thoroughly applied to the animal with a light to moderate infestation, mites are often eliminated with a single treatment.

When hogs have heavily-crustated areas over a large part of their body, a second treatment may be needed in seven to ten days to completely clear up the infestation,

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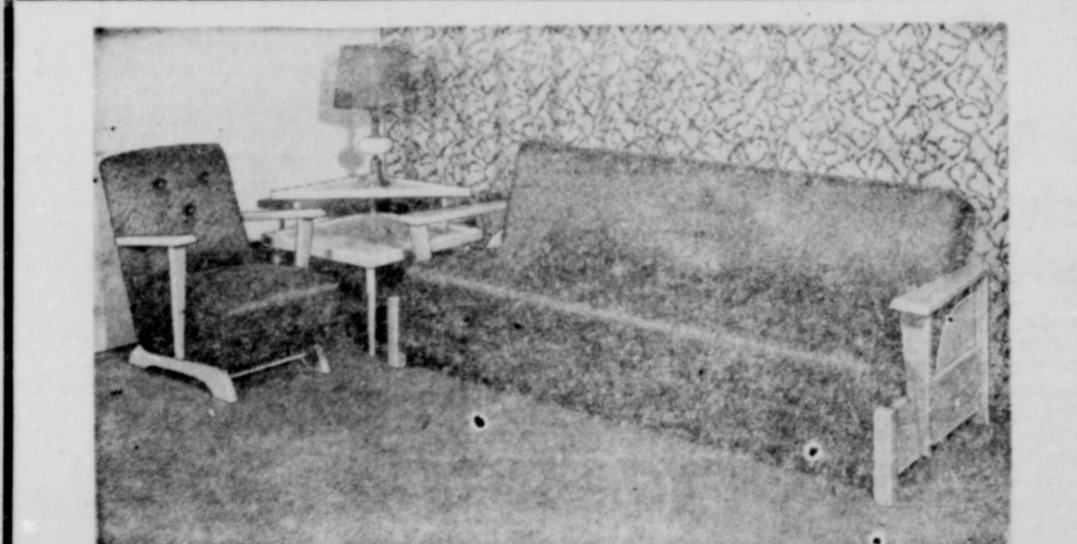

Organize Rural Communities To Progress

COLLEGE STATION -- Most rural families are interested in helping make their communities more desirable places in which to live and according to Reagan Brown, extension rural sociologist, an active community organization can do much toward achieving this goal.

Brown points out that during the past several years, hundreds of Texas communities have found that cooperation and planned improvements can remake a community. The first step, he says, is a community organization. Leadership is available in most communities to insure the success of the organization and assistance is available through the local county extension agents to help make the leadership job easier.

Organized communities also have an opportunity to participate in the Rural Neighborhood Progress Program and those in certain districts in the Pasture Improve-

ment Program. Cash awards are offered in both to the communities which make outstanding progress during the program year.

Up to the present, Brown says, 170 communities have submitted entries in the Neighborhood Progress Program and 23 have entered the pasture program. December 31 was the last day on which entries in both programs could be made, advises the specialist.

Brown emphasized that an entry card in either or both of the two improvement programs could become a strong force for good in the community. To the leaders in unorganized communities, he urges that they resolve to start the new year by contacting the local Extension Service agents and asking them for assistance in setting up a community organization.

