Sheriff Finally Gets Money Back On Jail Cooler

An air conditioner bought a year ago finally cooled things off in the County Commissioners' Court. Sheriff J. Williams got his \$130 back after the long, hot spell.

A year ago the sheriff came before the Court to request permission to buy a cooler for the living quarters of the jail. He got the permission providing the cooler could be paid for out of the permanent fund.

The attorney general of the state got called in finally, and he ruled the cooler couldn't be paid for out of the permanent improvement fund, that it would have to be paid out of the general fund.

By this time Sheriff Williams had already purchased the cooler, after taking bids. Then the Court told him the county couldn't pay for the cooler. The Sheriff ended up paying the bill himself.

Monday Sheriff Williams came in and asked if the Court had changed its mind. It had and quickly voted to reimburse him his \$130.

In other Court action commissioners approved payment of regular monthly bills.

Record Refunds Made This Year

A record number of tax refunds were made by the Dallas District of the Internal Revenue Service by May 9 of this year, according to A. E. Fogle Jr., administrative officer of the Abilene office.

Tax refunds amounting to \$64,379,186 have been forwarded to 685,576 taxpayers. A total of 6500 other North Texas taxpayers' tax refunds have been held up because of faulty preparation of the returns. The Internal Revenue Service is making every effort to clear the errors on these tax returns as soon as possible.

Taxpayers were requested not to contact the Internal Revenue Service concerning their refund until after July 1.

Cisco Boy Drowns In Swimming Pool

Eastland County's second drowning in 1958 occurred Monday afternoon when a 15-year-old Cisco boy lost his life in the swimming pool just below Lake Cisco dam.

Billy Wayne Taylor, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Taylor of Cisco, drowned in approximately nine feet of water in the deep end of the large pool. He was swimming with three other boys, his cousins Dennis and Ralph Lanham, both of Cisco, and Jack Snyder, who is visiting from Corpus Christi.

The four boys had been swimming for some time, they told officials, when they suddenly noticed that Billy Wayne was in trouble.

The drowning took place at approximately 4:25. Billy had just completed his freshman year in Cisco High School and would have been 16 years old June 22. He was a member of the Calvary Baptist Church.

The boy's body was rushed to Graham Sanitarium and Henson administered artificial respiration all the way. The youth was pronounced dead on arrival at 4:45 p.m., however.

Funeral services were still pending this morning. The body is at Wylie Funeral Home in Cisco.

Survivors include the parents; two sisters, Mrs. Nancy Lenz and Evelyn Taylor, both of Cisco; and a grandmother, Mrs. Phama Travis of Cisco.

Thomas Hamilton Rites Held

Funeral services for Thomas M. Hamilton, Ranger blacksmith and welder were held Sunday afternoon at Killingsworth's Chapel.

Hamilton died Friday while on a fishing trip in Stephens County.

Survivors include his wife, Pearl L. of Ranger; a brother, Willie P. of Ranger; one sister, Mrs. Nora Arcehiga of Austin; and several nieces and nephews.

for that is that hospitals must stay open day and night. That means that instead of the average 40 hour week, the hospital faces a 168 hour a week.

Pointing to Eastland Memorial Hospital, the guest speaker declared, "It is amazing how in the last three years your costs have remained about the same." He said that the cost of materials and labor have gone up greatly in that period yet the local hospital has been able to hold the line.

New Law May Force County To Build Jail

The Eastland County jail, like 99 percent of other county jails in the state, cannot meet new requirements passed by the 55th Legislature.

That is the opinion of Sheriff J. B. Williams, who like most Texas lawmen, does not believe that there are many jails in the state which can live up to the high standards provided for in House Bill 448.

Asked by a reporter if he thought the Eastland County jail would pass inspection, Sheriff Williams didn't hesitate in saying no. He said the jail would fall short in many ways. Lighting is not up to the new high standard, the jail doesn't have enough cell blocks and proper plumbing, according to the new code, isn't in the jail.

The Eastland County jail, which has seen some of the most notorious outlaws of the state come and go down the years, was built back before the turn of the century.

It was in 1897 that Eastland County boasted a new jailhouse. In 1934 the jail was remodeled, and little has been thought about it since. It is an old looking building, but is in fairly good repair.

