What's our opinion on abolishing the smaller voting precincts in the county?

The politically smart thing to say is that they shouldn't be done away with because it would ruin the smaller communities. However, we just can't believe that is so.

We think the answer to keeping a community alive is organizing community clubhouses such as has been done at Center Point and Morton Valley. That would mean that a community would have a meeting place the year 'round. Holding an election in a precinct once every two years isn't the answer.

However we do not believe that the communities should have their voting boxes pulled out from under them by force. We think we know these people well enough to know they are going to stand up and fight anyone who tries to legal-wangle them out of their precincts. If they are given a fair shake we think they will realize that it is only fair to cut election cost, and we think they know that the only way to cut costs is by doing away with some of the boxes.

Actually, folks in the larger cities should be doing some checking on their boxes, too. It seems mighty strange to us, for instance at Cisco has two voting places, but that all but a handful of citizens vote at one place—the "big" box they like to call it!

Birth Certificates Must For Local First Graders

With school bells due to ring in less than a month, Supt. of schools Wendell Siebert today made a special announcement regarding first grade students.

Classes will begin Sept. 2 in Eastland schools, and enrollment of first graders has already started. "Parents who have a child en-

tering the first grade in the Eastland Public Schools this September should make sure that they have the necessary credentials in order to avoid delay in enrollment," Siebert said.

"A child entering for the first time must be six years of age before Sept. 1, 1958 and be officially registered at the business office in the high school building. In order to register, parents must submit birth certificates and proof of smallpox vaccination by Aug. 22.

"If birth certificates are not already in the possession of the parent, immediate steps should be taken to secure one as no child can be registered who does not present one.

"Due to an increased enrollment there is a strong possibility that school boundary lines may have to be adjusted in order to accommodate the increase. Notice of such action will be published as soon as a decision is possible."

Siebert said he would present the annual school calendar to the School Board for approval at their next meeting, which is to be held Monday night.

Usually Thanksgiving, Christmas and Easter holidays are observed at the local school and closing exercises are held in May.

Cisco College to Have Enrollment Of Almost 500

A record number of students is expected to enroll at Cisco Junior College for the 1958-59 school year in September, according to an announcement by President Grady Hogue. Between 400 and 500 students are expected.

The college, which offers two complete years of courses, will begin pre-registration Aug. 4. Official registration will be Sept. 8 and 9 with classes beginning Sept. 12, Hogue said. Anyone interested in enrolling may do so at the college office any day after Aug. 4.

Cisco Junior College will offer extension classes at Dyess Air Force Base and at Clyde again this year, Hogue said. Tuition will be \$50 per semester or \$100 for the entire school year.

Dormitories are available for both boys and girls. A new girls dormitory is now under construction, adding rooms for some 50 additional students. The new building also houses class rooms, a student union and a book store. Work is scheduled to be completed early in September.

Hogue pointed out that Cisco Junior College is fully accredited and work done by its students is accepted by senior colleges and universities. The college offers all courses of the first two years leading to BS and BA degrees as well as pre-med and pre-law. In addition, it has an outstanding music department and offers courses in agriculture.

"The Cisco College business department is one of the most complete in this region, offering courses in office machines, typing, bookkeeping, secretarial training, and so forth. Our business graduates are in demand for jobs in industry of this region," Hogue said.

The college will have football and basketball programs again this coming year. Football workouts are due to begin about Sept. 1. Coach Bob Howard has arranged an 11 game schedule.

"The junior college offers the high school graduate an economical place to obtain his first two years of college training," Hogue said. "We cordially invite prospective student and their parents to visit us to discuss any phase of their educational plans."

Program Set On Consumer Credit

Ranger College will present a program, with speakers of national note, on the subject of consumer credit, President Price Ashton announced.

The date will be Oct. 9 and businessmen and the general public, not only of Ranger but of all cities in the area, are invited.

There will be two sessions and they will be free. In the afternoon, there will be a speaker, a motion picture and a question-and-answer period and, at night, a completely different program will be presented: another speaker, another film and then a question-and-answer period.

