With EPA On Sewer

Fun and games with the EPA.

That appears to be the status between the City of Eastland and the Environmental Protection Agency, in a joint effort to build a new sewer plant for the city.

A contract was tentatively let last month to the apparent low bidder, subject to EPA approval for a grant, share program.

Well, EPA didn't approve because low bidder, Environmental Research Control Inc., a Brownwood contractor, had a 30 day requirement on its bid, and the EPA vetoed the bid, calling it conditional.

So in a special called meeting of the City Commission Tuesday, Commissioners okayed awarding the contract to the next high bidder, West Texas Construction Co. of Borger on a bid of \$295,406.72. (The Brownwood bid was \$293,937.00).

EPA had advised the city that they would go with the next bid if that contractor would agree to meet new wage requirements. Contacted during the meeting, the Borger contractor was less than enthusiastic to commit itself on the new wage scale without a study.

So -- it's conceivable that the city may have to re-ask bids for the project, which will further delay the badly-needed sewer plant.

Billy Jacobs of the city's engineering firm was on hand to assist in the new negotiations.

In other action, the commission agreed to cooperate in a county-wide project to provide new ultra high frequency radio equipment for law enforcement personnel.

Earlier Tuesday commissioners had heard a Council of Government official explain the program and how it could be secured through government grants, in a combined effort by the county, Eastland, Cisco, Ranger, Gorman and Rising Star, sharing common costs, to provide modern equipment which will be necessary in a short time.

The official indicated that the radios could be in operation this summer if the county and the various city groups would give approval so application can be made into Austin immediately.

At the courthouse meeting Tuesday morning there appeared to be some reluctance on the part of some of the municipalities for the common radio link.

Commissioners at City Hall also Tuesday afternoon okayed a share program with the local schools to engage a contractor to resurface the two tennis courts at City Park. City and school will each pay \$1,400, and the school will get its two courts brought up to shape.

Commissioner Bill Hoffman advised City Manager Lewis Tiner to secure protective covenants on all new additions in the city and it was further agreed that no water and/or sewer taps would be made for buildings which do not conform to the covenants.

Commissioners also agreed that all city radio equipment is to be repaired and maintained only by FCC-licensed personnel.

All Commissioners were present.

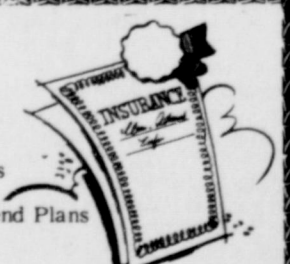

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Peanut Growers Air Views

Because of "wildly escalating production costs", an organization representing the nation's 90,000 peanut farmers urged Congress on April 24 to maintain price supports on peanuts at or near the present level of 75 percent of parity.

The National Peanut Grower Group (NPGG), a federation of 12 organizations representing peanut producers in 16 states, also warned that adoption of a "new and untested" program could result in shortages of peanuts for U.S. and foreign food use.

NPGG's position on proposed changes in the present peanut program was presented to the House Agriculture Subcommittee on Oilseeds and Rice by H. Emmett Reynolds of Arabi, Ga., chairman of the group and president of the Georgia Farm Bureau. Assisting Reynolds in the presentation was Ross Wilson of Gorman, Texas, NPGG secretary. Other area grower representatives present were Floyd King, Eakly, Oklahoma; D.B. Warren, and J.O. Jackson, Jr. of Gorman, Texas.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has proposed a two price plan for peanuts. One price would be supported at 65 percent of parity for peanuts used domestically for human consumption, while the second would be pegged to the world market price, expected to be below the domestic support, for peanuts produced for export or oil. The Department also suggested a 25 percent reduction in peanut allotments for domestic edible production. Legislation also was introduced in the House last November by Rep. LaMar Baker (R-Tenn.) to place peanuts under the so-called target price concept that Congress enacted last year for wheat, cotton, corn and feed grains.

Under existing law, peanuts are supported at 75 percent of parity and the minimum national allotment is set at 1,610,000 acres.

Reynolds told the Subcommittee, headed by Rep. Walter Jones (D.N.C.), that the nation's peanut producers prefer the present program and are "reluctant to change it... particularly in view of the unstable and uncertain world economic conditions."

"With the huge cost increases confronting farmers, we need a minimum price support level at 75 percent of parity... If the Committees (of Congress) conclude some reduction is indicated, we hope it will be small", he said.

Reynolds said that, while growers would like to see the present peanut program remain as it is, "if the Agriculture Committees of the Congress conclude that the program should be modified, we will cooperate fully in trying to develop sound changes."

He termed the target price plan "unworkable" because of the special nature of peanuts as a commodity, and said it is "totally unacceptable to the nation's peanut farmers."

