## Ranger Coin

The 150th birthday of the Texas Rangers will culminate in dedication of the Texas Ranger Hall of Fame in the autumn of 1973 at Waco.

Governors from throughout the United States and foreign dignitaries will be present for the occasion, according to Clint Peoples, Senior Ranger Captain and chairman of the executive committee of the Texas Ranger Commemorative Commission.

The Commission was created by the Texas Legislature for the express purpose of ramrodding appropriate celebration of the occasion.

On Tuesday, February 20, banks throughout Texas will begin selling the official commemorative medal which is available in either oxidized bronze or .999 fine silver.

Obverse of the medal bears the portrait of Ranger Captain Ender H. McNelly from the original painting by Joe Ruiz Grandee which hangs in the White House. The reverse shows the Lone Star of Texas as it appears on the seal of state.

Proceeds from the sale will fund operating costs of the Texas Ranger Hall of Fame.

Besides the two medals and a sterling silver commemorative plate produced by W.N.W. Mint Industries of Amarillo, daisy Air Rifle, Winchester and Smith & Wesson will have special Texas Ranger weapons on sale. There will also be a special issue of Bowie knives and tomahawks.

Melvin Warren has already made a special anniversary casting of his classic "Rangers on Patrol", a bronze sculpture of two mounted Rangers with pack animal. Artist Jack White will have a limited edition of his four Texas Ranger Captain portraits in the original black and gold "echruseo", and a special edition of the ever popular Texas Ranger bronze statue "The Authority" is also scheduled for production.

## Long Awaited Insurance Plan Now Available In This Area

A new force to bolster the economic stability of the Texas peanut industry is now available to growers in Comanche, Eastland, Erath, and Hood Counties.

The Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC), an agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, is now offering a non-profit insurance plan designed to help prevent annual investment costs of peanut growers from being wiped out when excessive moisture, wind, frost, freeze, or any other unavoidable causes damage or destroy the crop.

A temporary office where interested growers may obtain information and apply for the peanut insurance has been established at the Old SWPGA Office Building in Gorman, Texas.

Federap Crop Insurance representatives will be on hand to provide complete information and take applications weekdays from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Ben A. Jordan, Jr., Director of the Contract Service Center of Texas, Oklahoma, and Ne Mexico for FCIC with offices at College Station, will be administrator of the new program. He advises growers to contact the Gorman office immediately if interested in the insurance plan.

Federal Crop Insurance is a voluntary, self-help service offering growers protection on their annual crop investments. It is a cooperative program which helps peanut growers take a businesslike approach to the problem of protecting their capital investments, their credit, and their community economic strength.

"When adverse weather damages peanuts in any part of the four-county area, it hurts everyone formiles around - merchants, equipment dealers, bankers, consumers - every business and profession feels the economic loss", Jordan states.

The Crop Insurance plan now being offered to TEXAS peanut producers has been developed over a period of months through meetings between the Corporation, growers, Congressional representatives, and others directly involved in the production, marketing, and financing of paenuts in Comanche, Eastland, Erath, and Hood Counties. Similar programs under the direction

of Federal Cro Insurance operates in Alabama, Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, Oklahoma, and Virginia.

Basically, the new program provides theat eligible growers who apply for peanut insurance may protect their investment in the cost of production from the time the crop is seeded

through harvest. Premium rates are based on the amount of risk in the area where the crop is

is. Growers may apply now for the new peanut insurance by contacting the temporary office in Gorman where Corporation representatives will fully explain provisions for the in-

dividual produce's operations, Jordan says.

Due to the limited time remaining in order for the Corporation to provide protection for the coming crop, interested growers within the four-county area are asked to contact the office immediately.

# Precinct Lines To Be Re-drawn

Eastland County commissioners have agreed to redraw the county's precinct lines.

At the regular meeting of the county commissioners court Monday, the court heard a report from a special committee that had previously been appointed by the court to look into the possibility of redrawing the county's precinct lines.

