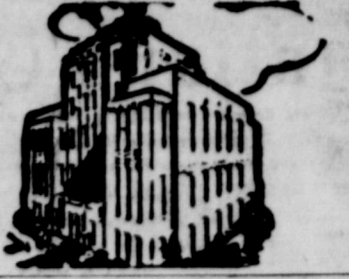

Mrs. Perkins' election came at the Federation's national convention in Detroit. She left Detroit Saturday morning for Lexington, Ky. for a board meeting of new officers of the General Federation.

Red Cross Will Hold Workshops On Care of Sick

Dates for two summer workshops in Texas to give special training in effective methods of teaching care of the sick and injured have been announced by the American National Red Cross, according to information released this week by Mrs. Bill Tucker, Eastland County Chapter chairman of home nursing.

"These courses are offered to people who are interested in teaching this vital subject," she said. The training with others and the sharing in valuable practice methods which one receives during the courses will qualify a person to go back home and help their community to better health. At least one person in every home should know the simple skills in caring for the sick and injured.

Lamar State College of Technology in Beaumont, in cooperation with American National Red Cross will conduct a workshop on Home Economics Course, Care of the Sick and Injured July 21-25. Monday through Friday, in the Home Economics Building, and the student may arrange to stay in the dormitory. Students may pay their own way or be sent by an organization for which they will teach.

East Texas State Teachers College, Commerce, in cooperation with American National Red Cross will also hold an instructor's training course in Home Economics, 429, August 11-15, in the Home Economics Building. Those taking courses for credit must contact (Continued on Page Two)

Connellee Hotel Opened 30 Years Ago This Week

It was exactly 30 years ago this week that the Connellee Hotel opened for business in Eastland. At that time an Eastland Telegram writer described the new building as, "A hotel unsurpassed in beauty, in completeness and luxury of detail is the Connellee."

A special edition put out in honor of the grand opening stated, "Eastland's magnificent hotel, seven stories in height, crowned by a sumptuous roof garden, represents an outlay of a fortune."

The ground breaking for the hotel was held Oct. 12. By Nov. 2 concrete was completed on the second floor and by Dec. 2 concrete had been poured on the sixth floor. The roof was finished by Dec. 31 and brick work was topped out Jan. 17. The contractors completed the building May 3.

C. U. Connellee, who donated the land for the building, was the first guest. His log cabin was built on the same land years before.

The 94-room hotel was dedicated at a banquet in the roof garden for "those who had devoted to the building of the hotel."

At the banquet, Mr. Connellee was asked to speak. He said, "This is the proudest moment of my life; it is my dream come true. On the spot where this hotel stands I built my first house, a log cabin, to which I brought my bride, and it is here that all my children were born."

Work On Organizing Social Club Begins

Lone Cedar Country Club at Lake Leon entered a new stage this week when organization of the social club began.

Dr. James Whittington, president of the Land Company which is in charge of building the club, said that work at the club is half-way through now. The land company will lease the club to the social club.

Dr. Whittington said that the contract on the swimming pool (which will be built in the shape of a modern flat bottomed ice cream cone) will be let June 15.

At present the air conditioning unit, plumbing and wiring are going into the clubhouse. Dr. Whittington said that the road to the club has been completed and terraces have been placed in. Tennis courts are also now being built.

The swimming pool will be 60 feet long, 40 feet wide at the shallow end and 20 feet wide at the deep end. Deepest part of the pool will be nine feet.

There will be ceramic tile around the edge of the pool with brick around the top. A 16 foot diving board will be installed and a brick bath house is to be built. The clubhouse itself is nearing completion. The room and brick (Continued on Page 2)

sides have been completed. Work on the inside of the building will be completed by the social club, which will also furnish the building.

Lone Cedar Country Club was in the dream stage back in 1953. In 1955 a charter was obtained and work got underway on the building early this year.

An 18-hole watered fairway golf course is also on the planning board. The course will be roughed in by the land company and completed by the social club.

Members of the club are from Eastland, Ranger, Cisco, Gorman, and Strawn.

Fire Defense Plan Meeting Set Tuesday

An initial Texas Rural Fire Defense Plan organization meeting is scheduled for Tuesday afternoon at 2 in the county commissioners courtroom in Eastland.