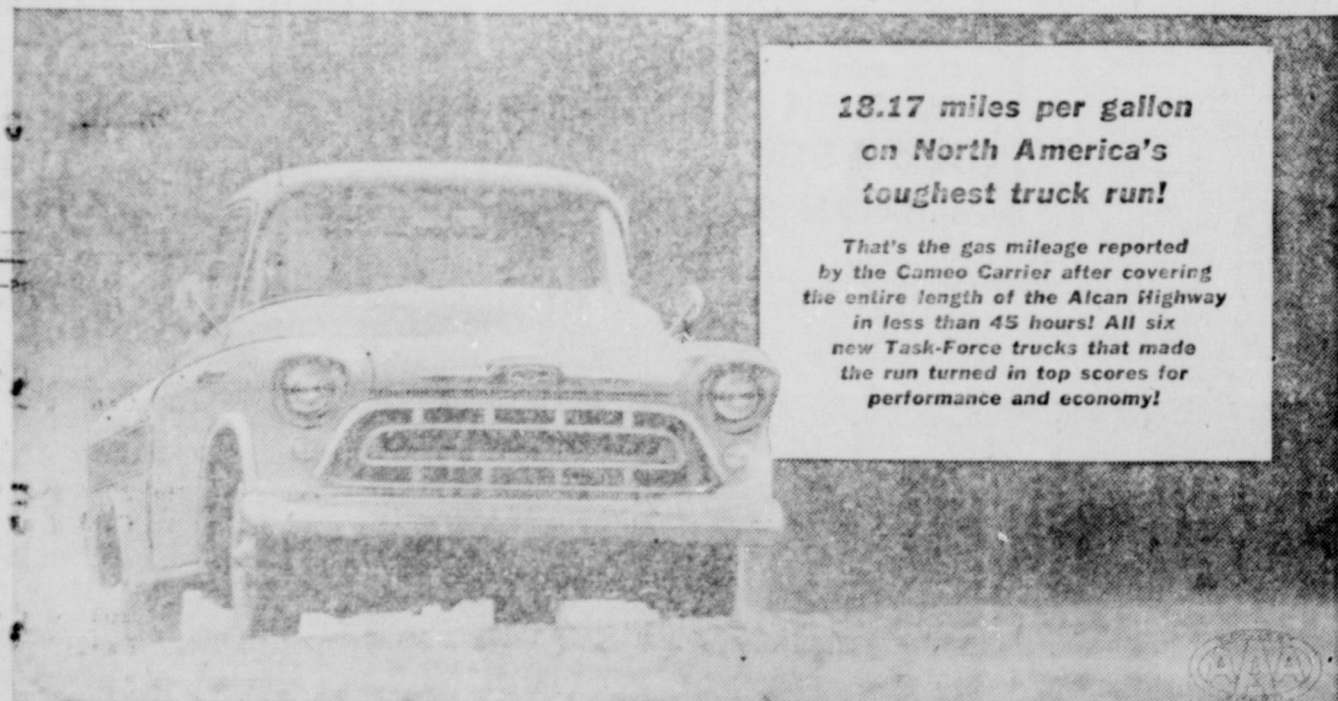

INCOME TAX AIDS

One of a Series of 12 Articles Prepared by The Internal Revenue Service

This is the eighth in a series of 12 articles prepared by the Internal Revenue Service to assist taxpayers in avoiding tax errors that cause "Pre-Refund Audits." Previous articles have set out the disadvantages of having your return contain questionable items that would require the Internal Revenue Service to select it for audit. Today we are presenting the five most common reasons for the Internal Revenue Service having to adjust Child Care Expense:

1. For a married couple, unless the husband is incapable of self-support because he is physically or mentally defective, child care

expense must be reduced by the amount by which the combined adjusted gross incomes of wife and husband exceeds \$4,500. A joint return must be filed.

2. A man may deduct child care expense only if he is a windower at the time the expense is incurred.

3. To be deductible child care expense must be incurred while the taxpayers are gainfully employed or seeking gainful employment and is limited to the expenses incurred for child care prior to the time his child reaches twelve years of age.

4. Child care expense is limited to \$600.

5. The expense of a maid who cares for a child must be allocated between child care and maid expense.

We are repeating again today the advantages of becoming better informed on income tax matters. The study of your tax instructions cannot be overemphasized. If you are interested in preparing a correct tax return that will pay the Government all the tax due but at the same time take all the deduct-

ions and allowances to which you are entitled, you should order "Your Federal Income Tax—1956" at the U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D.C. for 30c a copy. The amount of tax you pay is determined by your business and personal activities throughout the year.

The Internal Revenue Service feels that your being well informed on tax matters will be of benefit to you and to the Government. In the next article, we will present errors taxpayers make in claiming miscellaneous deductions.

Let Can Opener Be Magic Wand In Your Kitchen

With a little imagination and a bit of daring, your can opener can really serve as your magic wand in the kitchen. Canned foods are packed at the peak of goodness and with ideal methods, so they are delicious just as they come from the can.

However, improper cooking of a canned vegetable can quickly ruin it, no matter how good it was when it came from the can. Appetites can grow tired of canned vegetables just heated or canned fruit just chilled. Use imagination and that bit of daring to vary ways of serving canned foods. There's many a quick trick to give them new flavors, new importance in menus.