County Judge Scott Bailey said Wednesday that the eight member committee submitted a report recommending that

the court redraw the precinct lines so that Eastland, Morton Valley and area approximately five miles west, five miles south and four miles east of Eastland would be in Precinct 1; Ranger, Olden, Lake Leon and desdemona in Precinct 2; Rising Star, Carbon and Gorman in Precinct 3; and Cisco remaining in Precinct 4.

Upon presentation of the plan by committee member Graydon Baze of Gorman, committee member Harry Sone of Rising Star made the

motion that the court adopt the plan. Some's motion was seconded by committee member Mrs. Audie Wagley of Cisco. Bailey said the vote was unanimous.

Bailey also said that the commissioners court has asked Buddy Haun, resident engineer in Eastland for the Texas Highway Dept. to measure the number of miles of county-maintained dirt roads in the present precinct arrangement to see if the total number of miles per precinct will compare favorably with the proposed new setup

Purpose of the comparison, Bailey said, it is to determine if the present apportionment of money in each precinct's road and bridge fund is equitable.

# Gordon pot

Congratulations to Eastland County 4-H Youth who have been making headlines at the livestock shows. Theresa Scott of Rising Star showed the Grand Champion steer at San Antonio last week, a 1145 pound Angus calf. She had earlier exhibited the Champion Charolais calf at the Ft. Worth Stock Show.

Sicily and Joe Heyser of Cisco have won a room full of trophies with their Angus heifers this year. An example of their success was demonstrated at the San Antonio Livestock Show last week. Sicily and Joe took three heifers to the show. Each new first place in its class. One

was named Champion Angus of the Jr. Show while another was named Reserve Champion.

The Eastland County Pecan Growers met in Rising Star on February 13th for their mid winter business meeting. Dan Childress of Eastland was re-elected president for 1973. New directors elected were G.M. Taff and Rex Hudson, both of Rising Star.

Several folks have been calling and asking when they should apply dormant oil sprays to fruit trees. Some are confused about what good the oil spray does.

The dormant oil spray should

be applied now, before the trees bloom. The oil controls scale insects which are a major pest to fruit trees in this area. We would suggest that all fruit trees be sprayed with the oil emulsion.

There is still time to purchase trees for planting this year.

For peach and plum trees, select year old plants that are three to five feet high. Apple and pear trees should be four to six feet tall. Pecan trees that are five to seven feet tall are best. Such trees will transplant easily and will become established more quickly. Excisively large, bare-rooted trees should not be purchased.

When buying fruit and pecan trees, always insist on disease free stock. Select peach and plum trees that have remaguard rootstock (rootstock that has resistance to rootknot nematodes).

Trees perform best on soils that are well-drained and have good penetration by roots, water and air, so give special attention to the planting site.

An important operation following planting is the cutting back of the main trunk and side branches. Pecan trees should be cut back one-third to one-half of their top growth (that portion above the ground level). Cut back apple and pear trees to about 30 to 36 inches above the ground and peach and plum trees to about 24 to 28 inches.

If trees has side branches, remove all of these below the top 18 inches of the main trunk. Any side branches above 18 inches should be stubbed back to one to two inches.

The main reason for pruning the top growth of nursery trees is to compensate for root losses that these trees experienced when they were dug. In other words, the top growth needs to be balanced with the root system so that the roots can develop and become established.

All pruning cuts should be treated with a tree wound dressing as a protectant against insects and diseases.

Pruning is also important during the early years of fruit and pecan trees so that they will develop properly and take the desired shape.

When Merlin and Mim engage in a wizard's duel to outwit each other by changing into various guises, it is one of the hilarious highlights of this Disney entertainment treat.

