Junior High cheerleaders are to be named next week.

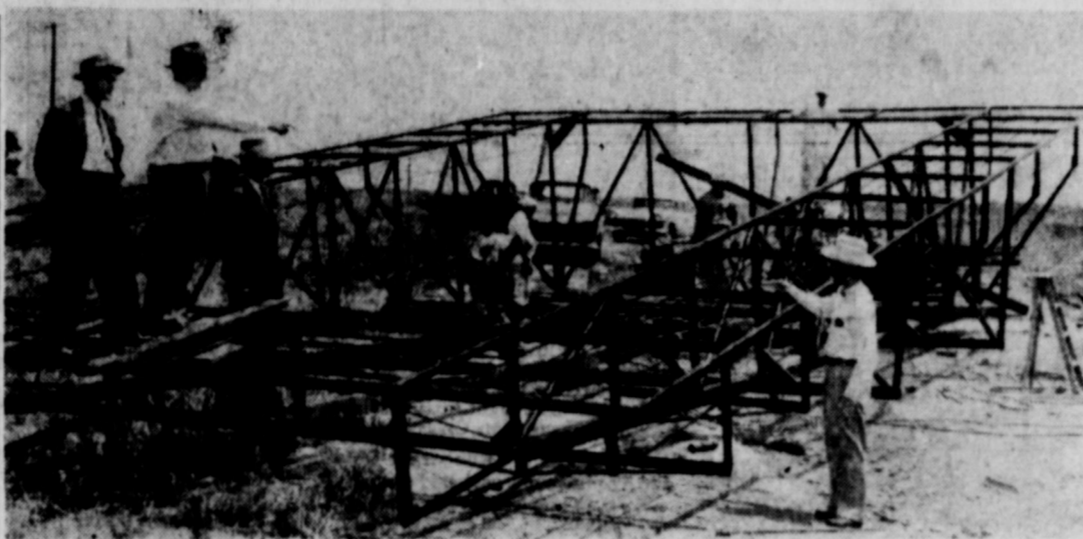
Season Tickets Help Two Ways

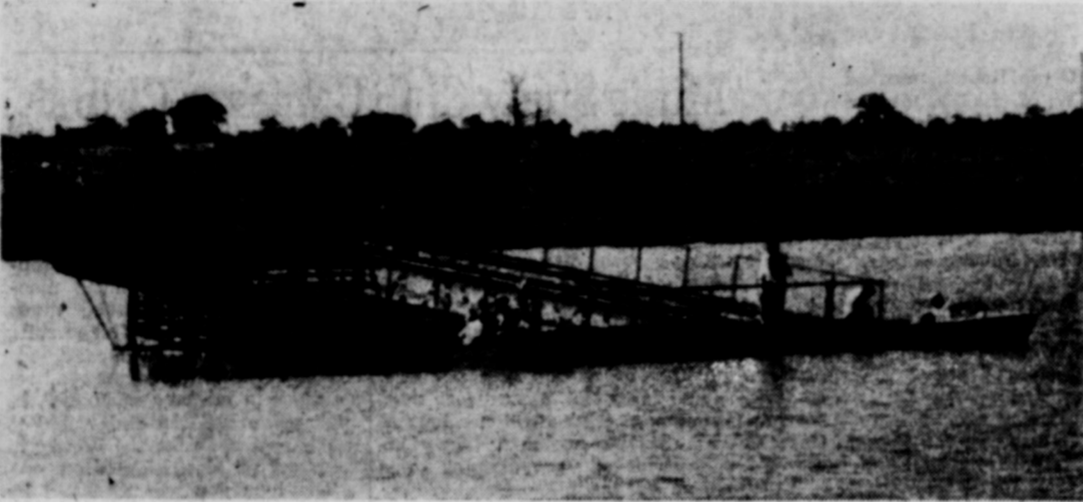

Floating Swimming Pool Is Christened at Lake

After an hour long wait the crowd cheered Friday morning when the nation's first known floating swimming pool slid into the waters of Lake Leon. As men and machinery pulled the 25,000 pound pool into the waters of the lake Carl Garner rushed up and christened the pool in the traditional manner—by breaking a bottle of champagne on the "bow."

