## Public Hearing Called for City Park Development Plan

ON GOOD authority, we have it that the new and unusual growths common to most men in and around Eastland, is NOT some kind of new strain of virus. They're being found on upper lips, chins and in front of ears, and the color variations are a sight to behold. Less evident early in the pale and fair, and instantly recognized in the dark and hardy, each has its own characteristics, and for the most part, its own variety of discomfort. But let it be ordained - the beards and mustaches are coming along, some fast, some slow. Real Estater M. L. Terrell certainly endeared himself to us when he was the first person to recognize that we did in fact have one, and gosh, he must have been standing a good four and a half feet away, and he saw it and commented without our even having to mention the growth, or otherwise call attention to it. Now that's an accomplishment.

A public hearing will be held at the Eastland City Hall Monday, March 26, 1973, beginning at 5 p.m. to present plans for the development of Eastland City Park.

The City Commission set date for the hearing during a called meeting Friday, so that the plan drawn by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission may be presented to the citizens.

It is the intent of the City to

apply for matching funds from the Land and Water Conservation Fund of the Bureau of

Outdoor Recreation as administered by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to

install the planned recreation facilities on this park area. All citizens are welcome to

attend the meeting when the recreation plans and detailed costs estimates for the park will be presented and discussed.

Attending the Friday meeting with the commission were Oil Conservation Service Supervisor Lynn Gibson of the Eastland office, and Truman Renshaw of Comanche. Assisting Project Director for the Resources Conservation & Development program, which will handle details for the matching-fund park development.

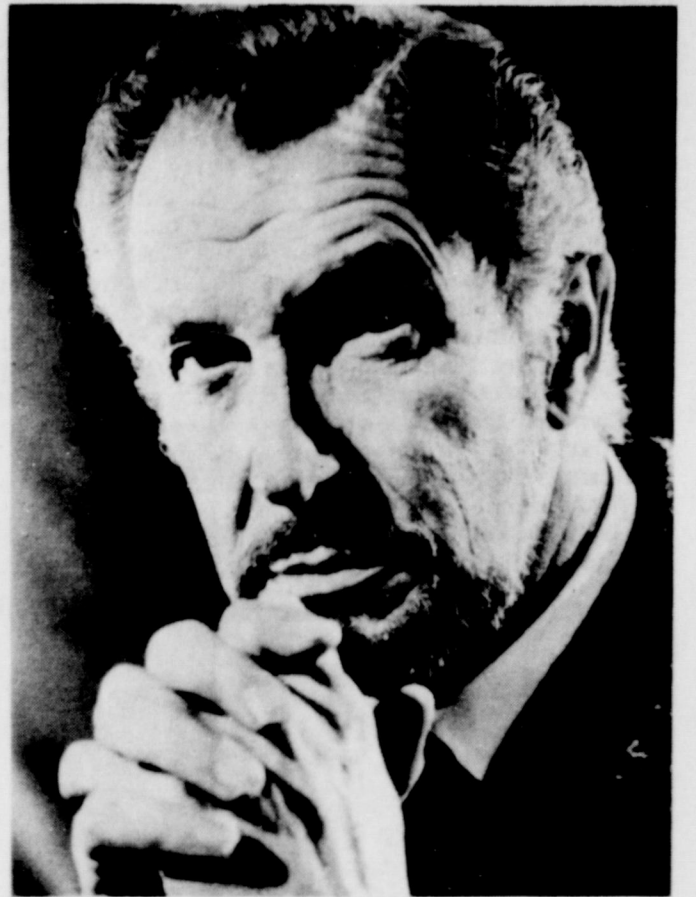
The City asked for a master plan through the RC&D some time back and the Parks & Wildlife agency did the research and made a master proposal for maximum use for the park. Development will be over a five-year period.

Mayor Pro Tem W. Q. Verner presided in the absence of Mayor Durel Reid who was out of town, with all commissioners present.

A secondary development was also discussed and the group enthusiastically agreed to pursue the possibility of launching another such program which would move all of the existing baseball and softball fields into a central deluxe complex, hopefully to be located directly south of the present park hill. The present park plan will be implemented as soon as possible however, with plans for the baseball grouping to come later, it was agreed. Commissioner H. V. O'Brien was elected by the Commission to be project officer for the City Park project.

The master plan includes major and minor improvements including a filter system for the swimming pool, as well as landscaping. The commission generally agreed that first phases should include installation of utilities, installation of sidewalks, road paving and rest room renovation.