When heating canned vegetables, use this method to retain greatest food value. Drain the liquid into a saucepan. Boil it quickly over a full flame to reduce the amount to about 1/3 cup. Add the vegetable, heat quickly and season. Never throw away the liquid from canned vegetables, for it contains valuable nutrients. If you prefer, it may be saved to use in soups, sauces and gravies, rather than boil it down.

There's no end to the flavorings that blend deliciously with canned vegetables. Try a generous squeeze of lemon juice and a generous dash of dill seed on seasoned green lima beans. Crisp, crumpled bacon, minced onion, a sprinkling of vinegar, a bit of sugar and a dash of salt and pepper dress up green beans. Top seasoned asparagus spears with lemon juice and buttered bread crumbs. Stir sour cream and mushroom pieces into seasoned green peas. A can of cream of mushroom soup thinned with 1/2 cup milk makes an excellent sauce for asparagus. Use cream of celery for peas. Toss hot, seasoned hominy with grated American cheese. French style green beans marinated in French dressing and tossed with onion rings make a crisp salad.

Canned fruits may be made into many colorful and festive salads and desserts.

Mix chopped crystallized ginger with cream cheese, arrange pear halves on salad greens and heap a tablespoon of cheese in each half. Serve with French dressing. Good with roast chicken, turkey or duck.

Spread pineapple spears with cream cheese, sprinkle with celery seed, arrange in lettuce cups and serve with mayonnaise thinned with liquid from the canned pineapple.

Fold drained crushed pineapple

into prepared instant vanilla pudding. Chill and serve topped with toasted coconut. For a richer dessert, fold mixture of marshmallows and chopped nuts in with the pineapple.

Season applesauce with cinnamon and nutmeg and spoon over warm gingerbread or spice cake. Use whole cranberry sauce instead of apples in your favorite apple crisp recipe.

Fill chilled pear halves with whipped cream and top with shaved milk chocolate candy bar.

