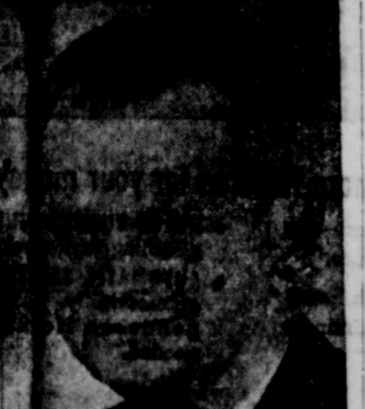
Campbell said the membership drive of the Bureau would continue throughout this week. He also announced a training meeting to be held in Brownwood for county presidents and membership chairmen.

A look at the record compiled by the speaker would make one think Henderson knows of what he speaks.

Success seems to be a byword for Sam Bradford Boyd, the 42-year-old former star Baylor end who gained a coveted berth in the Sugar Bowl classic in his very first season as a varsity head coach. . . then climaxed it by upsetting heavily favored, unbeaten Tennessee, ranked No. 2 in the nation.

Sain once was talked out of entering the coaching profession, but fortunately for Baylor, George Sauer persuaded him to change his mind nearly seven years ago, and he joined Sauer's Baylor staff when the latter left the Naval Academy to become the Bear head man.

Boyd began as the Baylor freshman coach in 1950, lost only five of his 20 games during the next four seasons, averaging 23 points per game, was never shut out. He produced one unbeaten, untied club and had another which was unbeaten, untied and unscored on until the final seven minutes of the season.

So now in one short season he has produced one of the most solid college teams in America, one which gained No. 11 national ranking and one which most Southwest observers dubbed the best in the Southwest at season's end. National observers were fully ready to agree after the Sugar Bowl Champions trimmed Tennessee, 13-7. Boyd's first team gained a 9-2 record against foes from Coast to Coast.

Coach Boyd was selected to be the lecturer on pass defense at the Jan. 8 through 12 annual National Football Coaches Association meeting in St. Louis and was chosen to be an honor guest Jan. 12 at the famed Washington Touchdown Club meeting.

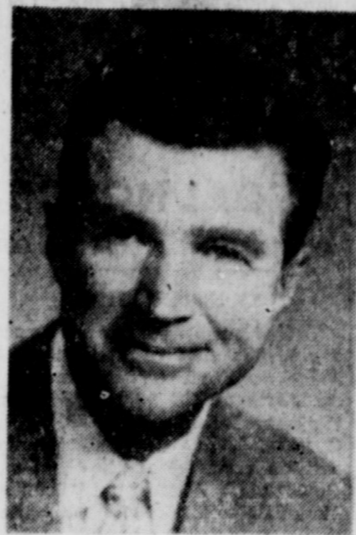
Sain started as a 166-pound junior high school quarterback in his native city of Cleburne, very near the Waco home of Baylor University. He earned his first Cleburne letter award as a 160-pound senior end, went to Baylor unheard-of, mowed lawns, worked in the dining hall and a service station to pay his way.

He caught over 30 passes as a Baylor junior end, caught 40 as a senior and Baylor co-captain, was a star in the annual Shrine East-West game, then played two years with the pro Pittsburgh Steelers. (Continued on Page 6)

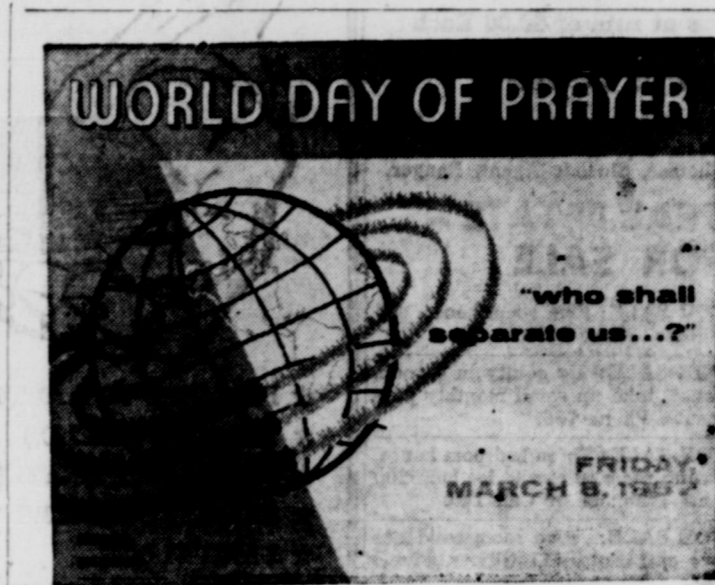

World Day of Prayer Services will be held Friday at 7:30 p.m. at the First Christian Church, with most churches of the community participating.

