Oh yes while we are fishing it was at his Rocky Mountain Fishing Camp in Colorado that President Eisenhower signed a bill passed by the 83rd Congress adding 10,000,000 persons to the social security system and increasing both benefits and the taxes to pay for them.

The President declared: "These acts and social security amendments I have approved today (September 1) will bolster the health and economic security of the American people."

The law will bring to nearly 80,000,000 — 90 per cent of the nation's gainfully employed workers — the number under the old age survivors insurance program.

The new law will mean higher social security deductions for many Americans.

The salary tax base goes up from \$3,600 to \$4,200 yearly effective January 1. Thus an individual earning \$4,200 or more next year will pay \$12 in additional taxes; his employer must do the same. The tax boost to self-employed persons will be \$18.

Included in the system for the first time are about 3,600,000 farm operators; 2,100,000 farm workers; 3,500,000 employees of state and local governments who want to be covered; 250,000 domestic workers; 100,000 accountants, engineers, architects and undertakers; 50,000 fishermen (see we haven't forgotten that this is a fish tale) and 260,000 clergymen on an optional basis.

The first effects of the law will be felt next month when persons now receiving pension payments will find their checks from \$5 to \$13.50 higher.

Minimum monthly payments will be raised from \$25 to \$30. Maximum payments which have been \$85 monthly for single persons and \$127.50 for married ones will go up to \$98.50 and \$147.80 respectively.

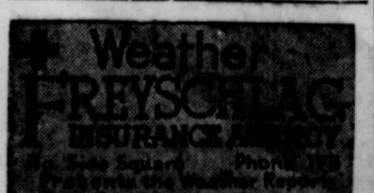
In addition the law allows beneficiaries to earn up to \$1,200 a year outside income without losing their pension payments. The previous ceiling had been \$75 a month or \$900 a year.

The law removes the limit on outside income for persons 72 and older. Previously they had to be 75 to earn unlimited income without losing benefits.

Traffic Deaths Claim Heavy Toll In Lives Of Children Under 15

"A total of 4,400 children under 15 years old were killed in traffic last year," Col. E. B. Tilley of Houston, President of the Texas Safety Association, and Services Advisor for the Gulf Oil Corporation said today.

He said that this terrible child death toll in itself would be reason enough for the child traffic safety program which his group is sponsoring this month in Texas in cooperation with the Texas Department of Public Safety and the National Safety Council.

"Put the number of fatalities is only part of the picture," he said. "In addition, approximately 225,000 children were injured in traffic accidents in 1953, according to the National Safety Council."

Many of these injuries, Col. Tilley pointed out, will leave the youthful victims maimed or scarred for life.

"There is no quick, easy remedy for this deplorable situation on our streets and highways," he said. "Instead, it will take a long range program of public education to bring about a lasting improvement. Motorists must come to realize their responsibility for the lives of unpredictable children and must exercise extra caution when driving in areas where youngsters may be walking or playing. And parents, too, must be made to understand the serious danger involved, and teach their children safety precautions."

"Many people today do not realize that traffic is the number one killer of children between the ages of one and 14."

"Traffic accidents kill more children in this age group than any one of the highly-publicized childhood diseases," Col. Tilley said.

"Figures for 1951, the most recent year for which complete statistics are available, show that for the one to 14 age group, there were 3,888 deaths due to motor vehicle accidents," he said.

"This was five times as many child deaths as were caused the same year by polio, and three times as many as were caused by tuberculosis. There were 800 fewer deaths from pneumonia and 600 fewer from cancer, in all its forms, than from traffic accidents in this age group."

He said that if we are to improve this tragic situation we all will need to remember and act on the traffic safety slogan being featured this month in the program of the Texas Safety Association, the Texas Department of Public Safety, and the National Safety Council: "Watch Out for Kids."

Fat Stock Show Offers All-Time High In Awards

The greatest total of cash awards — \$183,677 in the history of the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show at Fort Worth will be offered at the 1955 show, dates of which are Jan. 28-Feb. 6.

For the first time, Santa Gertrudis cattle will be shown in competition, with \$2,000 in prize money.

Awards in the horse show have been increased over the preceding year to a total of \$30,475, which is a gain of \$2,175.

Montadores have been added in the sheep show and the prize money has been advanced from \$5,563 to \$6,129.

The swine show, suspended last year because of the national vesicular exanthema situation, will resume. Awards for this department amount to \$8,400.

Other 1955 awards, as announced by President-Manager W. R. Watt, will be:

Steers, \$9,245; Herefords, \$13,800; Polled Herefords, \$5,000; Shorthorns, \$6,000; Aberdeen-Angus, \$10,000; Brahman, \$2,000; Carlot-and-pen bulls, \$6,335; dairy cattle, \$5,637; junior show, \$8,091, divided; steers, \$2,987; dairy, \$2,000; lambs, \$1,153; and pigs, \$1,951; judging contests \$1,500; poultry, \$2,000; herdsman, \$390.

The remainder represents the prize money and entry fees of the rodeo.

Deadline for entries of cattle, sheep and swine is Dec. 15; for horses, Jan. 8; for poultry, Jan. 15. Entry blanks and information may be obtained by writing to Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, P. O. Box 150, Ft. Worth.

A Pro-Am Tournament is also under way. Matched play will begin Sunday and continue through Monday.

Approximately 80 area golfers are expected to participate in the annual affair.

All Schools will open Tuesday morning Sept. 7th at 8:30 for regular work. W. G. Womack, superintendent of the Eastland Schools said. High School, having registered in the spring will go into their regular schedule Tuesday morning.