The master plan leaves open for discussion the extent and purpose for the building known as Firemen's Hall. Their proposal suggests that perhaps the top floor could be removed and then the two lower, rock buildings could be fixed up, one as a bath house and the other for a small public meeting room. Commissioners wonder if perhaps the top floor could be retained and turned into an apartment to be used by a caretaker who could help maintain and police the park. These details and others will be discussed.



## Vincent Price Due at CJC Thursday for Event

MR. VINCENT PRICE, celebrated star of stage, screen, radio, and television, will be presented in person at Cisco Junior College on Thursday evening, March 1 in the college's final program of the 1972-73 Arts and Humanities Series. His presentation will be a dramatic one entitled "The Villains Still Pursue Me," and is set to begin at 8:00 p.m. in the Harrell Fine Arts Auditorium on the CJC campus.

Price's appearance at Cisco Junior College is supported in part by the Texas commission on the Arts and Humanities.

Mr. Price, who is of course very well known to movie and television audiences, is equally well known to lovers of art, collectors of cook books, readers of his books and newspaper column, as well as the thousands who have seen his one-man shows and listened to his lectures.

Mr. Price has starred in more than one hundred films, among the best known of which are "Song of Bernadette," "Laura," "Dragonwyck," "House of the Seven Gables," "The Ten Commandments," "The Story of Mankind," and numerous "horror" movies. He has appeared on more than 500 major television shows and more than one thousand radio shows. In addition to all this, he has appeared as narrator with orchestras such as the Saint Louis Symphony, with the

Roger Wagner Choral, The El Paso Symphony, and many other renowned musical organizations. He is also an amateur archaeologist and anthropologist.

A man of many talents and interests, Vincent Price seems to be equally proficient at all of them. He is called by many, due to his many platform appearances such as the one scheduled at Cisco, "the top platform performer of the day."

Tickets for the performance at Cisco Junior College are available through the CJC Business Office or may be purchased at the door Thursday evening. Persons desiring to secure or reserve tickets may contact the Business Office at area 817-442-2567, or go in person to the office which is on the first floor of the Harrell Fine Arts Building at CJC. All seats are reserved and are priced at \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for all students.

Mr. Price is scheduled to arrive in Abilene on Thursday afternoon at 1:36 p.m. at the Abilene Municipal Airport. He will be met there by Eris Ritchie, CJC Public Relations Director who is in charge of arrangements for the evening's program. He will stay overnight in Cisco and depart Abilene Friday morning.

Price will be introduced to the CJC audience by Dr. Leland Willis, President of the College.

Funeral for Walter A. Evans, 70, Cisco pipe fitter and former house mover who died Wednesday in Eastland Memorial Hospital after an 18 day illness, was at 2 p.m. Friday in Bakker Funeral Chapel in Eastland.

The Rev. Haston Brewer, pastor of Eastland First Baptist Church, officiated. Burial was in Eastland Cemetery.

Mr. Evans was born Dec. 3, 1902, in Howell County, Mo. He married Bertha Kimbrough Feb. 25, 1925, in Eastland. He worked as a housemover in Eastland from 1934 until 1943. He had been a pipe fitter for 30 years.

Survivors are his wife, Bertha; one son, Elmo Evans of Tucson, Ariz.; two daughters, Mrs. Tressia McClanahan of Maupin, Ore., and Mrs. Betty Clapp of El Centro, Calif.; four sisters, Mrs. Nannie Neighbors of Bakersfield, Calif., Mrs. Tracie Airgrove of Salinas, Calif., Mrs. Velda Strange of Sepulveda, Calif., and Mrs. Inathe Howe of Bellflower, Calif.; three grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

## Technology To Replace Bell Operators at Cisco Office

Rumors to the effect that telephone operators would be phased out of the Cisco office in

1974 have been prevalent since last August, but only this week, has the company made official statement.

Plans are underway to provide an improved type of customer long distance dialing for Cisco and Eastland.

Southwestern Bell Manager John McGowan made the announcement this week in discussing planned rearrangements in long distance service for this area.

Plans are to put the new service in operation for Cisco and Eastland in mid-1974. At the same time, the Cisco telephone operator office will be closed.

"Several operators are eligible for retirement and are expected to exercise this option when the office closes," McGowan said. "Others will be offered an opportunity to transfer to other locations. Some others will probably elect to take separation pay."

