## GOOD NEWS FOR CITY EXPECTED TODAY

Big news for Eastland was expected to be announced in San Antonio Wednesday evening.

Local delegates from Las Leales Club and Thursday Afternoon Club are attending the 77th annual convention of Texas Federation of Women's Clubs.

Attending from Eastland will be Mrs. Joseph Perkins, Mrs. James Horton, Mrs. Herman Hassell, and Mrs. Dan Childress.

This event is being held at the St. Anthony Hotel in San Antonio, May 7 through 9. More than 500 club women from all parts of Texas are expected.

The delegates from Eastland were expected to be given remarkable news at the Wednesday night meeting.

The clubwomen were optimistic that their efforts in providing a first class library facility for Eastland through a dedicated program of all-out cooperation, would be recognized at the state level of

the Texas Federated Club work.

Assuming a major sweep in the state contest, it would propel the Eastland project into national attention, and made the project eligible for national recognition -- and the resulting cash awards which accompany them.

Indications were that the Eastland delegation would be pleased with announcements to be made Wednesday night at the state convention.

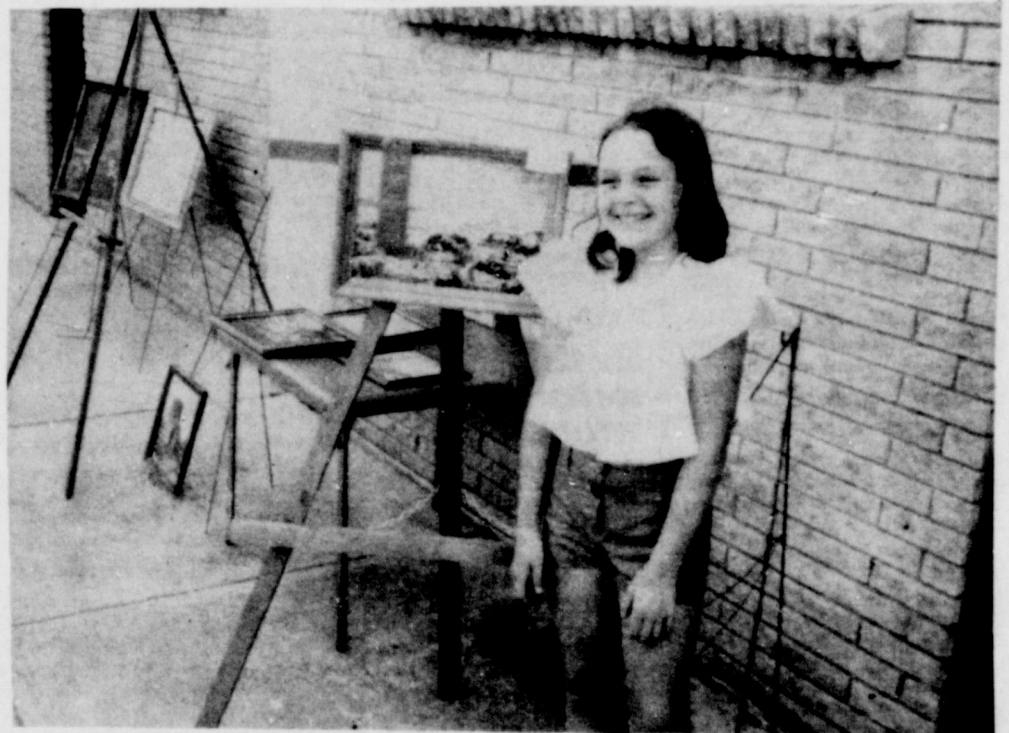

## Gordon Spot

Congratulations to Kokomo Community, winners of the district Community Improvement contest last Thursday. We hope a large crowd will show up for the regional tour which will be held next Thursday, May 9th. The community is very beautiful after the good rain last week.

And speaking of the rain - some say it was the most perfect rain they have seen in a long time. From one to two inches fell in a period of about 10 hours throughout the county.

Some county pork producers have already received a ballot to vote on a check-off program for pork. Others will be receiving ballots this week. The check-off program would mean that producers would have a few cents taken out when hogs are sold. This could not exceed 10¢ per head. The money collected must be used only for developing and carrying out programs of research, education, promotion, and disease, insect and predatory animal control designed to encourage production, marketing and use of pork.

If the referendum is passed by two-thirds vote, a board of

directors will be responsible for handling all phases of the program. Also on the referendum, producers will elect a board of directors from 15 districts which will be called the Texas Pork Producers Board. Harold Fritts of Gorman is running for a position on the board.

Voting on the referendum begins on May 1st, with balloting done by mail. All ballots must be postmarked not later than May 14th.

Powdery mildew, a disease commonly found on grass, vegetables, ornamentals, shrubs and trees, has been especially prevalent on roses, crape myrtles, petunias and zinnias this spring. The disease is also a serious problem on cucurbits in the home garden.

Powdery mildew reduces yields and weakens plants by attacking buds, young leaves and growing tips.

