Then there are four precincts in towns which have another voting box (Eastland, Ranger, Cisco and Rising Star). We personally think that if the smaller precincts have to give up their boxes the four towns should be limited to one box each. And let's face it; the cost of running for office is too high when some of the votes cost candidates from \$5 to \$10 each.

On the humorous side of the question, did you realize that if the second primary is used as a measuring stick, Eastland would lose both of its voting boxes since neither cast 50 votes? So would Ranger and Rising Star. Desdemona, out voted everyone of these towns by as much as 10 to 1.

COURT TO MEET AGAIN THIS WEEK

Abolishment of Smaller Precincts Is Undecided

Talk on the serious vein Tuesday afternoon when members of the Eastland County Commissioners Court met with the County Democratic Executive Committee. The subject: Abolishing some of the county's 25 voting precincts.

No actual steps were taken by the Commissioners Court to abolish any of the precincts, however, since Commissioner Bob Carter of Rising Star was not present. Carter recently underwent surgery and was not able to attend the meeting. County Judge John Hart said he would call a meeting later this week, saying he expected Carter would be able to attend by that time. If any of the precincts are to be abolished before the next Democratic primary (July, 1960) such action must be taken by the Court in August, according to State Law.

Commissioners were acting on a resolution passed by the County Democratic Convention calling for the abolishment of all precincts which cast less than 50 votes. No certain election was named in the resolution, but County Chairman J. Blevins used the first primary election in quoting figures to the Court.

Talk did not center around merely the smaller precincts in the county when election precinct judges met with the Court though. It was suggested that it is no necessary for Eastland, Ranger, Cisco and Rising Star to each have two voting precincts.

Blevins started things off by again expressing his belief that the price of running for public office in Eastland County has almost become "prohibitive." He said most people in smaller communities come to town on election day anyway.

Henry Collins of Carbon then said he could see no need for two voting precincts in the four towns which now have them. He said one precinct would be enough for any of the towns.

Dothan was heard from next. D. L. Dunaway said his community was in favor of doing away with its voting box.

J. E. McCannles, Cisco commissioner, said he had been informed Pleasant Hill was "agreeable" to such a move. Then the opposition

began. Arthur Bailey of Scranton said that community wants to hold its box and representatives of Pioneer, Alameda and Long Branch voiced the same opinion. W. E. Lusk of Sabanno said he

believed those that vote would go somewhere else to vote anyway, and that those who don't vote wouldn't exercise their right no matter where the polling place is. Commissioner McCannles said he believed that the Court should consider how good the roads were from the smaller precincts to the larger ones.

L. E. Clark of Desdemona said his precinct wouldn't be effected by the 50-vote rule and that he did not want to express his opinion. He said, however, that he felt election costs were too high, and he added that too much help is one of the reasons. He said some precincts have "almost as many election judges as they do voters."

Mrs. John Love of Alameda said that country people just do not go to town on Saturdays the way they used to. "We don't want to lose our votes," she said.

Commissioner B. M. Bennet of Gorman told other members of the Court that he had been told by citizens of Staff that they would like to do away with their precinct.

Under the 50-vote ruling, here are the precincts which would be abolished, Alameda, Kokomo, Long Branch, Okra, Scranton, Nimrod, Dothan, Rommey, Pleasant Hill, Staff, Cook and Sabanno.

That would leave the two precincts in Eastland, two in Ranger, two in Rising Star, two in Cisco, and one each in Carbon, Gorman, O'den and Desdemona.

This Summer Is Second Wettest In 47 Years

Eastland County farmers are wearing big grins again after good rains in the past few days have made the crop outlook in this area glittering.

July and August have already been two months which have caused Eastland County farmers to fail to make good peanut crops. It just doesn't rain much in those two hot summer months, Bureau records prove.

For instance, during 1957, the wettest year on record since 1911 when records were started, only 7.5 on an inch fell in July and just .41 was recorded in August. In July of this year a total of 5.12 inches fell and so far this month 3.31 inches has been recorded. Average rainfall in July is just 1.74 inches and the August average is just 1.77.

With three days left in August, this summer (June, July and August) is already the second wettest summer in the 47 years records have been kept. A total of 12.75 inches of rain has fallen during the three-month period. That's more than six inches above normal. The only year to exceed this summer was 1940 when a total of

13.54 inches fell. Actually, even that year could not be classed as inches of that amount fell in June alone.

Despite good sub-moisture, peanut farmers in the county were crying last week until the drenching rains came. Some areas reported as much as four inches in three days, but some got as little as .50. It was a general rainfall, however, and everyone benefited.

Almost as beneficial as the rain was the comparative cool days which followed. The mercury dropped from the 102 mark to the low 90's and upper 80's.

Improved Facilities Await College Pupils For New School Year

Beginning with the registration of students at Ranger College, Sept. 15-16, the thirty-third annual session of the college will get underway.
For one-third of a century now, the college has provided educational opportunities for the young people of Central and West Texas.
Dr. Price Ashton begins his sixth year as president of this fast-growing institution of higher learning. This school year will get under way with greatly improved facilities. Attractive and modern dormitories for men and women boarding students, a modern cafeteria, and paved streets will contribute much toward making life on the campus more enjoyable.
Improved standards and a faculty intent on demanding constant improvements in the quality of work have done much to make an enviable reputation for the local college.
B. W. Musgrave, executive director of council for Public Junior Colleges, predicts a 10 to 15 per cent enrollment increase for the thirty-one state-aid junior colleges this fall. Last year's enrollment showed a slight decline over the previous year, but the dip is considered only a temporary one. Many part-time students exhausted their war veteran benefits last year, but the number of full-time students increased.
Musgrave credits the expected

increase to the high birth rate during World War II plus a rising interest in college education.
Thirty-one public junior colleges receive aid from the state of \$230 each, for the first 350 students and \$175 for each additional enrollment. In typical districts this represents about one third of the total cost. Local taxes pay for another third, and tuition pays for the remaining third.
Ranger is the smallest town to have a junior college, yet it receives the least local support of the thirty-one colleges and it ranks tenth in size.
Other colleges are located in Houston, Wichita Falls, Alvin, Amarillo, Brenham, Cisco, Clarendon, Corpus Christi, Borger, Gainesville, Athens, Big Springs, Kilgore, Baytown, Corsicana, Odessa, Edenburg, Carthage, Paris, San Angelo, San Antonio, Uvalde, Temple, Texarkana, Brownsville, Tyler, Victoria, Weatherford, and Wharton.
Tuition is only \$50 per semester at Ranger College. Meals in the cafeteria run \$40 per month, and dormitory room rent for \$12.50 per month. Books and personal expenses are the only additional charges.
With the cost of an education so little, and the benefits so great—it is little doubt that the students of this area feel they can afford to take advantage of this wonderful opportunity.
Ranger College graduates speak for themselves. Their success stories fill the pages of Texas newspapers. A good start at Ranger College assures their success on the four-year college campus of their choice.