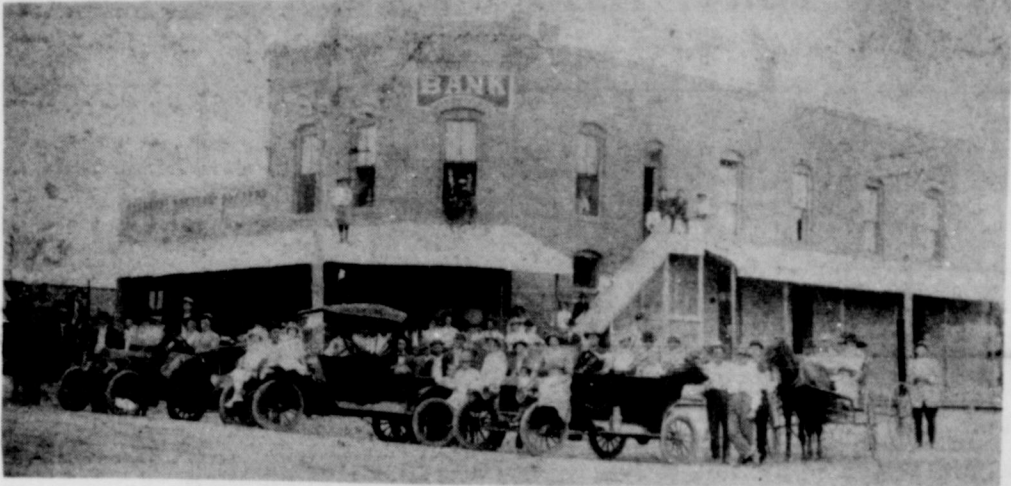

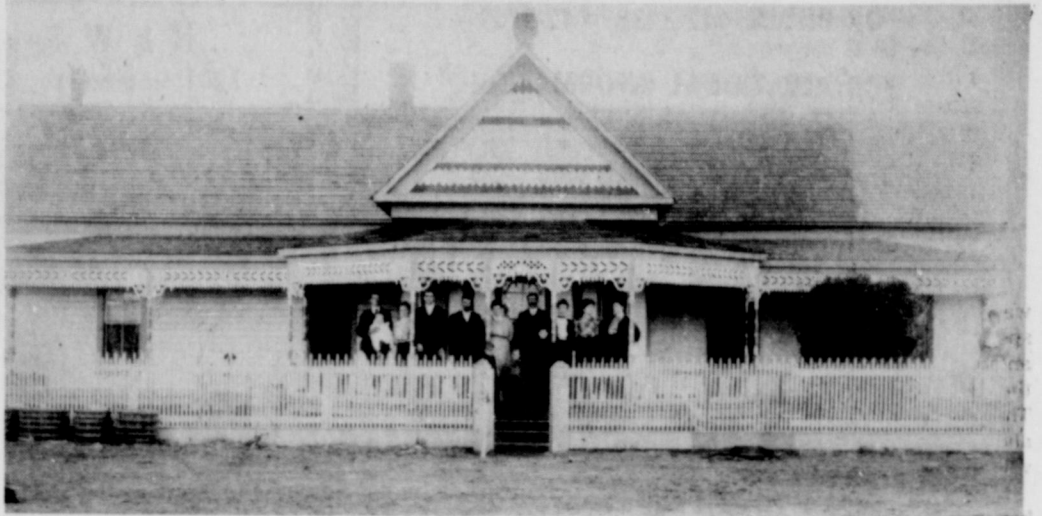

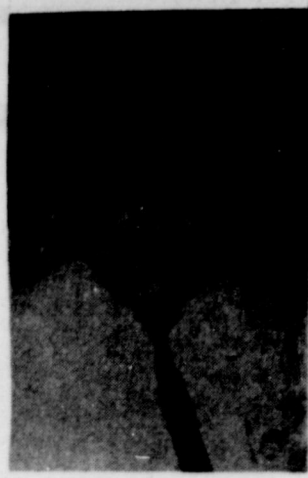

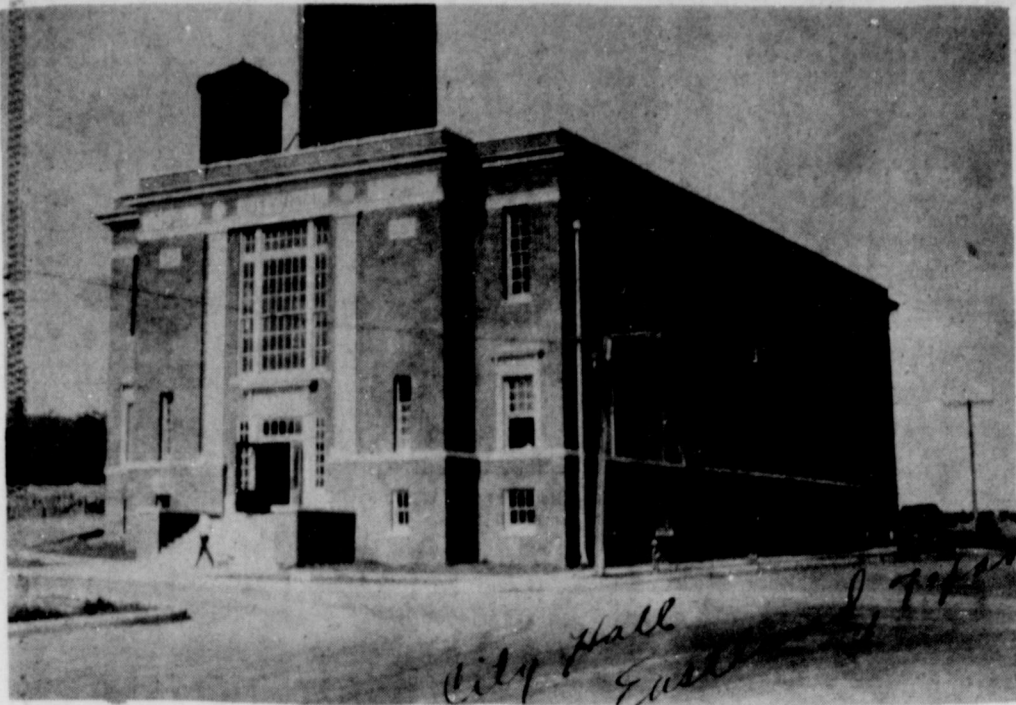
appointed the AAU boxing promoter for Atlantic City by its national president, Jack Kelly. He works to bring amateur bouts to his city.

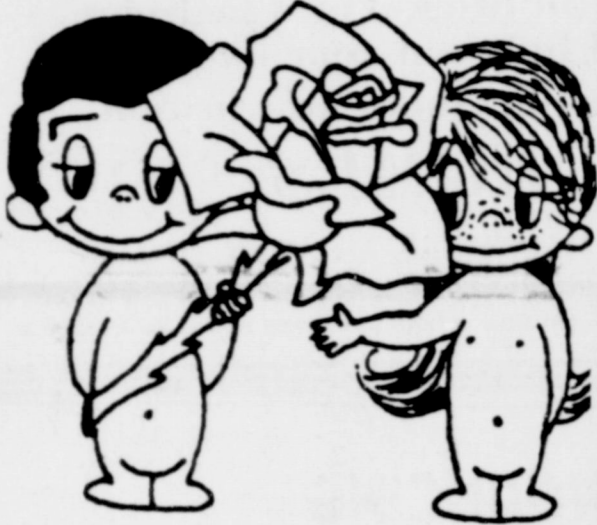
That immediately after said election is held, the officers holding the same shall make returns of the result thereof to the Mayor of this city as required by the Election Code of this State.

