"The herd may graze where it pleases, but he who lives the adventurous life will remain unafraid when he finds himself alone."

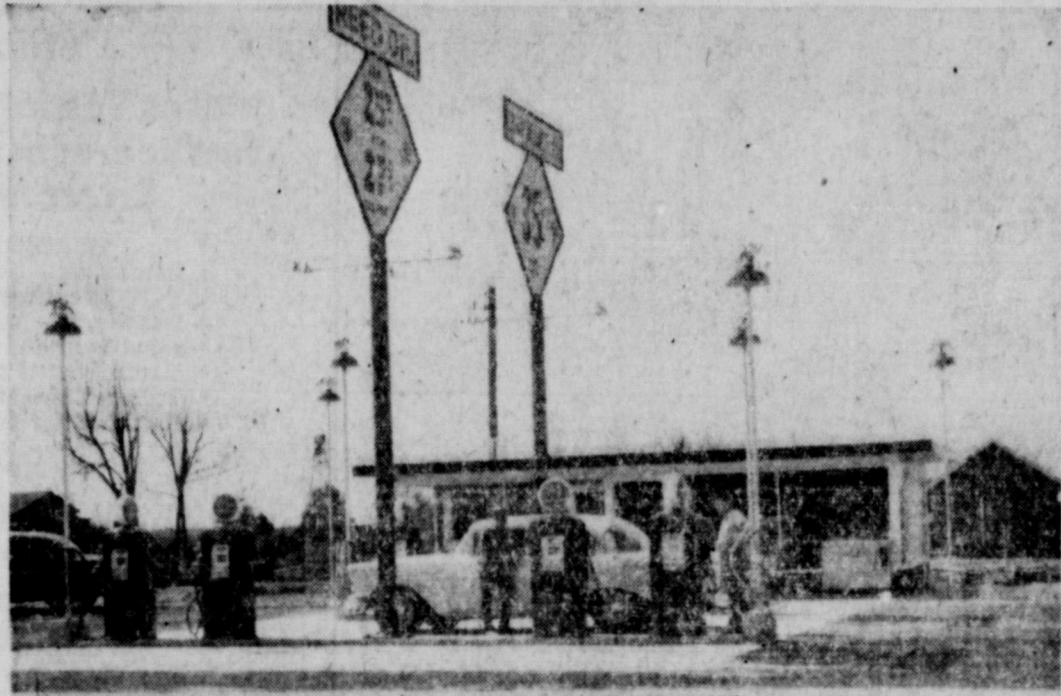
Anyone have a nice (male) puppy they want to get rid of? We are again in the market for one at our house. Here we are with two boys and no dog. A disgrace for any American father.

Eastland's second dog clinic of the year will be held Saturday at City Hall, James Young, city manager, revealed Thursday. Powell Points Out New ASC Rules On Crops

Emmett Powell, county office manager of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office, today issued the following statement regarding basic crops in the county:

"For 1957 there is a new phase to the planting of allotment crops of wheat, cotton and peanuts. A producer who has not placed all of the acreage allotment in the Soil Bank Program or released it to the Committee may sign a request that the history of the acreage remain on the farm even though the allotment crop is not planted. "In other words, here is the way it works. A producer has not or does not intend to plant all or any of the allotment crop, he may sign an MQ-31 and when the history for 1958 allotments is set up the farm is treated as if all the acreage had been planted in 1957. "Even though a producer signs the form he is not obligated to reduce the allotment. It is just an insurance that the allotment history will not be lost. "Again, we would urge all producers who have a wheat, cotton or peanut allotment that hasn't been placed in the Soil Bank or released to sign an MQ-31 form. "The final date for wheat producers to sign a request is May 1, 1957. "Peanut and Cotton farmers have until June 1, 1957 to sign a request. "We have had several inquiries as to strip cropping of cotton and peanuts for 1957. The rules are about the same as in the past years. "If cotton and peanuts are strip cropped with crops that compete with the allotment crops for moisture and plant food for the entire growing season, only that part of the land occupied by the allotment crop will be counted. "Idle or fallow strips must be at least four normal rows wide. "Crops that do not compete the entire growing season must be four rows wide. The same row width must be used for allotment crops and the strip. "If there is any doubt as to the strip competing with the allotment crop it seems that it would be a good idea to make the strips four rows wide."

