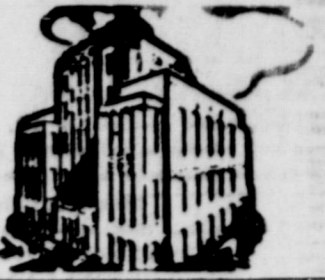

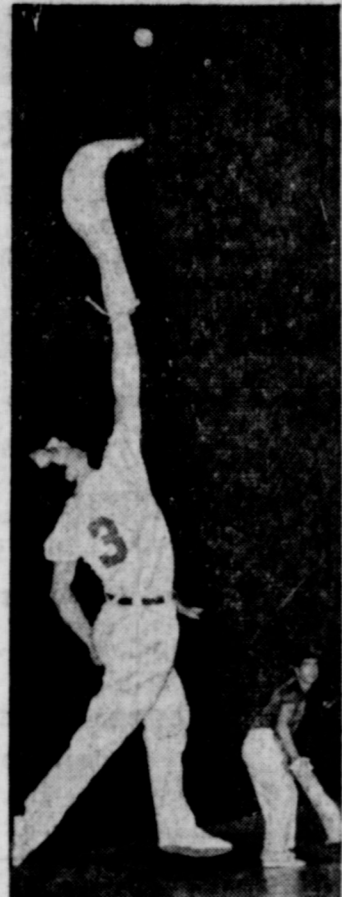
We sure would hate to pay a quarter every time we break a traffic law during a 12 month period. In fact, if we did, laws wouldn't be the only thing we would break.

Wilson Favors House Bill to Advertise Peanuts

Ross Wilson of Gorman, manager of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Assn., appeared before the House Agriculture Committee in Austin Wednesday in behalf of House Bill 174 which would allow peanut farmers to be assessed \$1 per ton to support a program of research education and promotion for Texas peanuts.

The bill was introduced by Rep. Ben Suddeth of Gustine. Wilson said the program is needed to match large promotional efforts by other Southern states.

The bill went into a subcommittee following the hearing. Also appearing before the committee in favor of the proposal was Agricultural Commissioner John White. White said Texas is "a pretty bad shape in the national markets... because the folks in other states are outselling us."

Three Members Of School Board Seek Re-Election

Three members of the Eastland Independent School District Board of Directors, whose terms of office end this year, have filed for re-election.

Seeking re-election to three year terms are M. H. Perry, H. L. King and H. T. Weaver. Perry is recently serving as president of the Board.

The School Board election has been set for April 4. The only voting place will be the courthouse. Deadline for filing in the election is 5 p.m., March 4. Filing can be done in the school business office.

Roger Jackson Buried Tuesday In Eastland

Graveside rites were held Tuesday afternoon for Roger Q. Jackson Sr., a former Eastland resident, at Eastland Cemetery.

Mr. Jackson, a retired carpenter, died Sunday in a Fort Worth hospital. He was 77. He had been a resident of Eastland since 1918, until moving to Fort Worth about five years ago. He was born Sept. 25, 1881 in Madisonville.

Rev. George E. Crittenden Jr., pastor of the Temple Baptist Church of Fort Worth, of which Mr. Jackson was a member, officiated at the service.

Survivors include two sons, R. A. and R. Q. Jr., both of Fort Worth two daughters, Mrs. R. G. Slaughter of Fort Worth, and Mrs. A. N. Crowson of Monohans; 13 grandchildren, and nine great grandchildren.

Garrett Named Commander of Barracks 1494

H. R. (Pop) Garrett was recently elected Commander of Barracks No. 1494 of Veterans of World War I.

Garrett said the purpose of this organization is: "To coordinate veterans of World War I into an organization for their mutual benefit, pleasure and amusement, giving them the opportunity and means of personal contact with each other in order to keep alive friendships and memories of World War I. To cooperate fully and in a harmonious manner with all veterans' organizations to the end that the best interests of all veterans of all wars in which the United States of America has participated, and the widows and orphans of such deceased veterans, be served.

