## Landscape Workshop Tuesday

A rural lawn and landscape workshop will be held at the First Baptist Church, Eastland, May 29, according to County agent J. M. Cooper.

"This will be the first county-wide meeting of this nature ever held in the county sponsored by the Extension Service agents who have been working on plans for the event for some time," Cooper said.

Three specialists from the Agricultural Extension Service at Texas A&M will assist the agents in presenting the program at the all-day affair, which will begin at 10 a. m.

The specialists are Ted Trew, laws; Dr. R. L. Ridgeway, entomologist, and Dr. Harlan E. Smith, plant pathologist.

Topics to be discussed include varieties and adaptability of various lawn grasses; insects common to home grounds and lawns, their control; fertilizers for the lawn; diseases of shrubs, trees, lawns, their control; question-answer period. Identification and recommended control measures for a

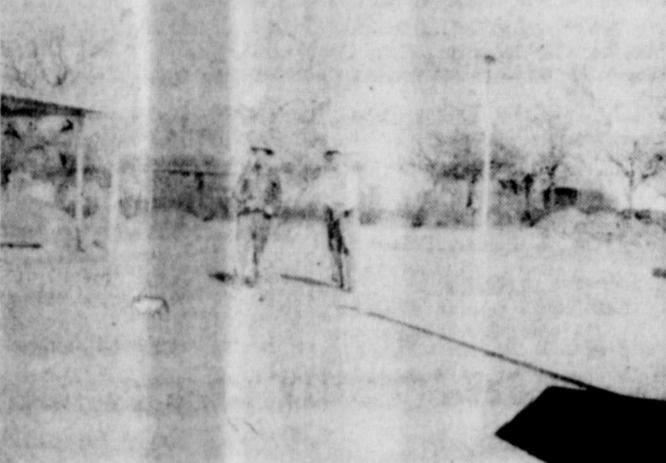
## Rites Pending For Mr. W. W. Martin

## County Has 8,249 Homes With Median \$5,000 Value

There are 8,249 housing units in Eastland County, according to information released by the U. S. Department of Commerce.

The median value of the owner-occupied places is listed at less than \$5,000, and of the total number, only 5,596 were considered in sound condition with all plumbing.

There are some vacancies in the county, in that only 7,131 of the units are occupied, and owners were listed in 5,279 of the lot.

That leaves 1,852 rented,

and the median gross rent here is \$44.

Hot and cold water runs out of faucets in 6,985 homes and 7,109 have flush toilets. There are 7,075 bathtubs and showers.

Sixty-five of the homes are on wheels (trailer homes) and 198 of the listed have basements.

Conveniences are up with 571 air conditioning units, 4,955 telephones, 4,071 washing machines and 340 clothes dryers.

Home freezers stand in 1,567 homes, and there are 4,005 automobiles in garages. Owning two autos were 1,391 and 234 had three or more autos.

Cisco Methodists To Note Anniversary

The First Methodist Church of Cisco will observe the 82nd anniversary of its founding with special services May 21-22 and a homecoming celebration on May 27. This will be the first homecoming held in the church in some 22 years. The week-long observance will be in the form of a Christian Witness Mission during which the Cisco church is to be presenting Dr. Albert P. Shirkey, pastor of Mount Vernon Place Methodist Church in Washington, D. C. in a series of sermons. Born the son of John Joseph and Jessie Hewitson Shirkey on Jan. 8, 1904 in Staunton, Va., Dr. Shirkey is a graduate of Union Theological Seminary, Richmond, Va., Trinity University, San Antonio, American University. He has pastored in the Branch Memorial Methodist Church, Richmond, Va., Pace Memorial Methodist, Washington, D. C., Travis Park Methodist, San Antonio, St. Paul's Methodist Church, Houston and Mount Vernon Place Methodist Church in Washington. Dr. Shirkey will speak each evening at 7:45 and each morning, Tuesday through Friday at 7:10. The Homecoming sermon on May 27 will be delivered by Dr. Lewis Stuckey of Dallas, who was pastor of the Cisco church from 1919 until 1922 during which time, the present building was constructed. This will be followed by an old fashioned "dinner on the ground" to be served at the church. Former pastors of the Cisco church have included the late Humphrey Lee, who was Chancellor and President of S.M.U. and the late Bishop Bascom Watts. Dr. Stuckey has served some of the largest pulpits in the south, retiring from the Tyler Street Methodist Church in Dallas last year after a 10 year ministry there. Prior to coming to Dallas he was pastor of First Methodist in Baton Rouge, La. Dr. Shirkey is a former pastor of Travis Park Methodist Church in San Antonio where he served 10 years before going to the nation's capital in 1950.

electors were voted on. Votes cast in the Ranger area at that time totaled 1,185. At least 25% of that total was required on the petition. In reference to determining the qualified voters, District Attorney Earl Conner stated, "The general election is the only yardstick you can go by." The application for petition was received by the County Clerk on April 5 and returned on April 27 with the required amount of signatures. All election costs will be borne by the county. Election judge presiding in the Ranger election will be Calvin Brown, Precinct Chairman of Precinct 2. Commissioner Tip Arther stated, "More than likely this is only the first in a series of beer and wine elections in the county." This will be the first election of a prohibition question in Eastland County since 1948, according to records at the county clerk's office. In the spring of 1948, the county as a whole voted on beer with 7,004 persons casting ballots--4,433 against and 2,511 for. In the same election the Ranger precinct had 760 votes against beer and 517 for it. Ten years before--March, 1938--in a county beer election, the Ranger precinct favored beer by a vote of 537 to 218. Two years later, in October, 1940, Ranger voted for beer, 479 to 314. The first Ranger prohibition election on record at the courthouse was in June, 1890, 40 persons voted for beer and 38 voted against it.
