Schools To Mark Special Week With Evening Open House

A NEW BOOK on our desk from Sterling Publishing is going to be all the rage with Ed Sargeant, Mike Collins and all the pigeon racers so numerous here now. It's packed with "trade secrets" on training from the French and American intelligence agencies that trained pigeons for carrying important "classified" documents.

For those in the hobby, this book must surely be a must.

Many never-before-published techniques of pigeon training have been published in the comprehensive new book PIGEON RACING by experts Dr. Herbert R. Axelrod and Edwin C. Welty, Jr. (Sterling, \$7.95).

The authors insist that by following the step-by-step instructions they've outlined in their book, any trainer will be assured of having his birds among the top racing winners.

Packed with helpful photographs and diagrams, the book tells how to plan and construct a pigeon loft which will contribute to the health and well-being of your racing birds, how to keep it clean, and how to buy birds and care for them from the first day you bring them home. It tells what and how to feed, how to breed and how to raise healthy youngsters.

Then the book goes on to explain how you know when your birds are ready for racetraining, and it shows several systems of training and ways to keep your birds fit, both physically and psychologically. The authors give information about moulting, young bird and old bird racing, long and short distance racing, and tips on making your birds winners in each.

You'll find out how to evaluate your birds, how to spot sickness in its early stages, and the authors include other aspects of the fast-growing "people's" sport, including club racing and how to compete successfully in pigeon shows.

At the same time, Sterling has announced a new enlarged edition of its classic book, HOW TO RAISE AND TRAIN PIGEONS by William H. Allen (\$5.95). Long the standard book on raising pigeons 10 printings and 38,000 copies sold, the lavishly illustrated work has been enlarged by a gallery of 35 color photographs

has been marked annually for twenty-three years by a Public Schools Week in Texas.

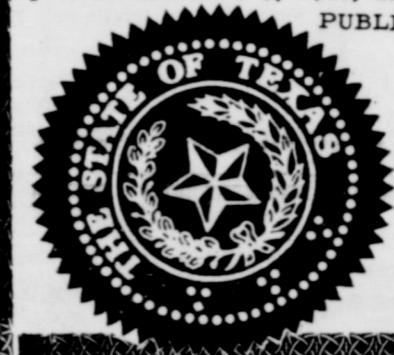

CONSIDER THE plight of those who consented to be named directors for the Eastland County Centennial Corp. The purpose of which was the staging of a joint, county-wide 100th Birthday Celebration for the county...As is known, the county-wide project didn't materialize - for lack of participation, so the corporation is now in the position of getting in shape to pay its indebtedness and dissolving itself since there won't be a county-wide party.

Even so, there is still a lot of centennial fever, and apparently most of the towns in the county will in fact have a celebration. Dates aren't definite, but planning is developing nicely in most quarters. The corporation's original thinking was for a May 5 to 12 celebration but this will vary with the individual communities.

This loose-jointed, informal column would be glad to offer its services as an announcement board for Centennial Planning so that there may be an orderly dissemination of ideas. Persons and or organizations wishing to announce dates and plans are welcome to direct them to the Circuit-Rider, via the newspaper in each town.

Among the plans we've heard talked are those for collectors' get to gethers (coins, guns, bottles, etc.); old fiddlers' contests; maybe a street dance or square dance; maybe a rock band; a county-wide rally race; and a religious service, complete with an old-time singin'.

Like we say though, these announcements on specifics will have to come from the various committees, chambers and organizations planning celebrations.

Gorman particularly is giving word of having big celebrations and we'll be sharing the plans as they're released.

In Eastland, the Civic League and Garden Club, the Chamber of Commerce and the Jaycees have banded together to handle activities.

The Ranger Chamber has announced plans to stage a celebration there with details to be announced.

In Cisco, Chamber Manager Gene Abbott has indicated that plans will be mapped and announced soon.

Word is also expected from Rising Star on activities there. The Centennial Corp will wait until May 21 to begin redeeming stock certificates as previously announced. It has maintained its commemorative coin plans in order to pay bills including printing, telephone, etc., as well as pay back the certificates to those who want to redeem them. The corporation did drop plans for the plates and has made the book available to the chambers of commerce in the county.

Revenue from the coins will just about, it is believed, clear the corporation, and any surplus will be divided equally between the chambers of commerce of the five towns, it has been announced.

A free barbecue is being discussed and considered in Eastland, which apparently will stay pretty close to the May week plans. Others may elect other weeks, and or even other months for celebration.

Meanwhile this desk and many others are being swamped with old pictures, old newspapers, old clippings, and be assured that everyone is welcome. We're running them in the papers as we have room, and plan to wrap them all into a giant edition later this year.