"To stimulate communities and political subdivisions into taking more interest in veterans of World War I and the widows and orphans of such deceased veterans, as well as the problems of such veterans and the widows and orphans of such deceased veterans. To uphold the Constitution and laws of the United States, as well as the individual states of the Union.

"To fight for our national security in order to protect Americans from enemies within our borders, as well as those from without, to the end that our American way of life be preserved.

"To fight to the last ditch all alien forces, particularly and specifically Communists whose objectives are to deny our very existence as a free people. To secure for veterans of World War I the same policy of treatment by our Government, both federal and state, that was accorded to the Civil War and Spanish - American War veterans, which they, through patriotic service and sacrifice to their country in its time of need, have earned and to which they are justly entitled.

All World War I Veterans in Eastland County are invited to attend the next meeting which will be held at the American Legion Hut in Cisco, Feb. 17, at 7 p.m., Garrett said.

Mavs Grab Third Place In District With Win

Eastland climbed into a three way tie for third place in District 7-AA Tuesday night, downing the Winters Blizzards, 41-28, in the local's home gym.

The win was the fourth in district play for Coach Jon Tate's charges and gained the Mavs a tie with Winters and Ballinger for third place. Eastland will journey to Ballinger Friday night in a battle that will determine which team will finish third in the circuit. Winters must play Cisco and will be the heavy underdogs, while Coleman plays Ranger in the only district clash.

Cisco downed Coleman, 58-51 Tuesday in the Cisco gym to gain an unduped lead in the district. A loss by the Lobos to Winters, while Coleman beats Ranger, would throw Coleman and Cisco into a play-off for the district crown. Cisco isn't expected to lose to Winters, however.

Eastland will be underdog to Ballinger after taking a sound 63-40 trouncing when the two teams played before. The Mavs may have improved enough to win this one though, despite the fact

the Cats have the home court advantage. The Eastland-Winters game Tuesday night was a close affair for one quarter, but Eastland out-hustled the visitors in the second period and built up a 22-16 lead after trailing 12-11 at the fourth-minute mark.

Then as the third quarter began the Mavs quickly built their lead to 50-16, and the Winters coach benched his entire first team (later sending them to the showers).

The Winters reserves played the Mavs a fairly close game for the rest of the contest as Coach Tate emptied his bench in the final quarter.

Stanley Reed was high-pointer in the game for Eastland, netting 12 points. Otis Green had six, Larry H. J. J. eight, Clint Humphreys six and Mickey Garner nine.

The Mavs slowed down to a snail's pace after the Winter reserves hit the court and the remainder of the game was highly uninteresting. Eastland's B-team dropped their third game of the year, losing,

50-47, to a team they beat fairly easy earlier in the year. The B team played without the service of Don Wilson, who was out because of illness. Don's twin brother, John, tried to make up for the slack and netted 18 points. Roger Taylor had nine, James Lewis seven, Martin Day seven and David Whittin and James McElreath two each.

The most lavish entertainment I ever received was in Port Arthur. I was to speak at the ladies' night dinner of the Lions Club and, next night, to the Elks and their wives.

Dr. Desmond Secrest, who had arranged the engagements, was aided and abetted by other Lions - (I'm a Lion myself) - and the red carpet was really rolled out. A group met me in Houston and we drove to Port Arthur. At the Goodhue Hotel, I was ushered into a suite - yes, sir, a suite and it had a balcony - and I mean balcony, for it would easily hold eight persons, seated.

We drove out to a beach cafe and had barbecued crab, the specialty of the house.

Next day, there was a cruise on a luxury craft. But the crowning event was a dinner at a lodge on a bayou - a campfire (for lighting, as the night was mild), a dinner composed of French dishes, and stories afterward. Some 50 of the leading citizens of Port Arthur were there.

I felt embarrassed at all this attention - but I sure did like it.