The programs are being arranged through the cooperation of the Texas Consumer Finance Association, whose member companies are supervised by the State Banking Department and operate 142 local offices throughout the state, serving 174,000 families annually.

"Eastland people are still the most wonderful people in the world." That was Mrs. Marene Johnson's summary following the big rush at the local post office following the switch-over to new postal rates Aug. 1.

Mrs. Johnson said only five pieces of mail with insufficient postage were mailed here. "There was a lot of it that came into the office from out of town, however," the local postmaster added.

Mrs. Johnson said there are plenty of stamps available here. In at least one city the big rush caught postal officials short and they ran out of stamps.

Grass Fire Hits Ranges at Olden

A blazing pasture fire cut across about 350 acres of grazing land on the 15-Bar Ranch, Hamilton Ranch and the Moss Place—about two miles east of Olden—as firemen from Ranger, Eastland and Cisco fought the blaze for about eight hours Tuesday.

Flames burned about 200 acres of pasture land on the 12-Bar Ranch, leased by Pete Tindall, about 100 acres of the Hamilton Ranch, leased by J. D. Harrell, and about 45 acres of the "Moss Place", owned by C. Pat Moseby. Fences were also damaged in the path of the fire.

A small corner of the "Butler Place" was reported damaged by the flames. Dr. Dick Hodges of Ranger owns the farm, but said he failed to discover fire damages Tuesday afternoon.

First report was made to Fire Chief Charlie Isabell of Ranger, when Highway Patrolman Les Strawn notified him of the blaze about 10:30 a.m.

Three trucks of volunteer firemen rushed to the scene and continued fighting until after 7 p.m. Lone Star Gas Co. employees also helped. Workmen on the 12-Bar Ranch were keeping watch for small flames Wednesday morning.

Absentee Voting For Democratic 2nd Primary On

Absentee voting in the second Democratic primary got underway this week, and from all indications, the second primary will be a quiet affair.

Absentee voting will continue through Aug. 19. Voting will be done through County Clerk Johnson Smith's office in the courthouse in Eastland.

Eligible to vote absentee are persons who will be out of the county on election day, and those who can not go to the polls because of physical disability.

Those who are already out of the county and will be out of the county on election day, or who are physically handicapped, may vote by mail.

Otherwise a person must appear in person at the Clerk's office. A disabled person voting absentee must make a written request by mail for a ballot, enclosing poll tax receipt or exemption doctor's certificate and return address.

Anyone out of the county must also send his written request for a ballot, enclosing poll tax receipt or exemption and return address.

Red Cross First To Offer Aid To Disaster Areas

Since the service for disaster relief work was added to the American Red Cross, it has always been one of the first to offer help to the victims of these calamities. The experience gained during the early period was of great value in formulating standards for effective disaster relief that are still the basis for present day Red Cross disaster work. The guide in disaster procedures includes:

1. Relief must be distributed on the basis of actual need, not in proportion to the amount of loss.

2. There are two phases in disaster relief—emergency assistance and rehabilitation. Emergency relief includes shelter, food, clothing, and medical attention. Rehabilitation relief, which accounts for about 85 percent of all disaster relief funds spent, includes assistance in rebuilding, repairing, or refurbishing homes. Other rehabilitation measures are re-establishing people in small business, arranging for necessary medical and hospital care, often for a long period, and counseling with people affected by disaster.

3. Relief must be positive and progressive, with a definite completion goal, and so given that people may become self-sustaining.

4. Relief funds should be given, with no obligation to repay.

5. Use of local committee for establishing the need of their neighbors.

6. Training for specialists to assist in disaster work.

The Red Cross, its responsibility to act in time of disaster clearly defined in its congressional charter, has been the traditional channel through which the public has had an opportunity to express its sympathy and generosity.

Two Oil Tries Are Located In Eastland County

Eastland County drew two oil tries this week.

W. H. (Bill) Hoffman of Eastland has staked the No. 12 J. V. Harbin as a regular field try four miles south of Eastland on a 91-acre lease. Location is 1600 feet from the north and 2630 - feet from the west line of Section 27, Block 2, H&TC Survey. Proposed depth is 1350 feet with rotary.

