## Brashear Says Special Session Up to Governor

Paul Brashear, state representative from this district, has replied to Gov. Price Daniel's letter asking his opinion on calling a special session of the Legislature.

Rep. Brashear made his reply public today. It is as follows:

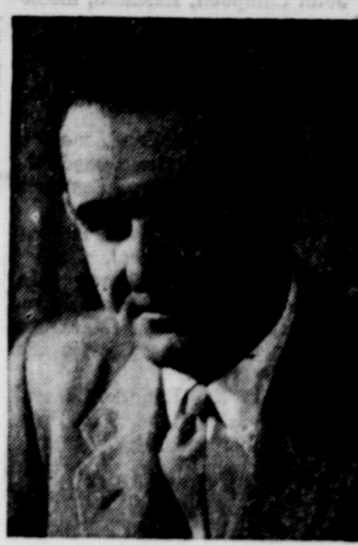
"This will acknowledge your letter of Nov. 21 in which you outlined the problems that you consider an emergency of sufficient magnitude to summon the Legislature into special session.

"The responsibility of calling a special session rests solely upon the governor and the question as to whether the emergency you outlined is any more serious now than it was during the past regular and special session.

In debating the teacher pay raise matter the real concern to me has always been the classroom instructors who are the real backbone of our school systems. To much of our tax money goes for the assorted supervisory people with which the Texas Education Agency has seen fit to endow us with so abundantly.

"While I am not entirely in sympathy with a special session, for the reason that it would be costly and a solution appears doubtful, I certainly appreciate the needs of our classroom teachers. But, if you order the session, the best of my efforts is pledged.

"Be assured of my interest and concern for the problems facing our schools, and for that matter, other political sub-divisions of our state that depend on local taxes for their upkeep."

## Johnson For President Club To Be Formed

Plans were announced today for organizing an Eastland County Lyndon B. Johnson for President Club. Making the announcement was Clyde L. Garrett of Eastland and Lloyd L. Bruce of Ranger.

The two spokesmen said an organizational meeting would be held in Eastland in the near future. Date for the meeting will be announced in this newspaper.

Judge Garrett expressed the hope that "... a large number of our citizens, both men and women, from all sections of the county will arrange to attend this meeting." He said those attending the meeting will become charter members of the club.

"Due to Senator Johnson's wide experience, background and training, his wide knowledge of national and international affairs, he is the man most eminently qualified to be the President of the United States at a time when our country faces so many grave problems," Judge Garrett declared.

## Baptist Pastor To be Honored

Rev. Harvey Kimbler, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Eastland for the past five years, will be honored next Sunday, Dec. 13 at a reception in his honor at the Fellowship Hall of the church.

The reception will also honor Rev. Kimbler's family.

Rev. Kimbler came to Eastland in December, 1954. He formerly served as pastor of churches in Valley View (Ballinger), Tye, Santo and Lometa.

A native of Hamlin, he graduated from Abilene High School, Hardin-Simmons University and Southwestern Baptist Seminary.

His family is composed of his wife, Frances (Polly), son, George 14; and two daughters, Janet, 12, and Susan, 6.

Rev. Kimbler is Sunday School superintendent of the Cisco Baptist Association and chairman of the Missions Committee. He is also Sunday School superintendent of the District 17 and a member of the Executive Board. He is a member of the Nominating Committee of the Baptist General Commission of Texas and a member of the executive board.

The Eastland pastor is past president of the local Ministerial Association and is now serving as vice president of that organization. He is also president of the Eastland-Ranger Ministerial Association and former president of the District 17 Baptist Convention. Rev. Kimbler also serves as a member of the Luaders Baptist Encampment board.

Since becoming pastor of the First Baptist Church here, Rev. Kimbler has seen 456 additions to the church. Total offerings under his leadership have climbed to \$217,000, of which \$63,000 has been spent on mission work.

The budget of his church has been increased from \$36,000 to \$53,000 in a five year period. Year around air conditioning and carpeting have been added to the church building, and the nursery and kitchen have both been remodeled. Some \$20,000 in improvements to the building are a part of the pastor's record.

Under Rev. Kimbler's leadership, two preachers have been ordained by the church and 10 young people have surrendered for special service.

## Deadline For Entering Pecan Show Announced

All entries of nuts in the Seventh Annual Eastland County Pecan Show at Cisco, Dec. 11 and 12, must be in by 9 a.m. on the second day to be judged, it was revealed today by show officials.

The Cisco Chamber of Commerce and the County Pecan Growers Association are jointly sponsoring the affair.

Nuts must be left on display until 4 p.m. Dec. 12. Entries that win first place are to be sent to Texas A&M College to be entered in the state pecan show and will not be returned.

Varieties of nuts with less than three entries will be judged and ribbons awarded but no cash premiums are to be paid. They may compete however for the grand or reserve championship of the entire show.

A total of 286 entries of pecans were entered in the 1958 show. Even with a short pecan crop over the county this year it is hoped to equal or exceed this number of entries.

