A demonstration of spraying by helicopter will be given on the Freeman orchard by John L. Scott, of the Continental Copters, Inc. of Fort Worth. This is a new method of spraying in this section.

Speakers for the morning session, from 10 a. m. to noon, will include Don King of the department of entomology at Texas A&M College who will lead the discussion on pecan nut case bearer and web-worms.

Oscar Schaefer of Cisco, president of the association, will preside at the business meeting.

The latest techniques of grafting pecans will be discussed by L. G. Romberg of the U. S. Pecan Field Station in Brownwood during the afternoon session at 1:30.

Officers of the association are Schaefer, president; Ellis Cooper, Ranger, vice president; and B. B. Freeman of Ranger, secretary-treasurer.

Further plans for the July Fourth celebration will be made at a joint committee meeting of Ranger and Eastland chambers of commerce members next Wednesday night at 7:30 in the Ranger Chamber of Commerce office.

This committee last met April 30 in Eastland to make plans for the fishing rodeo, water skiing contests, and a grand entry boat parade.

Other details will be worked out at Wednesday's meeting.

Previously it was decided to award cash prizes to both the adult and child catching the largest catfish, to the adult and child catching the largest crappie, and to those bringing in the biggest bass.

Special awards will go for the biggest string, with a division for adults and youngsters.

The fish rodeo will get underway at 12:01 p. m. and continue until 4 p. m., at which time all the fish must have been weighed.

Skiing contests, to be held from 3 to 5 p. m., will feature trick skiing. Prizes will be awarded to both the best man and woman on regular skis, to the best trick skier, to the best all-around skier, and to the best one-ski demonstration. Awards will also go to the oldest and youngest skiers.

A grand parade of boats is planned to take place at the dam, at 11 a. m., under the direction of the Lake Leon Boat Club.

Project Would Cost Estimated \$245,000

Eastland City Commissioners went on record Thursday night as favoring a Federal project for flood control work on the north fork of the Leon River.

Commissioners requested that the U. S. Army Engineers revise a program to build levees on the river and in other ways make the Leon floodproof.

In 1946 the United States Congress authorized some \$245,000 to be spent on the river, but Eastland commissioners at that time turned thumbs down. It was estimated at that time that city expenditures would run some \$36,000. Most of that money would have been for right-of-way, however.

The City Dad's action followed a meeting with the Army engineers in Fort Worth recently. Mayor Cyrus Frost said the engineers explained that after the City makes the request it will be one year before the bill goes into the Congressional hopper. If Congress again approves the bill the engineers need another year to draw up their plans, then the actual building would be done the third year.

During recent months a number of residential areas along the river have been flooded when the Leon went out of its banks.

VanGeems Are Nominated As Methodist Family of Year

Officials of the First Methodist Church of Eastland, have announced the Henry Van Geems of 1601 West Main as Eastland's nomination for 1958's "Methodist Family of the Year."

In competition that will have nominations from all over the United States, the Methodist magazine, "Together", will announce next October the family that will be honored as the Family of the Year. The Van Geems have been chosen to represent the Methodist Church of Eastland.

In choosing a family to represent each church, certain requirements were to be considered such as (1) the parents must be under 50 years of age, (2) they must have at least two children one of which is a teenager, (3) the family exemplifies inspiring family living, (4) the family applies Christian ethics in business or profession, and (5) the family takes a creative role in church and community.

The members of the Henry Van Geem family are the father, Henry, Sr., of the Texas Electric Service Company; the mother Myrtle, Sunday School teacher and circle chairman of the W.S.C.S.; Frances Ellen, Secretary at the Eastland National Bank; Herman Neill, student in the University of Texas; and Henry, Jr., student in Eastland High School and president of the Methodist Youth Fellowship.

The father has been the chairman of the Official Board of the Methodist Church and is a steward and teacher among other things at the present time. The mother holds several important offices in the Church School and Woman's Society of Christian Service as well as serving as an excellent homemaker. All three children have served as president of the local Methodist Youth Fellowship.