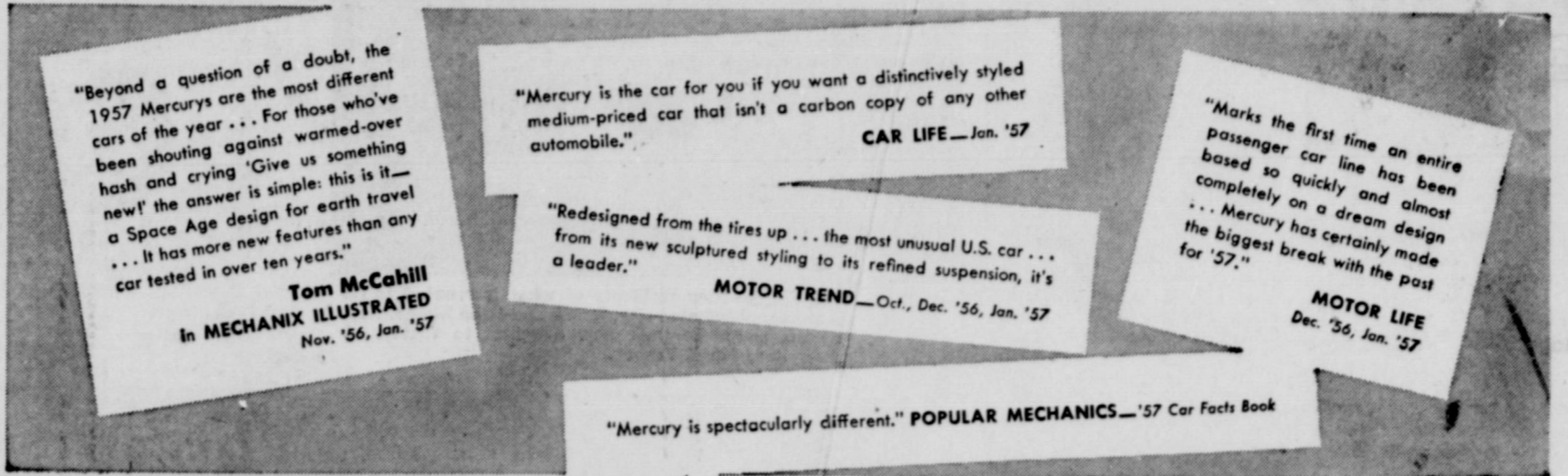

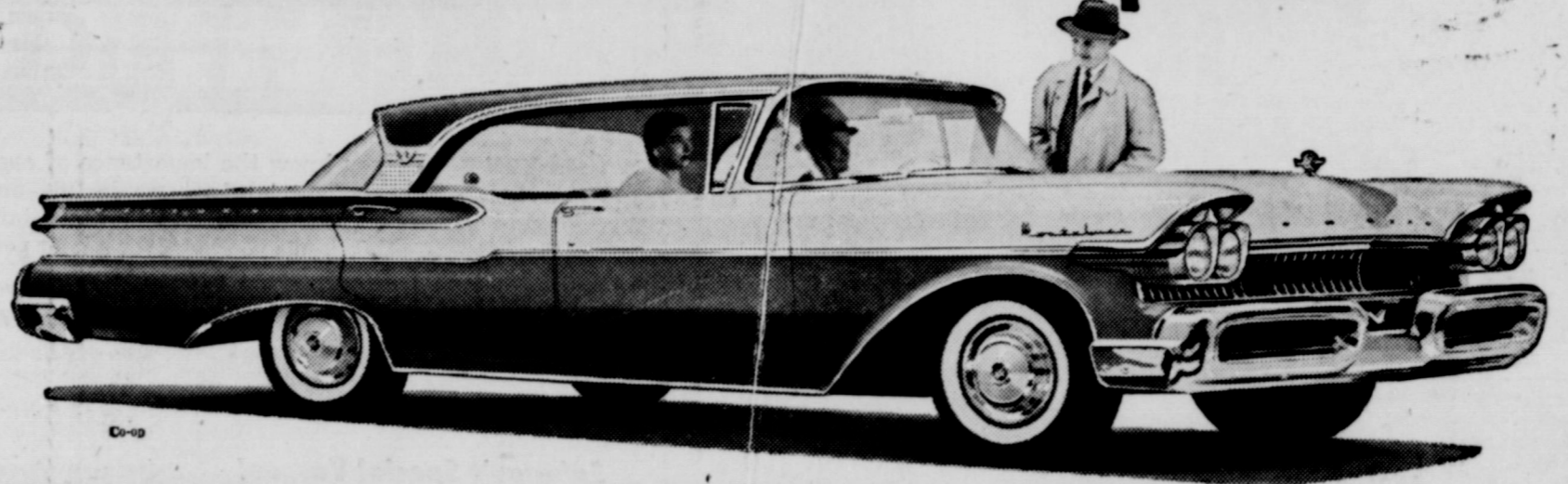

Applications to take the tests will be accepted until Jan. 31 at the University's Testing and Guidance Bureau.

Breckenridge is the closest place to Ranger that a student may take the tests.

The tests are open to high school seniors, high school graduates and college transfers who plan to enter the University either this summer or next fall.

The University requirement for admission tests in addition to acceptable high school or college records became effective last fall. College Board Aptitude Test scores, taken at the expense of the applicant, will be accepted in place of the University tests, which are given free of charge.

Although comparable forms of the tests will be given again in May and again in August, students are advised to sign up for the February tests. Dr. H. T. Masuol, Testing and Guidance Bureau Director has stated, "The earlier testing gives ample time to plan for a retest if this is necessary."

Due to the tremendous enrollment in the University of Texas it is becoming increasingly difficult for high school students to get in, and no matter what their grades are in high school it is mandatory that they take the entrance examinations.

It is suggested that Dr. Masuol's advice be followed and that students sign up for the February tests so that, in case they don't, they can take them over again in the summer.

Include Soil Testing In 1957 Farm Plans

COLLEGE STATION — High acre yields are more important than ever. Grain and forage supplies on most Texas farms and ranches are at a very low level because of the prolonged drought. Top yields are needed from next year's crops and pastures not only to replenish these supplies but also to help win the cost-price squeeze says M. K. Thornton, extension agricultural chemist.

To get the best possible production from crops and pastures, Thornton points out that a lot of cooperation will be needed from "mother nature" in the form of favorable weather conditions which includes a lot of rain. But, he also says, producers can aid the cause by applying fertilizer to make the land produce as it should.