"To put it bluntly, the target price approach either would reduce net farm income disastrously or would require (government) payments so large that program costs would be unacceptable to the Congress and the taxpayers", Reynolds said.

He noted that USDA, after originally advocating a target price plan for peanuts, has now abandoned the approach.

Reynolds said the National Peanut Grower Group considered the Department's two-price proposal "the best alternative thus far proposed if it is deemed advisable to provide for unlimited production, beyond allotments, to be marketed for crushing and export at world market prices." But he said producers are flatly opposed to a reduction in allotment acres.

Reynolds strongly defended the existing peanut program which he credited with spurring unprecedented growth by the peanut industry in the United States. In the past 12 years, he said, peanut production has risen 91 percent.

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STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN, Tex — Pressure on Gov. Dolph Briscoe to call a special legislative session increased with an appeal by inflation-hit state employees for a \$62 million a year emergency pay raise.

Forty-five thousand state employees signed a petition addressed to Briscoe requesting a special session on these pay matters.

A 10.2 per cent (three step) increase for classified and hourly workers immediately.

An additional 6.8 per cent (two step) boost for 1974-75 benefiting all employees.

An increase in the per diem travel allowance from \$18 to \$25 a day.

An increase in the mileage rate paid for use of personal cars on state business from 12 cents to 20 cents a mile.

Texas Public Employees Association represents more than 70,000 state employees.

TPEA President Walter H. Looney said the raises are needed to help keep up with the inflation spiral and catch up with last year's zooming living cost.

If inflation continues at present rate until September, said Looney, soaring prices will have nullified 98 per cent of the wage raises given state classified employees in the last seven years.

Governor Briscoe said he is "concerned" about the employees' problem and will consider it "along with the other priority matters in state government."

The Governor is weighing demands for a special session to provide \$200 million in emergency school finance aid to help hold down local property tax increases.

COURTS SPEAK — The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals held both criminal and civil penalties can be exacted for water pollution.

A divided State Supreme Court concluded an Abilene fireman, who was fired for declining to take a lie detector test concerning a stolen truck,

must be reinstated. A new trial was ordered by the Court of Criminal Appeals for a 23-year-old man sentenced to 101 years imprisonment for stabbing a drinking companion to death near Brownwood in 1970.

MANUFACTURING FIRMS WIN — Five manufacturing firms won the annual governor's Industrial Expansion Awards for 1973.

Winners were Hi Pro Feeds Inc. of Friona, Datapoint Corporation of San Antonio, Superior Continental Corporation of Brownwood, Owens-Corning Fiberglass Corporation of Waxahachie and the Beaumont Shipyards of Bethlehem Steel Corporation. Local Chambers of Commerce nominated the winners. Selections were made by the Texas Industrial Commission for civic and economic contributions to communities.

COTTON DEADLINES SET — Agriculture Commissioner John C. White ordered cotton farmers from the Winter Garden area to the coast to complete planting by midnight May 10. The area is ahead of last year's planting schedule, and some of the counties have reached 99 per cent completion, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

White said cotton planting statewide is 16 per cent complete, compared with nine per cent this time last year.

Estimated total acreage for Texas is 5,933,000 acres, up 10 per cent from 1973. Planting deadlines are fixed as part of the Texas Pink Bollworm Act control program.

White said probability of bollworm infestations is greater this year due to delay in cotton stalk destruction and a mild winter.

FEDERALS HELP — A \$195,000 federal Economic Development Administration grant has been awarded to Laredo and Mineral Wells for industrial site development to offset shutdown of U.S. military

installations. Of the total, \$89,000 will go to Laredo to help offset loss of jobs through closing of Laredo Air Force Base. The funds will be concentrated on development of industrial sites and transportation and to improve tourism.

Another \$90,000 EDA money to ease closure of Fort Wolters at Mineral Wells will be used to conduct a water development study and develop industrial sites in Mineral Wells and Weatherford.

Word of the allocation of the grant came from Al Rodriguez, head of the Technical Assistance Center for the Texas Industrial Commission.

The Industrial Commission also reports that 37 industrial start-up training programs now operating in 29 Texas communities are expected to provide 5,320 new jobs in the state.

CONVENTION DELEGATES TO RETURN — Delegates to the 1974 Constitutional Convention will resume their efforts to draft a revised document May 6, in Austin.

During the convention recess members of the Style and Drafting Committee have been meeting in Austin to polish language in the constitutional articles thus far tentatively approved.

Delegates have until July 31 to finish the constitutional rewrite. That's the date the convention automatically self-destructs.

NEW PUBLICATION — After seven years of research the Texas Water Development Board has published a book discussing application of computer-age technology to the planning of water supplies.