Entries may be left at the County Agent's office in Eastland or at the Chamber of Commerce office in Cisco prior to the show dates. They will be entered at the proper time.

## New Emergency Ambulance Co. To Serve Area

A new Emergency ambulance service for the Eastland County area was announced today by owners of the Ambulance Service Co., Eastland.

Owners of the new firm stated they will maintain 24 hour emergency and transfer ambulance service for the area, using modern, oxygen-equipped ambulances, with fully licensed and trained drivers and attendants.

Announcement was also made that the Eastland County Sheriff's office has granted authority for the company to operate a 2-way radio in conjunction with the Sheriff's department's transmitter, and frequency. This will provide quicker, and more efficient service in case of emergency, they said.

Owners stressed the point that the new company would be "dedicated to public service, and that the facilities of the ambulance are continually available by calling phone number 1218, Eastland."

Little known facts about Texas boundaries.

(Editor's Note: This is the eighth in a series of articles outlining numerous boundary conflicts dating back to 1716, pointing up little known facts which shaped the Texas of today.)

After the Supreme Court set the south bank of the Red River as the boundary a tremendous argument developed over the exact location of the south bank.

In the ensuing fray, Texas stood to lose the most.

Down through the years, the U. S. and Oklahoma had been content to let Texas exercise all acts of sovereignty over the area. That is, until oil was discovered.

Attorney General Will Wilson points out that the discovery of oil in the Gulf of Mexico also brought on the tidelands case in which he is fighting the federal government before the U. S. Supreme Court.

The first claim of Oklahoma to any land on the Texas side of the Red River came in 1918. T. P. Roberts owned and had lived 33 years on a farm located in Texas near the Red River.

"Mr. Roberts was working his pasture early one morning," Wilson recalls, "when, to his amazement, he discovered a posted notice, 'This is Tillman County, Oklahoma Line.'"

"If the boundary was fixed at the foot of the Texas bluffs as the United States and Oklahoma contended, Texas would lose more than 500,000 acres of land. This land was populated by Texans, their homes, churches, schools, Old Fellows and Woodmen Lodges, cemeteries and—oil wells," Wilson observes.

The solution lay in finding what was intended in the 1819 treaty. A cattle truck full of evidence was spread out before the court. Texas introduced six albums of photographic study of the Red River from the Panhandle to the east side of Wichita County.

The Red River got in the mood of the controversy. She staged a flood in 1920 that filled the oil wells with sand, tore derricks from their moorings. They disappeared downstream with their owner's dreams.

In January, 1923, the U. S. Supreme Court declared the southern bank to be a cut-bank at the aver-

age level. The United States took a strip of land between the cut-bank and the stream's normal stage and also got Burke Bet and Goat Islands.

Oklahoma claimed that in 1819 the river ran opposite Wichita County at the foot of the Texas bluffs instead of a mile north of its present channel.

Texas stood to lose a region about 10 miles long and more than a mile wide.

In the 1923 Red River dispute with Oklahoma, Texas discovered some ancient trees growing where Oklahoma and the United States claimed Red River flowed in 1819. Cross sections of these century old timbers were shown the court as proof that the river had not been there in 1819. The age of a tree can be determined by counting the rings.

"The court was impressed," Wilson points out. "It marveled at one in particular, a 170 year old Pecan tree. The stump of this mute witness should be located and dedicated."

"It clearly did more than any man to win the battle for Texas." The judgment of the court was swayed by a peculiarity of the Red River. The judges remembered well witnesses' testimony of the old Red River's vagabond nature.

Friends of the river reported finding the flowing channel near one side of the river in the morning and in the middle or near the other side in the evening.

"Certainly the haunting vision of an oil well located in Texas in the morning and in Oklahoma in the evening prodded the court to look for a permanent boundary," Wilson observed.

The nearest was the cut-bank. The U. S. Supreme Court appointed Engineers Arthur D. Kidder and Arthur L. Stiles to locate and mark this boundary line. They worked hard and reported in 1924:

"We have marked the boundary line by wooden posts called 'witness posts' set along the bank at varying short distances from the boundary and from each other. Permanent reference monuments are located in the Texas and Oklahoma bluff overlooking the river valley."

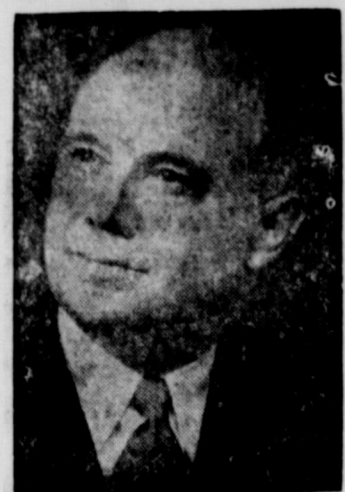
### Miss Willene Sockwell Is Feted With Gift Tea In Shelton Home
