

Protection Is Must For Soil, **Experts Declare**

(Editor's Note: The following article was prepared by the Upper Leon Soil Conservation Work Unit).

Productive soil cannot exist for ong without protection. Uncover soil and the wind and rain will blow or wash it away. Keep it covered and there is less soil loss and less loss of the moisture in it. Small grain straw left on the land is a natural soil mulch which can do much to keep the earth cool and save moisture.

Proper management of small grain residue is one of our most important conservation practices. The present summer season is a critical period in the management of stubble mulches. 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