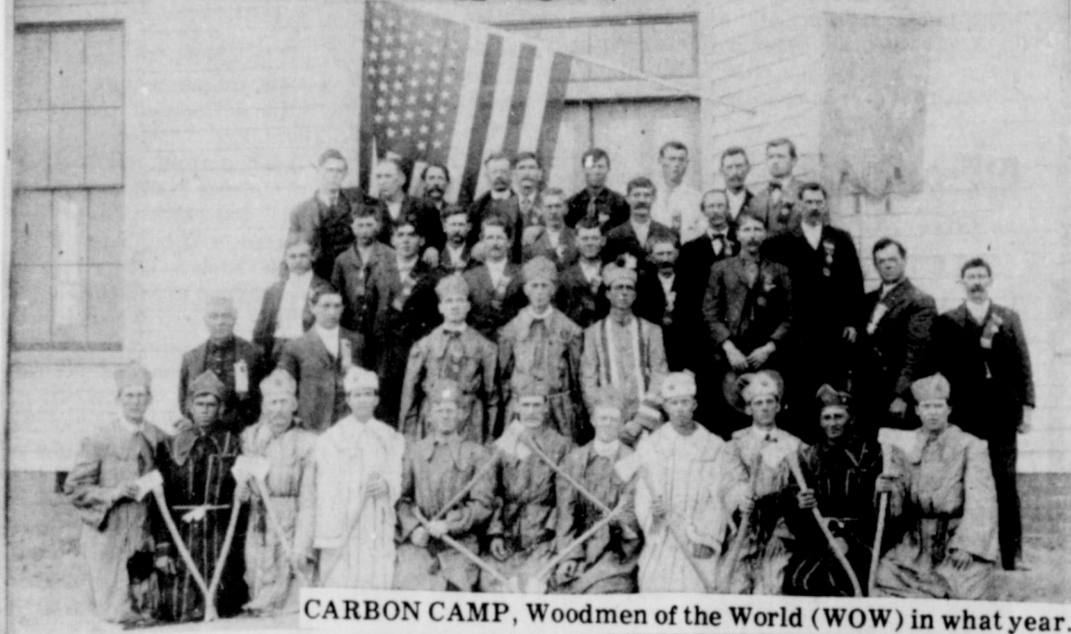
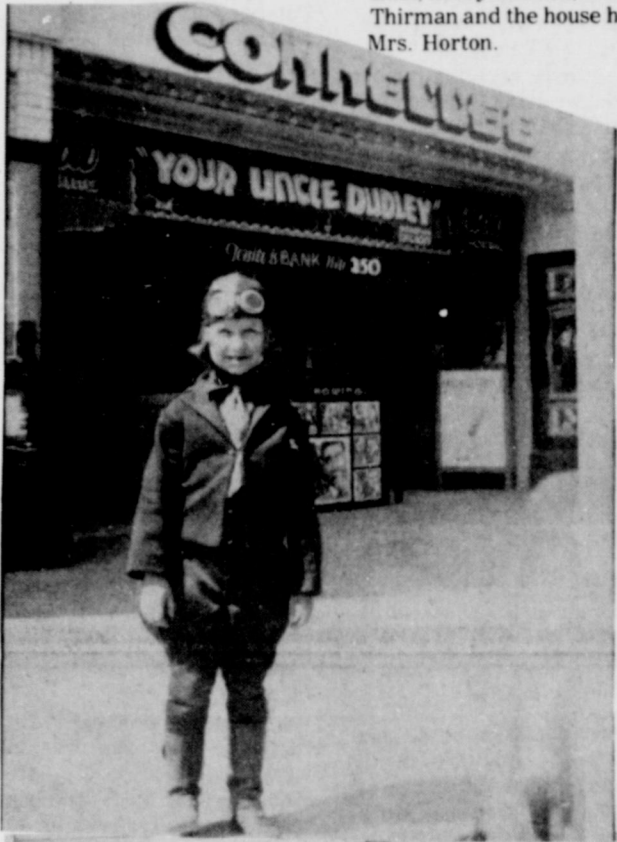

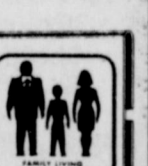
