Final services for Mrs. Lola Gar-rett, 61, were held in Fort Worth Friday afternoon following her death Thursday in Eastland.



Death loss was severe last summer in young seedlings, while one and two year old plants show good survival. A high centage of the grass seed planted last spring never germinated due to lack of moisture. It is hoped and anticipated that much of this seed will germinate this spring. Some seedling emergence was noted all ready in several plantings. Who knows perhaps 1957 will be remembered as the year the drought ended and grass land agriculture really began in our area.

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
