## Tid Bits

AN EASTLAND Chamber of Commerce brochure of 1930 is a sight to behold, and presented our town in a fine light... Could you guess that the present high school building was built for \$200,000, or that there was a school census that year of 1,256... The 50,000 horsepower Leon Power Plant was in full operation, and the office for Texas Electric Service Co. was on the fifth floor of the Texas State Bank Building.

Read through the old brochure with us:

**EASTLAND TEXAS MORE THAN THE HOME OF THE HORNE TOAD**

"Where the fluid is made that puts pep in your gasoline"

FASTLAND received nation-wide publicity in 1928 when a horned toad was taken alive after 31 years' imprisonment in the cornerstone of the old Court House.

He was immediately named "Old Rip" and exhibited in all of the large cities of the East, including an audience with President Coolidge in the White House at Washington, D.C.

On his return he was on exhibition here until January 28, 1929, when he contracted pneumonia and died. The body was embalmed and placed in a specially constructed casket and is now on exhibition in the lobby of the new Court House where thousands of tourists have stopped to see this famous lizard.

### GASOLINE AND CARBON BLACK MANUFACTURERS

Eastland county is well known for other things than horned toads. There are thirty plants in the County making casinghead gasoline. This is blended with gasoline by the refiners to make quick starting anti-knock motor fuel.

In 1928 Eastland County led all other counties in the State in the number of gallons of this article manufactured. The output in round numbers was seventy million gallons.

Carbon black is also manufactured in large quantities in this vicinity by burning the waste gas from our immense natural gas field.

Eastland and its contiguous territory have many advantages which recommend the city as a location for industries as well as a central distributing point for merchandise. Fertile soil for diversified farming; and a mild climate with almost continual sunshine permitting outdoor work the year around. A good place to live, work and prosper.

### SIX IMPORTANT COURTS AT EASTLAND

The City of Eastland is the county seat of Eastland County. The city has population of 5,000 and the county 40,000.

This new Court House was dedicated May 30, 1929. Six important courts function in this building, including the Court of Civil Appeals of the Eleventh Supreme Judicial District, also the Eighty eighth and ninety first Judicial District Courts of Eastland County.

The Bar Association numbers some fifty-three practicing attorneys.

1930 Poll Tax payers in the county, 8,087.

In the City of Eastland, 1,762. Eastland has the city manager form of government.

# Cong. Burleson To Be Law Banquet Speaker



Cong. Omar Burleson will be the principal speaker at the second annual Eastland County Law Enforcement Association Banquet to be held at the elementary school in Eastland on Monday, April 23, Eastland Police Chief John Morren has announced.

Chief Morren is Program Chairman for the event and expressed extreme pleasure in announcing that Cong. Burleson will be able to include the Eastland County appearance in his busy schedule.

The Law Enforcement Association is extremely active in the county and has established a pattern of outstanding speakers for their events. Gov. Preston Smith was banquet speaker last year. Cong. Burleson is well-known throughout this area having had close and personal contacts with citizens here over the years that he has represented the 17th District in Congress.

Additional plans and details for the banquet will be announced as they become

available. A special "red carpet" reception is being planned for the Congressman. Association President Doug Fry, Mayor of Cisco reports.

An area-wide Omar Burleson Appreciation Banquet was held in the same hall in March of 1966 and attracted many hundreds of well-wishers at that time, from throughout this district.

The importance of law enforcement is a subject well-known to Cong. Burleson since he was once an agent for the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and has taken an active part in good law enforcement over the years.

Omar Burleson, of Anson, U.S. Representative from the 17th District of Texas, was elected to the 86th Congress, taking his seat in the House in January 1947, and has been re-elected to succeeding Congresses.

Mr. Burleson is presently a member of the highly important Ways and Means Committee of the House.

Burleson served as County

Attorney and County Judge of Jones County over a period of eight years. In 1940 he became a Special agent of the federal Bureau of Investigation, resigning in 1941 to become General Counsel of the Housing Authority for this District of Columbia. He resigned that office to enter the Navy in World War II and was in the service three and one half year with duty in the North Atlantic

and South Pacific. He was discharged as a Lieutenant Commander of the U. S. Navy.

Burleson attended public school in Anson, attended Abilene Christian College and Hardin-Simmons University, and obtained his law degree from Cumberland University Law School; he later did graduate work at the University of Texas Law School. Mr. Burleson married Miss

Ruth DeWeese, and they have a home in Anson. He is a member of the Church of Christ, the Masonic Lodge, and several civic, service and veterans' organizations.

Congressman Burleson spends most of each fall visiting about over the District after the Congress has adjourned. He is a conscientious, consistent, conservative Democrat.