Getting the pool into the water was a moral victory for Victor Cornelius. Cornelius had the pool built after waking up in the middle of the night with the idea on his mind.

At the time the pool was launched, at 8 a.m., the odds were eight to one that it would never reach water. Workmen were delayed an hour in preparing for the launching, but they got the pool in the water on the first try by placing

Pecan Growers Urged to Watch Nut Casebearers

Possibilities for a good pecan crop in Eastland County are described as good, but B. G. Hancock, extension horticulturist, has warned that pecan nut casebearers are already on the job in the state and unless control measures are applied the crop could be a small one.

South Texas producers are spraying and those in all other areas in the State are warned by Hancock to be ready to apply the needed insecticides any day. The usual pattern of casebearer development is off schedule and the smart thing to do, says the specialist, is to watch the orchard every day.

The three essentials in obtaining satisfactory casebearer control are listed by Hancock and C. F. Garner, extension entomologist, as correct timing of spray application, proper application of spray material and use of the correct insecticides.

To be sure of timing, the specialists urge pecan growers to check the nut clusters closely and regularly for the appearance of the casebearer eggs.

it on slides. Two trucks pushed at the back of the pool and a wench truck across the lake pulled via cable.

Cornelius had the 25 by 45 foot pool built just below Lake Leon dam. It has a five foot walkway all around the top. The pool has a steel frame and is lined with redwood. Cracks were left between the redwood so that water from the lake will seep in. Ninety-seven barrels are used to float it in the water.

After the pool got into deep water where it would float, boats were used to drag it to its permanent location at Cornelius Cove, the lakeside home of Mr. and Mrs. Cornelius. The trip across the water took another hour.

The floating swimming pool solved a big problem for Cornelius. He wanted a place for swimming, but the water in front of his place was too deep for safety. He didn't have room for a swimming pool on his lot, so he set out to solve the problem. Now he has plenty of room left for a fine lawn, and as nice a swimming pool as you can find.

The pool is built in much the

same way as pools you have seen. It has a slanting bottom, giving an eight foot deep end for adult swimmers, and a wading pool at the other end for youngsters.

During the week, as workmen built the strange looking "craft," onlookers couldn't decide what it was to be. Some figured it was a new type boat dock, one person thought it was going to be a drive in boat movie screen and another figured out it was to be a super-sized ski ramp.

The pool is anchored to the shore by two large pipes fitted to a base which is buried in cement. It has a walkway much the same as those on most boat docks. All that's needed now is a sign which reads, "No Fishing in Swimming Pool."

Seventy Percent of Seniors Will Attend College

Twenty-six of the 37 Eastland High School seniors who will get their diplomas June 2 plan to continue their search for knowledge after their graduation, a Telegram survey reveals.

Twenty-one students announced plans to attend college, five said they would attend business college and 11 announced plans to go to work, marry, or enter military service. That means that

slightly more than 70 percent of the 1958 graduates will stick to their books for at least another year.

Melt chocolate. Remove from heat, add sugar and water, and blend. Add egg yolks, one at a time, beating after each. Then add butter, a tablespoon at a time, beating thoroughly after each addition. Makes 2 cups, plus 2 tablespoons frosting, or enough to cover top and sides of 13x9x2-inch cake or tops and sides of two 9-inch layers.

Note: If desired, 1 whole egg or 1 egg plus 1 yolk may be substituted for the 2 egg yolks.