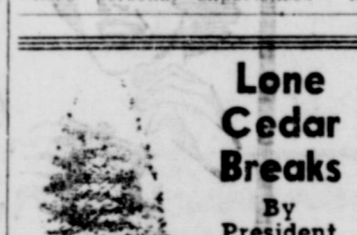
This will mark the 71st observance sponsored by a small group of church women, which has spread to the far corners of the globe, now touching 143 different areas in six continents.

IT'S THE LAW
in Texas

'NEGOTIABLE INSTRUMENTS'

The average person does not often use the term "negotiable instruments" in his everyday conversation, and the words may not mean much to him. Actually, it is just a mouth-filling term, used in law to describe certain important pieces of paper that we normally call by simpler names.

Even though we seldom use the words, we deal with negotiable instruments all the time. Every check we write to pay the gas bill is a negotiable instrument, and so is your paycheck or pension check. The note you sign to buy a new car, the money order you purchase at the bank or post office, or the traveler's checks you take with you on a trip instead of cash, all are negotiable instruments.

It was all started by merchants who had to send large sums of gold or currency between cities or nations. They worked out a way to exchange money, or the value of money, by written messages, much of the time through a third party like a broker or bank. But when you deal in pieces of negotiable paper instead of hard money, there have to be certain standards and safeguards or the paper could lose its value.

Consequently, there developed a whole system of laws within nations and between nations, upon which all our business rests. Through the courts, if necessary, the owners of negotiable instruments may enforce the terms written on the paper.

In the United States things used to be confusing some times because of different state laws, but by 1924 all 48 states had adopted a Uniform Negotiable Instrument Law which sets up the same rules nationwide.

Since so-called negotiable instruments are so important; since they are ordinarily just like money in many ways; since they often are used like money, or are sold to other persons or companies, and since there are special laws defining the ins-and-outs of negotiable instruments which we wouldn't ordinarily have any reason to know about, there are one or two simple rules we should follow:

We should make certain we read what's on the paper, that we know what the words mean, and what the penalties and dangers may be, before signing our name.

Remember: You are the only person in the world with that signature, and the courts, as a rule, must take your signed promises at their face value.

How To Cook for Weight Watchers

Any weight watchers in your family? If so, you, the cook, can be a big help by planning a n d preparing foods to cut calories. Here are some suggestions offered by extension foods and nutrition specialists:
Use non-fat, dry milk solids for cooking. Reconstituted dry milk solids heated and combined with vegetable liquors are good in soups.
Keep desserts simple . . . Serve fresh fruits or canned and frozen fruits packed in water or juice—not syrup.
Roast or oven or pan-broil

meats, poultry and fish instead of frying in fat. Avoid "breeding" and use of egg batters on foods. Trim extra fat from the meat.
Serve salad materials plain—or use low-calorie seasonings or salad dressings. These can be made with tomato juice, herbs and lemon juice or vinegar.
Prepare food without added fat, sugar or flour whenever possible.
Tempt appetites with herbs and spices instead of rich seasonings, sauces and gravies.
Serve low-calorie items for nibbling in-between-meals or as appetizers. Try celery, cabbage wedges, carrot sticks, or other low-calorie vegetables or fruits.