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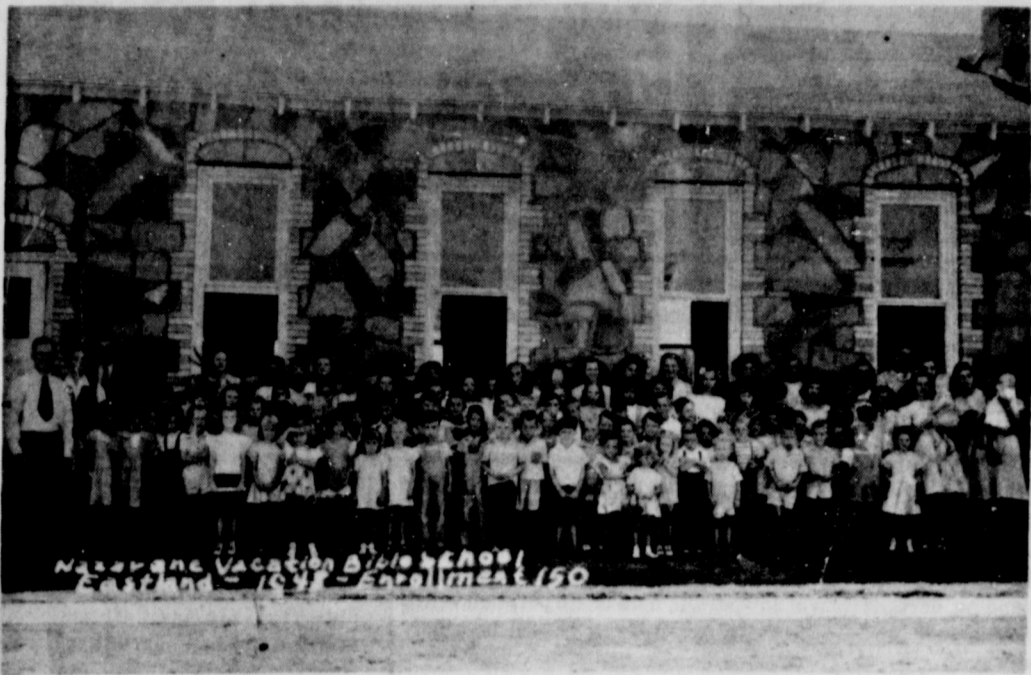

Voter Registration Question Answered

Do we have to register again this year to be eligible to vote in the Elections? This question among many others have been asked of Mrs. Nancy Trout, County Tax Assessor-Collector. In answer to this question Mrs. Trout

says: Any person who registered for the 1972 voting year does not have to reregister for 1973 or 1974. The "A series" certificates issued from October 1, 1971, to January 31, 1973, are for three full voting years, unless the voter moves out of the county or dies or is convicted of a felony or declared mentally incompetent.

These registrations are still valid, even if the voter failed to vote in the primary or general election in 1972. Any person who voted in the May primary, the June run off, or the November general election will have his registration extended for one additional voting year.

For persons who did not register in 1972, or for new residents of the county, any application received after January 31, 1973, will receive a "B series" registration certificate which will be effective as of March 1, 1973. The certificates will be valid for the 1973, 1974, and 1975 voting years.

To determine whether you have an "A" or "B" series certificate one may look at the top of the registration certificate and the letter that precedes the number determines the series.

For those who have never registered and hope to vote in the upcoming city and school elections they have until March 2 to do so and be an eligible voter.

Another deadline that falls on Friday, March 2 is the filing of candidates for the city commissioner posts. March 7 will be the deadline for filing for the school board positions.

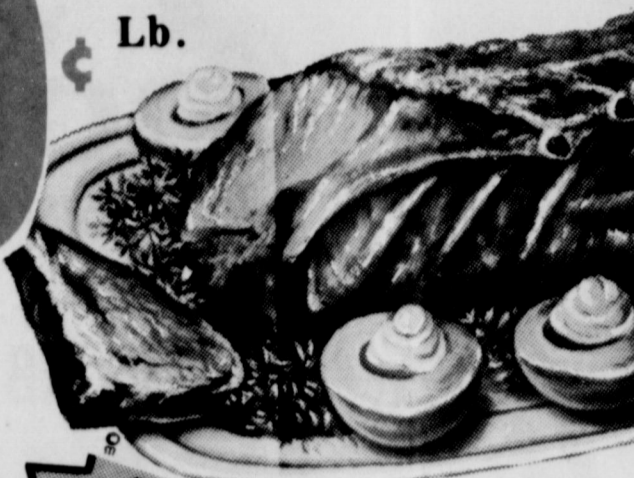

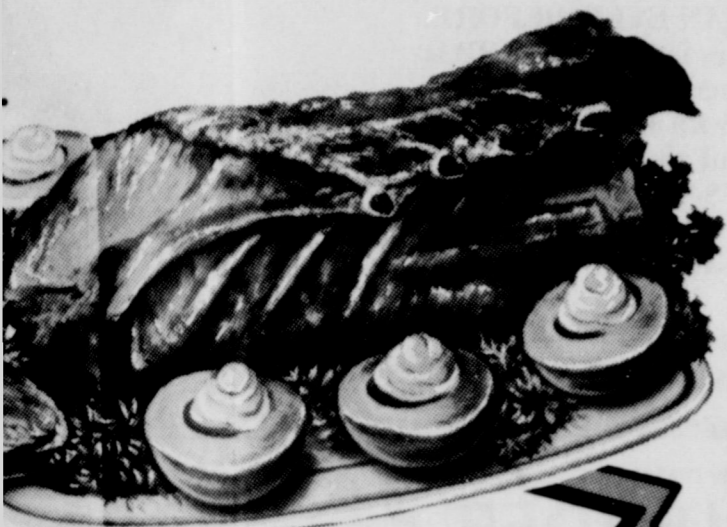
