An Eastland County peanut expert has predicted that the county will have a "bumper crop" this year if as much as one inch of rain falls in July or August.

T. C. Wylie, manager of Ranger Peanut Co., made that statement this week. He said that Eastland County has an allotment of 26,000 acres this year, giving it the second largest acreage allotment of all counties in the southwest.

Wylie said there is a heavy demand for acreage this year and he urged farmers to plant every acre they could. Last year 28,000 acres were planted and 22,000 were harvested, according to Wylie.

Some county farmers have already planted, but many to replant because of recent heavy rains. May and June are the planting months in this county, most growers agree.

Comanche County is the only Texas county ranking in front of Eastland in number of acres in the nation.

Purcell Denies Ineligibility To Hold Office

Graham Purcell, district judge at Wichita Falls and a candidate for the Court of Criminal Appeals, lashed out Wednesday at his opponent in the race to keep his name off the ballot.

Judge Purcell, in an exclusive interview with an Eastland Telegram reporter, fired back at Judge K. K. Woodley of Uvalde, who earlier Wednesday told Richard M. Moreland of The Dallas Morning News that he would ask Democratic Party officials to refuse to put Purcell's name on the ballot.

The Wichita Falls judge was in Eastland to plead a case in the 11th District Court of Civil Appeals here.

"Judge Woodley is just as wrong in his efforts to disqualify me and to deny the voters of Texas the privilege of passing on his qualifications in a contested race as he has been in many of his interpretations of the law in the opinions handed down by him as a member of the Court of Criminal Appeals," Judge Purcell declared. "His (Judge Woodley's) opinions have created much turmoil in the administration of our criminal laws in Texas," he added.

The Dallas News, in a front page story Wednesday morning, quoted Judge Woodley as saying that the Constitution and law plainly required that a man have at least 10 years experience as a lawyer or judge of a court of record before he can seek advancement to the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Woodley pointed out that the state Constitution requires that a judge on the Court of Criminal Appeals shall have the same qualifications and receive the same salaries as the judges of the Supreme Court.

Purcell, Woodley's only opponent, told Telegram reporter that from 1891 until 1945 judges of the two courts, under the Constitution, had to have seven years experience as an attorney. In 1945, Purcell said, the Constitution was amended to read that a member of the Supreme Court must have 10 years experience. However, Purcell reasons, there was no mention of the Court of Criminal Appeals in the amendment. Therefore the Wichita County judge says that Judge Woodley is trying to amend the requirements of holding the office of judge of the Criminal Appeals Court "by implication."

More Than Hundred Traffic Fines Paid

In his original statement Judge Woodley quoted the Texas election code as follows:
"No person ineligible to hold office shall ever have his name placed upon the ballot at any general or special election, or at any primary election where candidates are selected under primary election laws of this state; and no such ineligible candidate shall ever be voted upon, nor votes counted for him at any such general, special or primary election."

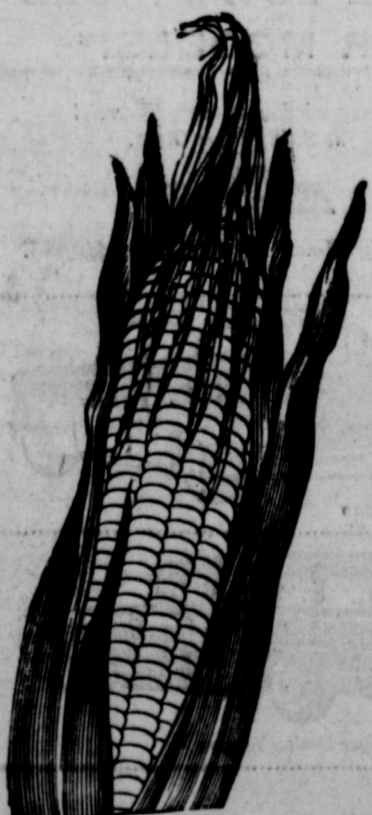

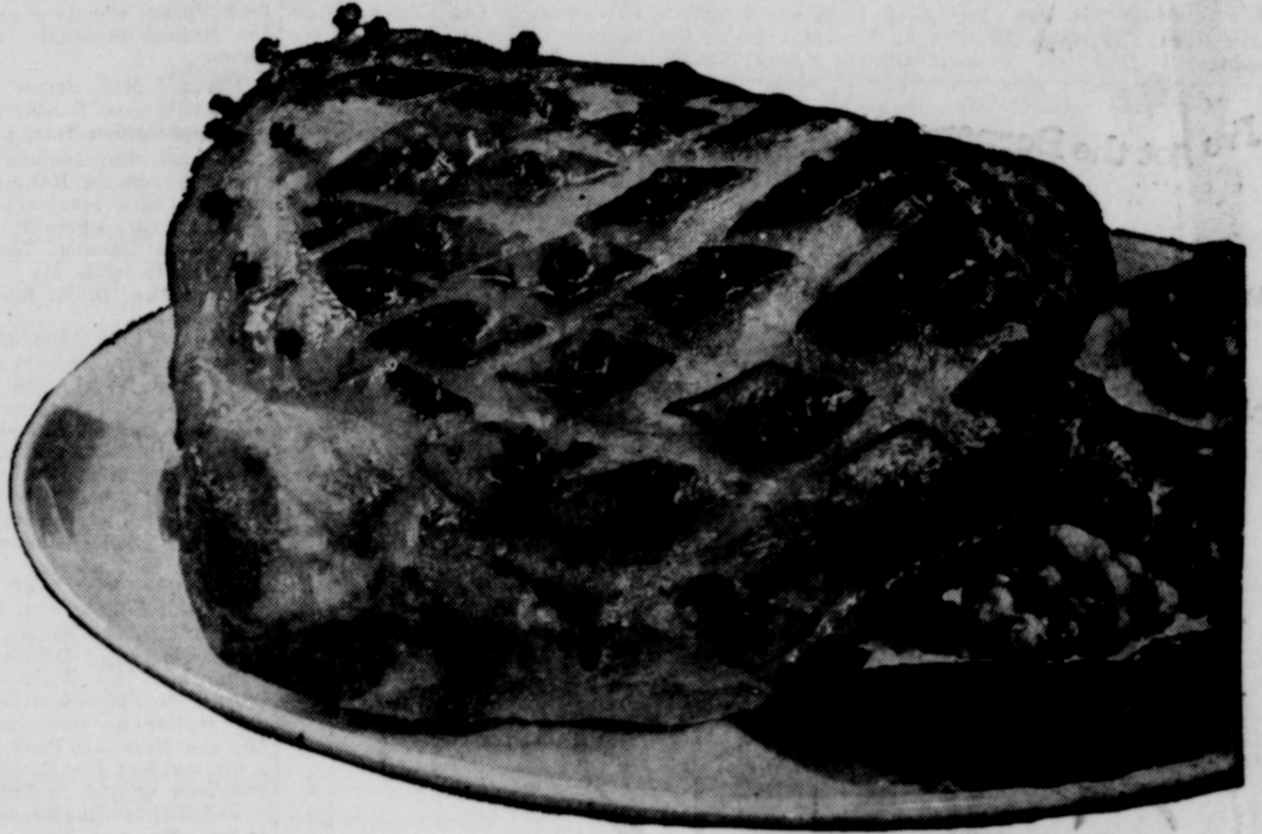
