## Contracts To Be Let On Super Highway Aug. 19

Contract for construction of 3.7 miles of Interstate 20 (U. S. Highway 80) east of Ranger, will be let in Austin on Aug. 19-20, according to an announcement from Morris George, divisional vice president of the U. S. Highway Association.

Construction will extend from a point about seven and one-half miles east of Ranger to the Erath County line, George said. Two interchanges are planned for the area.

Included in the project will be a four-lane expressway, frontage roads on sections and two grade separations.

Some \$1,335,000 has been designated by the State Highway Department for construction work in the county on Interstate Highway 20. This sum represents part of the \$226,000,000 program for 1959 - 1960.

Included in the program is the purchase of right-of-way in the county and surrounding counties, with projects throughout the state. Total construction cost is estimated at over \$8,500,000.

No specific amounts have been named for purchase of the land for right-of-way purposes. Construction stage will probably be set up for July, 1960.

Right-of-way projects in the county will also include purchase from the Callahan County line to a point one mile west of Cisco (6.6 miles).

"Although we will concentrate our rat and rodent drive in the rural areas we hope the town people will join with us and we cordially invite them to do so," John Love, County Farm Bureau president, said. The Farm Bureau is cooperating with the county agricultural agents in sponsoring the drive.

## Conservatives Rule County Demo Convention Twelve Precincts Asked to Abolish

Eastland County Democrats will send an uninstruced delegation to the State Democratic convention in San Antonio Saturday, but there is no question that the delegation will support Gov. Price Daniel.

Conservatives, as expected, completely controlled the county convention held Saturday afternoon in Eastland.

County Chairman A. J. Blevins Jr. called the convention to order, and in well planned order Conservatives quickly elected Dr. James Whittington of Eastland as permanent chairman. Mrs. Steve Potts

was then just as easily nominated and elected permanent secretary. Mrs. Potts is also from Eastland.

A Credentials Committee named by Dr. Whittington made short work of things and recommended that all delegates be seated. Cyrus Frost of Eastland headed the committee, and other members were Rev. G. A. Dunn of Rising Star and L. E. Clark of Desdemona.

Frost, in making the committee report said all credentials were "sufficiently in order." He reserved a recheck, however, in case of "a close vote."

Virgil Seaberry Jr. of Eastland headed the Committee on Delegates. Serving with him were E. E. Addy of Cisco and M. E. Shel of Gorman. All persons were asked if they would attend the state convention if elected, and all who said they would had their names placed on the proposed list. When the committee returned with the list of delegates, it was noticeably lacking any loyalists or liberals however.

Tom Stark of Cisco headed the committee on resolutions. Keith Whitt of Gorman and Garvin Chastain of Ranger were the other two members. Only two resolutions were presented, and both were approved. The first resolution passed was the unit rule, making it certain that all of the county's 15 votes will be cast as the majority of delegates vote.

The second approved resolution called for the abolishment of all voting precincts in the county with less than 50 votes. The resolution did not specify if the votes to be considered were cast in the general elections or the Democratic primary election.

The resolution will be presented to the County Commissioners Court for action. Two years ago a similar move was ignored by the Commissioners Court.

Blevins told delegates Saturday, however, that some of the smaller precincts have actually asked to be done away with. He pointed out that the July primary would cost between \$5000 to \$6000, and that such money would have to be paid by candidates. He termed the cost of running for office in Eastland County as almost prohibitive.

The only "no" vote of the day came on this resolution, however. It was cast by Scott Bailey, Cisco teacher. He told a reporter it would be unconstitutional to abolish the precincts before two years from now, when the present chairman's term of office would end.

If the July primary votes are used to determine which precincts would be abolished under the 50-vote rule, 12 of the county's 26 precincts would be done away with. They would be Pioneer, Alameda, Long Branch, Okra, Soranton, Nimrod, Dothan, Romney, Pleasant Hill, Staff, Cook and Sabano.

However, if the last general election was set up as the determining election, it would mean Pioneer would not be abolished, but that Kokomo would.

## Gray Matter

I've been with my tours again. In fact, I just got back to Eastland Sunday evening in time for supper. I voted an absentee ballot and left town before the candidate got a good hold on me. I was in Tallahassee, Florida, when I heard who won the governor's election and the senate race in Texas. Actually, it was all my three-tube portable would do to pull in WBAP loud enough to find out who won the election, but it did and I got the news just as soon as any Texan at home.

I went to the Southeastern corner of these United States this time and looked over the State of Florida. Up until this trip I had not been any further south in Florida than the town of Perry which is just about at the 11 o'clock position on the west coast — this is, it's near the west coast of that state but not on it. This time though, I Evergladed and Miami'd all over the place. I'm still trying to figure out what makes a town of Miami.