On young leaves the disease first appears as slightly raised blisters - like areas that soon become covered with a grayish - white powdery growth. As the young leaves expand, they become curled and distorted. On older leaves large white patches of the fungus appear and there is little distortion. Tiny, black fruiting bodies of the fungus are often embedded in the mildew patches, especially later in the season.

Sometimes plant buds are attacked and become covered with the white mildew before they open. Thus they either fail to open or open improperly.

Many times the infection spreads to mature flower parts, causing flower blight.

Unlike other fungus diseases, the powdery mildew organism can cause infection when very little moisture is present on the plant surface. The disease is most common when cool nights are followed by warm days, a condition that have been prevalent this season. The fungus overwinters on diseased plant material on the ground and also on young growing parts of plants.

Control of powdery mildew requires certain sanitation procedures as well as application of fungicides. Good air circulation among plants will reduce the possibility of the disease. So avoid overcrowding plants and planting in low damp areas.

Begin fungicide applications early in spring when the new growth develops or immediately after the first sign of powdery mildew. Fungicides can be applied during the flowering period to prevent blossom blight.

Suitable fungicides for ornamentals include Benlate, Karathane, sulfur and Acti-Dione. Benlate and Karathane can be used in the home garden. Use sulfur only at temperatures below 85 degrees as it will burn plants in high temperatures.

## "Revitalized" Cotton Price Support Plan Urged

WASHINGTON, D.C. - The Farmers Union warned today that "Forward contracting for sale of cotton does not give farmers the price stability nor the price security they need in order to stay in business and produce the cotton that the nation needs for domestic use and exports."

Joe Rankin, Ralls, Texas,

Vice President of the Texas Farmers Union, put both the Texas and National Farmers Unions on record for "a renewed and revitalized farm program" in a statement to the Cotton Subcommittee of the House Committee on Agriculture Monday, April 29.

Rankin said cotton buyers are anxious to buy cotton for

future delivery when they think the price will go higher. But when buyers expect abundant supplies in the future, farmers can't get offers to buy at prices sufficient to cover their production costs, Rankin said.

Rankin called for an eight point price support and stabilization program for cotton.

Rankin has been designated by Texas Farmers Union to represent cotton producers at the 17th Universal Cotton Standards Conference to be held at Memphis, Tennessee, May 14 and 15. Cotton industry leaders from the United States and 10 other nations will attend and take part in the discussions. This conference is held every three years under terms of the Universal Cotton Standards Agreement.

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## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Lyndell Williams TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN, Tex. — New federal  
revenue sharing funds totalling  
\$294,045,044 will be distributed  
to state, county and city  
governments in Texas during  
the next fiscal year.

This is \$9 million more than  
allocations for the current year  
which amount to \$285,228,345  
for all units of government in  
the state.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe reported  
state government will get nearly  
\$3 million more for the 1974-75  
fiscal period beginning July 1  
than the 1973-74 allotment.

State government's cut is  
\$98,081,488 compared with  
\$95,283,690 for this year.

An overpayment of \$108,711,  
due to an Office of Revenue  
Sharing mistake in Washington,  
will be deducted from next  
year's funds sent to Texas.

The allocation is based on a  
formula including consideration  
of population, per capita income  
and tax effort.

Under next year's formula,  
hospital district taxes will be  
considered in the total county  
tax effort. Hospital taxes  
previously had been considered  
a city tax effort.

Six Texas counties will get  
larger revenue sharing allot-  
ments while some cities within  
the counties will get smaller  
amounts.

Harris County, which now  
receives \$6.87 million, will get  
\$9.65 million for 1974-75.  
Houston will receive slightly  
less — \$17,366,689 as compared  
with \$18 million under current  
formulas.

The Dallas County total will  
increase from \$3.58 million to  
\$5.2 million. Nueces County's  
share will increase from \$1.7  
million to \$2.3 million, Bexar  
County's from \$2.6 million to  
\$5.2 million, El Paso County's  
from \$1.2 to \$1.9 million and  
Tarrant County from \$1.8  
million to \$3.25 million.

The city of Dallas will get  
slightly less — \$13.1 million, as  
compared with \$13.6 million.  
Corpus Christi's total will  
decline from \$3.66 million to  
\$3.4 million, San Antonio's from  
\$9.6 million to \$9.3 million, El  
Paso's from \$6.1 million to \$6  
million and Fort Worth's from  
\$5.26 million to \$5 million.

DROUGHT DECLARATION  
SOUGHT — Governor Briscoe  
has requested U.S. Secretary of  
Agriculture Earl L. Butz to  
declare Coleman County a  
disaster area as a result of  
drought conditions in the county.  
Briscoe requested the disaster  
declaration provide low interest  
loans and other assistance to  
farmers and businesses that  
suffered wheat crop losses from  
the drought.

The Governor informed Sec-  
retary Butz a number of other  
Texas counties have been affect-  
ed by prolonged dry weather  
and high winds and similar re-  
quests for supplementary Fed-  
eral assistance may be received  
from other county officials in  
the near future.

