Head High Oats Are Credited to Turkeys

Adequate moisture and turkey fertilizer under a two acre patch of oats is expected to result in a bumper hay yield on the small plot on the E. A. Ivey farm north-west of Eastland, according to those who have seen the head high crop.

Ivey, new president of the Central Texas Turkey Growers Association, who raised 9,000 of the big birds last year, 30 pickup loads of the manure on the two acre patch near his house. Without a manure spreader, he spread the material by hand.

In September he seeded the patch with a variety of Illinois white oats. With plenty of rain during the fall, winter and spring the crop grew rapidly. He grazed 12 calves on it from early fall until April 1. His present flock of 1,500 white turkeys have also grazed on the oats near the 100

by 24 building this spring on the Ivey farm located on the Cisco-Breckenridge highway.

According to Ivey, the land has been in cultivation for the past 50 or 60 years. He brought the farm in 1932 but did not move onto it until 1949.

Observers who have inspected the crop believe that he will get over 100 bales per acre on the patch, some say even more. He has contracted with D. J. West, Morton Valley dairyman, to cut and bale the crop.

Ivey believes that more turkey growers could profitably use more of the residue from the birds under hay and grain crops over the area.

500 Scouters Expected At Billy Gibbons

Five hundred Boy Scouts, Explorers and leaders, including several groups from Eastland will camp at Camp Billy Gibbons next month for a week of training in scoutcraft.

Camp Billy Gibbons will open Monday and continue through June 22 and this will be the twenty seventh season. There will be three periods of camping of one week each. The camp is located near Richland Springs in San Saba County on Brady Creek.

Camping activities include instruction and participation in swimming, life saving, boating, canoeing, marksmanship, nature, Indian Lore, handicraft, skills, archery, hiking and horseback riding.

"Stress will be placed on the advancement in rank of each Scout and Explorer and presentation of awards will be held at a camp Court of Honor following the noon meal each Sunday" according to Carl Arnsperger, Chairman of Advancement Committee.

"The Camp Staff is made up of veteran campers who are trained in their phase of the program," stated Lowell Pouncey, Chairman of the Camping and Activities Committee of Comanche Trail Council.

All Scoutmasters are on the staff during the week their Troop is in camp.

Reservations for the Scouts and Explorers to attend camp are being made by Scoutmasters and Explorer Advisors at the Boy Scout Office in Brownwood and it appears there will be a record attendance.

Frank Sayre Is Representative for Foundation

Frank Sayre of Eastland has been named representative for the Eastland division of the Gonzales Warm Springs Rehabilitation Foundation.

The Foundation, which is the Southwest's largest facility for the treatment of the physically handicapped, is a non-profit organization which assures needed care to disabled citizens, regardless of ability to pay. Its welfare program covers all children and a limited number of adults.

As a result of the efficiency of the Salk vaccine, the Foundation now is able to handle disabling conditions such as those caused by ear, nose, and throat infections, strokes, arthritis, cerebral palsy and muscular dystrophy in addition to its polio patients. All of Texas is served with the program.

Sayre, who is employed with the Texas Electric Company, will keep the citizens of that area informed concerning the progress and operation of the Foundation and its program.

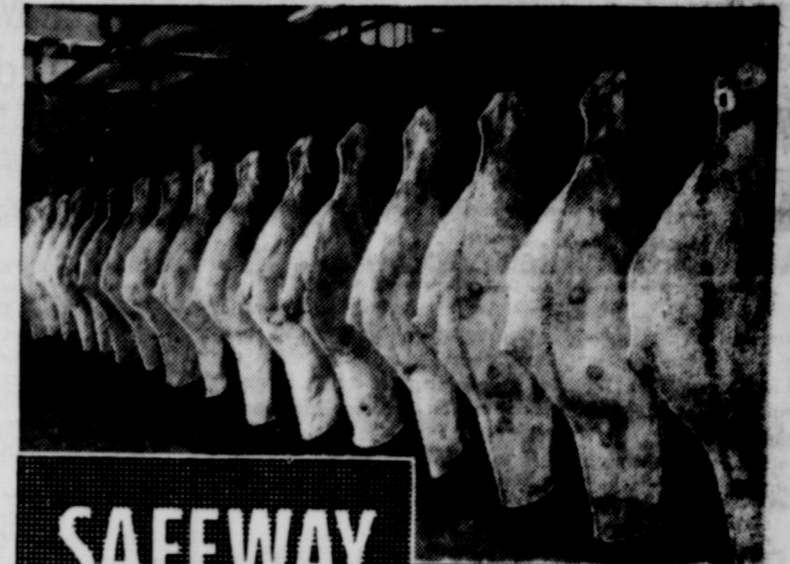

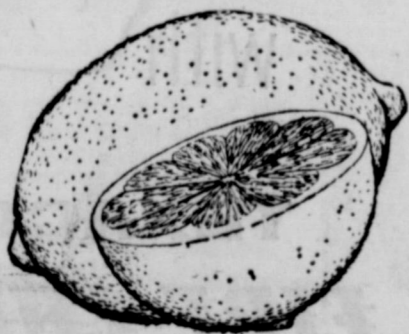

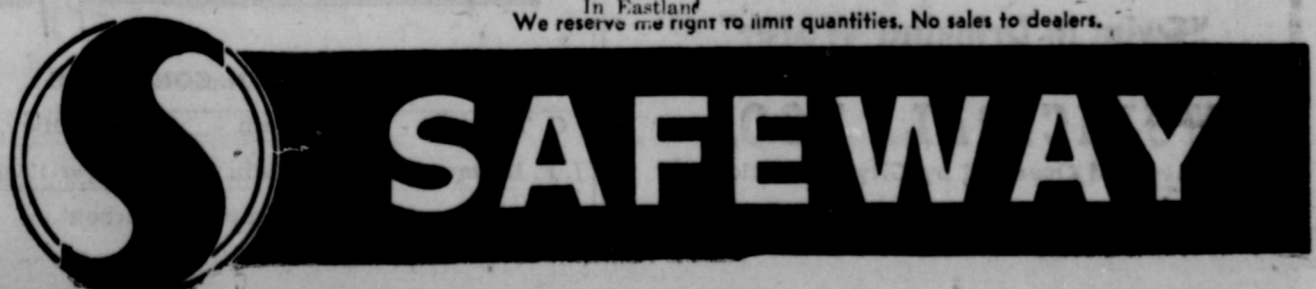
