> Maxson became the county's third traffic fatality of 1958 when the 1957 Buick he was driving fail-Houston road machinery salesman was killed immediately. The accident occurred at 4:05 a.m. His home address was listed as 126 Rocky Creek Road, Houston. The body was removed to Hamner Funeral Home in Cisco and later transferred to Houston. The car was a total loss.

Jordan suffered a fractured left leg, facial cuts and a possible back injury when the borrowed 1954 Buick he was driving smashed into the High Point Service Station two miles west of Gorman on Farm Road 8 (old Highway 6.) Jordan said he apparently fell asleep at the wheel of the car.

At the time of the crash he wa traveling west, returning to Eastland. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Y. Jordan of Eastland. He had borrowed the car from a friend in Eastland.

Jordan's car didn't make the sharp curve, tore through a guard rail and ripped into the side of the combined station and house. Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Mason were sleeping in a bedroom of the house, but escaped injury. Jordan was rushed to Blackwell Hospital in Gor-(Continued On Page 7)
