Boyce House was back in his old stomping grounds Tuesday, and in the course of our conversation with him things got around to Ralph Yarborough.

Boyce, you may, or may not know, was Yarborough's publicity director when the junior senator from Texas first ran for a statewide office. Yarborough was successful in winning the attorney general's post in that campaign. (Believe Boyce said that was in 1938).

The time came to do some campaigning in Eastland County, and that night Boyce and Ralph went into a Ranger hotel. They were greeted with big smiles and ushered to their rooms. Later Yarborough came into House's room. "They didn't give me a room, Boyce, they gave me the royal suite," he told his publicity man. Boyce explained that Ranger was a good town and that they were just paying honor to Ralph since he was a candidate for an important office.

Later when Boyce left his room to go out and see some old friends, he left his key at the desk. When he returned he asked for his key. The manager was on duty, and he looked at Boyce with surprise.

"Why, Mr. House, you have your key," he said.

"No," Boyce explained, "there it is on the board, number 214." The manager again gave Boyce a strange look and said, "That's the man's key who is with you. We wanted you to have the suite."

"I couldn't help but tell Ralph about what had happened," House recalled. "As we were driving out of Ranger the next day I did. He got a night good laugh out of that, and so did I. Imagine the candidate's publicity man getting the royal treatment instead of the politician. Of course, I had worked in Ranger and had written a book about the town and was something of a hero there."

With Boyce House on our mind, this is as good a time as any to tell the story Clyde Garrett once told us about House.

Garrett was judge when the Santa Claus bank robbery was hung on a utility pole next to the jail. He didn't know anything about the hanging, however, until after the man was dead. When he heard about it he went to the scene, and decided that the dead man's body should be cut down from the pole. Judge Garrett climbed out a box and told the crowd that it was time to take down the body.

The next day, in the Eastland paper, Boyce carried a story quoting Judge Garrett as saying, "Well, let's cut down the body men, We've done all we can."

Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Williams, formerly of Morton Valley Olden, respectively, and now both teachers at Andrews, wrote to say they are really having a time on their tour of the nation with other graduate students at Sul Ross College.

"We were invited to the U. S. capitol this morning for a visit with Sen. Lyndon Johnson, who received us very warmly. Then Sen. Ralph Yarborough took us over and escorted us through the vice president's office and the President's room," they wrote. The group ended up having their picture taken with just about everyone in Washington.

Met Mr. and Mrs. John Merritt for the first time the other night. John is new lab technician at the Eastland M&S Clinic. The Merritts are certainly a fine young couple, and you will want to meet them.

Protection Is Must For Soil, Experts Declare

(Editor's Note: The following article was prepared by the Upper Leon Soil Conservation Work Unit).

Productive soil cannot exist for long without protection. Uncover soil and the wind and rain will blow or wash it away. Keep it covered and there is less soil loss and less loss of the moisture in it. Small grain straw left on the land is a natural soil mulch which can do much to keep the earth cool and save moisture.

Proper management of small grain residue is one of our most important conservation practices. The present summer season is a critical period in the management of stubble mulches. Benefit to the land from straw or other plant residue is in proportion to the amount of residue left on the surface in tillage operations. Any tillage method in preparing a seed bed for fall sowing that leaves the residue on or at least near the surface will give the best protection to the soil. Best jobs are usually done with chisel or sweep type implements. However good work is often done with disc implements provided the discs are run at the correct angle to not turn the soil excessively and cover too much residue.

An important factor in stubble management of course is in the management of grazing in order to leave sufficient residue for soil protection. In addition protection of stubble from fire can be awfully important.

Chief benefits from stubble mulches is in the role of the mulch serving as a cover to the land. Cover serves to reduce raindrop impact.

County Highway Projects Progress

Construction on highway projects in the county are progressing, according to various reports.

Work on the Caddo Road, FM 717, north of Ranger, is progressing as workmen are straightening the route, widening the highway, and making general improvements. Construction on the road has been in progress for some time.

Work on the Desdemona-Gorman highway is well under way, and a bridge about two miles from Gorman has been replaced with a larger span.

Changes are also being made on bridges over the Leon River, and dirt has been filled in where the dip was located. A new channel has been dug for the river, so that water can drain faster.

