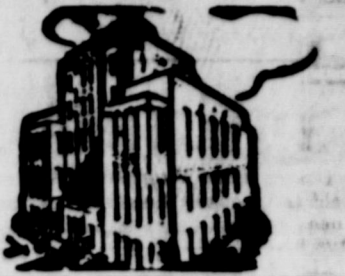

Curly Maynard and the other roque players here in Eastland are mighty proud of the roque court at City Park which they rebuilt last year. And Curly and his friends have some big plans in mind, too.

We personally thought everyone had forgotten Hitler and switched his hate to Khrushchev.

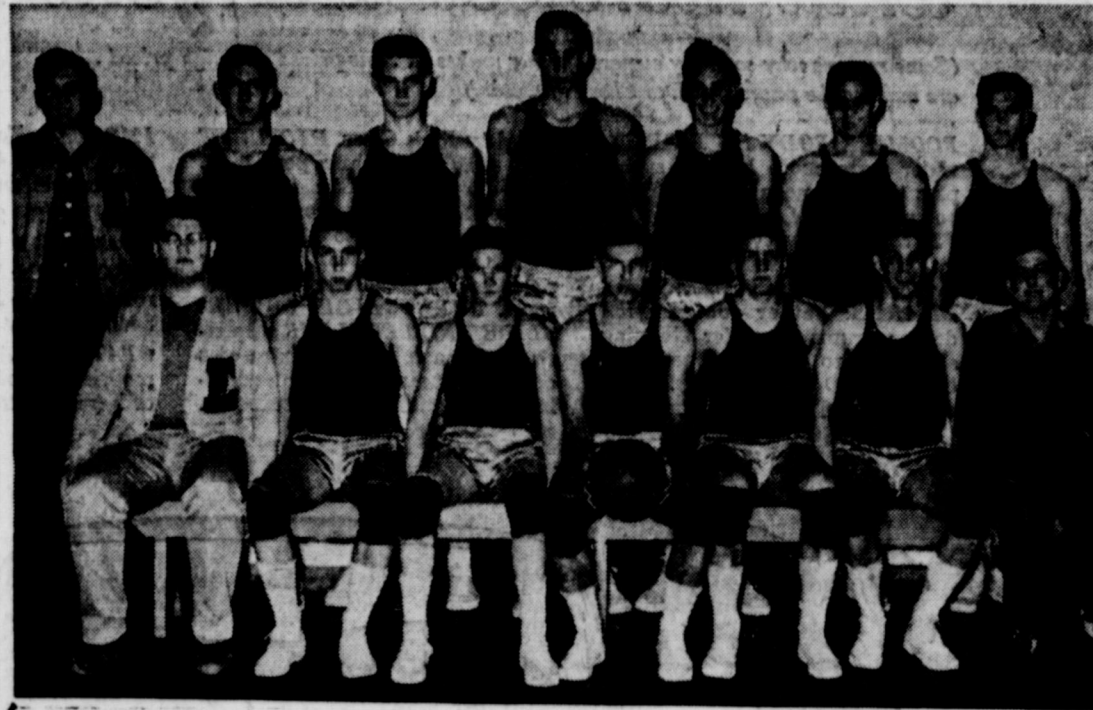

Officer Calls Highway Crash Near Tragedy

A tale of a near tragedy was told this week by Highway Patrolman Al White, of Eastland.

A "routine" highway crash about a mile north of Ranger on Farm Market Road 717 caused heavy damage to a truck-tractor and tank trailer and injured the driver, but White said it could have been much worse.

The driver of the truck-tractor locked his brakes and jackknifed his vehicle in an effort to avoid a collision with a pickup truck. He missed the pickup, but overturned the truck in doing it.

J. B. Craig, 55, of 615 Breckenridge Street, Ranger, was treated for minor injuries at Ranger General Hospital and later released. Driver of the pickup truck was Robert Jackson of Route 3, Ranger.

Craig was hauling a load of crude oil, just out of the ground. He said it was more flammable than gasoline. About half of his load poured onto the highway and into a ditch, but somehow didn't catch fire.

C-C BREAKFAST SPEAKER DECLARES

Airport Is Tool In Fight for Industry

"Air travel and airports are not play things, they are important business tools," R. B. Allen of the Federal Aeronautics Administration, Fort Worth, told Eastland Chamber of Commerce membership breakfast goes this morning.

Some 45 early morning risers attended the breakfast in the White Elephant restaurant to hear the government engineer speak. President Robert Perkins presided over the meeting and Virgil Seaberry Jr., breakfast chairman introduced the speaker.

"The day of flying for the fun of it or thrill of it is over," Allen declared. "Today when a pilot climbs in his plane he has some place to go and usually his trip has business connections."