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'Best Peach Crop In Five Years'—Cooper

Late Freeze Fails To Kill Fruit Crop

"It looks like the best peach crop in five years," J. M. Cooper county agent, declared Wednesday after a survey of fruit trees in the county conducted in the last two weeks. Cooper credited moisture from the late freeze, and he said there was little if any damage to the large peach crop in the entire county. Peach trees are heavily loaded and from early indications growers will find a good market for their peaches. Cooper said the price could range as high as \$2.50 to \$3 a bushel. Plums in the county are "not as good," he added, however. The crop will be better than in the past two years at that, but plums

did suffer more than peaches. Apricots, always the weakest of the fruits to lose, suffered heavy damage from the cold spells, he said. Cooper also pointed out that the peach crop also suffered from the sub-freezing weather earlier this month. "Peaches were hurt worse than peaches," he said. "This is the first time I ever saw that happen." The county agent estimated that the peach crop in some orchards was 25 percent lost, but he pointed out some trees were not damaged at all. Peaches are fast becoming a major crop in the county.

County Savings Bonds Sales Hit \$38,882 Mark

Savings bonds sales in Eastland County during March totaled \$38,882, Guy Parker, county chairman, revealed today. That pushed total sales for the year here to \$112,850, or 19.1 percent of the county's quota of \$589,300. Parker said Texas ranked 20th in the nation in percentage of savings bonds quota attained. Sales during March amounted to \$13,095,441.

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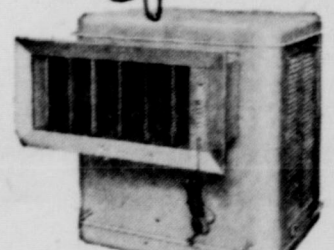

I GIVE YOU TEXAS

Remarkable things, or what seem remarkable things, sometimes have very simple explanations.

I remember when I was maybe 10, one night in a South Texas small-town hotel lobby, a man told me that he had such keen eyes that he could tell which end of a domino had the larger number of spots, with the domino face down. He did not claim to be able to see through the half inch of black wood but his method was to see the domino spinning and then, he said, the end with the most spots offered less resistance to the air and therefore that end wobbled more. Watch as hard as I could, I was unable to detect any difference but he said he could because he had such keen eye-sight. And every time, he was correct, too. Finally, however, he called my attention to the design on the back: an eagle. He said, "The eagle's beak always points to the end with the most dots." And, unless it was a double, that was the case.

Baffling—yet simple, wasn't it? Soon after joining the Fort Worth Star-Telegram staff in 1931; I was walking down the street in Abilene with Prexy Anderson, then sports editor there. A car was parked and two men were talking to the man at the wheel. "I want you to meet him," Prexy said. He addressed the man in the car, "This is Boyce House of the Star-Telegram and, Boyce, this is our chief of police." I said, "I'm glad to meet you" and called him by name (which Prexy hadn't mentioned.) His friends looked surprised and he beamed at this evidence that he was famous. I didn't bother to explain that,

until a few weeks before, I had been editor in a neighboring county, read the Abilene Reporter every day and, since that city elected the police chief by vote of the people, I had seen his ads for re-election and remembered his name because it was very unusual. Yes, a thing is simple when you know how it's done!