Progress is also being made on the Duster - Gorman Farm-to-Market Road, with a base being laid at the rate of about one-half mile per day. The base has been completed from Duster to the Sabanna River bridge, and it is now being laid from Gorman to the river bridge.

Work on the Sabanna River Bridge is about three-fourths completed. Contract for construction of 3.7 miles of Interstate 20, beginning about seven and one-half miles east of Ranger and extending to the Erath County line, will be let in Austin on Aug. 19.

Rising Star city officials met with members of the State Highway Dept. Monday to confer on the problem of keeping State Highway 36 running through the business district.

County Girls To Compete for Queen in Contest

Nominees from throughout Eastland County will vie for the title of "1958 Eastland County Farm Bureau Queen" at the annual beauty contest to be held in conjunction with a barbecue in Eastland City Park on Monday, Aug. 25.

Any single daughter or sister of a Farm Bureau member in the county, between the ages of 16 and 22 years old, is eligible to participate.

Winner of the county title will compete with the 12 other winners for the District 7 title, to be bestowed the first week in September. All district winners will compete in the state elimination contest at Corpus Christi.

The state queen will be crowned at the state convention, in Corpus Christi, beginning Nov. 9. Charlotte Hilley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Boyd Hilley of Gorman, was county queen last year.

A committee to nominate a campaign chairman to conduct Eastland's United Fund Drive in October was appointed by Larry Kinard, president.

Members of the committee consist of Bob Perkins, chairman; David Fry, Harold Reese, Virgil Seaberry, Jr., and Wendell Siebert.

After the committee nominates a chairman, they will in turn present the name to the board of directors for approval. The chairman will, then, select seven or more to assist in the drive.

A Donkey Ball Game is scheduled between business men of Eastland and workers of Little League and Teen-Age League at Fireman's Field next Thursday night at 8.

Donkeys for the event are being furnished by Cliff Dunham of Crescent, Okla.

Funds will benefit Eastland's Teen-Age and Little Leagues. Admission has been set at 25 cents for children of school age and 50 cents for adults. Children under school age will be admitted free.

Convention Story Is Biased, Says Reader

Billy C. Frost, prominent Eastland attorney, in a letter to the editor of the Telegram, has charged that the Telegram's account of the Democratic County convention which was held last Saturday, was biased.

Printed below is Frost's letter to Virgil E. Moore, Telegram editor, and Moore's reply:

Your article in yesterday's paper concerning the Eastland County Democratic Convention was very interesting, though pointedly biased. It has traditionally been the duty of a newspaper to report the news as it occurs, without giving the reader the benefit of the opinions of the editor. Opinions are traditionally relegated to the editorial page.

It seems to be your idea as expressed in your front-page article that the conservatives rigged the convention. It is a requisite to any successful venture, whether financial, social, political or religious, that such venture have advanced preparations. Those who are interested in succeeding must take the time to succeed. The reason the so-called conservatives have controlled the County Convention for many years is because they believe sufficiently in their cause to make the effort to get their ideas over. Your liberals evidently have no such belief in their cause. Whether conservative or liberal, if there are any such animals, the citizen has the obligation to support the mechanics of his government. Eastland High School football coaches are attending the annual Coaches Clinic this week in Houston, but when they return they will probably bring a catching disease back with them: Footballitis.

Coach Carrol Shelton, before pulling out for Houston, announced he would start initial drills at E.H.S. Monday, Aug. 25.

Eastland this year faces what is probably the roughest schedule ever marked up against a Maverick team. The locals advance into Class 7-AA play this year, and on top of that, have an extra hard non-district slate.

The Mavs beat Ranger, last year's 7-AA champions, in a non-district game in 1957, but the going looks rough this year.

The Mavs lost 11 key boys through graduation last year, but that was to be expected. What was not expected was the fact that several other outstanding gridsters will be in school here this September.

Lost through graduation were such stalwarts as Saul Pullman, Johnny McMahon, Kenneth Watson, Fred Tucker, Charles Thompson, Bill Norwood, Hampton Stamer, Ronald Robertson, Henry Van Geem, Leo Murray and Juan Jay Smith.

On top of that, however, the Mavs lost 210 pound tackle Wayne Dodson, a sophomore sensation, who moved to West Texas. Then Guard Larry Alldredge joined the Armed Services and Joe Martin moved to Cisco.

