Demo Primary Set Saturday

Eastland County voters will go to the polls Saturday to vote in the second Democratic primary election, but only in Cisco and Gorman is interest high.

Precinct 2 (Gorman - Carbon) and Precinct 4 (Cisco) voters will elect county commissioners. The only race on the Precinct 1 (Eastland - Ranger - Olden) and Precinct 3 (Rising Star) ballots will be for associate justice of the Supreme Court.

In Precinct 2, B. M. (Froggie) Bennett, the incumbent, is opposed by A. M. Thurman. Bennett lacked just two votes having a clear majority in the first primary, but ended up in a run-off with Thurman.

The Precinct 4 race has Clifford R. Phippen and Garl Lamb in a runoff. They were the top two men in a six-man race in the first primary.

The Supreme Court battle is between Edwin Smith, Houston attorney, and Robert Hamilton, now chief justice of the 8th District Court of Civil Appeals.

In the first primary Hamilton received 476,799 votes to 311,481 for Smith. A third candidate got 303,606 votes, however.

Hamilton, 58, was appointed to the El Paso court in 1953. He was unopposed in 1954 when he ran for a full term. He has based his campaign on the theme that experience on the appeals court is important.

Parents Urged To Register First Graders

Parents of first graders were reminded again today that they must bring birth certificates and proof of small pox vaccination to the school business office by Friday.

No child will be admitted to the first grade here without such proof of age and immunity to small pox. Supt. Wendell Siebert said.

So far, 48 first graders have been registered. Siebert said that he expects some 20 more first graders have yet to register.

"We must have this information to determine where division lines will be," he said.

Eastland Scouts To Attend Swim Meet In Ranger

Boy Scouts and Explorers from seven cities are expected to participate in the annual swim meet of the Northeast District of the Comanche Trail Council to be staged at the City Pool in Ranger, Friday at 7 p.m.

About 10 troops and posts from Ranger, Eastland, Cisco, Carbon, Gorman, Woodson and Breckenridge are expected for the event. They will participate in a general swim before the meet, and some will hold a picnic at Willow's Park.

Contests, directed by H. A. Shockey and Arthur Deffebach of Ranger, will include swim races in two divisions using strokes of back, side, breast and crawl—with one comedy race. Relay races will include all four strokes.

Local troops and posts will compete for ribbon awards to be presented upon completion of the contests. Special recognition will go to the troop and post having the highest percentage of members present.

Dr. E. E. Addy of Cisco and Dr. T. C. Ford of Breckenridge are on the Health and Safety Committee under which the activities are conducted.

Boy Scouts have always stressed water safety in their program. At this time they are engaged in a national safety program to help people to be safety conscious.

In a planning meeting of scout leaders Tuesday night in Ranger details of the swim meet were worked out. Three judges from Ranger were named to assist three out-of-town judges to be selected. Ranger judges are Lee Russell, Boone Yarbrough and Beverly Dudley, Jr.

Events will be judged on the basis of speed. "Duke" Dixon, assistant scout master of Troop 10, will serve as time keeper.

Swim distances, set by the rules, will consist of 75 feet, 150 feet, 300 feet and 600 feet (by relays). Explorers will be required to swim twice the distance of Scouts, competing only with other Explorers.

Super Highway Work To Begin In Month

Work on the first section of the new coast to coast super highway, Interstate 29, which will cut across Eastland County, will begin sometime in September, Gordon Smith, resident highway engineer, declared Thursday.

Smith, in announcing that Collins Construction Co. of Austin was successful low bidder on the 3.7 mile stretch which runs from the East County line to 7.2 miles east of Ranger, said the firm would begin work as soon as possible.

Collins' low bid on the project was \$935,745.75. Bids were opened by the State Highway Department in Austin, Tuesday.

Two interchanges and six bridges will be included in the construction. He said the low bid was lower than anticipated by the Department. He earlier had predicted the work would cost more than a million dollars.

One of the overpasses will be 290 feet long and the other 190 feet long. They will be located at the Highway 16 intersection and the old Tudor Road between Strawn and Deademona.

It is estimated that it will take roughly a year to complete the work (some 275 working days.)

The superhighway will be a four-lane asphalt and concrete expressway. It will be tied into 80 for the present, and will give Eastland County a divided highway from the Earth County line to west of Cisco.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—It is often my feelings that the success of the Congress may be measured by some of the things it does not do, as well as some of the things it does.

Someone suggested a few days ago that the last action of the Congress before adjourning should be a bill repealing all laws passed during the last two weeks of a session.

Legislation is being ground out in the closing days until it is virtually impossible to give proper study to every measure.

However, the congress has just passed a measure which is highly justified. Some may recall that in this column a few weeks ago was discussed the virtual impossibility of deporting aliens who are found to be undesirable, as long as the alien had money and could hire a lawyer to keep his case in the Courts. Many of these cases have been in Court for ten years or more, and the undesirable alien is still here.