Eastland is one of several adjoining counties involved in the Plan as a result of Wolters Air Force Base in Palo Pinto County being designated as a target area in case of disaster or enemy attack. County Agent J. M. Cooper explained.

Authority for the setting up of this plan, came in the form of a memorandum received from President Eisenhower, Gov. Price Daniel, the Texas Forest Service and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Each target area county is to have a rural fire committee composed of at least six persons.

Everyone is invited attend the meeting, and according to plant sent Cooper, a number of persons, including the county judge, sheriff (fire chief), Soil Conservation Service unit leader, highway patrolman, chairman of the Soil Conservation District, Highway Department officials, game warden and large landowners are urged to attend.

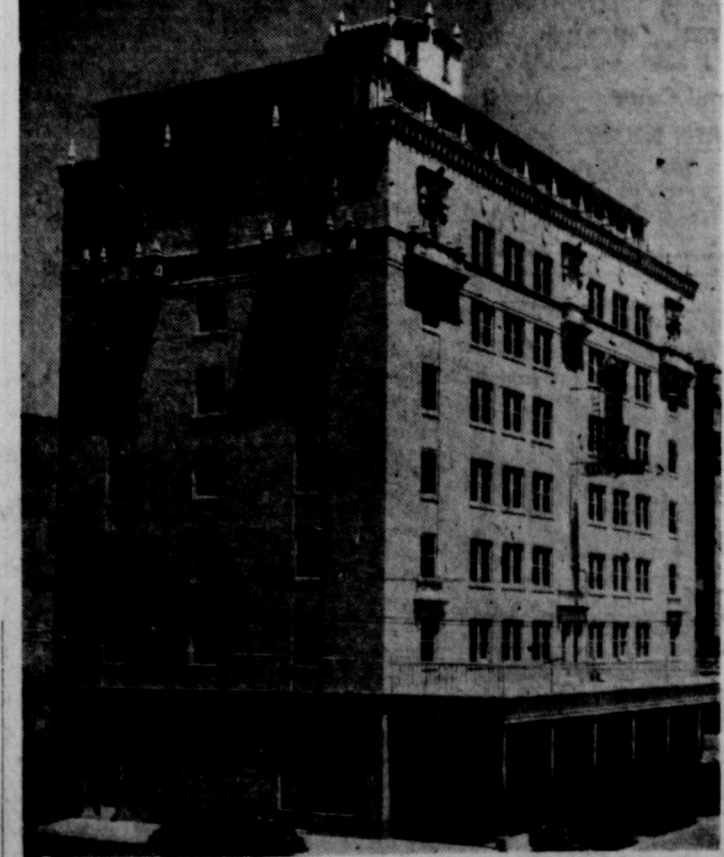

Many other benefits than financial have been experienced by all churches which have used the program.

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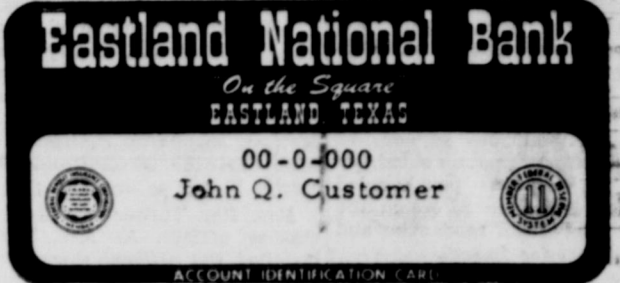

Real cool is this soup beverage, whipped up in a trice. Combine 2 cans (10 3/4 oz. each) condensed cream of celery soup, well chilled, with 2 soup cans of ice cold milk. Shake, mix or blend and pour into four tall glasses.

Skillet Barbecued Chicken

1 broiler-fryer chicken
cut in pieces
3 tablespoons molasses
1/4 cup prepared mustard
1/2 cup salad oil

2 tablespoons salt
1 teaspoon pepper
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup vinegar

Wash and dry chicken. Combine molasses, prepared mustard, salt and pepper. Add water, vinegar and oil; blend well. Dip chicken into sauce. Cook in heavy skillet over medium heat, brushing with additional sauce until tender, about 30 to 45 minutes.