All other schools will register, issue books, and go through their complete schedules. All schools will be dismissed about 2:30 Tuesday.

Buses will make regular runs in the same direction as in the first semester last year.

Pupils in grades one through five will attend ward schools. Those pupils living east of Daugherty Street will attend South Ward School and the ones living west of Daugherty Street will attend West Ward School. Grades six through eight will attend Junior High School.

All cafeterias will be open beginning Tuesday Sept. 7th. Prices of meals will be the same as last year; 25 cents for Ward School pupils and 30 cents for junior high and high school students.

### Aggies To Honor John Kimbrough At Nov. 13 Game

John Kimbrough, Texas A&M's great all-American fullback of 1939-40, will be honored at the Aggie-Rice football game at College Station November 13.

Paul Bryant, athletic director and head coach at A&M, set that date aside for the purpose of honoring the all-time Aggie great who was recently elected to the College Football Hall of Fame at Rutgers University, New Brunswick, N. J.

In addition to Hall of Fame Day November 13, it will be Band Day, September 18, at the Texas Tech game; Dad's Day, Oct. 30, at the Arkansas game and Class Reunion Day, October 16, at the TCU game.

On Band Day the high school bands of the towns surrounding Bryan and College Station will be invited to play during the game and between halves.

Dad's day will honor the fathers of players on the Aggie squad. The dads will be invited to sit on the bench and each dad will wear the number corresponding with the jersey number of his son.

The former students of A&M who graduated with the classes of 1929, 1934, 1939 and 1944 will be honored at the TCU game. These classes will sit together.

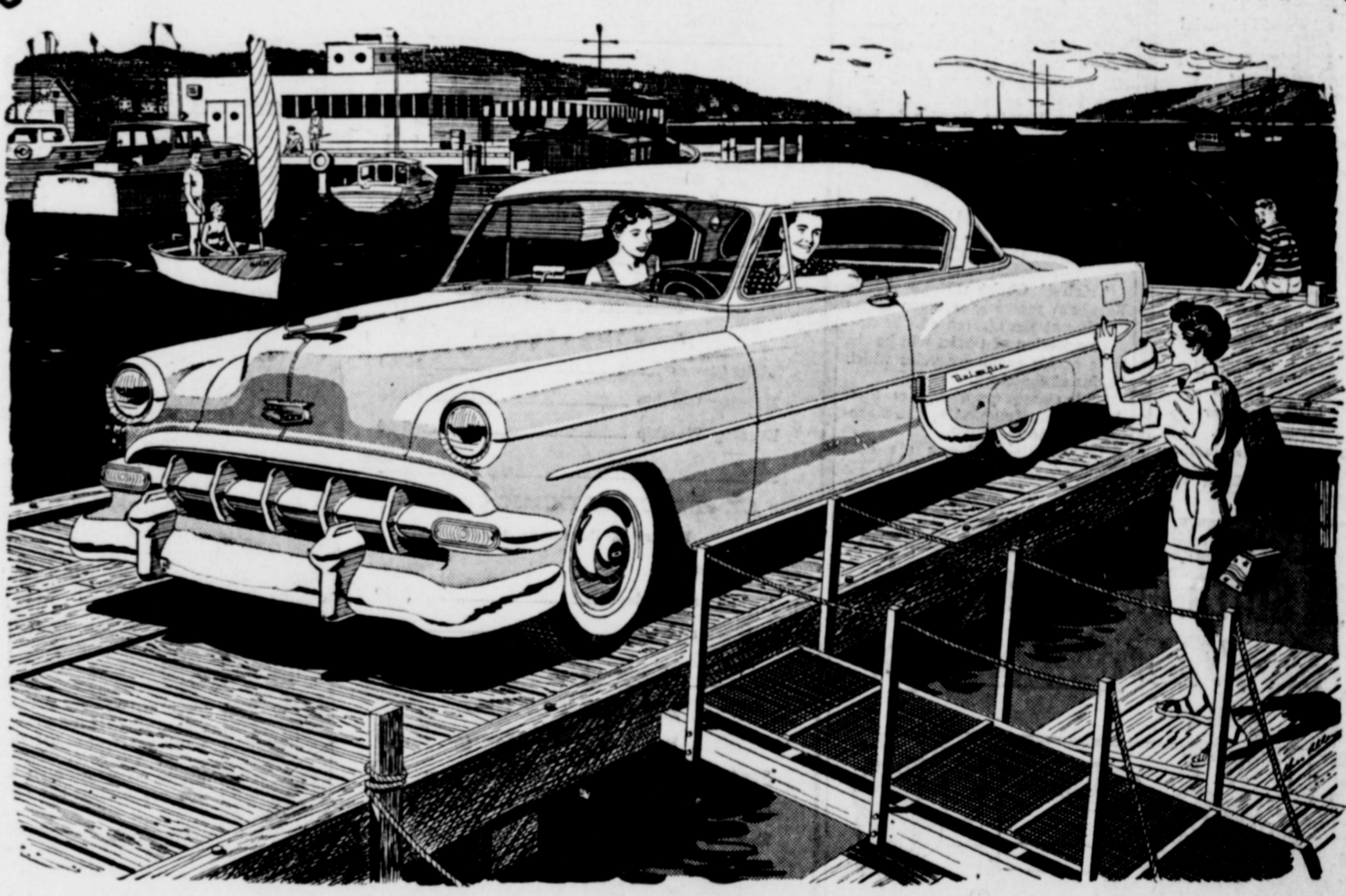