State Agriculture Com-  
missioner John C. White said  
estimates of wheat losses due to  
drought conditions in 47 Texas  
counties run about \$160 million.

ATTORNEY GENERAL  
RULES — Under most cir-  
cumstances submission by State  
Welfare agencies of basic in-  
formation concerning the  
identity of welfare recipients to  
a centralized computer does not  
violate any Federal or State  
common law statutory or  
constitutional right of privilege,  
Atty. Gen. John Hill has ruled.

In an opinion requested by  
Governor Briscoe, Attorney  
General Hill noted there would  
be no public disclosure of the  
information, hence no violation  
of law. The Governor had noted  
that the centralized computer list  
would eliminate the need for  
welfare recipients to fill out  
applications.

Hill also issued an opinion  
saying it is a legitimate ex-  
penditure of campaign funds for  
"publicity" purposes to furnish  
transportation to members of  
the press to accompany a  
candidate on campaign travels.

"If paying for the trans-  
portation of newsmen is a  
means of securing publicity, and  
we think it is, then we cannot  
say that it is an unreasonable  
one," Hill said in his opinion.

Galveston and Texas City. Each  
will serve a two-year term ex-  
piring April 15, 1975.

City.

RIGHT TO READ MEETING  
— Dr. Ruth Holloway, U.S.

## Eastland County In Top Ten In Pecan Production

Eastland County ranked in  
the top ten in pecan production  
in Texas for the 1973 season,  
Agriculture Commissioner  
John C. White has announced.  
Total pecan production for  
Eastland County was 680,000  
lbs., compared with 1,625,000  
lbs. in 1972.

Production statewide was  
estimated at 23 million lbs.,  
mostly from the Trans-Pecos,  
South Central, Cross Timbers  
and Blackland areas.

Texas dropped from first to  
fifth place in pecan production  
nationally.

"Pecans were expected to be  
down in 1973 from a year  
earlier since they are an  
alternating year crop, but  
production was also reduced by  
insect and weather problems",  
Commissioner White stated.

South Central Texas was  
hard hit by the walnut cater-  
pillar, which stripped many  
trees of their foliage two or  
three times.

A late freeze in April caught  
Central Texas trees in bloom,  
destroying much of the pecan  
crop.

YOU SAT UP ALL NIGHT WONDERING WHERE THE SUN WENT? YEAH, THEN IT DAWNED ON ME...

Only in the land of the Americas from early to mid-April, suddenly there are flashes of gray, black, and white evident in our yard, and no doubt in yours.

The young Mockingbird starts declaring that he is master of all he surveys, assuming territorial rights to an area of 20,000 to 60,000 square feet. Certain visitors are not tolerated such as cats and snakes, too we notice him harrassing the Grackles continually. He does not bother the birds that are permanent residents.

The Mocker even attacks one, or more of his own, often fighting the other to the ground. He is quick to pick a fight, at the same time appearing to protect a pair of Wrens with their young in their house outside our window. A sudden "Tchach, Tchack" announces that the Mocker sees an intruder, and at times his own reflection upsets him.

His songs give the mockingbird the color he lacks otherwise. The ten specie north of Mexico are great singers, singing at night, in flight, or while perched. He has been known to change his tune 50 to 80 times in a ten minute song fest. One was reported to have joined the National Symphony Orchestra during an outdoor recital, imitating a flute playing bird calls in the "Peter and the Wolf" musical score. Experts in Ohio demonstrated that often the only way to distinguish between an actual bird call and the Mocker's imitation was with electronic analysis. Mockers start tuning in late January, reaching their peak in Spring, singing at almost any hour. During August they molt, and are quiet, then return to form in the fall. In the late year the female delivers soft, beautiful notes from the cover of brush.

Mockingbirds are nine to 11 inches long, and the adults look alike. They are the state birds of Texas, Tennessee, Mississippi, Arkansas and Florida. Their nests are of twigs, grass, rootlets, etc., and built within 10 feet of the ground in a shrub, tree or vine. The nest holds four or five bluish or greenish eggs spotted with brown. The eggs hatch in about 12 days and the young ones fly in about two weeks. The mates build another nest then for a new brood. Wild berries make up over half of the mocker's diet, the rest being insects.

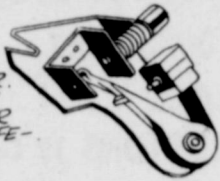

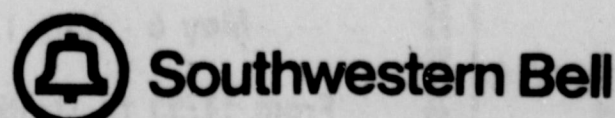

With a total of 10,110 qualified voters eligible to help make decisions, over half, 5,610, did not show up to vote. Exactly 4,500 voters marked ballots Saturday: 4,478 democrats in nine boxes; and 24 Republicans in one box.