The bill passed provides for one appeal from a deportation order direct to the United States Circuit of Appeals, and if the Circuit Court and the Supreme Court uphold the order, the only other action available would be to seek release on a writ of habeas corpus on an issue that could not have been raised at previous hearings.

This measure should prevent the legal merry-go-round by which subversives and criminals with money can bring endless court actions and stave off deportations for years.

Another partially won victory for those of us from oil producing areas is a section in the new Reciprocal Trade Act, giving the Administration a mandate to substantially curb damaging oil imports.

Now that the Congress has acted, the Administration is on trial to carry out in good faith the reduction of foreign oil imports, which has been a factor in the adverse conditions now being experienced by the independent domestic oil industry.

Another prediction made in this column some months ago is, unfortunately, proving true. Inflation is the most serious domestic problem confronting the nation.

The administration is girding itself for a new anti-inflation battle. Its tools will again be tighter money and an effort to cut Federal spending.

On the matter of cutting Federal expenditures, there is agreement on the need, but many doubts about the deed.

Since the congress is adjourning and much of my time will be spent back at home, this column will be discontinued for the remainder of the year.

TALES OF LOST TREASURES IN AND AROUND EASTLAND COUNTY

In his book of the oil-boom days at Ranger, the genial writer Boyce House included on page 93 a concise and vivid paragraph concerning the buried treasure legends of this county and what the people did in an attempt to recover them.

That they succeeded in doing so Mr. House does not say. But then on the other hand, neither does he state that they failed either. It is simply a matter of speculation as to whether the treasures were found or that they still remain hidden in the ground yet awaiting someone's happy discovery.

Down on Nash Creek near Kokomo church are four old Oak trees that bear some mighty strange "markings". After seeing them, a person easily would be led to believe that they were just as bona fide as the old Oaks were themselves! The Oaks are all in a line with one another and the first three unmistakably point out the earth which bears the sign of a eming cross carved in the thick bark. The cross "leans" off to the left and—as do the other markings—points also. Only this time up to another tree but to a particular spot on the ground a few feet away. At this spot can be found a considerably deep hole where somebody apparently has seen digging for treasure or for whatever the cross on the Oak is supposed to denote.

I have in my possession a reproduction of ancient treasure symbols taken originally from old church archives in Mexico. According to this chart, the cross is always to be found directly over the treasure and is to represent nothing else. On the other hand, an arrow's head gives directions "on the way" to a treasure as does also the Bowie knife, a Spanish sword, and a turtle or a terrapin. There are something over 25 different symbols that the Spaniards used in marking treasure sites.

"ORO", a picture of the sun with flashing rays, and the letter "G" all denote that the mineral "Gold" is concealed nearby. A coiled snake ready to strike is also sometimes used to indicate gold at hand. But—whatever the cross on the old Oak tree near Nash Creek is supposed to represent, it surely must be only a short distance

away, for the person, or persons, that are responsible for the cross being there evidently knew what he (or they) were doing and therefore concealed the treasure or whatever it is accordingly.

There are many unanswered mysteries to be found in Eastland County regarding the early pioneers and settlers and many an old landmark can still be viewed throughout its quadrangular boundaries should the desire arise. In the meantime—the four old Oaks with the strange carvings and Nash Creek are but standing pioneer monuments to the passing unheeded generation of today.



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The death of an interstate person (one who has made no will) may give rise to many problems regarding distribution of his separate estate. In the preceding column we investigated the manner of dividing the community estate upon the death of a husband or wife. Now we shall see that, where separate property is involved, a completely different set of rules applies in determining heirship and apportioning the estate among the rightful claimants.

It may be well to recall that the separate estate of a husband or wife includes property owned by either before marriage, and that which is acquired after marriage by gift or inheritance. Any other property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be community property until the contrary is clearly proved.

Now, here is a general idea as to how your separate property will be divided if you do not make a will with provisions prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and if, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of previously deceased children, the children and their descendants immediately obtain a full (fee) title in two-thirds of the real estate involved. The surviving spouse receives a life interest in the remaining one-third of the real property, which passes on to the children and their descendants upon the death of the spouse.

The rule for distributing personal property—cash, stocks, bonds, furniture or any other items not constituting real estate—is different. Here the surviving spouse gets full ownership of one-third, and the children and their descendants inherit the balance.

Now suppose your husband or wife survives, but there are no surviving children or their descendants. In this case the surviving spouse inherits all of the personal property involved.

With regard to real estate, the survivor obtains full title to one-half, and the other half is divided between your mother and father, if both survive you. If only one of them survives, he or she receives only half of his portion, and the other half (or one-fourth of the entire real estate) will be divided among your brothers and sisters (and their descendants) who survive. If there are no surviving brothers and sisters and their descendants, then the one surviving parent inherits the full one-half.

Where no parent survives, but there are brothers and sisters and descendants, the full one-half is divided among those survivors. And, if there are no parents or brothers and sisters (and their descendants) surviving, then the surviving husband or wife inherits all of the real estate.
