

Charlotte Hilley Shows Grand Calf At County Show

Charlotte Hilley of Gorman, who showed the reserve champion calf at last year's Eastland County Livestock Show, walked away with top honors Saturday at the 1955 Show held at the Eastland airport.

Miss Hilley showed a 13-month old, 1,060-pound Shorthorn which was named grand champion calf. In showing the winning animal, she repeated what she had done two years ago. The 13-year-old Gorman girl is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Boyd Hilley. Mr. Hilley is president of the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association, sponsors of the annual junior show.

Cisco Boy, Wins
Taking the reserve championship in his first effort at showing a calf Saturday was Larry Garrett, 16, Breckenridge FFA. He won the runnerup slot with a 17-month-old Aberdeen - Angus weaning about 1,050 pounds. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Garrett of Cisco.

The grand champion was bred by C. M. Carraway and Sons of DeLeon and the reserve champion by Jesse Garrett. Both animals were dry lot calves.

Charlotte's feeding program was supervised by J. M. Cooper, Eastland County agent. Larry was feeding under the supervision of Tom Seely, Breckenridge vocational agriculture teacher.

Larry also had the champion Angus breeding female. He fed this animal under the supervision of Stephens County Agent Bryan Swain.

C. W. Butler of Rising Star showed both the grand and reserve champion fat lambs.

Ranger Winner
Dayle Penny of Ranger had the grand champion breeding ram, a Rambouillet which was also cham-

pio of his breed.

The reserve champion ram, a Corriedale, was shown by Edwin Shaeffer of Rising Star, a ram that also took the reserve championship in the class of all breeds except Rambouillets.

The Carbon FFA Chapter owned the grand champion breeding ewe, a Southdown, and Wallace Cherry of Gunsight had the reserve champion, a Rambouillet. Cherry's ewe was the champion Rambouillet ewe.

Pob Hogan, Carbon, had the champion breeding ewe of all breeds excluding Rambouillets. Dayle Penny, Ranger, had the championship Rambouillet ram.

Exhibiting the grand champion fat barrow, a Duroc - Berkshire cross, was Joel Graham of Cisco. Jimmy Hager of Ranger had the reserve champion, a Berkshire.

The champion breeding boar of the show, a Duroc, was shown by

Fat Agnew of Rising Star. A Poland China boar shown by Oscar Penn of Cisco took the reserve championship and was the champion of all breeds, excluding Durocs.

Covie Weaver of Rising Star showed his Duroc gilt to the breeding female championship of the show. Cherry's Hampshire gilt was the championship of all breeds, except Durocs.

Gorman Winner
Howard Hilley of Gorman, Charlotte's brother, took the grand championship of the breeding female division with a Shorthorn cow. C. M. Carraway and Sons had the grand champion breeding bull, also a Shorthorn.

Don Jobe of Cisco walked off with the champion female of the dairy cattle division, a Jersey.

No reserve champions were named in the breeding classes of ewes, bulls, beef females or the

dairy division. No bulls were entered in the dairy show.

Frigid temperatures and a cold north wind failed to cut show attendance appreciably. Luther Wilson, general show superintendent, estimated that more than 500 people witnessed some portion of the day's judging.

All fat animals will remain on exhibit until Tuesday when they will be moved to the Sig Faircloth Livestock Auction here for the annual sale at 2:30 p.m.

Classes of fat stock here are rated according to prime, choice, good and medium packer classifications and are not placed as 1, 2, 3, etc. All animals being classified "prime" compete for grand and reserve champions.

The annual \$10 showmanship award went to Don Jobe, Dan's twin brother.

Rural Fire Aid Asked County

Representatives of four Eastland County towns appeared before the Eastland County Commissioners Court Monday requesting financial aid to assist them in fighting rural fires.

Representatives from Eastland, Ranger, Cisco, and Rising Star requested that the county help the cities to pay the cost of fighting fires in rural areas. A request for \$50 a month for the fire departments in the four towns mentioned and Gorman was made. Eastland Fire Chief Billy Jack Johnson said that the fire departments needed the money badly. He cited a run made by Eastland firemen to Staff last week.

A. E. Taylor, Eastland city manager, said, "We are just back with the same proposition we made before. We are not up here with a threat, for we do not plan to refuse to fight any rural fire."

Lester Crossley, Ranger city manager, said, "If we were subsidized to some extent by the county we could give the rural area better fire protection."

Wayne Jackson of Eastland explained that the five fire departments in the county have plans to make up a district of the county, dividing off what town would fight a particular rural fire. "That way every area could be served quickly by one of the five departments," he said.

Commissioners called on County Auditor Earl O'Brien to see if the county had funds to pay the money asked. Mr. O'Brien explained that the money would have to be paid from the general fund "and every cent of that fund is already earmarked to be spent in 1955."

Commissioner B. M. Bennett said that the road and bridge fund and several other county funds have enough money to pay the cost, but he pointed out that legally those funds cannot be used for any purpose other than those intended.

The Court decided to check into the problem further and try to find some way to assist the cities. All commissioners agreed some aid is needed.

County Judge John Hart presided over the meeting and all commissioners were present.

Estimate Made On Cooling Off Courthouse

Two representatives of Lone Star Gas Co. Monday estimated that the Eastland County courthouse could be air conditioned for \$62,135.

Eastland County Commissioners were given the estimated figure by a Lone Star Gas Co. engineer. The Court was told that much of the pipe now in use in the courthouse could be used as well as the furnace.

"We could lower the temperature in here to 77 degrees when it is 100 degrees outside," the engineer said.

No definite action was taken by the court.