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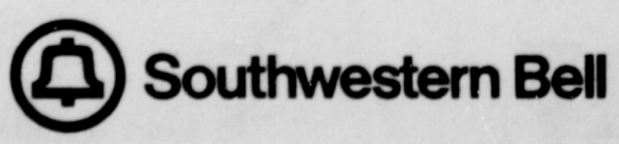
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Pete Parker Speaks To Lions Club Tuesday

Eastland's Mr. Good Citizen told Lions Tuesday how banking used to be in Eastland. Speaking at the Ramada inn meeting was Veteran Banker Guy P. (Pete) Parker, who retired in 1954. He said that banks are better managed now days and there are fewer problems in the banks, and certainly less failures.

Program Chairman Carl Garrett introduced Mr. Parker, recalling that he'd not only been a successful banker, but had also served this town as city manager, and civic responsibilities such as school board president, water board president, hospital board president and U.S. Savings Bond County Chairman.

Mr. Parker recalled that in 1912, when he came to town through 1917, there were two banks, the First State and Citizens National. In 1917 - 18 two more opened during the oil boom. They were the Guaranty State and the American National. From 1930 through 1934 there were no banks, following the crash of '29, and the ensuing bank runs that followed.

In 1934 a group of citizens organized Eastland National Bank which is strong and healthy today.

The First State, he remembered, was in the building now occupied by Robertson TV. Citizens National was in the Leslie Building, now the Baird's TV, and later occupied by Guaranty State. The American National was in the Conner Bldg. The American National was in the present Eastland Drug Bldg.

Eastland National Bank opened Nov. 5, 1934.

Pete was working in the tax office in 1917 when a Ranger banker saw his impressive penmanship and hired him to work in his bank. In '19 he came back to Eastland with the American National, which later closed. He then joined the State Banking Dept. as a liquidator. In 1924 he and Russell Hill

joined the Exchange National Bank. He remembers that in 1927 the currency size changed and the bank got its first shipment of the new sized bills on the day Lindburg landed in Paris on his around - the - world flight.

He served ENB later in various capacities including president and sold his interests in 1954.

Mr. Parker displayed three old oversized bills, with his signature, and a note for

\$95,000, he'd signed with a commercial bank, with an interest rate of 1 1/2 percent on 30 days.

Democratic Precinct Convention Doors

Will Be Wide Open This Saturday

The doors to Democratic precinct conventions will be open wide and everyone will be welcome this Saturday,

declared Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White. White also is serving as chairman of the Texas Af-

firmative Action Committee, which has spent the past 12 weeks seeking to inspire more participation in the convention process.

A key rule for precinct conventions this year stipulates that at least 20 percent of those in attendance may - - by written petition - - form a separate caucus and elect their share of the total delegation. "This is a guarantee of the open door policy and that every voice will be heard at the precinct conventions", White said.

White said that every Democratic county chairman had received a quantity of materials to stimulate interest in the conventions.

The materials include a one - page brief on Democratic Party rules which traces, step - by - step, the conduct of a precinct convention. County chairmen also have posters which read "Vote Saturday, May 4; Voice Your Views at Your Democratic Precinct Convention".

White emphasized the importance of precinct conventions by saying: "They are the first step toward writing a new charter for the national Democratic Party".

This year, Texas Democrats will select 76 national delegates to attend a conference in Kansas City December 6 - 8 for the purpose of writing the charter.

Delegates selected Saturday will go to their county conventions on May 11, White said, and elect delegates to the State Democratic Convention in Austin, September 17.

White's committee is especially interested in seeing more women, minority groups, young people and senior citizens participate.