Going west out of Miami there is not a thing between the town's city limits and the west coast of Florida but a little swamp here and there and then some more swamps. It's a mosquito's paradise and I'm told that it is also a wildlife paradise, but a motorist who is not on a hunting trip wouldn't know nor find out about that.

Miami is something to behold. According to the 1950 population census of 249,000 and by the same census Fort Worth had about 278,000. Dade County, in which Miami is located, claims to have doubled in population every census since the city of Miami was established in 1896 with the completion of the railroad. The chamber of commerce down there now claims the county to have 750,000 people and I understand that in the winter months when all the winter tourist trade from the North freezes down to sit out the dead freeze, the population tends to be over a million souls.

That's a lot of people. Miami is a city, there's no doubt of that. This was my first visit to Miami and I was well pleased with what I saw. I got some surprises too.

For instance, I was surprised to find so much Spanish spoken on the streets of Miami. I understand it's due to the nearness of Miami to Cuba and other Latin

American countries. Miami is one of the principal, if not the principal, port of entry for airline traffic from South America.

I noticed the escalator in Sears Roebuck's store had the usual warning about the use of the climbing stairs in both English and Spanish. The Miami post office has "Please use the next window" signs in both languages too.

For a Texan who expects to hear Spanish on the streets and in the stores of San Antonio and some of our South Texas cities, it was somewhat of a surprise to find the language of our southern neighbors spoken so widely in Miami.

In one of the stores there I ran into five Spanish-speaking people bagging over the price of a television set with the salesman the same as you and I. Of the five, only one of them could speak English and he was working over time putting the jabbering of his friends into an English the poor salesman would understand.

Miami is just across the bay from Miami Beach, which is where most of the city boys go to spend the winter. The beach there is almost a single line of hotels and luxury-type motels that extend up the Atlantic for 12 miles by my car speedometer and had wasn't all of it by any means as I didn't start at the extreme end.

There are all sorts of hotels in this area. Some of the large ones, some of them small ones, and some of them sort of in-between, but all of them get a pretty price for their rooms for night, even in the summer time. Those who know all me the nightly rate in the winter is "out of this world."

Put anyway it's good to be back to Eastland where a fellow can walk into an eating place without having to bribe his way through a set of out-stretched claws such as one meets in the Morrison Cafeteria in the South. I feel like I've had to tip all of their employees since I left home to get a glass of water and from the looks of my pocket book I must have. It's flatter than a cafeteria pancake.

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HJR #17—Number Six on the Ballot.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 17** proposing an amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 66, to provide that the Legislature shall have authority to provide a system of retirement and disability pensions to certain retiring Texas Rangers and their widows, stating the maximum of such pension; and providing a fund from which such pensions may be paid.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, shall be amended by adding thereto a new Section 66, to read as follows:

"Section 66. The Legislature shall have authority to provide a system of retirement and disability pensions for retiring Texas Rangers who have not been eligible at any time for membership in the Employees Retirement System of Texas as that retirement system was established by Chapter 522, Acts of the Fifteenth Legislature, Regular Session, 1947, and who have had as much as two (2) years service as a Texas Ranger, and to their widows; providing that no pension shall exceed Eighty Dollars (\$80) per month to any such Texas Ranger or his widow, provided that such widow was legally married prior to January 1, 1957, to a Texas Ranger qualifying for such pension."

"These pensions may be paid only from the special fund created by Section 17, Article VII for a payment of pensions for services in the Confederate army and navy, frontier organizations, and for widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations or militia."

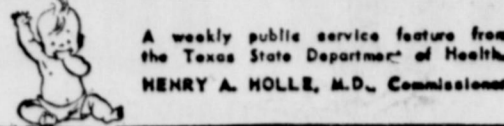
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional amendment providing for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

It will arouse the wrath of sun worshippers, but this must be said: The healthful effect of a sun-tan aren't worth the time and trouble it takes to get one. After all a sunburn—like any other burn—is a manifestation of a skin injury.

True, a sensible bask in the sun makes a fine mental pick-me-up, and there is no denying the supple appeal of a tawny life-guard but to overdo it can lead to trouble. In fact it can kill you. More than one person has succumbed to prolonged and unaccustomed exposure to the sun.

Even at best, overexposure can mean two or three miserable days when a mere shirt or blouse is torture, and a friendly pat on the

back can end in murder. The medical term for sunburn is "erythema solaris." It's the ultra-violet light in sun rays which does the damage. And since clouds don't remove all ultra-violet rays, it is possible to get burned even on overcast days in mid-summer.

Some people are physically unable to tan. Known medically as "heliophobes," they could spend the entire summer on Padre Island, and all they'd get would be blisters on their blisters. The reason: Their skins lack the pigment necessary to produce the tan.

They never had a tan and they never will, so they ought never attempt one. Each new exposure will only mean a new burn.

Assuming you are the type who can tan—a "heliophilac" that is—the well-known rule about doing it by progressively longer exposure time is valid and should be followed.

