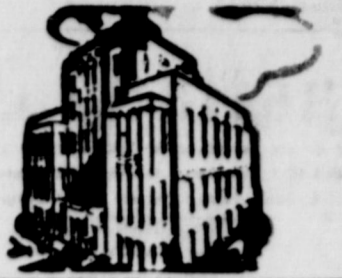

## Burglary Suspect Arrested After Speeding Chase

Breckenridge officers picked up a burglary suspect in Eastland Wednesday after a speeding chase Sunday night and a calm capture Monday.

Eddie R. Huffman of Lingville was arrested at his home there Monday by officers including Johnny Boyd, Eastland County deputy sheriff. He is charged with burglary of Breckenridge package store. Huffman gave no fight when he was captured.

Sunday night Highway Patrolman Les Strawn of Eastland spotted the suspect driving on Highway 80. He turned and gave chase. The driver of the car turned south off of 80, then made an east turn onto Farm-Market Road 570.

As Strawn narrowed the distance, the suspect pulled off the side of the road and ran into thick brush. Strawn called for aid and a search was conducted but the suspect couldn't be located. Strawn said he believes Huffman walked the distance from where he ditched the car to his home in Lingville.

A general discussion regarding pending bills in the Legislature concerning the nursing profession was held. Plans were made for giving examinations and issuing licenses to candidates qualifying to become registered tuberculosis nurses.

Miss Blair has been a member of the Board since it was created in 1950 by an act of the Legislature.

The boys A-B team game was a thriller until the last two minutes of play. The B team jumped to a 10-0 lead in the first period before the A team could score, then fell behind 11-10 at the end of the quarter. The B team trailed at halftime, 25-23, but led 35-33 going into the final period.

Clint Humphreys had 18 points for the Mavs, Larry Hollis had 17 and Otis Green 14. Phillip Lewis was high pointer for the losers with 15 points and James Lewis had 14.

Clark Conner was high pointer for the Freshmen with 18 points and Tommy Beck netted 17 for the Dogies.

The teams will play again Friday night. Only change will be that the senior boys will play next year's probably varsity team.

## Grass Fire Is Largest Ever In Eastland County

Firemen from five cities and scores of volunteers fought one of the largest grass fires in the history of Eastland County Tuesday and Wednesday morning, winning the battle only after losing some 3,000 acres of brushland to the hard to handle, wind-blown flames.

Fire Chief Billy Jack Johnson of Eastland declared that the fire, which burned out of control between Eastland and Cisco for hours, was the largest he or any member of his department can remember.

Firemen from Eastland, Cisco, Ranger, Breckenridge and Brownwood were called to fight the blaze, and many landowners and other volunteers assisted in the battle. The dry brush burned at an amazingly fast pace as terrific wind gusts pushed it westward.

Only three small sheds were lost to the fire, as fire fighters were able to save some 10 to 15 homes, a drive-in theatre, an oil company camp, a pottery factory and a hospital.

Flames licked up to within inches of some houses and were stopped by fire fighters at the edge of the Joy Theatre.

No injuries were reported, but two firemen from Eastland and a volunteer fire fighter from Cisco came close to being overcome by flames.

Eastland Chief Johnson reported he and Assistant Chief Wayne Jackson and an unidentified Cisco volunteer were completely surrounded by the fire in timberland at one time. Chief Johnson radioed for aid, but had to drive through the flames and heavy smoke before it could arrive.

"I don't know how I managed to get through without hitting one of those trees," Johnson told a reporter, "for I couldn't see anything except smoke and fire."

The fire started Tuesday morning near the Boss Grove manufacturing plant in Cisco, according to firemen. Cisco firemen answered the alarm and thought they had the fire under control. Later, however, it spread quickly as high winds hit the area, and soon was out of control.

Firemen from Eastland joined the fight as the flames raced westward along Highway 80. Then Ranger and Breckenridge firemen joined the battle and later Brownwood equipment hit the scene. Cisco had three units in operation and Eastland had two. The other departments each had one truck.

Firemen brought the fire under control about 4 p.m. Tuesday after it had burned a trail across the B. W. Martin place, the southwest corner of the George Fee ranch and land owned by Mrs. Perry Gallagher.

Road maintainers were brought in and helped stop the fire to the west, and to the north.

About 7:30 more trouble began on the south side of Highway 80 near Humboldt. Either a new fire began or sparks from the first blaze set fire to timberland across the highway. The second fire was about a mile from the first blaze.

Firemen credited radio communications with "... saving the day." They reasoned that the fire probably would have caused heavy damage had all units not had

radios, thus aiding firemen in knowing where they were needed worse.

Chief Johnson said members of his department (some with 25 years service) had never encountered a brush fire of such a degree. He warned that the fire hazard is still great in the county.

Firemen and volunteers were fed at the scene of the fire Tuesday night. Food was rushed from Cisco.