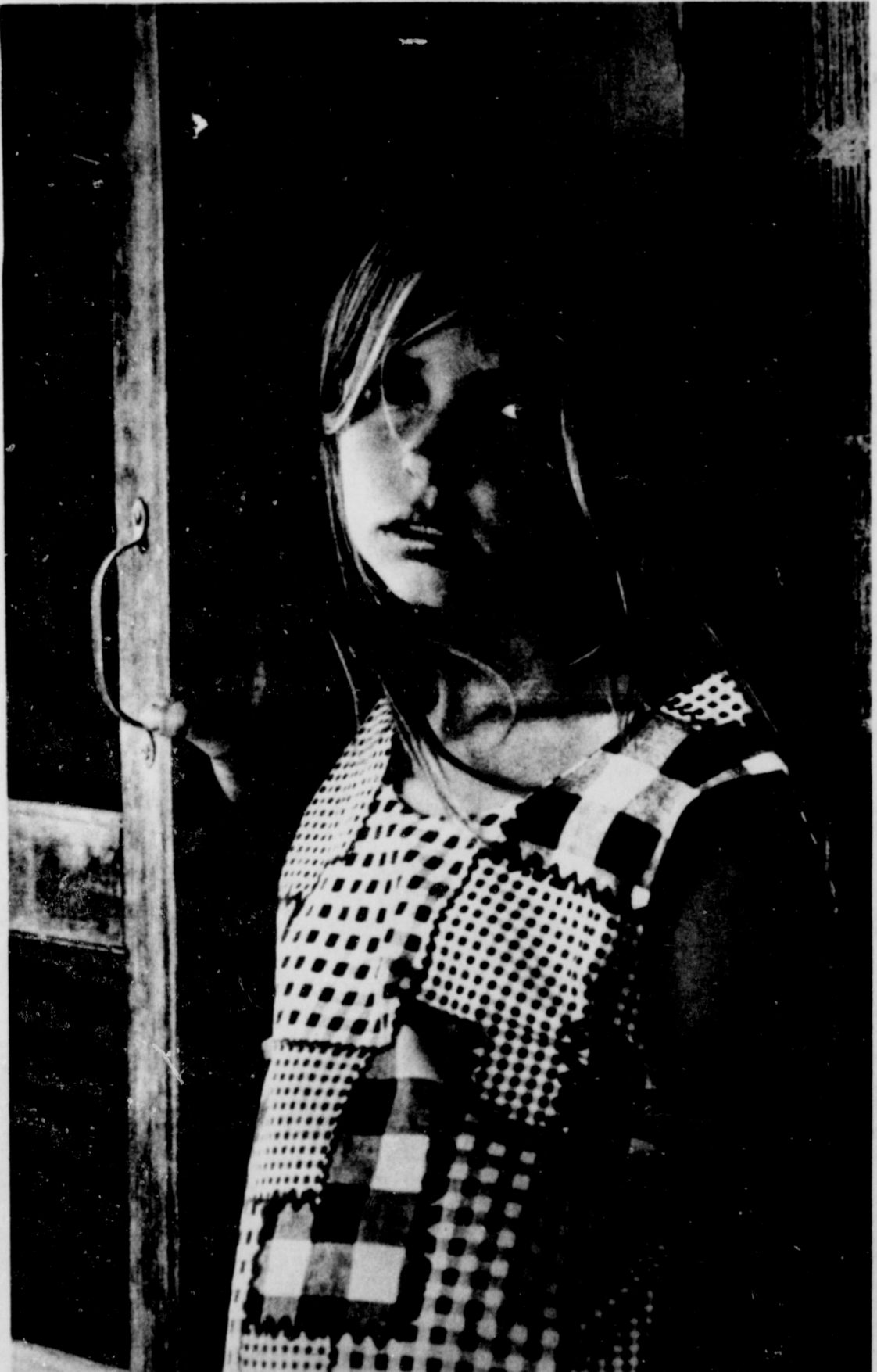

Some employers won't hire people unless they have a social security number so students and others planning to get summer jobs should apply for a number now if they don't already have one, according to Glyn Hammons, social security district manager in Abilene.

"Delaying your application might prevent your employment or cause you to lose time and wages in a job requiring a social security number", Hammons said. "When you don't recall having had a social security number before, your application is screened against central files in Baltimore to make sure a second number isn't issued to you -- and screening takes time.

"You should apply for your social security number at least several weeks before you need it for a job", he said. "You can get information about applying by calling, writing, or visiting any social security office."

A worker builds disability, survivors, retirement, and Medicare protection by work and earnings credited to his social security number. He gets credit if he's paid \$50 or more in a three month calendar quarter in work covered by social security.

More than nine out of 10 jobs are covered by social security. "Your social security number is yours alone and remains the same for life", Hammons said. "When you get a job covered by social security, be sure your employer copies your name and number correctly from your social security card to his records."

People applying for a social security number for the first time may be asked to prove their age, identify and citizenship, according to Hammons.

The Abilene social security office is at 142 Pioneer in Abilene. The telephone number is 698 - 1360. Schedules of visits to towns in the Abilene social security district are posted at all post offices.

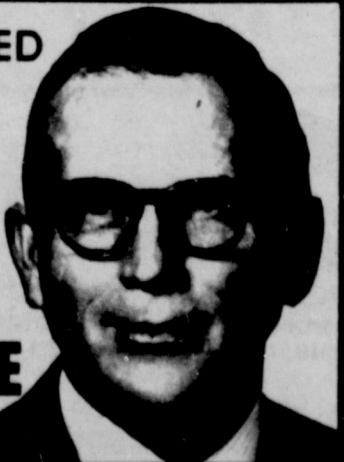

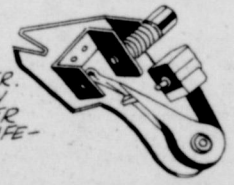