There are approximately 45 operators in the Cisco office; six of whom live in Eastland.

"We are now discussing these options with our people and it is too early to determine what each individual will elect to do," said Mrs. Lola Haskins, manager of operator services for this area.

The change will not affect plant, construction and business office personnel," McGowan said.

"We regret the necessity of closing the Cisco operator office," McGowan said. "The move will enable our company to operate more efficiently and at the same time provide a much improved service."

McGowan pointed out that changes in this area are typical of innovations which have enabled the Bell System to provide interstate long distance service today at rates below those in effect 20 years ago. We have been able to hold our interstate long distance rates below the 1953 level despite the fact that the cost of living has gone up more than 50 percent during this period, he added.

Cisco and Eastland now have "i Plus" long distance dialing which enables telephone users

to dial their own station-to-station calls.

The newer system, called "i Plus" long distance dialing enables telephone users to dial virtually any type long distance call, including person-to-person, Collect, those billed to a third number and other calls requiring operator assistance.

The operator assistance for these types of calls will be provided by the Fort Worth Regional office.

The "i Plus" system works similar to the present "i Plus" station-to-station dialing. For instance, with the "i Plus" system, if a customer wanted to dial a person to person call, he would dial "0", the area code, if it is different from his own, and the telephone number. An operator would come on the line, obtain the name of the person being called and get his party on the line.

Telephone people point out that the "i Plus" system is faster as well as being more accurate and reliable. A vast majority of the work involved in completing a call is done with computerized automatic equipment and all but eliminates the chance of error.

Equipment to make the "i Plus" system work for Cisco and Eastland will be installed in existing space in these telephone buildings. The new system is expected to be ready for service in these towns in mid-1974.

The change will not affect Ranger customers at the present time.

## Miss Miller To Compete in Top State Contest

Eastland Cowgirl Becky Miller will be representing The Big Country at the Houston Livestock Show March 1, 2 and 3, after her recent winning of the Typical Cowgirl Contest in Abilene last week.

Becky Miller of Eastland and Don Wayne Jones of Jayton Saturday were named the winners in The Reporter-News Typical Cowboy-Cowgirl Contest held in the Lytle Shores Auditorium.

The nine judges had their work cut out for them, taking more than four hours to select the winners from the six boys and 17 girls from throughout the Big Country area who were entered in the contest.

It was 16-year-old Becky's first win in a contest of this type. "I've been runner-up so many times it's not funny," said the sandy-haired youth. "I've been entered in sweetheart and queen contests but have never won," she said. "I just knew I would be first runner-up."

WINNING contests may not be one of Becky's traits, but a sparkling personality and determination to do well are certainly two traits she does possess.

The Eastland High School junior has the responsibility, along with her younger brother, Kem, of taking care of the family ranch, so she is a cowgirl for real. Her father, M. H. Miller, has been in ill health for the past 13 years and her mother works. So, a cowgirl by necessity she became.

The spunky five-foot one inch girl cares for 25 mother

cows and as many as 80 steers on the family ranch. She also helps her grandfather, who lives nearby, with his ranch chores.

Being raised on the ranch as she has, she just naturally became interested in rodeoing. "I like any kind of rodeoing and compete in goat tying, roping, pole bending and barrel racing." She keeps a string of 10 quarter horses on the ranch, some of which she broke herself.

BECKY WAS entered in the contest by the Eastland FFA chapter and accompanied by Mrs. L. A. Harbin - a friend of her mother's.

"Her mother will be thrilled to death," Mrs. Harbin said. "All she's known is the ranch and we know she had a good chance to win if it was really a typical cowboy-cowgirl contest."

Becky is a member of the Spanish Club and the Future Homemakers of America. She is a class officer and serves on the library staff. In addition, she is vice president of the Eastland 4-H and a member of the West Texas Barrel Riding Assn and National High School Rodeo Assn.