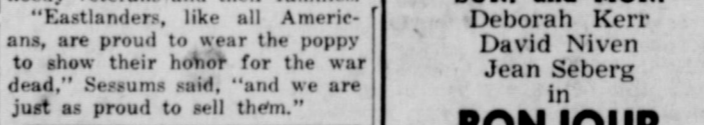

(Editor's Note: Mrs. Lloyd Bland, the former Adrienne Flurry of Eastland, wrote the following article which appeared in the Wichita Daily Times recently. Mrs. Bland was reared in Eastland and is the niece of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Davis, granddaughter of the late Judge and Mrs. R. B. Truly. She is also related to the J. L. Johnson, Russell Hills and many other families here)

Chaperoning the Young Home-maker of the Year, Miss Aloma Qualls, to Washington and New York City is quite an experience especially since she was presented with a citation by Mrs. Eisenhower and then presented another by the American Mothers Committee which selects the Mother of the Year.

At the White House Mrs. Eisenhower greeted us warmly. She is a beautiful lady whose soft complexion and bright blue eyes do not receive justice in her photographs. She wore a royal blue suit with a small pink collar and a small blue hat to match.

"I do other things, Aloma," she smiled "but deep in my heart I am just a homemaker. I think that is the most important job in the world."

There is nothing artificial or pretentious about Mrs. Eisenhower. Her naturalness and genuine quality shine through.

Sam Rayburn told us this story.

"I said to Mrs. Eisenhower once

that she would have made a charming farmer's wife or a fine doctor's wife. And she makes a perfect First Lady of the Land." Rayburn's eyes twinkled at us "You know what she did? She reached and kissed me on the cheek. Ike leaned around her and said "Now just what's going on here?"

From the White House we went to the Senate Dining Room where Mrs. Ralph Yarborough entertained us at a luncheon. Guests were Mrs. Frank Ikard, India Edwards, Mrs. Lewis Ross, National Girls Club chairman, and several newspaper representatives.

During the luncheon Senators Lyndon Johnson, Ralph Yarborough and Jack Kennedy and Doris Fleeson came by to congratulate Aloma and to visit.

Later Mrs. Ikard conducted us around the capital. We visited in Frank Ikard's office where he presented Aloma with a book on Washington and answered questions for her. Later, we toured Sam Rayburn's office.

With a great deal of courtesy he escorted her to the House of Representatives to sit for a few moments in the chair of the Speaker of the House.

"This influences me," Aloma mused dreamily, sitting back in the chair. "I may go into politics some day."

Then with a true 16-year-old's enthusiasm she requested and received his autograph.

That evening Mr. and Mrs. Ray Bland, Lloyd's brother, took us on a short tour of Virginia where we saw Arlington, Lee's mansion, the statue of Two Jims, the Jefferson and Lincoln Memorial and the Mayflower anchored at the harbor. Afterwards we took a boat trip around Manhattan, saw the Statue of Liberty, Riverside Drive, the tall beautiful church steeples and Grant's Tomb.

That evening we went to Radio City Music Hall and Aloma, being a tap dancer, especially enjoyed the Rockettes.

Mrs. Daniel Poling, president of the American Mother Committee, presented Aloma with a citation the next day at the Waldorf-Astoria.

Aloma is 16 years old and full of energy and teenage interests like buying souvenirs, seeing the mystery of Chinatown, mailing post cards home and admiring the page boys at the Capitol were "just darling."

But she has other qualities. She is generous, for much of her spending money went for gifts for "Mother and Daddy and the boys." She spent very little on herself.

She is a girl with a dream, to become a really good homemaker and to acquire skill in domestic abilities as well as an understanding to bring peace and security to those she loves.

The community is invited to participate in the ordination service. A reception will follow in the Fellowship Hall.

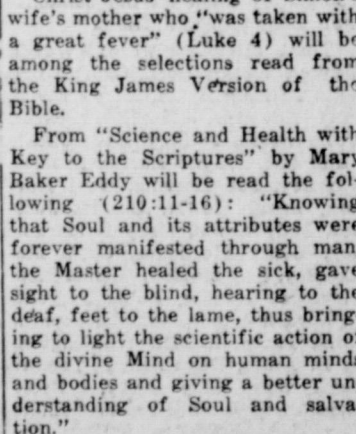
Christian Science