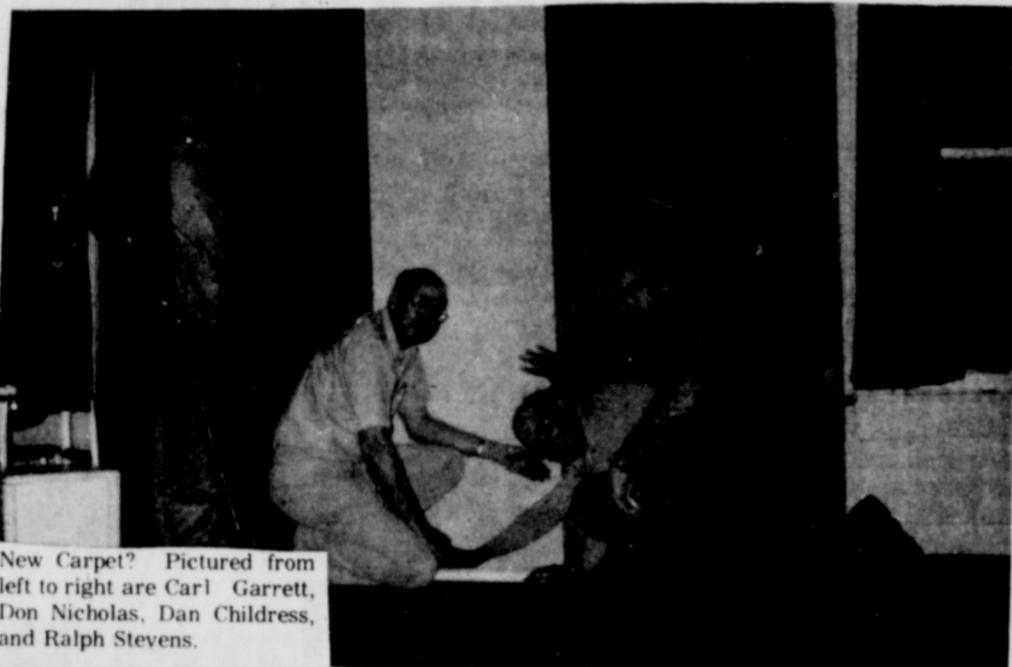

The store was successively Norvell & Wilson, Norvell & Johnson, Norvell & Gude and Norvell & Miller. The late W. R. (Hutch) Miller became a partner in the 1930's. The store has been at its present location since about 1940.

The store operates a partnership with Chester Norvell as head of the business. The owners are Mrs. L. B. Norvell and her children - Chester and Elvin Norvell of Cisco, Mrs. Ethel Anderson of Mineola, Mrs. Vera Clark of Lampa and Mrs. Cordie Clark of Grand Prairie.

The store always processes its own meats and handled livestock feeds until the war years. Hevis Gregg is store manager with William Laird as Assistant manager. William Graham is product manager

and Pearl Booth sees to the bookkeeping department. Ben Jarimillo is also in the meat market.

Chester Norvell was born at Eolian and grew up here. He attended public schools here

### TEXAN RECALLS ASSASSINATION OF PRESIDENT LINCOLN IN 1865

CISCO, TEXAS Jan. 23, 1933

"When the shot was fired that mortally wounded Abraham Lincoln, the people first thought it was part of the play," recalls John Freeland one of the last, if not the last, of the survivors of the hundreds who filled Ford's Theater in Washington the night that the Civil War President was assassinated.

Freeland, a veteran of the Northern armies, lives in the Romney community, 10 miles south of Cisco and 10 miles southwest of Eastland, in Eastland County, Texas.

He was in the second gallery

on the eventful April night in 1865. He could see the Presidential box and during the play Freeland saw Lincoln once or twice as the President shifted his position.

After the shot rang out, Freeland saw John Wilkes Booth - an actor, known to many of the theatergoers - spring from the President's box to the stage and, after waving a knife, in theatrical fashion and shouting "Sic semper tyrannis," leave the stage, dragging one foot. The injury had been sustained when Booth's foot caught in the box of decorations. When the audience realized what had happened, almost everyone sat stunned for a moment.

Freeland said. The events of the next few minutes are blurred in his recollection due to the great excitement that prevailed.

Others related afterward that there were shouts "Kill him! kill him!" revealing the frenzy of the throng for the assassin already had fled. There were even yells "Burn the theater." Then in a moment's lull of the inferno, there came the anguished cry of a woman.

It was the voice of Mrs. Lincoln and instantly pandemonium burst forth. Shouts, groans, curses, prayers, the smashing of seats, the screams of women, all mingled in an indescribable chorus.

Of all this, Freeland recalls nothing. In some way he reached a door, and, on the human tide, he was borne into the street. That, he remembers.

Freeland had seen Booth act a number of times.

He was acquainted with Dave Herold, associated with Booth in the conspiracy. When Freeland and Herold were boys, they lived in the same neighborhood.

Mrs. Surratt, owner of the Inn at which, it was charged, the plot was formed, was innocent, Freeland believes. He

had stopped at the Inn several times and knew Mrs. Surratt and her son. The woman, tried by a Court martial, was hanged.