Two Elections Set In Next Seven Days

Eastlanders will go to the polls twice during the next seven days.

Saturday they will cast their votes to elect two members of the Independent School District and April 5 they will vote in the city election.

Seeking the two vacant seats on the School Board are Billy C. Pfost, H. L. (Mutt) Lewis and W. E. Hailenbeck Jr. Mr. Pfost is seeking re-election. The other two are seeking first terms. Holdover members are M. H. Perry, H. T. Weaver, Hood King, Curtis Koen and Vernon Humphrey.

Friday is the last day for voting absentee in the city election. A. E. Taylor, city manager, said Tuesday that not a single absentee vote had been cast. Seeking the three seats on the city commission are T. L. Fagg, Mayor George L. Daventport, Norris Wilson and J. Y. Jordan. All but Jordan seek re-election. Dr. M. A. Treadwell and Cyrus Frost are hold-over members of the commission.

Band Boosters To Make Profit In Flour Sale

The Eastland Band Boosters Club will be the profit makers in Eastland grocery stores this week.

Band Booster officials have announced that a representative of General Mills was in Eastland this weekend to make plans for a special sale in all Eastland grocery stores. The club will receive five cents for every box of Betty Crocker cake mix sold this week and 25 cents for every 25 pound bag of Gold Medal Flour.

The sale will last all week long and all Eastland stores are cooperating. A club spokesman said it is hoped that the club's funds can be increased several hundred dollars.

Fire Destroys Feed, Barn Near Morton Valley

Fire destroyed a barn partially filled with sacked livestock feed and baled hay belonging to George Harrison near Morton Valley Monday afternoon.

Fire had enveloped the entire structure before the Ranger fire department arrived on the scene. The Eastland Fire Department, whom Ranger asked for assistance, was later in arriving.

The barn and its contents both belonged to Harrison.

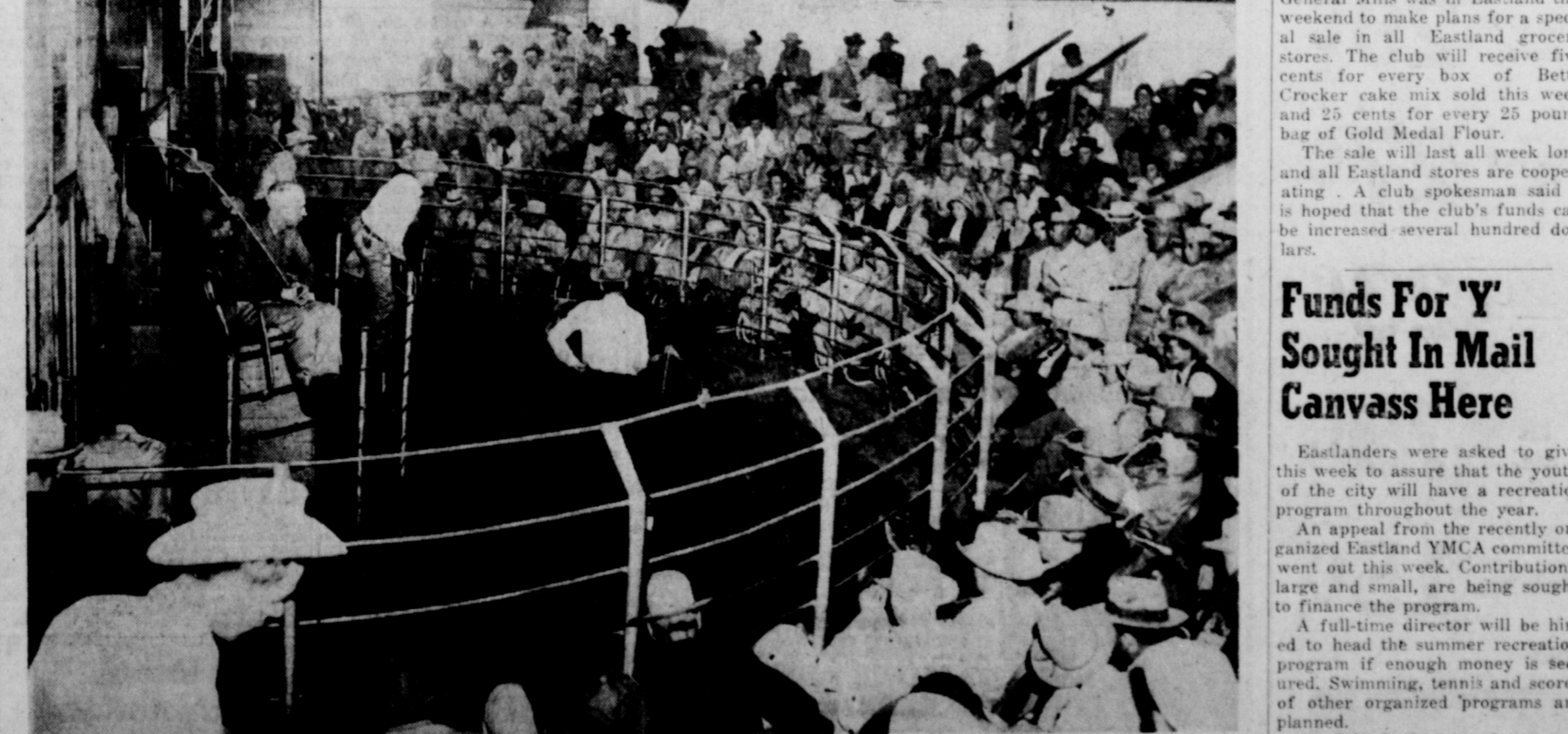
Further Plans To Be Made On Songfest Here