Allen said that too many persons think an airport is just for a "few rich local flyers." He said Eastland's need for an airport is, as Chamber of Commerce officials have stressed, an industrial need.

The C-C speaker declared that executives today usually ask, as their first question, "What type of airport facilities do you have?"

"Time is money to them," Allen stated. He cited several examples of cities gaining new industries because they built airports. Hereford and Paris were two Texas towns he mentioned in his talk.

"Whether we like it or not we are living in a faster age and if we are going to compete we are going to have to have the tools to do it," the government airport expert emphasized.

Allen also said he believed this

area has a great potential as a recreation area, and he pointed out that air travel is important to vacationers. He said the recreation facilities in this county have not been developed, but stated that he felt they should be and would be.

Asked specifically about the local airport improvements (the C-C is working on a program to hard surface one airstrip and light the Eastland airport), Allen said that if the improvements are made the strip can handle anything up to a DC-3 and "possibly even a DC-3."

He was asked about the cost of the local project (the C-C plans to do the job for \$4000) and said normally the work would cost much more. Earlier he had expressed amazement at the building of Eastland Memorial Hospital and Lone Cedar Country Club at such low costs.

"You have a good start here and your proposed improvements will help you immeasurably," he told breakfast goers.

He said the FAA recommends that a city draw up an airport plan and work to it step by step, "... just as you are doing."

In introducing Allen, Seaberry

stated that the Industrial Committee of the C-C has now raised three-fourths of the needed money to complete the airport project.

Jim Sees Castle of Sultan In Morocco

(Editor's Note: This is another in a series of articles written for the Telegram by Jim Horton, who, with his wife, is now on an ocean tour.)

Each day gets warmer as we go on South. The sun is mellow, and the sea a deep blue. It feels like a warm spring day. A few days ago we set forth on the shore of Africa at Casablanca, Morocco. It didn't seem much different from many places all over the

world. A rain the week before had turned all the pastures green and everywhere were small bunches of scrub cattle. They are all guarded by their owners to prevent stealing by their neighbors.

The soil seemed poor and the farming decidedly sub normal. Here and there you could see someone plowing with a pair of camels, and one fellow had a camel and horse hitched together. Here and there were small flocks of dirty sheep. The farm houses were scattered over the landscape. They were thatched small buildings with the stable attached and a brush fence around it all. The people and the livestock lived together.

We drove over to Rabat, the capital of Morocco, and saw the Sultan's castle but not the Sultan. The Sultan has four legal wives and an undisclosed number of concubines (willing girl friends). He was probably busy indoors.

Each Moorish city has a Casbah (a walled part of the city) and a medina (where the natives live). Each city also has slums of abject squalor and poverty. The (Continued On Page Six)

Public Schools Week to Be Observed March 2-6

Eastland will join in the observance of Texas Annual Public Schools Week, March 2-6, J. B. (Pop) Arther, city chairman, announced today.

Arther said all schools will maintain their regular schedules here so that visitors can see just what students are actually doing. Visitors will be welcomed at all Eastland schools throughout the week, Supt. Wendell Siebert stressed.

Parents and other interested persons can eat at the schools if they chose, but should make reservations. Meals will be served to adults during the week for 50c.

Object of Public Schools Week, according to Arther, is to acquaint all people with programs and accomplishments of Eastland's public education system.

"Texas Public Schools—Democracy in Action," is the slogan. The State Board of Education past a resolution "... that Public Schools Week be suggested as an appropriate week for local school officials to plan school events and educational programs which will give to each pupil and to each citizen who visits in the schools a better understanding of the vital importance of the public schools in the country governed by and for the people."

Gov. Price Daniel signed a proclamation for the ninth annual statewide observance and the State Senate passed a concurrent resolution.

Arther said it is hoped that

every Eastland citizen will take advantage of the special occasion to visit in at least one local school. He pointed out that the Constitution of the Republic of Texas, adopted March 2, 1836, declared, "It shall be the duty of Congress, as soon as circumstances will permit, to provide by law, a general system of education."

In 1854 a School Law provided

for the first State public school system in Texas and from this grew the public school system in Texas today.

As of Feb. 1, Eastland school enrollment totaled 766 students, according to Siebert. That includes students in Eastland High School, Junior High School, South Ward, West Ward and Douglas School.

