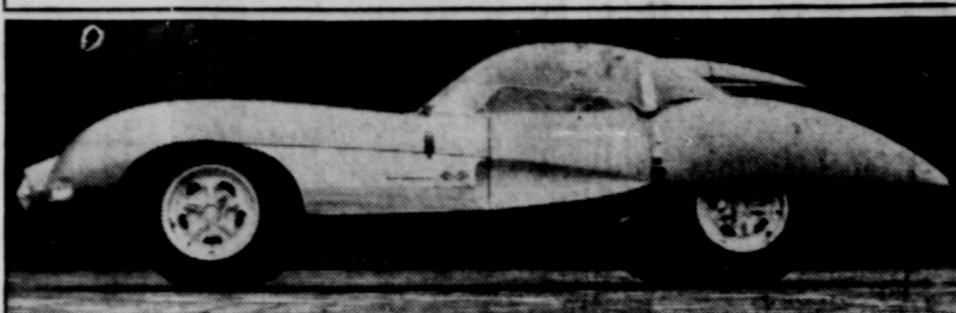

Shortening The Miles

It used to be that we could keep in touch with our families and friends with a chat over the backyard fence or a wave and friendly greeting from the front porch

But it seems like people are moving around more these days—from city to city and out-of-state. Some of them settle close enough around Eastland that you can get together frequently on weekends. But others pack up and leave for places hundreds or even a thousand miles away.

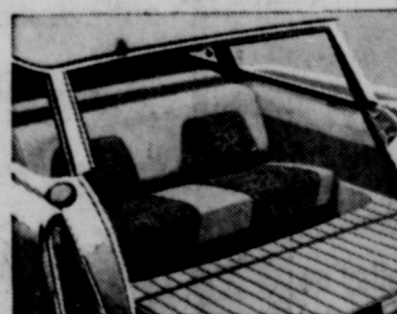

**More Uses For Eggs Given**

Because of increased production, eggs are in abundance and their quality is excellent. Cool February temperatures are keeping them in top condition.

Most of us buy a dozen, two dozen or some certain quantity of eggs each week and that quantity takes care of our usual uses. With supply and quality as they are, it is wise to use an extra dozen or so.

A real staple item in our diets, almost everybody likes eggs and almost everybody can eat eggs. A gold mine of nutrients, eggs are rich in protein and they supply other nutrients, as well.

A luncheon or supper dish may well feature eggs. Egg-rich desserts, such as cream puffs, are always popular. Hard-cooked eggs left in the shell and tucked into lunch boxes are steady travelers. Keep them in the refrigerator to be peeled and eaten on the spot. They make a good snack food for dieting.

Add variety to the breakfast eggs by serving creamed eggs. Goldenrod Eggs is a more tempting name for them. For four servings, prepare 1 1/2 cups medium white sauce. Add 4 coarsely chopped hard-cooked egg whites. Spoon

the mixture over crisp brown toast. Top with 4 hard-cooked egg yolks which have been forced through a sieve or strainer.

It takes only minutes to mix a delicious salad of chopped hard-cooked eggs, canned chopped ripe olives, salt, pepper and mayonnaise. Use it in a sandwich, to fill a tomato for a salad main dish, spoon it onto tomato slices or into lettuce cups for a salad to go with a main dish.

Scrambled eggs take well to mushrooms, minced green onion and grated cheese. Add about 4-cup of one of them to 4 beaten eggs.

Cook eggs at low gentle temperatures. Fast cooking toughens them and overcooking darkens the yolk. For tender hard-cooked eggs with clear yellow yolks, place eggs in saucepan and add cold water to completely cover them. Cover and bring to a rolling boil. Remove from flame and let stand covered 20 minutes. Immediately cool eggs under cold running water.

For easier dishwashing, rinse the beater, dishes and pans in which eggs have been beaten or cracked, in cold water. Hot water will cook the egg on, making it hard to remove.