The second try is the No. Joe Danaway, seven miles southwest of Cisco on a 160-acre lease. Proposed depth is 500 feet with cable tools. Location is in the B&C Survey. Operator is Vin M. Gamblin of Cisco.

Auto Insurance Rate Increase Not As Noticeable As Four Cent Stamp

Postal increases were not the only thing that Eastland County citizens had to face beginning August 1.

Less noticeable, at least all at once, was the hike in automobile insurance rates.

In explaining the new rate increase, the State Board of Insurance recently released the following statement:

"Automobile insurance rates for Texas were raised effective August 1. These increases result directly from an increasing number of automobile collisions, higher costs of repairs, larger medical costs, and higher jury awards in actions for damages.

The average rate increase, state-wide for all classes combined is approximately 19 percent for liability insurance and approximately 17 percent for collision insurance on private passenger cars. It is emphasized that these percentages are only the average increases, are based on Texas experience alone, and will vary widely among the different rating ter-

ritories of the State and among the different classes of insured. The State Board of Insurance, as required by law, has set these rates after a public hearing in Austin on June 20, and after careful study of statistics collected on automobile losses in Texas.

"Even after these increases become effective, liability rates in Texas still are below the majority of other states, and Texas has the lowest rate among the eight states having the largest number of registered motor vehicles. The increases in rates is necessary because of the highest underwriting costs in history. Over the nation, leading stock automobile insurance companies last year paid out \$116.70 for every \$100 received in policy premiums."

The county winner will be eligible to participate in the District 2 contest later in the year and the state winner will be selected from district winners. The state winner will receive an all-expense paid trip with a matron escort to the National Farm Bureau convention.

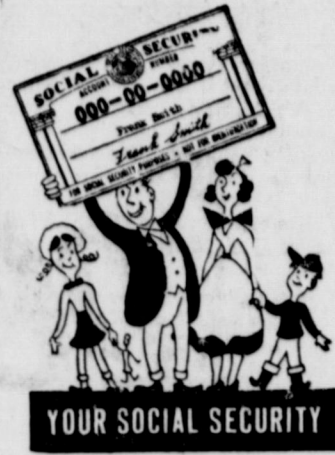

The purpose of your Social Security office is to serve you. Probably the first contact you had with a Social Security officer was when you completed your application for a Social Security number. Most everyone today, when he gets his first job, will need a Social Security card. Applications may be obtained from the Abilene Social Security office or your local postoffice. If you lose your card and need to replace it, or you wish to make a change in your Social Security record—such as your new name when you marry—you can obtain application for this purpose at your Social Security office or local postoffice. The Abilene Social Security office issued 4900 new account number cards in 1957 and replaced 4746 lost cards.

Any time you need information about your Social Security or have any question regarding the Social Security program your Social Security office is the place to get it. Last year we answered an average of 50 letters per week for general and specific information about the Social Security laws.

We answered several thousand verbal inquiries. We distributed over 10,000 booklets and had over 250 radio programs throughout our 16 county territory. We also made several talks to interested groups during the year.

Eventually you or your survivors will be filing a Social Security claim for benefits. In 1957 the Abilene Social Security Office cleared 5890 original claims for Old-Age and Survivor Insurance and 683 recomputation applications were handled. In addition 614 claims for disability insurance payments were processed and 179 requests for disability freeze action were handled.

In addition to the town where this paper is published, we visited on regular visits, ranging from weekly to monthly, 21 other towns throughout the area to handle claims and inquiries. A schedule of such visits is furnished each postmaster in our 16-county district for your guidance in seeing our representative about your social security questions.

