Kincaid Feed and Hatchery store here in Eastland for the past two years have distributed several hundred poults to 4-H Club boys and girls free of charge. They plan to do the same thing again this year.

They will set 2,000 turkey eggs in the near future. The poults that hatch will again be distributed to those who qualify for them by writing themes on the subject: "Why turkey growing is important in Eastland County" and who along with their Dads sign an agreement to raise and care for the birds under certain conditions, County Agent J. M. Cooper has revealed.

"We will have a meeting here in the courthouse next Thursday night, Feb. 7 at 7:30 to discuss the details of this plan," Cooper said. "The south door of the courthouse will be open. You and your Dad and Mother (your brothers and sisters too) are invited to come and attend this meeting.

The program will be discussed and your questions will be answered concerning the program."

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Mavs Come From Behind To Defeat Throckmorton

Eastland's Mavericks trailed for three and a half quarters Friday night, then put on a fourth period spurt to down Throckmorton's Greyhounds 57-50 in their own home court. Throckmorton's girls downed the Mavettes 43-34 in the opening game of the twin-bill.

The boys game stole the show Friday, however. The Mavs, in their usual fashion, fell far behind the Hounds, but gradually worked themselves out of the hole, then in the fourth quarter went ahead for the first time. Eastland got only one field goal in the first quarter of play while Throckmorton got 10. Ten free throws kept the Mavs in the game, however. Dale Slaton, the Mavs potential all-starter, had an off night, failing to connect on many of his shots, but was still high point man for the night with 18 points. Lupe Herrera had

his best night so far this season, getting 11 points. Harvey Lewis and Clint Humphreys each had nine, Johnny McMahan got five, Larry Hollis three and Otis Green two. The Mavs ended the game with Hollis and Green on the court after McMahan and Lewis fouled out. Both played excellent games, with Green doing the best job of re-bounding seen this year. James Baker was high for the Hounds with 16 points. Jerry Grable was second high pointer for Throckmorton, getting 15 points. Grable started off in sensational fashion, getting 12 points in the first quarter, but the Mav defense tightened and held.

Throckmorton led 21-12 at the end of the first quarter, 33-29 at halftime and 41-40 at the end of three periods of play.

Sue Day paced Eastland with 26 points in the girls game, but her performance was not enough to stop the Greyhounds. Sue Merrimen was high pointer for Throck-

morton with 15 points. Joan Hollis had four points and Brenda Evans got three.

Throckmorton led most of the game, getting a 14-7 advantage at the end of the first quarter. They pushed their lead to 25-16 at halftime and led 34-25 going into the final quarter.

Eastland has a pair of non-district games coming up the first part of the week. Coach Tate has scheduled a Monday night affair with Cisco. There will be three games in all. At six the Freshmen play, at 7 the B team will see action and at 8 the A teams clash.

Tuesday night the Mavs and Mavettes will be in Gordon to complete their home and home agreement.

The victory gave Eastland a record of three wins and three losses in district play.

Olden Seniors To Sponsor Chili Supper Monday

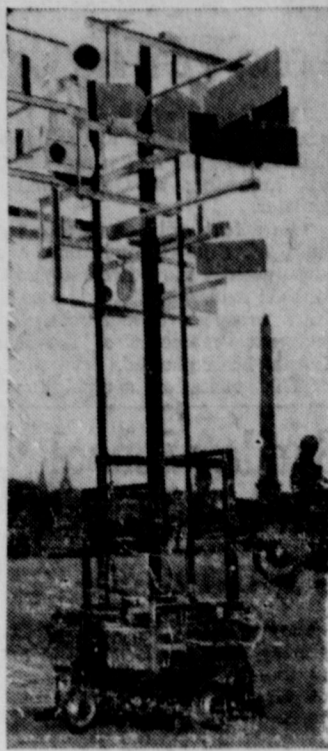

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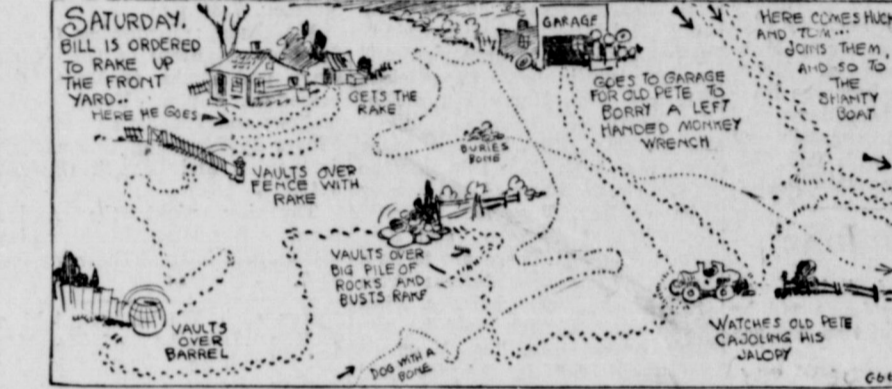
