## 2 Run-Offs Seen For County; Most Incumbents Win

Eastland Countians, 4,478 strong but only about half voting strength, went to the polls Saturday and made im-

portant decisions. Vetoing a proposition which could legalize race-track gambling, countians stayed

with Gov. Dolph Briscoe, but made some local courthouse changes. Unofficial returns showed incumbents generally

successful with two runoffs seen on the county level.

In one of the key races, that for Eastland County Judge, Incumbent Scott Bailey got 2,371 votes, and Challenger Carl Garrett, 2,028 for re-election.

In another county race that drew four contestants, for the office of County School Superintendent, Jimmy Hughes led the ticket, with 1,525, followed by Stubby Warden with 1,275, Carlos Turner with 810; and Alton Roan with 744. There will be a runoff between Hughes and Warden.

Incumbent Johnson Smith got 2,645 votes for County Clerk. His opponent Carol Senkelgot 1,568.

Mrs. Ellen Justice, Incumbent, got 2,648 votes for re-election. Her opponent Dick Foster got 1,691.

In the newly-created County Commissioner post for Ranger, in a field of five candidates, Jack Blackwell lead with 396, followed by O. L. Cantrell with 326 votes and will be in a runoff. Other candidates Pat Mosley got 238; Walter Henry, 101; and D. B. Cozart, 64.

In the Cisco Precinct where Commissioner Incumbent C. B. Dill was challenged by two, Dill got 676, Slim Booth 370 and Bill Childers 145.

In the Eastland Justice of the Peace race, Incumbent Wells Dalton got 392 to be defeated by Challenger Buddy Rowles who got 800.

Cisco JP Incumbent Carlton Holder got 709 and Challenger W. A. Dizzy Dean got 501.

The county joined in re-electing State Rep. Joe Hannas who got 3,126 votes here to defeat Challenger Harold Freeman with 1,150 for the District 54 post.

Incumbent M. D. Underwood at Ranger got 709 votes for re-election to the Jp post and Challenger John Tyson got 370.

The county gave Gov. Briscoe a decided margin over his strongest opponent, Frances Farenthold. Briscoe got 32,457 and Farenthold got 569.

The county went for Bob Bullock as state comptroller giving him 2,976 and Hugh Edburg, 941.

Veteran State Treasurer Jess James lead the county with 2,383 and Challenger Donald B. Yarbrough got 1,928.

Incumbent Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White took the county with 2,796 and his opponent Herbert A. Schroeder got 1,338.

The county with C. A. Kelly with 2,020 over Mark Wallace with 1,856 for railroad commissioner.

Democrats voted against parimutuel betting (except the Lake Leon box with for it) but the 'fors' were heavier than had been guessed. County vote on the issue was: 1,440 for and 2,549 against.

## I'm Proud of My Town!

I'm proud of our town of Eastland, Tex., a community of 3,800 generous people. A few years ago, we built our own hospital without borrowing a cent of money, but now we have surpassed that deed. With help from the whole town, we have converted a former slaughterhouse and meat market into a beautiful library.

The townspeople proved that they didn't want to go into debt for a new civic center and library by vigorously defeating bonds that would have raised taxes. Then the 30 women of the Thursday Afternoon Club acquired a building for the library—an old meat market which was in bad repair. They paid \$15,000 for it.

Remodeling began and donations poured in to cover costs. The exterior of the building was painted and trimmed with black wrought iron gates, flower boxes, and lettering. Inside, the walls were paneled, shelves were built, and air-conditioning and a heating system were installed. Formal opening and dedication ceremonies took place just 11 months after the bond issue failed. We now have a \$100,000 library that is an asset to the community.
