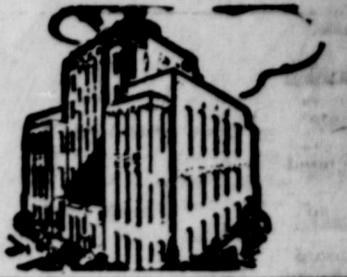

Is There Gold South of Eastland?

Not very far, in a southerly direction from this city, lives a retired tiller of the soil. The place of dwelling he ever so humble it is open to all who long for a taste of old-fashioned "Southern hospitality."

the Eastland C-C, presiding. Included in the full-day of events will be a Fishing Rodeo, boating exhibitions, skiing contests and a grand entry boat parade.

The two sponsoring organizations will equally underwrite expenses for the celebration. The Fishing Rodeo will be the highlight of the affair. Cash prizes will be awarded to both the adult and child catching the largest catfish, to the adult and child catching the largest crappie, and to the adult and child pulling in the biggest bass. In addition there will be a special awards for the biggest string, with a division for both adults and youngsters.

Highway Accidents Kill One, Injure One

Houston Man Third Fatality of Year

One person died and another was seriously injured early Wednesday morning in two different highway accidents in Eastland County.

Eugene Thomas Maxson, 30, of Houston, died on his 30th birthday in a one car crash 2.2 miles

south of Cisco on Highway 183. The second accident hospitalized Landon Jordan, 22, of 1306 South Bassett, Eastland.

Maxson became the county's third traffic fatality of 1958 when the 1957 Buick he was driving failed to make a sharp curve. The Houston road machinery salesman was killed immediately. The accident occurred at 4:05 a.m. His home address was listed as 126 Rocky Creek Road, Houston. The body was removed to Hammer Funeral Home in Cisco and later transferred to Houston. The car was a total loss.

Jordan suffered a fractured left leg, facial cuts and a possible back injury when he borrowed the 1954 Buick he was driving smashed into the High Point Service Station two miles west of Gorman on Farm Road 8 (old Highway 6.) Jordan said he apparently fell asleep at the wheel of the car.

At the time of the crash he was traveling west, returning to Eastland. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Y. Jordan of Eastland. He had borrowed the car from a friend in Eastland.

Jordan's car didn't make the sharp curve, tore through a guard rail and ripped into the side of the combined station and house. Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Mason were sleeping in a bedroom of the house, but escaped injury. Jordan was rushed to Blackwell Hospital in Gorman. (Continued On Page 7)

'Papa Says No' here Friday night.

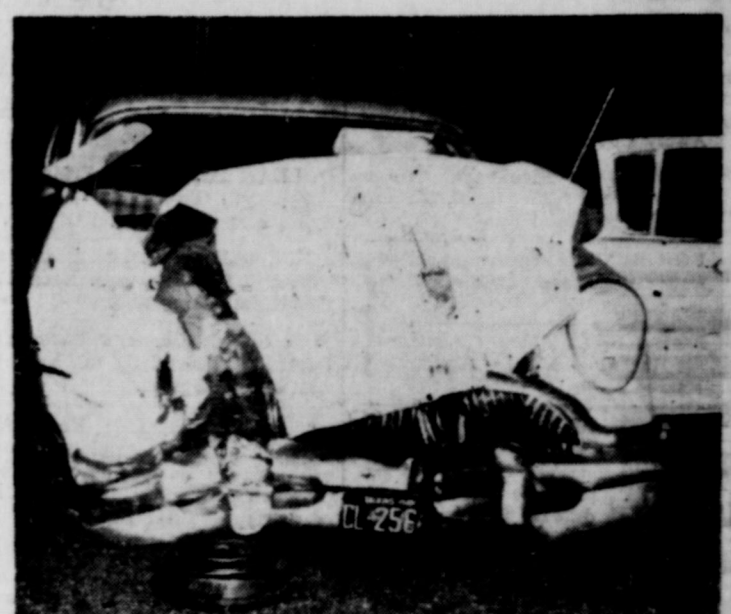
The occasion will be the annual Eastland High School Junior Class play production in the High School auditorium at 8 p.m.

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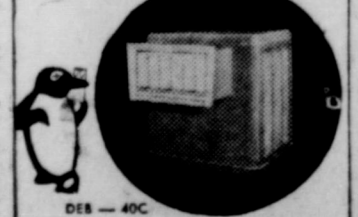

massacred and scalped. Their camps were burned and so were the smelters. This map fell into the hands of the Indians, along with other belongings.

The map bore markings and symbols of Spanish mining activities in that vicinity and it indicated several areas in various places throughout the territory. It was offered to my father in payment for his kindness who accepted it merely to satisfy the old Indian who passed away a few years later.

"My father wasn't much for going off on a wild goose chase and looking for gold mines. Being in the position of having to support a large family, he returned to wagon-freighting for Valdez in Fagle Pass. Some years later, when I grew older, I ran across this old man in a trunk in our attic and became deeply interested in it. It has long since deteriorated and crumbled to pieces. I memorized it thoroughly, however, and could draw it off right now. I never did look for those old Spanish mines, but I know for a fact the Comanches ran the Spaniards out or killed them before they extracted all the gold. You see... the redmen knew the reason the Spaniard were raving their land—it was for the gold and silver for the King of Spain and for no other reason.

"Well, those Comanche Indians had no use for gold except for ornaments and for this they preferred silver. Silver was used for bullets as well as lead. They covered up all the mine shafts with big racks and lots of dirt. They even planted grass and flowers on them so 't would look natural like. No one but the Indians and that ol' map know where those mines are now. And thanks to the map and my memory for enabling me to know. You now, if I was rich' and could afford it, I'd re-open and work as many mines showed on that old map as I could, but it takes a mine to work a mine, the old saying goes."

Old Jake was kind enough to take time off from his siesta period and draw crude facsimile of the original which was confined only in his head. I now have it in my possession. With a thank you I bid old Jake adieu and came back to Eastland.

I've studied the drawing of Jake's thoroughly and of the several old mines locations he put forth, and I wish to present on here.

Adjoining Eastland County to the Southwest is the County of Brown. In the northeastern section is a group, or range, of hills known as the Hog Mountains, that lie just to the east of the community of May. The drawing calls for a vein of gold, 90 varras deep, in the east side of Cerro Perros. Old Jake said this would be Hog Mountain. Cerro Perros translated means hill of the dog. Where the dog comes in I haven't determined. A Varra is a spanish

measure of 33 1-2 inches. If in your belongings you possess an electronic locator or detector, and you have means of transportation and some time off—you are luckier than I.

And now a word to the wise. It is a geological fact that the area of Eastland County and adjoining counties to as far south as Idaho, San Saba, Mason, Burnett, and Menard are known to be mineral bearing, gold including. Check with the school of Mines in El Paso or in an early dated Texas Almanac. Gold is worth \$301 an ounce and an ounce doesn't require a whole lot of space. As for myself... I most assuredly do not possess the financial requirements to re-open one of these ancient mining shafts, and to say the least, even verify their existence. Neither does Old Jake. Do you?