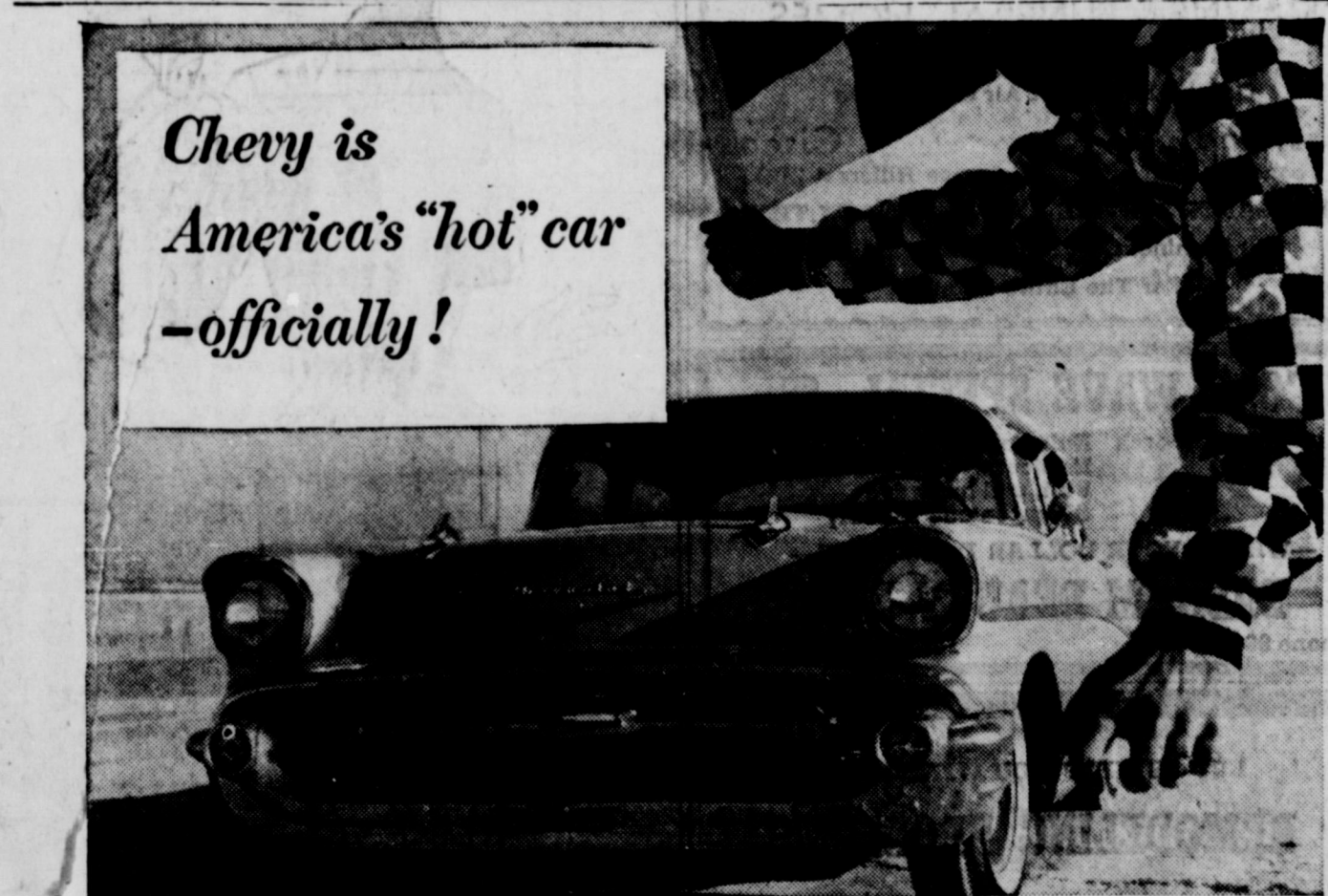

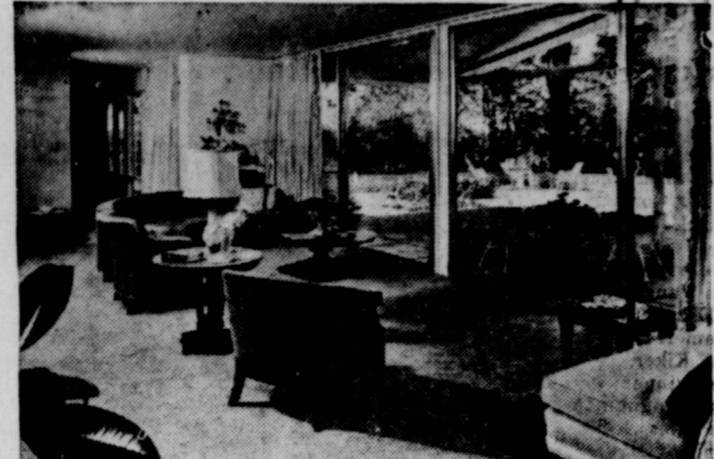