Sunshine is a source of vitamin D, as most people know. What is apparently misunderstood is that ordinarily healthy persons suffering from pellagra, lung tuberculosis, high people can get all the D vitamin they need through routine activities such as hanging out the family wash, moving the lawn, or walking to the store.

Blood pressure, or hyperthyroidism sunlight may be definite harmful. In case you have wondered about the source of freckles, here's the answer: The color of everyone's skin is determined by the amount of pigment in skin cells. Dark complexioned people have considerable, blondes very little,

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL  
AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED  
ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE  
HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO.**  
proposing an amendment to Subsec-  
tion (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI  
of the Constitution of Texas, au-  
thorizing each county to provide re-  
tirement, disability and death benefits  
for appointive officers and employees  
of the county or precinct, or for ap-  
pointive and elective officers and for  
employees of the county or precinct;  
providing for the submission of the  
proposed amendment to the voters  
qualified to vote thereon, and providing  
for the necessary election, form of  
ballot, proclamation and publication;  
**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-  
ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF  
TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Subsection (b) of  
Section 62 of Article XVI of the Con-  
stitution of Texas be amended so as to  
read hereafter as follows:

(b) Each county shall have the  
right to provide for and administer a  
Retirement, Disability and Death Com-  
pensation Fund for the appointive offi-  
cers and employees of the county or  
precinct, or for the appointive and elec-  
tive officers and for the employees of  
the county or precinct, provided same  
is authorized by a majority vote of the  
qualified voters of such county and  
after such election has been advertised  
by being published in at least one  
newspaper of general circulation in  
said county once each week for four  
consecutive weeks provided that the  
amount contributed by the county to  
such Fund shall at least equal the  
amount paid for the same purpose  
from the income of each such person  
and shall not exceed at any time seven  
and one-half per centum (7½%) of the  
compensation paid to each such person  
by the county.

All funds provided from the com-  
pensation of each such person, or by  
the county, for such Retirement, Dis-  
ability and Death Compensation Fund,  
as are received by the county, shall be  
invested in bonds of the United States,  
the State of Texas, or counties or  
cities of this state, or in bonds issued  
by any agency of the United States  
government, the payment of the prin-  
cipal of and interest on which is

guaranteed by the United States, pro-  
vided that a sufficient amount of  
funds shall be kept on hand to meet

ballot shall have printed thereon the  
following words:

"FOR the amendment of subsection  
(b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of  
the Constitution, to authorize each  
county to establish, after approval  
by its voters, a retirement, disability  
and death compensation fund covering  
the elective officers of the county or pre-  
cinct, as well as the appointive officers  
and employees of the county or pre-  
cinct."

"AGAINST the amendment of sub-  
section (b) of Section 62 of Article  
XVI of the Constitution, to authorize  
each county to establish, after ap-  
proval by its voters, a retirement, dis-  
ability and death compensation fund  
covering the elective officers of the  
county or precinct, as well as the ap-  
pointive officers and employees of the  
county or precinct."

"Each voter shall mark out one of  
said clauses on the ballot, leaving the

subdivisions using voting machines,

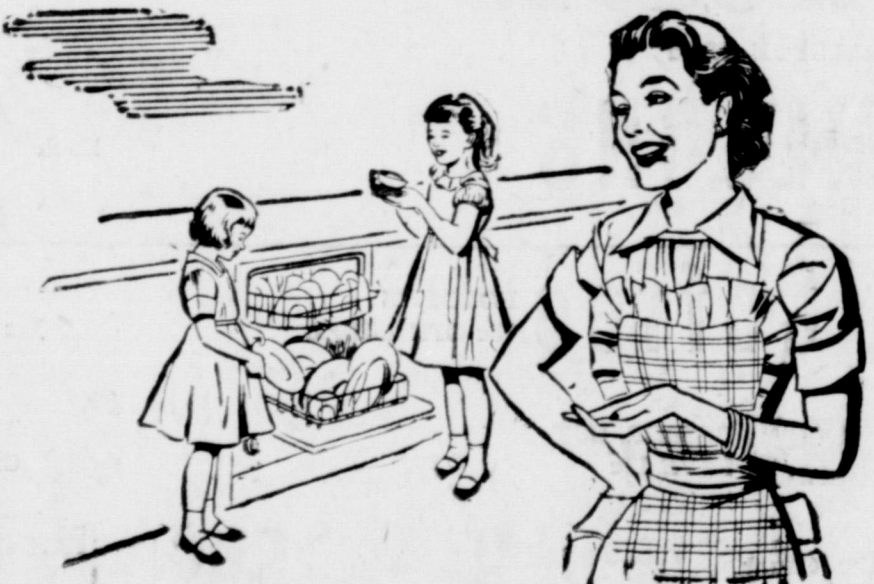