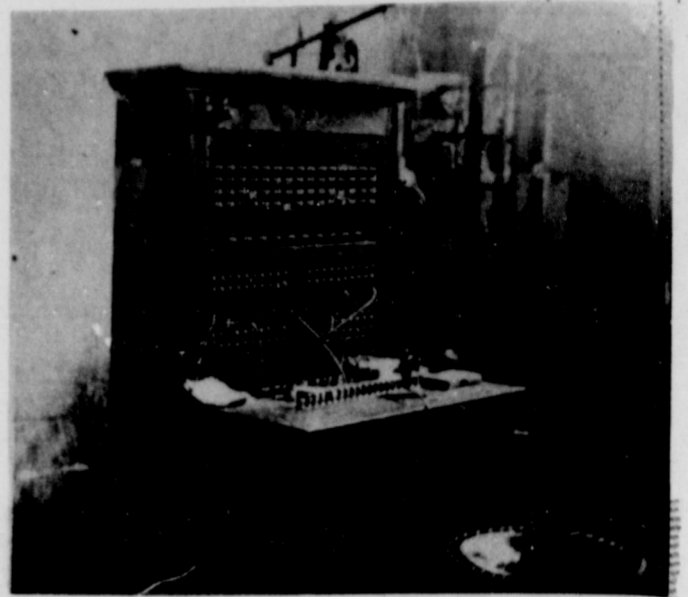

# Gordon pot

When the soil dries out a little it will be time to plant your vegetable garden. If you plan to have a vegetable garden or if you have some fruit trees in the yard why not come to our home orchard and vegetable garden meeting this Tuesday, February 27. It will be held at the Texas Electric Reddy

Room in Eastland. We will have two Extension Service Horticulturists here to help with the meeting. One is a specialist in vegetable and one a specialist in fruit. It starts at 1:30 p.m. We hope you can come.

Home gardeners complain each year about root knot nematodes in their tomatoes, okra, beans, and other vegetable crops. These microscopic worms may be the reason for sickly plants that do not respond to fertilizer or

water. Nematode presence can be recognized by galls and knots on plant roots.

If nematodes have been a problem in the past, treat your garden this spring before planting.

The most widely used chemical for nematode control contains dibromochloropropane. It is available at nurseries and farm supply stores.

No special equipment is necessary for treating home gardens. Liquid materials can be applied with a quart fruit jar with a ten-penny nail hole punched on each side of the lid - one to pour from and the other to let air into the jar so the liquid will pour evenly. Pour the proper amount of fumigant diluted with water into each 100 feet of open

furrow at least 6 inches deep. Granular DBCP can be sprinkled by hand into the open furrow, but be sure to wear rubber gloves.

For row treatment, place the fumigant in a 6 inch deep furrow directly under seed rows or transplant rows.

Broadcast treatment can be made by opening a 6 inch deep furrow using a hoe, spade or other implement. Furrows should be no more than 12 inches apart from center to center. A broadcast treatment is much more effective than row treatment; however, more fumigant and expense is involved.

Whether using the liquid or granular material, cover the treated furrows immediately to seal the fumigant into the soil. This can be done by dragging a weighted board over the treated area. Then sprinkle the soil lightly with water.

Our horticulturist will discuss this and other information on vegetable Tuesday.

Before taking that initial step of planting the garden, consider a control program for soil pests that may attack plants.

Soil insects can give home gardeners a lot of trouble. Most common are wireworms, white grubs, rootworms, cutworms, mole crickets and stalk borers. Applying an insecticide two to three weeks before planting your garden will eliminate most soil insect problems. Recommended insecticides include chlordane and diazinon. Chlordane should be applied at three to six pounds of actual material per acre while

Both insecticides are available in either the spray or granular form and should be worked into the top three to five inches of soil.