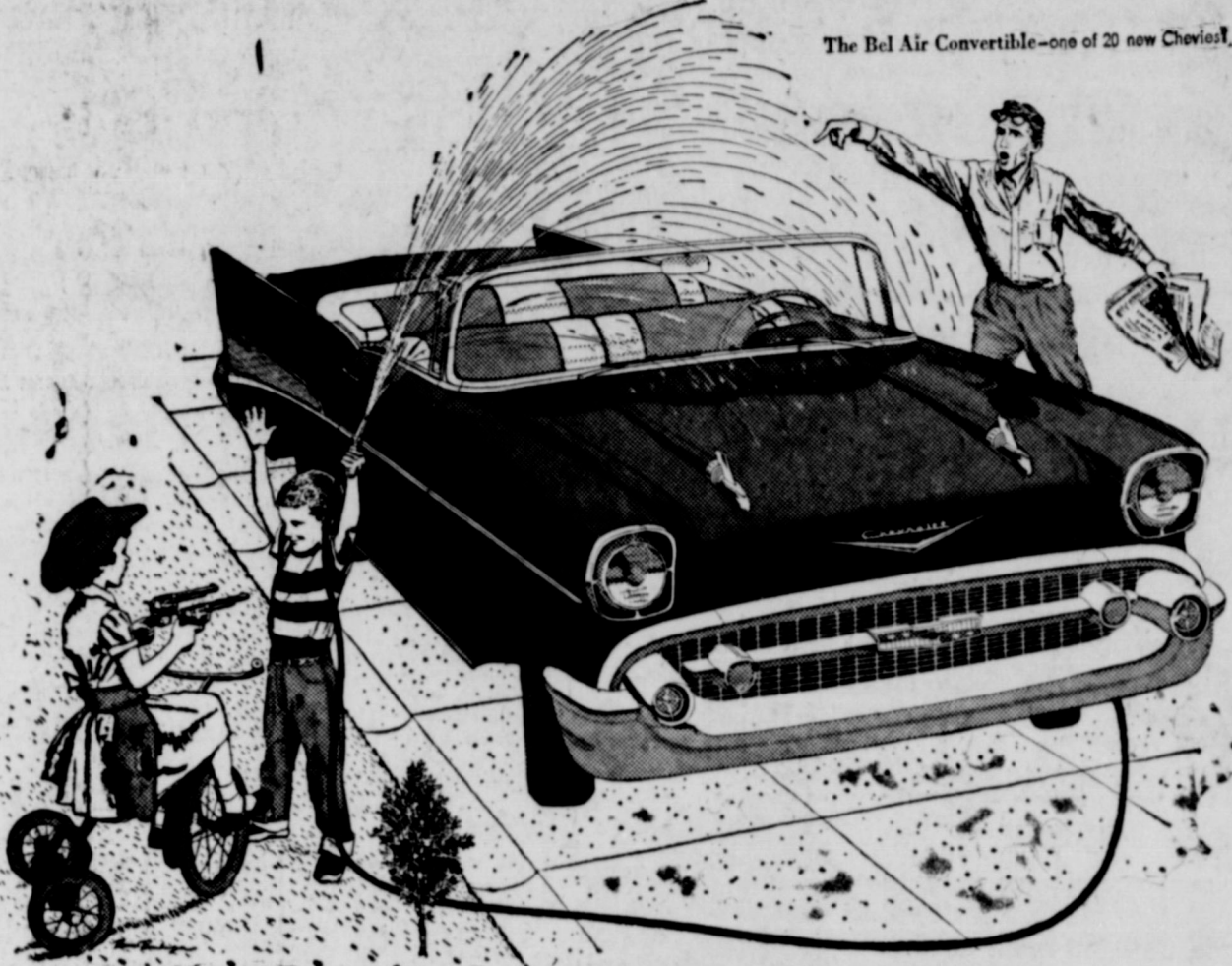

 According to new research, you may be able to absorb fat or stress without bringing on heart trouble. But you probably cannot do both. The Reader's Digest writers say that faulty use of fat by your body is dangerous when combined with emotional pressure and tension.
 Information like this has developed from research spurred by President Eisenhower's heart attack. His case focused public attention on the toll taken by heart disease. Every day of the year, a thousand Americans — of all ages — die as a result of coronary attacks such as the President suffered.
 The article says overweight is only partly the danger that fat brings to your heart. Greater danger comes from poor burning of fat in your body. When this process is not working well, fat stays on the inside of your arteries. These deposits partially cut off the flow of blood. When this happens, you get warning by feeling the pains of angina.
 You cannot avoid stress as easily as fat in this jittery age. But avoiding it is wise for everyone — and coronary patients must do so. The rule is "Take it easy," at work and recreation.

