

Santa's Visit, Super Specials Are Set For Saturday

Saturday will be "Double S Day" in Eastland. Santa Claus will make his first visit to Eastland at 3 p.m., and on top of that Eastland merchants have set the day aside as Super Specials day.

Santa, in a wire received this week by the Chamber of Commerce, notified local officials that he would be in Eastland with a bag full of candy for local children. He will stop on both the east and west sides of the square to distribute candy to boys and girls who turn out to greet him. An extra large supply of candy will be on hand since a record crowd is expected.

And while Santa will be the number one attraction for the kiddies, Super Specials may attract the adults

in even larger numbers. A two page co-op page is featured in today's Telegram in addition to other Christmas advertising.

City Manager James Young has also announced that there will be free parking in Eastland all day long Saturday. All parking meters will be covered up that day. Employees and owners of stores were urged not to park on the square, however, so that there will be as many parking spaces available as possible.

Most downtown stores have completed their Christmas decorating and others are still in the process. With a record peanut crop already assured, Christmas shopping is expected to be extra heavy this year.

H. J. Tanner, chamber of commerce manager, reminded area shoppers that most Eastland stores are giving away valuable tickets during the Yule season. On Saturday, Dec. 27, \$100 in cash prizes will be given away.

Santa's visit Saturday will be the first of three pre-Christmas stopovers in Eastland. He will return again the following two Saturdays, bringing a sack full of candy each trip.

Downtown Christmas lights were turned on here Thanksgiving night. The special lighting, plus numerous attractive window displays, have attracted window

shoppers at night as well as during the regular shopping hours.

In predicting the best shopping season in eight years, Tanner pointed to healthy crop reports and the number of new businesses which have recently opened here. He said that more than 700 persons registered at the recent opening of Hareluk's department store in one day.

"That should prove that the potential is certainly here this year," he declared.

Eastland stores, which are heavily stocked, are stressing the slogan, "If it is worth buying, you can buy it in Eastland."

Pecan Pick-Up Planned Monday

Pecans will be picked up by J. M. Cooper, county agent, at different places in the county next Monday, for entry in the Sixth Annual Pecan Show to be held in Ranger Dec. 12-13.

According to a letter sent out by Cooper to members of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association, pecans will be picked up according to the following schedule:

In Eastland, entries may be made at Cooper's office on the

second floor of the courthouse. They may be left at the Chamber of Commerce office in Ranger.

A copy of the rules and regulations of the show is enclosed with each letter.

All pecans entered in the Sixth Annual Eastland County Pecan Show at Ranger, Dec. 12-13, must be grown by the person entering them, according to officials.

The show to be held in the Joseph Building is being sponsored by the Ranger Chamber of Commerce and the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association.

Growers of both native seedlings and papershell or improved varieties of one or more trees are invited to exhibit their pecans. A quart of pecans constitute enough for an entry. The owner gets them back at the end of the show unless they win first place in their division, in which case they are sent to the state pecan show held each year at Texas A & M.

Entries are accepted not only from Eastland County but from adjoining counties. The grand champion entry at the 1957 show was of the Mahan variety. It was entered by a grower near DeLeon and it was the first time an entry of Mahans had won the grand championship.

Entries are accepted in the show as late as 9 a.m. Saturday, Dec. 13th, the day they are judged by a team of horticulturists from Texas A & M College. They must remain in the show until 4 p.m. that date.

Many people have found out the true name of their papershell pecans by entering them in the show, according to Oscar Schaefer, Cook community, president of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association.

Pecan cakes, pies, cookies and candy in the bake division will be under the supervision of the County Home Demonstration Council.

Pecan Show to Feature Bake Contest Again

The Eastland County Home Demonstration Council will sponsor a Pecan Bake Show in connection with the annual Pecan Show to be held Dec. 12-13 in the Joseph Building at Ranger.

Rules for the Bake Show, as given by Sandra Kirkland, county home demonstration agent, are:

1. There shall be five divisions of products with a requirement for each:
 - a. Pies—must enter one whole pie.
 - b. Cakes—must enter one whole cake.
 - c. Candy—must enter at least 5 pieces.
 - d. Cookies—must enter at least 5 cookies.
 - e. Nut Bread—must enter one whole loaf.
2. All entries must contain pecans.
3. Anyone, man or woman, from this county or adjoining county may enter products in the show.
4. All entries must be entered in place by 11 a.m. when the judging will begin (Dec. 12).
5. Judges will be trained home economists.
6. Score cards will be used to judge entries in all 5 divisions and cash prizes and ribbons awarded according to score.
7. A grand prize will be given in the cake division.
8. Each entry becomes the property of the bake show to be sold and the proceeds will go to the H. D. Council.

Products should be brought on disposable plates.