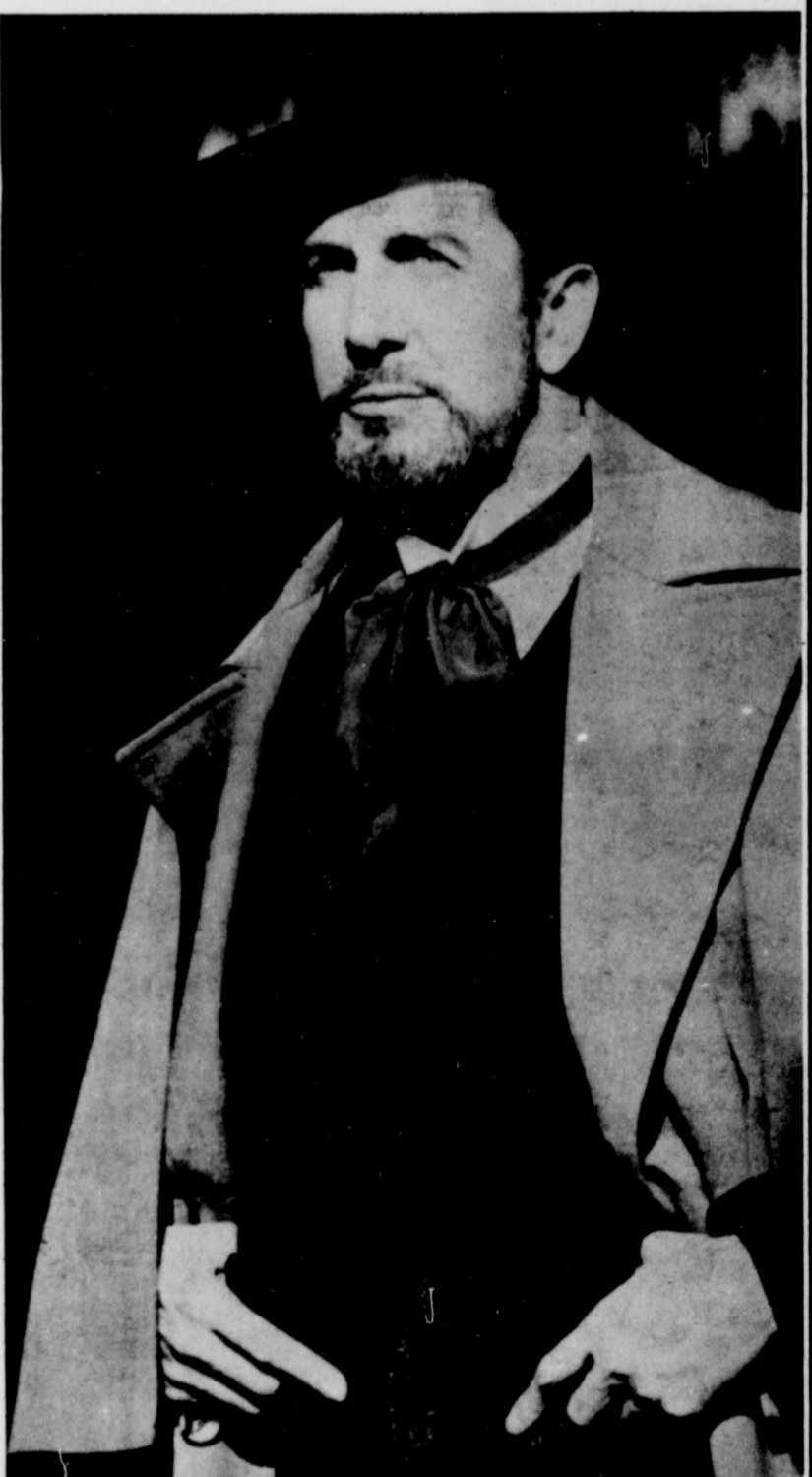

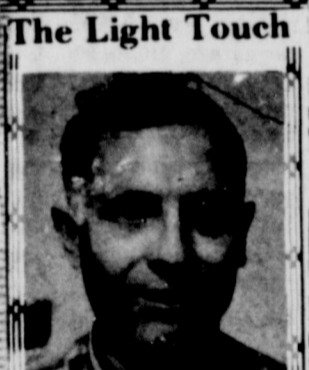

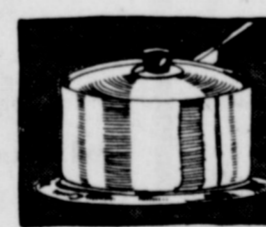

## Tips to help you use electricity more efficiently for cooking.

You can get the most value from your electric range by following these tips.



### Use flat-bottomed pans

The flatter the pan the better the contact with the electric unit. Also, be sure the pans have tight-fitting lids to reduce cooking time and moisture loss. And match pan size to unit size to avoid heat loss.

### Don't open the oven door unnecessarily

Opening the oven door when the oven is hot can cause heat loss and extended cooking time. It also can result in undercooking.



### Use minimum amount of water

The more water you use, the longer it takes to get it hot. Many foods

can be cooked with little or no water. Once water starts to boil, use the lowest heat setting that will keep it boiling.

### Cook and freeze

Bake two cakes or pies, or make double recipes of such foods as stews and spaghetti sauce. Then freeze one for future use. Also, when you're baking, prepare an oven meal at the same time so no surface cooking is necessary—simply choose foods that will cook at the same temperature.



### Thaw before cooking

Thawing meats before cooking reduces cooking time. Also, when recipes call for a preheated oven, don't turn it on too far in advance—usually 10 to 15 minutes will do.