All doesn't look bad, however. Three outstanding players from last year's team have been named tri-captains, and they are expected to lead the Mavericks. Halfback Larry Hollis, Quarterback Clint Humphrey and Guard Knicker Arthur are all highly respected backs.

Among other players from last year's squad who will be back are Phil Turner, Stanley Reed, Mike Manning, Phillip Lewis, Truman Lane, Marvin Aasow, Mike Lisenbee, Freddie Miller and Gary Lusk.

Another good factor is that the

Mavs will have more leadership in the form of an extra coach. Besides Shelton and Jon Tate, line coach last season, the Mavs will get some able guidance from Bennett Kagdale, the new assistant.

Social Security In County Shows Jump

Ninety-five thousand dollars in social security benefits were paid to some 2043 persons in Eastland County during the month of December, 1947, according to official figures just received by R. R. Tuley Jr., district manager for the Social Security Administration in Abilene.

This represents an increase of some 30-35 per cent over comparable figures for December, 1956, he added.

These payments went to retired men and women past retirement age (62 for women, 65 for men), to severely disabled persons past age 50, to wives and dependent husbands of retired persons, to children of retired or deceased parents (either under 18 or disabled since before age 18), to widows, dependent widowers, and dependent parents (if no spouse or child eligible for payment).

Tuley urged all persons past retirement age to contact a representative of the Abilene social security office as soon as possible, if they have had as much as two or three years of social security credits on their past and present earnings, to avoid possible loss of benefits through a misunderstanding of what is meant by "retirement." Too, upon the death of anyone holding a social security card, inquiry should be made regarding the possibility of survivor benefits due some members of the family. Delays in making inquiries can result in the loss of some benefits.

The figures of Eastland County are further broken down by benefit category in the following table:

Ever since World War I, Red Cross has been alert to the needs of ex-servicemen and women. An experienced field staff assigned to Veterans Administration offices assists chapter Home Service in handling individual applications for government benefits. These field directors also represent the veteran before Veterans Administration rating and appeal boards and military review boards.

Services to veterans include counseling, interpretation of laws affecting veterans' benefits, and assistance in preparing claims for government benefits. Changes in federal and state legislation during the past year affected benefits available for many veterans with service-connected disabilities and dependents for deceased veterans. The Red Cross sees that emergency financial needs are met pending decisions on government benefits.

An average of 13,000 veterans were assisted each month last year in making application for government benefits and in gathering evidence needed to support their claims.

Locally, in the year ending June 30, 1958, the Red Cross assisted 513 families with emergency financial help, preparing welfare reports, making affidavits, assisting in claims work, and giving emergency medical care. Such services are available and free to all veterans, to their families, and to the dependents of deceased veterans.

Help to keep these Red Cross services available to the veteran by supporting Eastland's United Fund drive this fall.