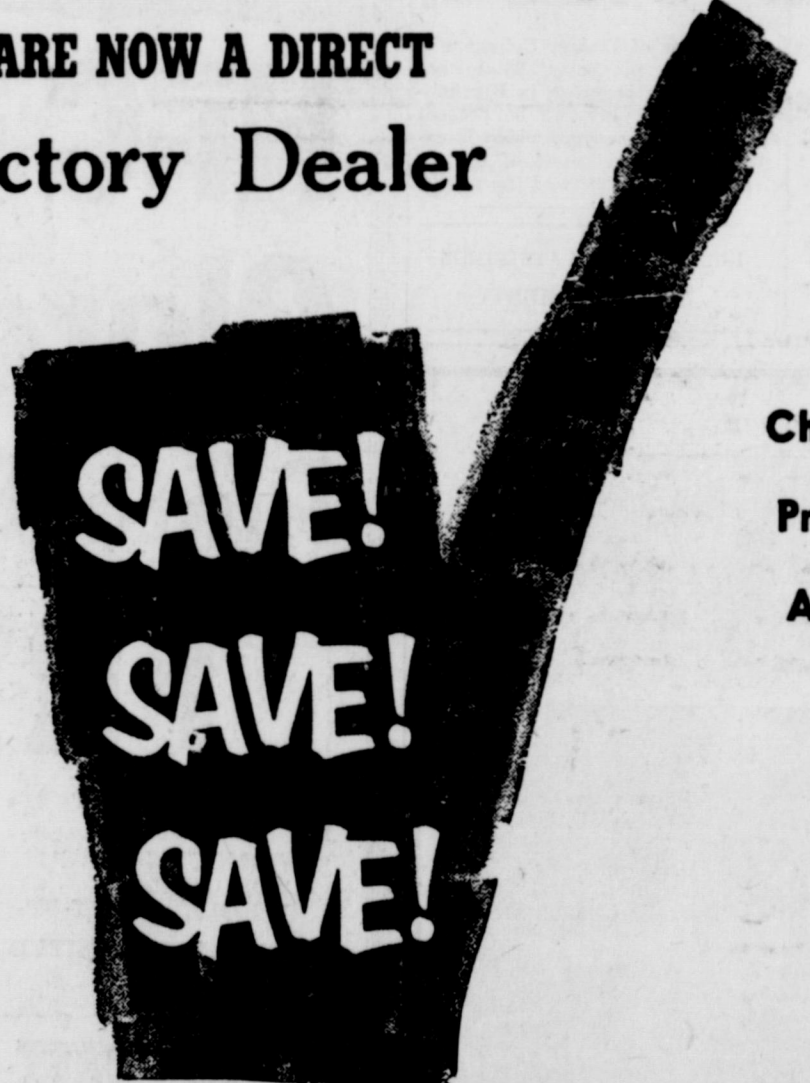

ABOUT YOUR HEALTH



A weekly public service feature from the Texas State Department of Health. HENRY A. HOLLE, M.D., Commissioner

Many Texans like to spend their vacation time with an extended trip to far away places.

There are several risks in travel to strange places, but knowledge teamed with common sense can make your trip both safe and pleasant, provided you take the trouble to follow a few simple rules.

Immunization requirements for foreign travel vary from country to country and should be determined in advance so that you have ample time to receive the pro-

per immunizations.

By all means you should be protected against typhoid, smallpox, and polio. Your family doctor, local director of health or the State Department of Health can advise you on these recommendations.

While it is probably safe to drink water in the big tourists hotels and the big cities everywhere the traveler who gets off the beaten path should, in most areas be careful.

The only safe water should be filtered and treated in an approved manner and approved by the local health department.

Coffee and tea are not necessarily safe because of boiling, and carbonated or noncarbonated soft drinks from unfamiliar sources should be avoided. And don't forget that ice cubes from polluted water can contaminate any drink.

Unless you are sure that the local milk is absolutely safe, and that the custards, ice cream, etc., are made from safe milk, you had better steer clear of them.

There is no rule that cooked food is safe, but you should be especially careful of uncooked foods; refrigeration standards may be poor and especially in sub-tropical climates, foods will spoil quickly. Many local farming habits bring sewage into close contact with vegetables, so eat only fresh vegetables and fruits that you are sure of.

Bathing in salt water is usually safe unless the water is grossly contaminated with sewage. Water infested with dangerous fish, sharks, barracuda, piranha — should of course be avoided.

In some places of the world, blood worms or flukes are prevalent and bathing in fresh water pools or rivers may be dangerous, so seek local advice.

Also, walking barefoot in southern climates where hookworm is prevalent should be avoided. If all this sounds dangerous, perhaps you should see America first.
