The month of June has been designated as Dairy Month.  
 It is difficult to have a balanced diet without including a good deal of milk every day. Recent studies show that women, especially are not drinking the milk they need each day—neither are their teenage daughters. This may be partly due to the fact that many people think milk is fattening. It isn't. A glass of whole milk has fewer calories than a serving of many other foods. There are only about 145 calories in a glass (eight ounces) of whole milk, and each ounce is packed with food value. Rich in calcium, milk also provides high quality protein, other minerals and vitamins.  
 Drink skim milk, if you're trying to lose a few pounds. It has approximately half the calories of whole milk, but you will still be getting the important minerals, vitamins, and protein. When energy lags—in mid-morning or afternoon—try a cold glass of milk for a list that lasts. Make sure all family members get enough milk every day.

Another dairy product commonly used is cottage cheese. Cottage cheese is a popular dish summer or winter. A good source of protein, calcium, phosphorus, and riboflavin, it's a good food buy anytime.  
 Easy to prepare, the bland smoothness of cottage cheese contrasts well with the crisp texture of vegetables such as celery, carrots, green peppers, onions, cabbage and lettuce. The coarse textured kind is good for simple salads while the smooth variety blends more readily with other ingredients, particularly in a congested salad or in cooking.

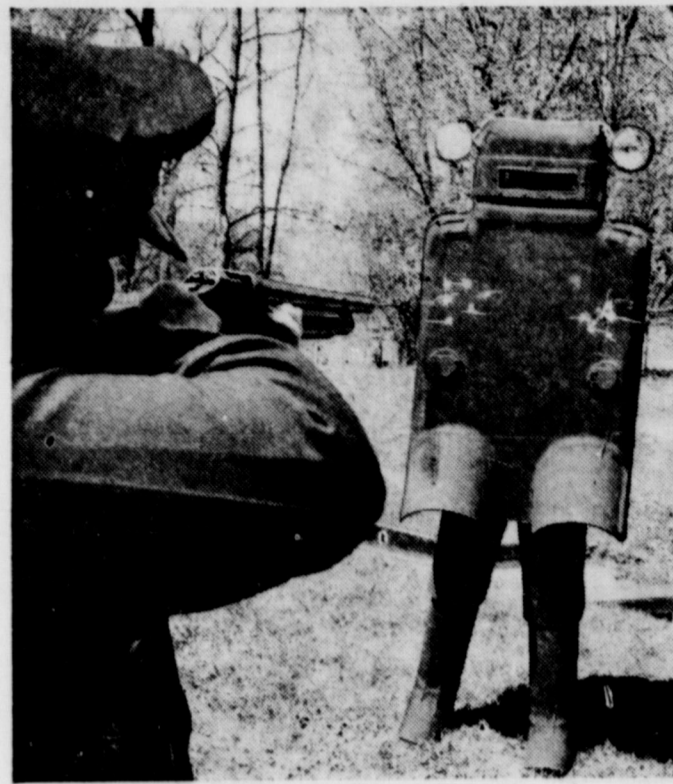

## TALES OF LOST TREASURES IN AND AROUND EASTLAND COUNTY

By Atlas Wilson

Consider for a moment the vast wealth accumulated and then lost or buried in the centuries past. Consider the ultimate disposition of the great wealth and loot of the pirates and bandits so numerous during the early days of this country. Consider the large quantities of old family silverware and savings hidden to protect them and then subsequently forgotten. What has happened to this great wealth? For the most part it lies buried in long-forgotten sites. It lies at the disposal of some modern explorer with determination and foresight willing to acquire and use the latest and most scientific instruments in his search.

The Metal and Mineral Detector is this instrument. With it, and

under ideal moisture content conditions in the ground, you can, for example, detect under solid earth a small bag filled with gold coins at twelve inches; At thirty-six inches under solid earth you can 'pick-up' an object the size of an ordinary tin can; At 4 1/2 feet, a civil war cannon-ball; At seven feet, an old dutch oven; and at twelve feet, a small treasure chest. In short . . . anything at all composed of a metallic substance can be detected through the earphones connected to the instrument if it is within a reasonable range. These treasure finding devices are not unreasonably priced but for the average person, perhaps they could do better in constructing their own "detector."

Constructing your own treasure finder is relatively simple and the cost is practically nil. All you need is a 3 foot forked mesquite limb, a silver of the mineral you are going to search for and a little time to use it. This operation is commonly known as "witching". You may "witch" for water, minerals, treasure, and, according to some people, even oil. This business of "witching" for oil is a little far fetched to my notions but there are some people who practice the task quite earnestly.

Once your 'doodle-bug', as it is called, is constructed you go to the suspected spot and pass it over the area until you feel it tending to pull or draw downward and this is the place to dig for the object you are searching for. One last word on this subject. Be sure you

use gold with your 'doodle bug' if that is what you are looking for. If you are searching for silver, then of course use silver. Lead you would use lead and so on.

Whatever method you may use in finding buried treasure just always remember this. The best instrument is your head. Remember also that the most important thing of all to do before going onto someone's property is to get their permission to do so. In fact, if at all practical, get their consent in writing. When this is done and you should find the treasure you are looking for then the land owner can't claim it all for himself as he otherwise could do had this procedure not been followed.