"The Texas Lawman," spokesman for the state's lawmen, has bitterly opposed the new bill. "The Lawman" terms the new law "idealistic." The magazine editorially says the law "... would work an insupportable hardship on most Texas counties — principally the smaller ones." The editor also suggested that the counties' tax money could be spent better

by "raising the lamentably low salaries of the officials than by seeing to the comforts of jail prisoners."

What is the answer to the county's problem? Sheriff Williams says that if the county has to live up to the letter of the law it will mean that a new jail will have to be built, or at least a major remodeling job will have to be done on the present structure.

The County Commissioners Court, today, hasn't worried itself about the new law. The county jail, so far, has not been inspected.

Survey Reveals Participation In United Funds

The American Red Cross participated in 108 Texas United Campaigns this past fall, and the TUF-USO in 97, out of a total of 121 Campaigns reporting to a state-wide survey just completed by the Texas United Fund. Local United Campaigns reported to the Texas United Fund that the American Heart Association participated in 72 United campaigns and the American Cancer Society in 29 campaigns.

The Texas United Fund is a state-wide federation organized by and serving all local Community Chests and United Funds in Texas. The state-wide survey was conducted by the TUF at the request of Texas' local Community Chests and United Funds. Object of the survey was to determine what State and National agencies participate in local Campaigns as a guide that local Chests and Funds.

The recent surveys made by the TUF on Campaign Results and Per Capita Giving, as well as this report, indicate that the popularity of "once-a-year" campaigns is even greater than before. As this survey shows, many agencies which formerly conducted their own campaigns are participating in the united effort through local Chests and Funds. In addition, financial support by the public through voluntary contributions is reported to be better than it was through separate drives.

The 121 reporting Community Chests and United Funds that the Red Cross participated in 108 of these Campaigns; the TUF-USO in 97 Campaigns; the American Heart in 72 Campaigns; the American Cancer Society in 29 Campaigns; the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis in 7 Campaigns; the National Tuberculosis Association in 7 campaigns; the Crippled Children's Society in 17 campaigns; Muscular Dystrophy in 7 Campaigns; Multiple Sclerosis in 1 Campaign; Cerebral Palsy in 3 Campaigns; and Retarded Children in 7 campaigns. Not all United Campaigns reported, therefore, some of the agencies may have participated or been included in additional United Campaigns. The Texas United Fund states United Fund-USO participated in 33 additional campaigns.

The information was not requested by the Texas United Fund but 13 local United Campaigns reported they had included the Texas Mental Health Association. The Texas United Fund states that this information was volunteered, and that it is possible the agency participated in more Campaigns than reported.

A. E. Fogle Jr., stated that "24,960 North Texans had possible erroneous deductions in their tax returns that requires a pre-refund audit before the refund can be made." The Internal Revenue Service is advising each of these taxpayers of a specific time and date for reporting for an interview or is requesting specific information by mail concerning the deductions claimed.

Taxpayers involved in the pre-refund audit program are being scheduled as rapidly as possible by the Internal Revenue Service, however, this audit program continues until September 30. Taxpayers who have received notice that their return has been selected for a pre-refund audit do not have to write or call the Internal Revenue Service since they will be contacted as soon as possible by the auditor assigned to their case.

TALES OF LOST TREASURES
IN AND AROUND EASTLAND COUNTY

Talking about finding lost treasure, or where it may be buried, is just not an everyday discussion among most people. Perhaps this is why not much is known about the subject. It is surprising, however, what one may learn once the subject is mentioned during the course of a friendly conversation.

In my pursuits of hunting down lost mines and buried treasure, I find that many people, strangely enough seem to know a great deal more than one might be inclined to surmise.

For example . . . who would know that a resident of Ranger, knew of the approximate location of \$5,000 in buried silver. His name is Tom Goodlam. Only a few people know Tom. They know even less of the silver.