Soil testing is the one sure way to find the answer to the question, how much and what kind of fertilizer is needed to get top production? Thornton suggests that soil samples be taken and submitted now to the Soils Testing Laboratory.

Pensions Hinge On Vet Questionnaires

Annual Income Questionnaires have been mailed to more than 14,000 veterans and widows and children of deceased veterans in the Dallas Veterans Administration Regional Area who are receiving pension, Scott B. Harrington, Manager, announced today.

Those in the Dallas area are among 1,200,000 throughout the nation who will receive the questionnaires.

Mr. Harrington urged those who receive the questionnaires from the Dallas Office to fill them in completely and return them immediately to the VA Office, 912 South Ervay, Dallas, Texas. Those who receive the questionnaires from other VA Offices should return them to the office from which they were received. Unless completed questionnaires are returned to VA within 30 days, pension payments will be stopped, Mr. Harrington stressed.

Questionnaires are mailed out yearly because disability and death pensions are subject to annual income limitations. The current questionnaires request data on 1956 income and anticipated 1957

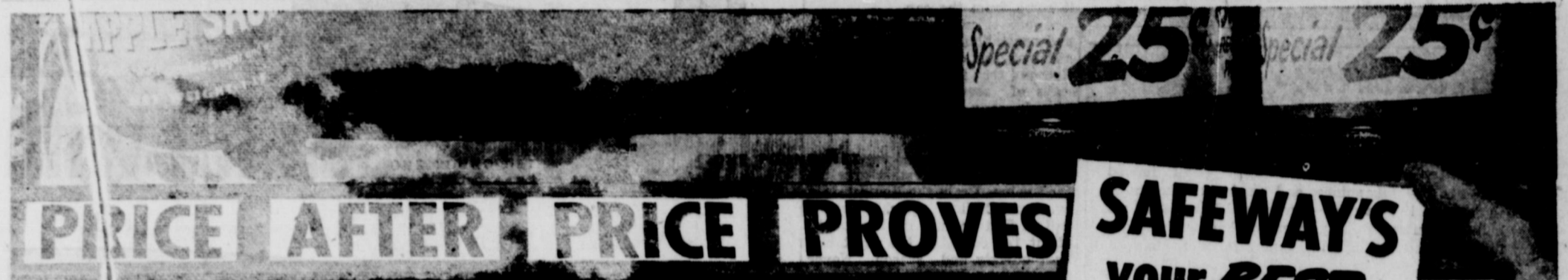
income. Pensions are payable to certain eligible veterans of World War I, World War II, and the Korean Conflict period who are permanently and totally disabled from causes not connected with their service in the armed forces, and to certain widows and children of veterans of these wars who die of non-service-connected causes.

In both cases, the annual income of those receiving pension must not exceed \$1400, without dependents, or \$2700 with dependents.

Only dependents allowed for a living veteran for pension purposes are a wife and minor children, and for a widow, only minor children.

For income purposes, payments from VA for disability or death including proceeds of GI insurance need not be reported. However, all other payments, including gifts, employment, commercial life insurance, social security, annuities and retirement benefits must be reported.

Those receiving pensions should report immediately any increase in income which would raise their annual income above the statutory limitations.

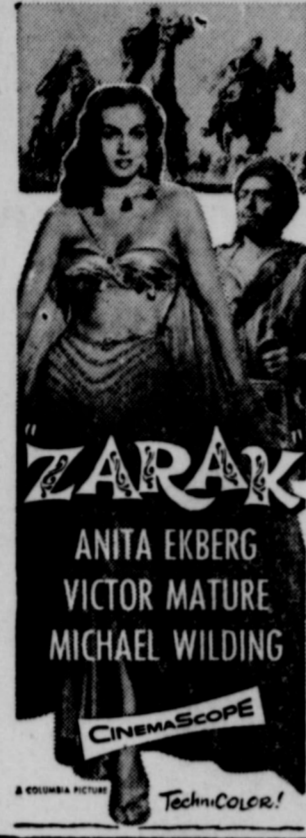

Enhancing Hosiery Demands Extra Care

STOCKINGS are a form of leg make-up. Perhaps you've never thought of them that way, but they're intended to do more than keep your legs from getting chilled in the winter.