## LEGAL NOTICE

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN

That on the 11th day of June, 1958 the Board of Directors of the Eastland County Water Supply District had a regular stated meeting, passed an ordinance changing the rules and regulations for fishing and boating on Lake Leon, which were passed on the 12th day of July, 1955. The changes were in Article III and Article V. The new law will read as follows:

### ARTICLE III

It shall be unlawful in Lake Leon to catch or take any fish, or to possess any fish taken by any method, means or device, except by ordinary pole and line, rod and reel, fly rod, throw line equipped with no more than two (2) hooks, and trotline of not more than thirty (30) hooks. The use of trotlines is limited to one trotline per person and not more than two (2) trotlines per party of two or more persons. No metallic trotlines shall be used. No two trotlines or more shall be connected together in any manner; and no trotline shall be set, tied or placed within two hundred (200) feet of any boat dock or pier, bathing pier, beach or any place commonly used as a swimming area.

Minnow seines not more than twenty (20) feet in length, dip nets and fruit jars with funnel attached are permitted for taking minnows and rough fish. Further, it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to fish for, take, catch, or attempt to catch any fish in the waters of Lake Leon by the use of any net, seine, snag line, trap or other device not herein authorized; and the possession, within two hundred (200) yards of Lake Leon, of any tackle not authorized by this act shall be prima facie evidence of violation hereof.

### ARTICLE V

It shall be unlawful in Lake Leon to use for bait any game fish or fish commonly known as Gold Fish, except when they are cut up and used as cut bait. It shall be lawful to use for bait, when lawfully caught, acquired and possessed, crappie and perch. This notice shall be published in the papers in Eastland County once a week for two consecutive weeks, said change and said ordinance shall be in full force and effect on and after June 26, 1958.

A full copy of the changes in this ordinance will be on file at the Chamber of Commerce in Eastland and Ranger.

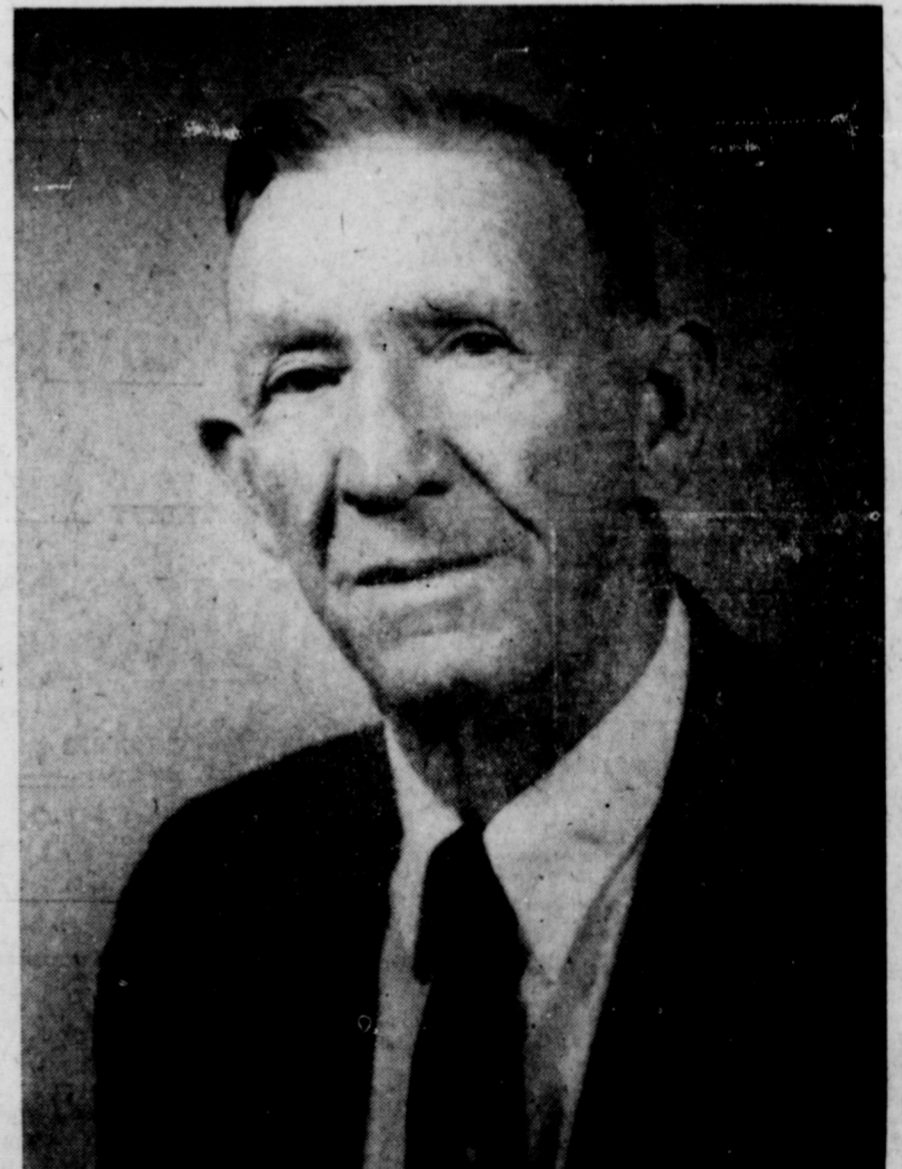