It is certainly strange when you stop and think it over. Here is \$5,000 in precious silver bars left by early Spanish miners during an Indian attack, just lying idly under a few feet of sandy topsoil while all Eastland Countians try to find out where the next dollar is coming from. But be all this as it may, people must continue to meet their obligations treasure or no treasure and on Goodlam is certainly no exception. With a family of four growing youngsters . . . to go out and look for buried treasure? Nonsense! "I would be a dastardly injustice indeed. Tom curses the day he learned of the silver. It haunts him at night and day and because of his family obligations he is not a treasure hunter. In fact, he doesn't even have the time to find out where to go LOOK for buried treasure. Realizing this, to the silver. With reluctance and it was with a bit of sympathy for

him when I ask him for a waybill a promise on my part to forfeit half of what was recovered, he wrote one out. It is needless to say that I searched for the silver immediately. I am still searching with directions in hand, but to no avail. As Tom, I guess I'm no Treasure Hunter. So with his permission I would like to give the reader the opportunity to search with me. This is the waybill to the fabulous horde of Silver bullion:

"Go to lake Cisco and take the old fish hatchery road into the woods. After a short distance, the road seems to play out but if you observe closely you will discover that it doesn't play out at all but, instead, courses northeasterly. Keep going and you will come to a crumbling gate. Here, take the fork of the trail that leads to big Sandy Creek. You can't miss the creek for it is big and sandy. It is 3 miles from the gate. Budget Request Is Made By Ranger College

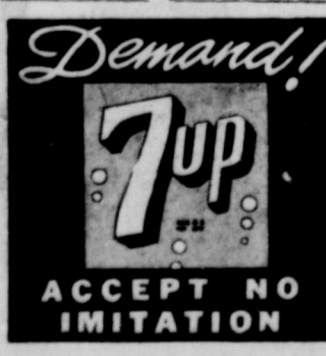
An appropriations request for Ranger College was made by Dr. Price Ashton at a meeting of Texas junior college presidents in Austin Friday.

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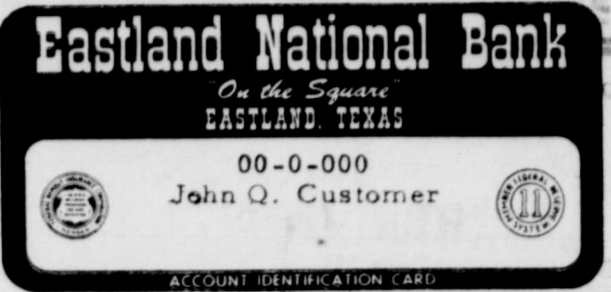

4-H Program Offers Members Scholarship

CHICAGO — Many 4-H boys and girls throughout the state have found that club work lays the foundation for a college education. Whether their interests are in agriculture, home economics or community service, members have a wide choice of 4-H activities.

One of these is the 4-H Poultry program which offers \$400 college scholarships annually to the six most outstanding club members in the nation. Besides success in raising and marketing poultry and eggs, the 4-H'er must show an exceptional achievement record in good citizenship, leadership, and all-around club participation. The winners are selected by the Cooperative Extension Service.

To be eligible for a scholarship the boy or girl must be 14 years of age or over, have satisfactorily completed three years of club work, and have been designated as a state 4-H Poultry winner. The top award is an expense paid trip to the National 4-H Congress held in Chicago.

These awards, and the county medals as well, are made possible by the Sears - Roebuck Foundation (Chicago) through the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work. Last year 6,000 medals were awarded to 4-H'ers in 48 states, according to the Committee.

The Cooperative Extension Service directs the program. Additional information may be obtained from the County Extension office.

Texas Tourists Stay Longer, Spend More

AUSTIN — Visitors to Texas spent more money and stayed around longer spending it in 1957 than during any previous year, so indicates the tourist industry report released by the Texas Highway Department today.

D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer, pointed to statistics in the Report which show that expenditures per person per day jumped to \$8.22 in 1957, as compared to \$7.71 in 1956. "Moreover, the typical tourist extended his visit to 6.3 days in 1957, as against 5.9 days the previous year," Greer observed.

The Report defined tourist dollars as new money earned elsewhere and brought into the community where it is then spent and spent into the local business cycle.

Specifically, tourist dollars to the tune of \$531 million made music in Texas cash registers and jingled in the pockets of Texas jeans last year. This whopping amount was cleared from tourists traveling by automobile. Greer pointed out that this was an impressive increase over 1956's intake of \$379 million. The Report says that approximately \$98.9 million was spent also in 1957 by tourists visiting Texas by air, rail, bus, and ship.