In the report sent to the judges complete statements were made or each member of the family. Here are some of the sentences lifted out of the rather lengthy report:

"Without exception each mem-

ber of the Henry Van Geem family exemplifies in any place one might meet him the very finest example of Christian living. It does not take long for you to realize that this family under-

stands and practices the Christian way of life," the Board said. "It is practically impossible to list all the things that the family has done and is doing in a creative way in the church and community. Whenever there is some kind of activity there is always at least one Van Geem present. They are held in high esteem by all our people and yet they maintain a gracious spirit of humility and never seem to recognize that they have done more than what should be expected of them."

The report concludes, "Our Church is proud of the Henry Van Geem family and we enthusiastically believe them to be a most representative candidate for the 1958 Methodist Family of the Year."

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Bra Thief Nabbed; Sentence Is Stiff

A 14-year-old Eastland boy came to the end of a long, long trail this week when City Police arrested him as the thief who has specialized in stealing brassieres.

The youth finally admitted he was the thief who has entered a large number of Eastland homes and made off with women's clothing. His downfall came after he entered a local home Wednesday night and made off with some clothing and a green fountain pen. Police have had the lad under surveillance for sometime. When they discovered he had the pen they made an arrest.

The youth almost exclusively entered homes of high school girls, but he did break into some other homes as well. Police are still holding a number of brassieres, and a

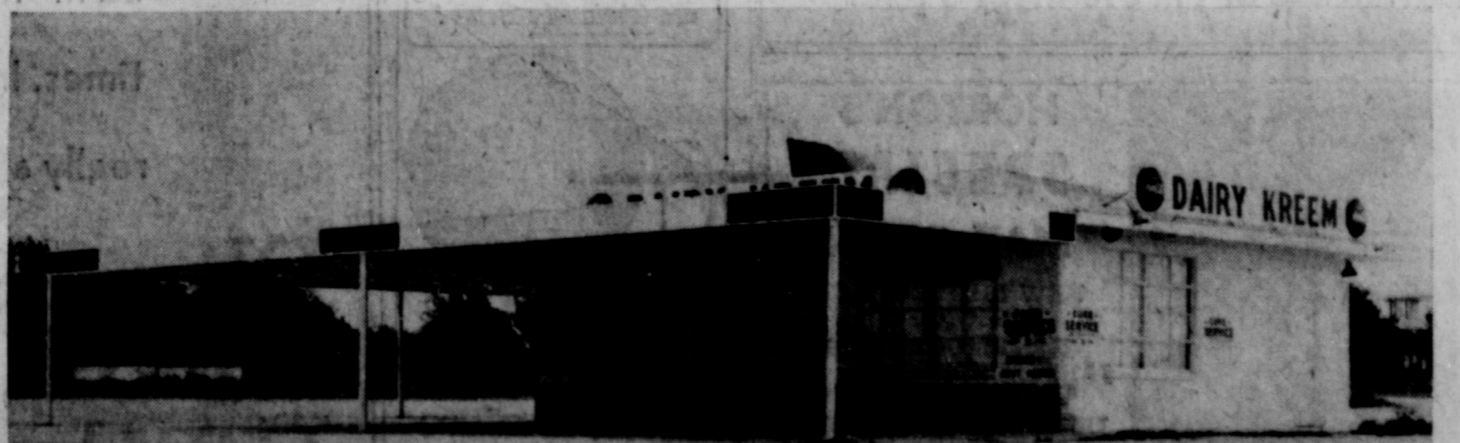
few slips, dresses and skirts. Ownership of the clothing can claim and identify the garments at City Hall.

The boy took only \$2 in his entire crime spree, which lasted a number of weeks. He on numerous occasions passed up money, watches and jewelry. He stole almost 100 brassieres, however.

Thursday morning the boy and his parents appeared before City Judge James Young. Young ordered the boy to report to him for work each afternoon after school and on into the summer months. The parents of the boy agreed to take him to a psychiatrist and to report back to the judge.

City commissioners, meeting Thursday night, ordered the municipal judge to make things hard on juvenile offenders. Mayor Cyrus Frost said it was time the City let it be known that persons causing property damage in this city—adults or juveniles—would pay for their crimes.
