EASTLAND MEMO

In New York City's Central Park in March of 1890 a group of Shakespearean Bird enthusiasts released 60 European Starlings, introducing them to America.

Today the prolific Starling is evident not only over all of North America, but has multiplied into millions. This chunky bodied pest is speckled white on black in winter and black with a yellow bill in spring and summer. The stubby tail sets the Starling apart too, although he is a black - brownish whiz in flight, attaining speeds up to 50 miles per hour.

The Starling squeaks, rattles, wheezes and whistles while being aggressive in evicting Bluebirds, Swallows and other birds from their nests. He destroys nests, eggs, and young in foraging for a varied diet of fruit, seeds and insects. Many farmers say the Starling is responsible for much crop loss.

The citizens of Englewood, New Jersey, it is reported, in a desperate move to rid themselves of Starlings, cut down shade trees.

Scarce defenders say the Starling helps the farmer by eating the ravenous Japanese Beetle, and other insects.

It is quite possible you have Starlings in your Martin house, for we do. They share their accommodations with Sparrows, and would not give a beautiful Purple Martin a chance.

The Starling which is quite evident around Eastland, was mentioned in Shakespeare's "King Henry the Fourth" and which mention, motivated the group to release them in New York. His Shakespearean connection however, does not keep the Starling from being one of the few birds in the United States not protected by law.

To add a note of value to this Starling tale; in some areas of the south it is reported that a Starling wrapped in Bacon and roasted is a gourmet's treat. Anyway, neighbor, in the next day or two look about and see if you have some Starlings around your place. An Eastland Bird Watcher

Scott Bailey Makes Formal Statement For County Judge

County Judge, Scott Bailey, Eastland C County native was born and reared in Cisco. One of seven children of Mr. and Mrs. M.D. Bailey, Sr. he married the former Mary Nicholas of Carbon. Judge and Mrs. Bailey have two children, a son, John and a daughter, Melissa.

Bailey is a graduate of the Public Schools of Cisco, Cisco Jr. College and earned a BS Degree from North Texas State in Denton. He has done Graduate work at NTS as well as one year of Law School at the University of Texas at Austin. He is an Overseas Veteran of the Korean Conflict, where he served with the famed "Buffalo" R Regiment of the 7th Infantry Division.

After returning from overseas action in Korea, Bailey served as a High School teacher and was active in professional organizations of the teaching profession. His interest in betterment of the teaching profession caused him to run for a seat in the Texas Legislature. He was elected and represented Eastland County during the 57th Regular Session and three Special Sessions. Much of his work in the Legislature concerned Education and Agriculture as well as Soil and Water Conservation, along with needed improvements to our Farm to Market Road System. During the 57th Session, he was able to block legislation which would have moved the historic 11th Court of Civil Appeals from Eastland to Abilene. Bailey's work for and support of War Veterans and Senior Citizens has won him lasting recognition with these groups.

In making his formal statement, Bailey said: "I do not intend to make a lot of promises or commitments that would be impractical or impossible to fulfill. If the good people of Eastland County re-elect me as their County Judge

"WHEREAS, it therefore behooves us to humble ourselves before Almighty God, to confess our national sins, and to pray for clemency and forgiveness; Now, therefore be it

"Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress Assembled, that the Congress hereby proclaims that April 30, 1974 be a National Day of Humiliation, Fasting and Prayer; and calls upon the people of our nation to humble ourselves as we see fit, before our Creator to acknowledge our final dependence upon Him and to repent of our national sins."

Unfortunately, the rain last weekend did not cover the entire county. Everyone in the county needed rain. Some areas received three or four inches while a large portion of the Southern half of the county got no rain. This includes most of the peanut growing area. They need rain for planting preparation.

Those areas that did get rain have sure improved this past week as new lush growth is covering pastures and rangeland.

Congratulations Kokomo! They have been selected as a finalist again in the District Community Improvement Contest. A tour of the community is being planned for May 2nd.

They are one of 191 communities that are enrolled in the program. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service along with investor - owned electric utility companies of the state sponsor the annual program.

The main incentive for these

communities is to grow and develop within themselves so that they will be a better place in which to live. Furthermore, numerous cash awards sponsored by the utility companies are available to those that make the biggest strides and work together as effective units in reaching goals they have set for themselves.

Livestock producers should be aware that 1974 has the earmarks of an extremely bad screw-worm season, and should make every effort to reduce the number of outbreaks.

Screwworm program officials are asking producers to refrain from livestock surgery or other man-made wounds to prevent screwworm infestations.

We urge all livestock producers to support the screwworm eradication effort by carrying out three key practices:

- (1) Inspecting their animals frequently;
- (2) Treating all wounds found with an approved product; and
- (3) Collecting and sending worm samples from wounds to the USDA Screwworm laboratory at Mission, Texas, for identification.

As cases are confirmed, sterile screwworm fly treatment is initiated by the USDA. It is vitally important for program officials to know where cases are happening in order to begin the sterile fly treatment before cases are too numerous.

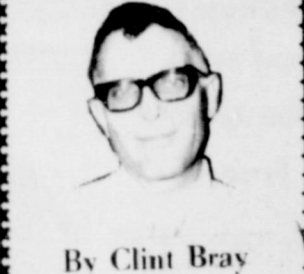
As spring migrations of fertile flies from south of the Rio Grande continue, the cases move northward across Texas rather rapidly. Already positive cases have been confirmed as far north as Brown and Haskell counties, so this means Eastland County stockmen should watch for screwworms.

Now is a good time to spray pecan trees with zinc sulfate. If diseases such as scab and mildew have been a problem in past years a fungicide should be added to the spray. And if foliage feeding insects are a problem add some malathion. Zinc is the important material to get on when it is sprayed on the leaves.

The spray should not be confused with the nut casebearer spray which should be applied about the last week of May. Zinc sulfate should also be included in that spray solution.

We now have copies of a pesticide schedule for pecans, peaches, plums, apples and pears as well as guides for vegetable insect control.

To practice water ecology in Texas, he has been taught effective ways for producing safe drinking water and treatments to make wastewater into clean streams for public use.

Because of this training, through the Texas Water Utilities Association, the largest water and wastewater training school in the United States, there are cleaner streams and better operated facilities here than any other section of the country.

Slampa received the certificate only after completing a formal and specialized education, accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience, and passed the examination given by the State Health Department's Sanitary Engineering Section.

Our growing concern over clean water makes the water ecologist one of the most important workers in the community. Though his efforts are not seen by those he serves, his results are visible every time one turns on a tap.

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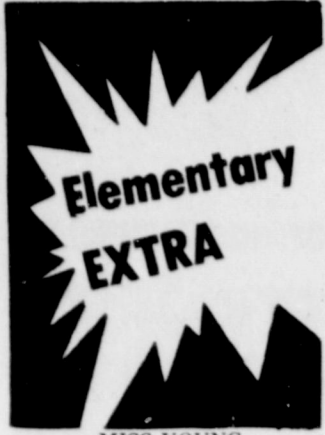