Largest part of the tourist dollar in Texas is spent for food, lodging, and car upkeep. To serve those basic needs, the Report estimates, 25,320 established businesses with 102,265 employees are required. The final figures are increased many times when the retail stores, amusement spots, gift shops, and other places where the remainder of the tourist dollar is spent are considered.

Tourists themselves provide the records from which the Highway Department obtains the statistics in the annual Tourist Industry Report, Greer remarked. Survey cards, to be completed and mailed back after the visit in Texas, are given tourists stopping at the Department's seven Highway Travel Information Bureaus located on major highways entering the state. Last year the Bureaus played host to 174,000 such out-of-state guests.

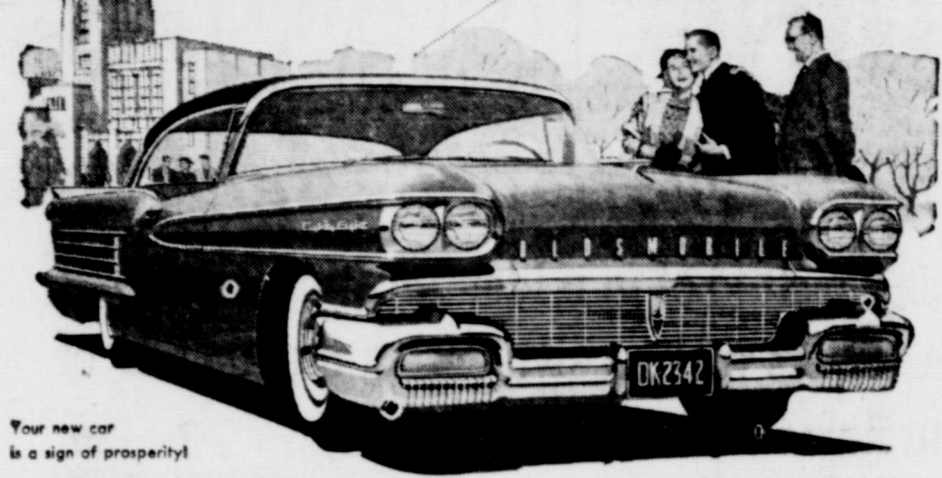

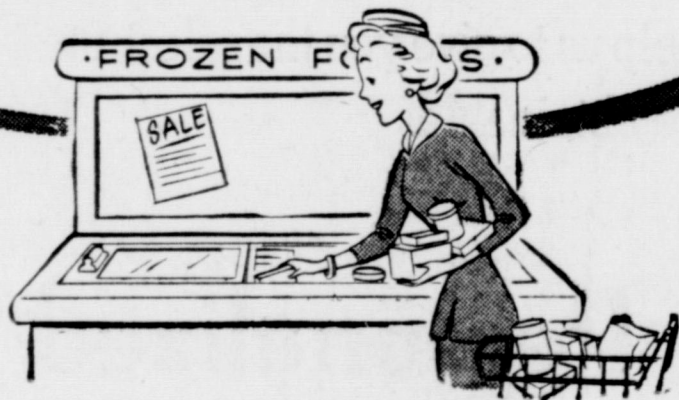
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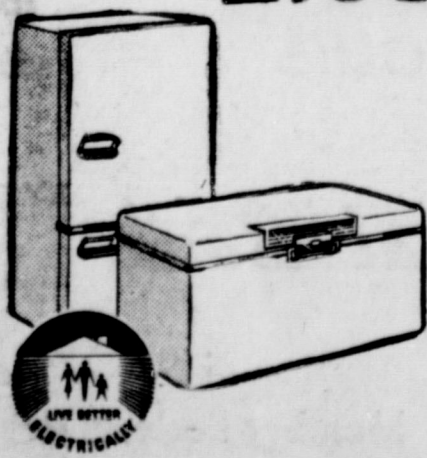

Wash and dry chicken. Combine molasses, prepared mustard, salt and pepper. Add water, vinegar and oil; blend well. Dip chicken into sauce. Cook in heavy skillet over medium heat, brushing with additional sauce until tender, about 30 to 45 minutes.