In addition to the Bake Show, the council will sell coffee, pie and sandwiches during the two-day show. The public is invited to enter and view the pecan bake show.

Mavs Down Comanche by Big Count; Girls Lose

Eastland basketball teams won two out of three games against Comanche teams here Tuesday night in the initial home games for the Mavs, Mavettes and B team.

The Mavericks, stopped by Comanche in their first opening a week ago after only two days of practice, won easily this time by a 58-41 margin. The Eastland girls dropped a close one, 25-31, and the May B team edged past the visitors 25-23 in two overtime periods.

Showing great teamwork, the Mavs held the favored Comanche Indians to just eight field goals in the entire game. Had it not been for 25 free shots capitalized on by the visitors, the game would have been a complete runaway.

In the last two quarters of the game, Comanche got only two field goals as the Mavs pumped the baskets full.

Eastland got just 12 points on gratis throws, with Clint Humphreys getting nine of them. Larry Wells was high scorer with 25 points with 12 fieldgoals and one free throw, and Humphreys was next with 17. Otis Green got eight points, Don Hull had four and Stanley Reed and Phil Lewis each had two.

Green played the second half with four fouls on him and Lewis had three. Lewis was the only loss during the game via fouls, however. Green and Lewis teamed together to completely control the Comanche backboard and the Indians had to hit on their first try or forget it.

Comanche couldn't shake off the Mavs' tough man-to-man defense and did most of their shooting from far out court. The Mavs, on the other hand, worked the ball in good.

One of the surprises of the game was the fine play turned in by Hull. Coming into the game in the third quarter when Lewis fouled out, Hull played excellent ball. Also seeing action for Eastland were David Whitten, Mickey Garner and Roger Taylor. Comanche led only in the opening minutes of the game, building up a 9-3 margin before Eastland tightened up.

The Eastland girls had the same trouble Comanche's boys did. The Mavettes couldn't get a rebound off their own backboard.

Eastland led at halftime, but a third quarter spurt gave the visitors a lead which was never overcome. The Mavettes did manage to trim the lead to two points in the final stanza, but couldn't pull it out of the fire.

Standouts on offense for Eastland were Yvonne Green, Jackie Baggett and Patsy Hollis. Defensive standouts were Judy Inzer, Judy McMillan and Beverly Moore.

After ending up in a 21-21 deadlock at the end of regulation play, the two B teams had 23-23 at the end of the first extra period. Mickey Garner rang in a field goal in the last overtime to give Eastland the win.

Pat Murphy Services Are Held Thursday

Funeral services were held at 1:30 p.m. today in the Hamner Funeral Home Chapel for Pat Murphy who died Tuesday night in Veterans Hospital in Dallas.

Mr. Murphy was a pioneer bus line operator. He founded the first bus line ever to serve the Stamford-Lubbock areas in 1924 and operated it for 20 years.

In his younger life Mr. Murphy had been an outstanding baseball player, having signed a major league contract at one time. During service with the Army in World War I he was injured and his injury cut short his baseball career.

He was born April 25, 1886 in Atlanta, Ga. and was past commander of the Eastland American Legion and a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. Mr. Murphy was a member of the First Christian Church and active in the Men's Fellowship Bible Class.