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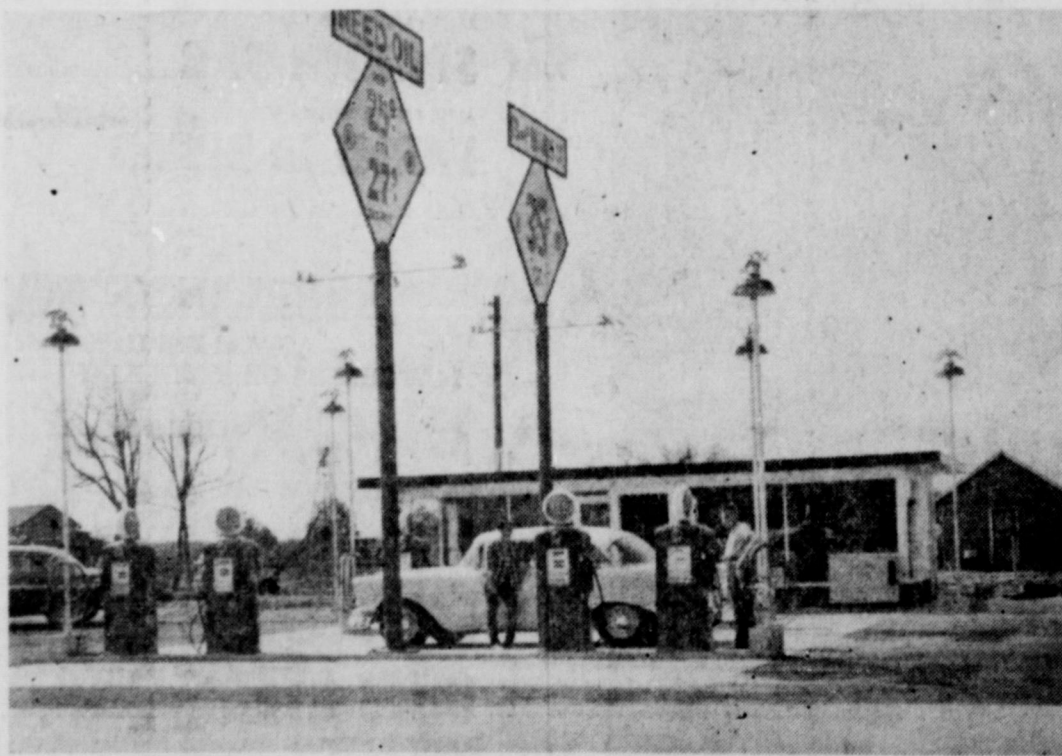

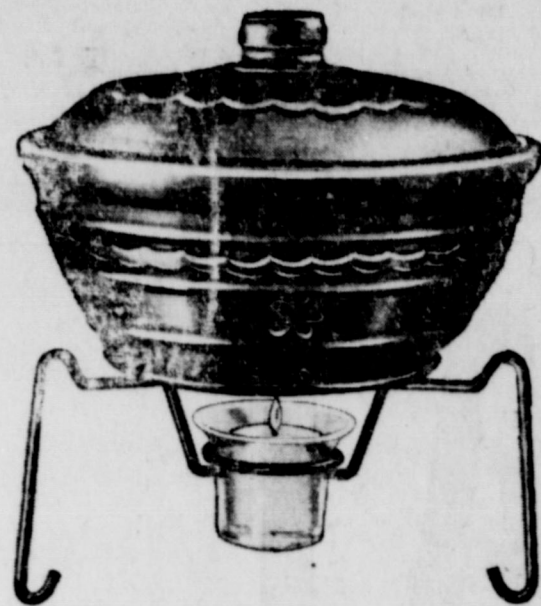

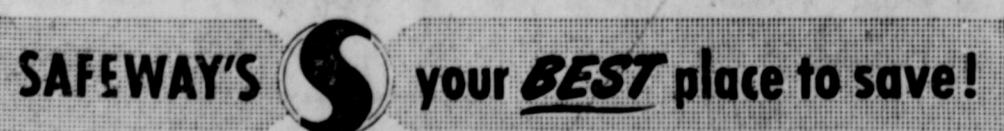
