Now wouldn't you think that a good reporter would have asked the boy how he came to get his hand caught in the machine in the first place? Not a word about it. We suppose the lad refused to tell because he might incriminate himself, although we doubt seriously if the jury could ever reach a verdict on a case as serious as that.

And since we have dealt a lot with the American press in today's column, we must end this waste of space by telling the classic story about the cub reporter in Johnston, Pa., at the time of the disastrous flood in 1889.

The first flash reached the nearest big-time newspaper office late at night when only this newest addition to the staff—a droopy youth just out of school—was on tap. The editor hustled him to the scene of the catastrophe and spent the next hour in a frenzied effort to get his veteran reporters on the job. By then it was too late, however. All wires were down, and the valley was isolated. For 24 hours the only reporter in the devastated area was one green beginner.

The press of America waited feverishly for his first report. Finally it began to trickle in over the telegraph. "God sits upon a lonely mountaintop tonight and

gazes down upon a desolate Johnstown. The roar of swirling waters echoes through . . ." The editor tore his hair and rushed a wire back to his poet laureate: "Ghaz. Forget flood. Interview God. Rush pictures." —vem—

ed regularly in the training diets of many famous athletes.

The energy value of one pound of peanuts is said to be equal to that of four pounds of beef steak, 21 pounds of cheese, 10 quarts of milk, or 33 eggs.

Peanut hearts (the little seed inside the kernel) are removed before making peanut butter. They are used in poultry feed and are in heavy demand because of their high nutritive value.

Peanut hulls have many industrial uses. They are used as grinding and polishing abrasives; as sound and temperature insulation; for making paper pulp, corrugated boxes and wall board; also, as poultry litter and for roughage in

**Can Teach Any Dog New Tricks**

Any dog can learn new tricks.

One of the easiest for a dog to learn is the game of dead dog. Command him to lie in a "down" position on the floor or lawn. Gently roll him over on his side, saying "dead dog," and hold his head down until he relaxes. Release him by the command "O. K.," or "all right." Hold only 15 minute training sessions, advises the March issue of Better Homes & Gardens magazine.

To teach a dog to shake hands, find a spot where he will feel secure from slipping or falling. The first command is "sit." You can place a length of cord under his paw and pull the paw upward when the command, "shake," is given. If you are patient and repeat the exercise, the dog will raise

his paw on command.

Start training your dog to carry packages by first getting him to hold objects in his mouth. The practice item should be small and light, like a rolled newspaper, the magazine says. Offer it to him with the command, "take it." Start him on a leash, from the "heel" position, to carry an object in his mouth, and walk with him.