The darker colors are meant to slim down heavy legs and the lighter colors do the reverse for thin legs. Hosiery in the pastels can carry out a theme for you (pale green or blue or pink) and match dress and shoes in a dramatic one-color theme.

If you find that your stockings flutter at the calves or flap at the ankles, it's time you investigated proportioned stockings. These are sized to fit not just your foot but your entire leg and to be the exact length that you require as well.

INCOME TAX INFORMATION

Under the provisions of the federal Internal Revenue Act, all persons who have a gross income over \$600 must file income tax returns, except if the taxpayer is 65 or older he need not file a return unless he has gross income over \$1,200. This is because persons who are 65 or older have two exemptions which automatically elicit a "no tax liability for income under \$1,200."

All federal tax returns for individuals must be filed on or before April 15. Although many persons believe that a tax return need only be postmarked by the due date, such is not the intent of the statute. The return is supposed to be in the office of the Internal Revenue Service by the due date specified.

The federal instructions will be received by most persons during the afternoon.

The instructions being distributed this year contain the following statement: "The Internal Revenue Service will mail Form 1040 ES, as far as is practical, to each person who may need it. Anyone also required to file should obtain the form from an Internal Revenue Service office in time to file by April 15, 1957."

Declarations of estimated tax are required from all persons who expect gross income of more than \$400, plus \$600 times the number of exemptions which may be claimed, if more than \$100 of the income will not be subject to withholding.

Single persons with more than \$5,000 and married persons with more than \$10,000 expected gross income must file declarations of estimated tax even though all of the income is subject to withholding.

Declarations of estimated tax, except those for farmers, must be filed by April 15. Like the income tax return, this date is one month later than the deadline for years before the new Revenue Act went into effect. However, the final dates for quarterly installment payments remain the same—April 15, June 15, September 15, and the last one on January 15 of the following year.

If a person, other than a farmer, desires to file his income tax return and pay his tax in full, he may do this on or before January 15, instead of paying his last quarterly installment. It does not relieve anyone from filing the original declaration of estimated tax and making three payments on it. However, in most cases this provision does remove the possibility of a penalty for an under estimate of tax liability.

Farmers have special provisions concerning declarations of estimated tax, and may postpone the filing of any estimate until February 15 of the following year.

The penalty for underpayment of tax liability on the declaration of estimated tax was reduced by the 1954 act. There is not an underpayment if the taxpayer remits at least 70 per cent of his tax as shown on his final tax return. If there is an underpayment, the penalty is 6 per cent per annum interest on the additional amount which should have been remitted. It is expected that there will be more strict enforcement of this provision in the future by the Internal Revenue Service.

Keep Lids On Garbage Cans To Fight Rats

Rodents can't chew through galvanized steel garbage cans equipped with close-fitting covers of the informed to advise. No person should ever open or interpret any law without the aid of an attorney who is fully advised concerning the facts involved, because a slight variance in facts may change the application of the law.)

same material, but when the lid is lost or damaged, access to the edible garbage is easy. Sanitation authorities say covers should be kept on garbage cans at all times to protect contents from disease-bearing rats and flies.

Perhaps the best protection against a cover being lost or run over by garbage collectors' trucks is to fasten the cover to an immovable object so that it may not be taken away.

One method is to fasten one end of a short length of rope or chain to the handle on the top of a galvanized steel garbage can cover and secure the other end to a nearby tree, fence post or garage wall.

When the refuse collector carries the container to his truck to be emptied, he must remove the cover. Even if he fails to replace the cover on the can when it is returned to its place, the cover remains in the refuse area and can be replaced easily without damage.



Pay Your Poll Tax by Mail!

To obtain a poll tax receipt fill out the above form and mail it to the assessor-collector's office with \$1.75 for each poll tax. No fee is required for exemption. Exemption certificates are required to be renewed annually. Overage exemptions are not required of residents of communities smaller than 10,000 population. Twenty-one-year-olds are required to obtain exemptions regardless of where they live.

You are entitled to an exemption if you become 60 years of age before Jan. 1, 1956, or if you became 21 years of age after Jan. 1, 1956, or if you will become 21 years of age 30 days prior to an election. Either the husband or the wife may sign this affidavit for both. Fill out carefully and write plainly. You will not receive a voting certificate if your letter is postmarked after January 31, 1957.