When the barn in which Booth and Herold had taken refuge was surrounded by troops, Herold obeyed the command to surrender. Booth, according to the generally held belief, perished after he was wounded by a soldier and the barn had been set on fire.

"One of the brightest recollections of my life was the celebration of victory in Washington," Freeland said. "Citizens were firing howitzers loaded with blanks, of course, up and down Pennsylvania Avenue. That night thousands of Japanese lanterns were strung everywhere."

"A month later the whole city was draped in mourning and men and women went about sadly, talking in low tones. A more complete transformation of a city in so brief a time hardly could be imagined."

Freeland once shook hands with President Lincoln. It was Thanksgiving and the former stood in line a long time for a handshake and a word of greeting.

The Union veteran was born near Baltimore, Dec. 9, 1849. He spent his boyhood in the nation's capital. Freeland served in the Eleventh Maryland Infantry under the command of General Lew Wallace. The soldier was wounded and was mustered out of service before the close of the war.

After the return of peace, he visited many parts of the country. In Las Vegas, N.M. he ran a meat market and paid a visit in Santa Fe to his old general who was Governor of the territory.

In New Mexico Freeland worked in a railroad section gang. One of his fellow workers was a quiet, rather nice looking fellow who had killed a man - a practice which he later was to develop into something of an art and to attain a place in the records of the West as Billy the

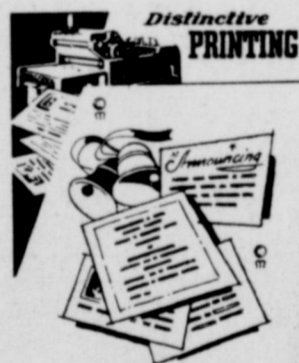

## THE WONDERFUL WORLD of BOOKS

Perhaps we can take in our stride headless hikers on old English roads, and shrug off terror in the Outer Hebrides - but shrugs turn to shivers in C. B. Colby's new book THE SCARIEST PEOPLE IN THE WORLD (Sterling \$3.95) where the apparitions are mostly American and the horror is next door!

A sequel to Mr. Colby's recent "Strangely Enough," which has now sold well over a million copies, the new book tells classic tales and curious yarns of the unbelievable and meamny - mysterious disappearances, lost mines, fabulous buried treasure, and a gallery of ghouls. The stories come from Vermont, New Hampshire and Washington, D. C., from Florida, Texas and Louisiana, from Illinois and Ohio - from almost every state - and they were gathered in Mr. Colby's travels, contributed by his friends and readers, many of

them eye witnesses, who insist the stories are true.

Here is the report of an island that vanished from a New York State lake, of 20 million in Mexican gold hidden in the rugged mountains and canyons of northwestern New Mexico is someone watching it and waiting? of a vicious gray terror who has been victimizing tenants of a house in Paterson, New Jersey (Colby gives the street but not the number), and for completeness, there's a headless hiker, too, from Southeast Essex and a chilling tale from the Outer Hebrides.

All the stories are short, suspenseful, and recommended for reluctant readers, most of them illustrated with line drawings.

Major changes in the world's monetary systems have forced collectors to seek new fields of interest, reports Burton Hobson, prize-winning author of the standard book, COIN COLLECTING AS A HOBBY, which has now been greatly revised and enlarged (Sterling,

memorative medals have been attracting more attention, and Mr. Hobson has expanded his coverage of them and included a new section on the controversial, widely-advertised non-circulating legal tender issues, coins which are struck especially for the collector.

Other new chapters on how errors and irregularities happen in the coin process, for those "oddy" collectors who delight in "bugs-bunny" half dollars, "Adam's apple" quarters, and "fanged" Roosevelt dimes. Another new feature extremely important to beginning collectors is an identification guide to coins of foreign countries.

Mr. Hobson received the Robert Friedberg Award in 1972 from the Professional Numismatists Guild in recognition of the excellent contribution he made as author of the full-color book, "Historic Gold Coins of the World." He has written many other highly praised books about coin and stamp collecting.

The New York Times said of the previous edition of COIN COLLECTING AS A HOBBY, "Young collectors, especially beginners, should find (this book) of unusual interest. It answers many of the questions often asked by newcomers to numismatics... why collect coins, how to get started in the hobby, and what the beginner should look for." It is on the School Library Journal "Best Looks for Children" list.

Since the U.S. replaced its silver coinage with the new "sandwich" coins, and Great Britain went on the decimal system, it has been increasingly difficult to collect coins by the old method of searching through pocket change - most of the coins in circulation are of very recent date - but the collector with even a limited budget has many alternatives.

The book explains how to set up a collection by types of coins, by countries, and by subjects, and it suggests some brand new possibilities: one of these just opened up in 1968 with the start of the first international coin issue launched under the auspices of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the U.N. Another idea lies in the specially boxed specimen and "proof sets" now issued by many numismatics-conscious governments.
