is not the total answer to traffic accident prevention, but that severity of accidents increase with speed.

"All regulations governing the movement of motor vehicles are designed to prevent traffic accidents. But it is only when all drivers comply with all traffic regulations will accidents be prevented.

"The public's response to our 1957 traffic safety campaign is very encouraging; we ask for the continued cooperation of Texas motorists in making 1958 an even safer year for driving."

Palsy Tests Promising

Authorities at Dallas Research Center have expressed the belief that they have come up with a muscle relaxant which may help the tiny victims of cerebral palsy.

Dr. Phillip N. Hood, director of the Dallas Center where tests of the drug are being made, said the tests were called a "double blind study". One group of children under observation at the center is given the drug, while a second group under observation is given only a sugar pill.

The treatment center is at the Dallas Society for Crippled Children, which is an Easter Seal agency.

Only the doctor conducting the experiment knows which children receive the drug.