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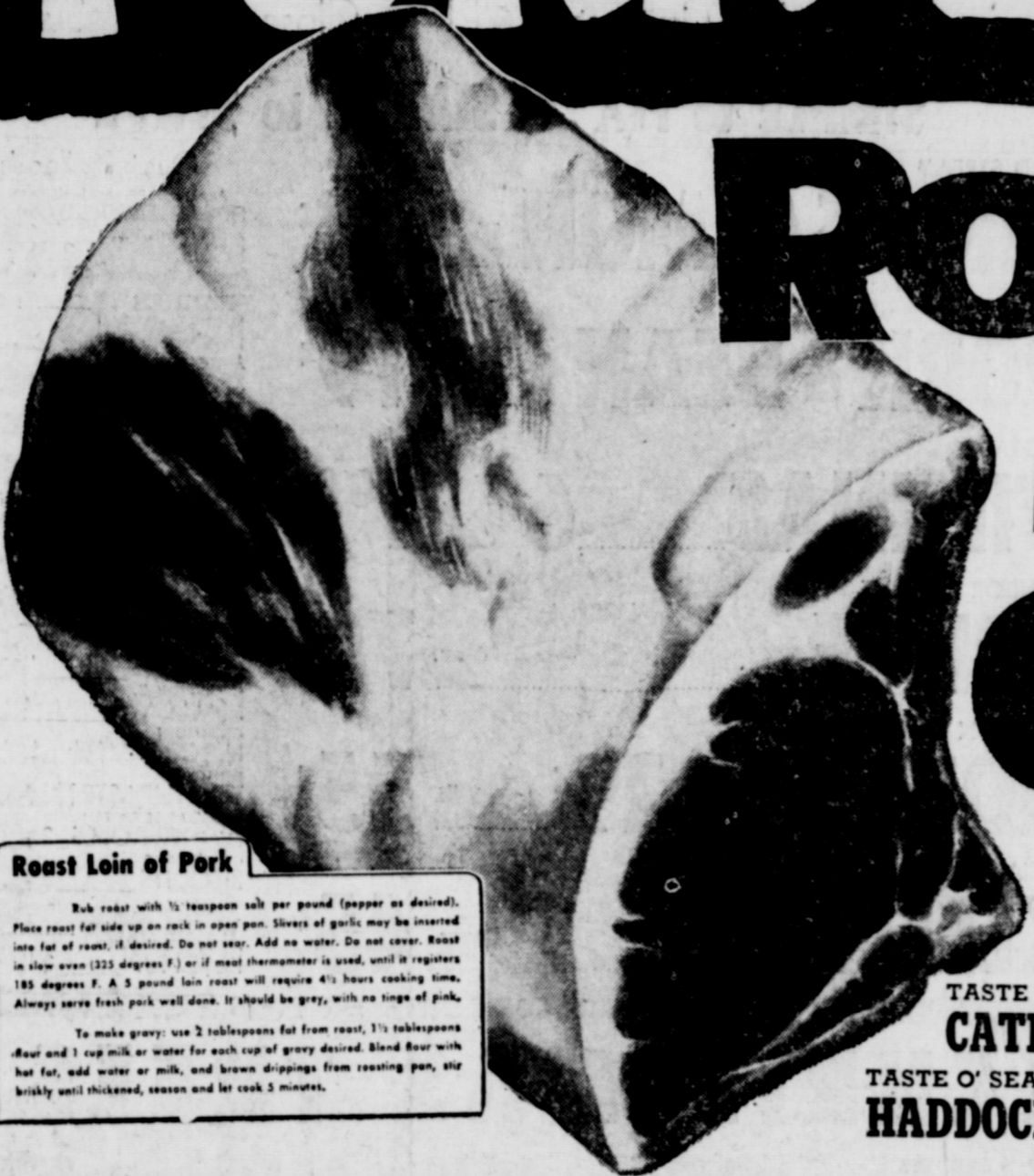

Roast Loin of Pork
 Rub roast with 1/2 teaspoon salt per pound (pepper as desired). Place roast fat side up on rack in open pan. Slivers of garlic may be inserted into fat of roast, if desired. Do not seal. Add no water. Do not cover. Roast in slow oven (325 degrees F.) or if meat thermometer is used, until it registers 185 degrees F. A 5 pound loin roast will require 4 1/2 hours cooking time. Always serve fresh pork well done. It should be gray, with no tinge of pink.
 To make gravy: use 2 tablespoons fat from roast, 1 1/2 tablespoons flour and 1 cup milk or water for each cup of gravy desired. Blend flour with hot fat, add water or milk, and brown drippings from roasting pan, stir briskly until thickened, season and let cook 5 minutes.

Letters To Editor

Carbon, Texas

 Dear Editor,
 Your issue of the Eastland Telegram, dated Nov. 30 carried articles on the phone system titled "Our County Needs One Phone System" and "How Do You Stand on New Phone System?"

First, let me say I agree our county needs one phone system. But according to the 1958-59 issue of the Texas Almanac, Eastland County has 955 square miles and the towns certainly include Eastland, Ranger and Cisco, but it also lists Gorman and Rising Star in the major towns, then if you take a few minutes and look at the map it shows Desdemona, Pioneer, Olden and Carbon, plus other small communities. These are very longtime populated places that deserve more, at least as much, consideration as does Lake Leon as far as efficient phone service is concerned.

Now, I do not live in any of these towns, but on a farm, and we pay taxes yearly on our land. I have and my husband has been to the Eastland telephone office a number of times trying to get a telephone and they tell us, "You aren't in our district, where do you live?" So I point out our place and they say their district only goes to the northeast corner of our place, therefore we cannot get a phone out there. Now we ask, who sets up these phone districts? As yet they have not answered this question. Perhaps if I can get this in print we can get an answer.

No, we don't want a phone just to have one. We have a reason very near and dear to us. One of our sons is a physically handicapped

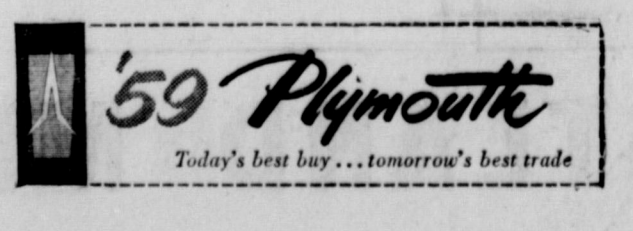