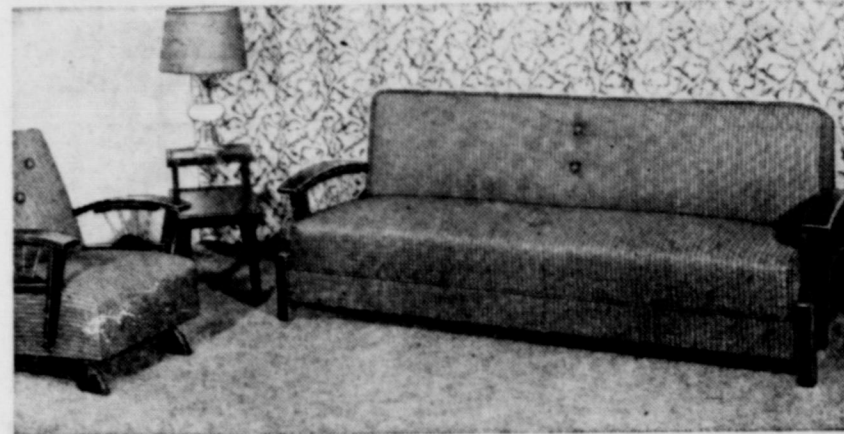
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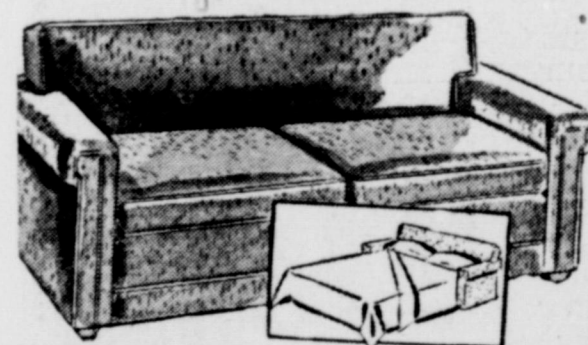


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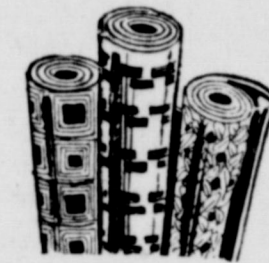
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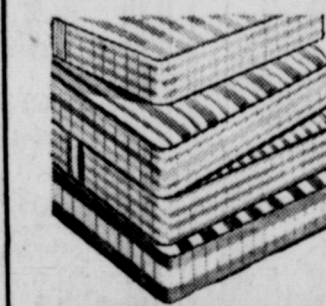


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Texas Wesleyan College Singers To Appear In Eastland March 2

The Wesleyan Singers of Texas Wesleyan College, will appear in Eastland at 7:30 p.m. March 2, under auspices of the First Methodist Church.

The 40-voice choir of Texas Wesleyan College in Fort Worth, is directed by Howard Skinner, professor of voice and choral activities. The entire concert, with the exception of the Brahms and Dello Joio numbers, will be sung a Capella.

The women of the Choir and the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra have just recently joined forces to give Fort Worth some fine musical entertainment. Joint offering of the two groups included a concert version of Debussy's Nocturnes with the chorus singing "Sirenes" testifying to the versatility of the young singers. Several members of the Singers have appeared with the Fort Worth Opera Company in their productions in Fort Worth.

Almost two-thirds of the members of the Singers are music majors in the Fine Arts Department of the college. Almost every other department on the campus is represented in the group also. One third of the 40 members of the Wesleyan Singers were listed on the Dean's Honor Roll for the first semester.

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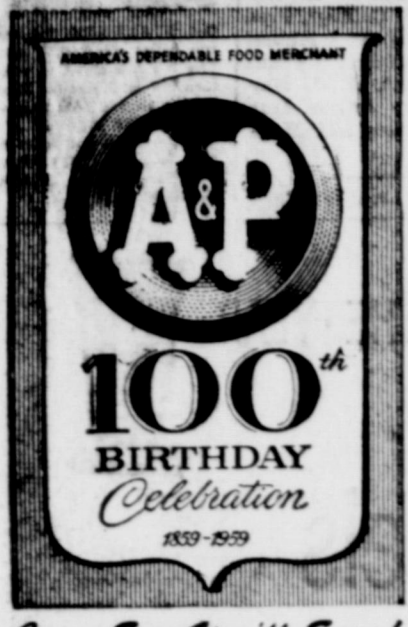
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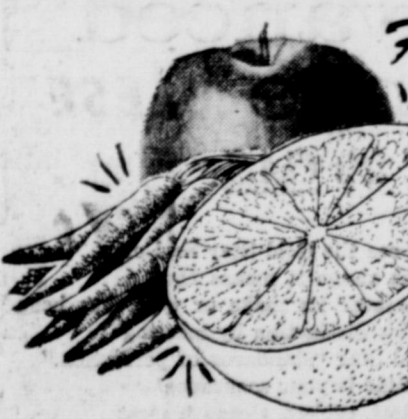