Six County 4-H Club Camp to Open Wednesday

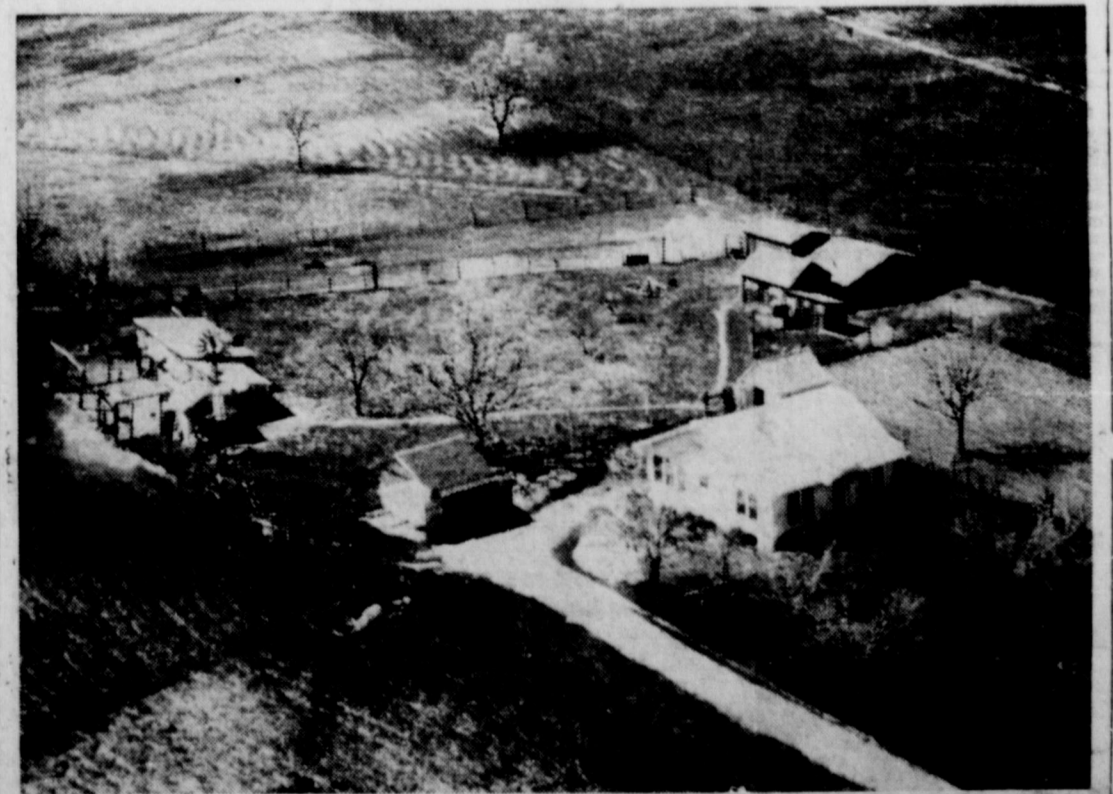

Chipped Beef and Kidney Bean Burgers
2 jars (2 1/2 ounces each) chipped beef
1 can (16 ounces) kidney beans, drained

3 tablespoons finely chopped onion
1/2 cup sweet pickle relish
2 teaspoons prepared mustard
1/2 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing
4 hamburger buns
1/2 cup grated cheddar cheese

Cut chipped beef into thin strips with scissors. Combine beef, kidney beans, onion, pickle relish, mustard and mayonnaise or salad dressing. Split buns in half and toast cut side. Spread beef mixture on toasted bun halves. Sprinkle grated cheese over top. Place on broiler rack and insert broiler pan so that the top of buns is 4 inches from heat. Broil 4 to 5 minutes or until cheese is melted and lightly browned. Yield: 8 sandwiches.

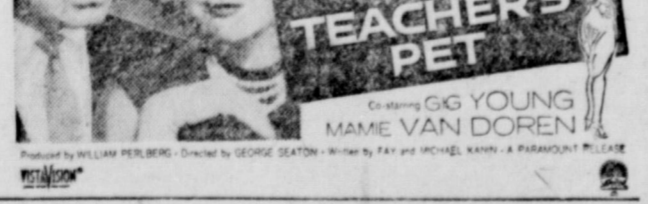

Rising Star Rites Set for N. B. Montgomery

Funeral services for N. B. (Newt) Montgomery, 61, who died of self-inflicted gunshot wounds Thursday at 11 a.m. in the Higginbotham Funeral Home Chapel in Rising Star with the Rev. Hershel Smith officiating. Burial will be in the Rising Star Cemetery. Montgomery was found at his farm home, two and one-half miles south of Rising Star, with a 12-gauge shotgun beside his body. Sheriff Ray Masters of Brown County investigated the shooting. An attending physician said Montgomery died instantly from a wound in the neck. Mrs. Montgomery said they got up about 5:30 a.m. Thursday, and while she was making the bed, she heard her husband go out the back door. She heard a blast and ran outside to find him lying beside the house. Mr. and Mrs. Montgomery were employed at Girl's Town, at Whiteface, until three weeks ago when they returned to their farm. Survivors include his wife; two brothers, H. B. Montgomery of Olden and L. M. Montgomery of Chandler, Ariz.; and one sister, Mrs. Alta Scott of Lamesa, Calif.

Milk Program Now Revised, Ready to Operate

COLLEGE STATION—The special milk program, recently revised and extended by Congress for three years, is ready to operate under the new regulations in Texas. Any organization may participate if it sponsors non-profit activity for care and training of children and submits a positive plan to encourage increased consumption of milk by children in its care. The program includes children of high school age or under.
