**Texas Women Are Doing Well In Civil Defense, Disaster Relief**

AUSTIN — Are Texas women really doing the job in civil defense and disaster relief they set out to do three years ago?

Some — mostly women involved in the work — have said they have sometimes fallen short of their goal of preparing themselves and their families for possible disaster, natural or otherwise.

Statistics, however, indicate that even though much more remains to be accomplished, a lot has been done in the past three years — in other words, since the Women's Advisory Council for Civil Defense and Disaster Relief started functioning.

The council held its third annual meeting in Austin near the end of October. It was attended by representatives of more than 20 state-wide organizations which represent almost half of the women in this State.

Some of the organizations — for example, the Parent-Teacher Association with 50,000 members

— are among the largest of any type of group in the nation. Others are among the smallest.

"But no matter how large or small they are," Mrs. Grace Martin, women's coordinator of civil defense in Texas, said, "they all presented facts and figures which indicate to us that in spite of all that remains to be done, a real healthy start has been made."

Every organization represented at the council meeting, she said, has some type of training program underway in the field of home nursing, first aid or in related types of endeavor.

For example, Mrs. Martin pointed out the job the P-TA has done so far. More than 2,000 members have taken first aid courses, while 1,400 have completed Red Cross home nursing studies. And since a large number of those members took their courses with the announced intention of teaching others in that field, the number of trained Texans who could be of

vital service during a disaster is expected to take a large jump during the next year.

Another case in point, Mrs. Martin said, is the Auxiliary of the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

"So far, a total of 9,273 hours have been spent in training or in volunteer civil defense and disaster relief service by members of that organization," Mrs. Martin said. "Better yet, the auxiliary is making plans to enlarge on its work."

Mrs. Martin also said that every organization, large or small, was able to give a general indication that real progress is being made

in civil defense and disaster relief work by its members.

For instance, the smallest group represented was the nursing section of the State Health Department, a body of just 13 members.

"In addition to teaching nursing," Mrs. Martin noted, "this group was able to prove just how important preparedness can be. They gave nursing service when it was needed most — in the Lower Rio Grande Valley flood. Because of what they accomplished, there are a lot of families in that stricken area alive and thankful today."

### SCALLOPED CABBAGE WITH HAM

- 2 pounds (about 3 quarts) shredded fresh green cabbage
- 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 3 tablespoons flour
- 1-4 teaspoon salt
- 1-8 teaspoon pepper
- 1-2 cups milk
- 1-2 cups diced, cooked ham
- 2 cups corn flakes
- 2 tablespoons melted butter or margarine

Cook cabbage in boiling salted water only until tender; drain well. Melt butter in saucepan; stir in flour and seasonings. Add milk gradually, stirring constantly; cook until thickened, stirring occasionally. Combine cabbage and ham in greased 2-quart casserole; cover with sauce. Crush corn flakes slightly; mix with melted butter. Sprinkle over sauce. Bake in moderately hot oven (400°F) about 15 minutes or until thoroughly heated.

Yield: 6 servings, about 1 cup each.

### STUFFED CABBAGE ROLLS

- 6 large cabbage leaves
- 2 cups (1-2 lb.) ground cooked ham
- 1 egg, slightly beaten
- 1-4 cup minced onions
- 1-4 teaspoon minced garlic
- 1-4 cup chopped pimiento
- 1-4 teaspoon salt
- 1-8 teaspoon pepper
- 1 tablespoon melted butter or margarine
- 1-2 cups oven-popped rice cereal

Dip cabbage leaves in boiling water to soften. Combine remaining ingredients in order given; mix well. Place spoonfuls of meat mixture on each of the cabbage leaves. Roll up and fasten with toothpicks. Place in kettle; pour on Tomato Sauce. Cover. Simmer about 30 minutes or until cabbage leaves are tender.

Yield: 6 servings.

### TOMATO SAUCE

- 1-4 cup salad oil
- 1-2 teaspoon pepper
- 1-4 cup chopped onions
- 3 tablespoons tomato paste
- 1-2 cup water
- 2 cups cooked tomatoes
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon sugar

Heat salad oil with pepper in saucepan for 2 minutes. Add onions and simmer until tender. Combine tomato paste and water; add to oil and pepper mixture in three parts, letting mixture boil rapidly after each addition. Stir in tomatoes, bay leaf and salt; cook until thick. Stir in sugar; cook about 15 minutes longer, stirring frequently to prevent scorching. Pour over Cabbage Rolls.

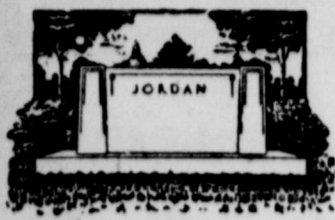

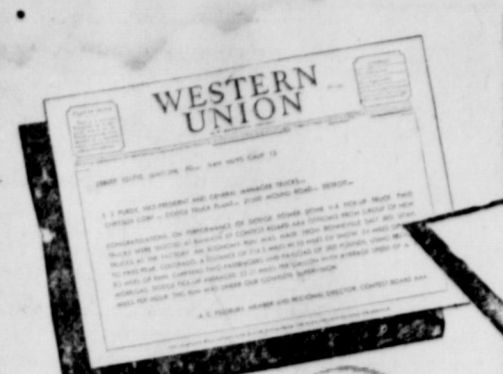

**PATENTS AND COPYRIGHTS EXPLAINED**  
Alert observers frequently notice that some goods or articles are patented, whereas other seemingly similar items are copyrighted. The question accordingly arises as to what constitutes the difference between a patent and a copyright.

Patents are granted to inventors on new and useful articles of manufacture, compositions of matter, methods of articles of manufacture and certain types of plants.

Copyrights are granted to authors, composers or artists on works such as books (which include not only bound volumes, but also pamphlets, leaflets and even single sheets), periodicals, speeches, plays, musical compositions, phonograph records, works of art, including sculptures, works, maps, photographs and motion pictures.

The function of a patent or copyright is to give its owner the right to exclude all others from infringing the patent or copyright—that is, from practicing the invention or copying the copyrighted material. Patents give protection against any infringer who makes, uses the invention, regardless of whether he is a copier and regardless of whether he actually knows of the patent. Copyrights, on the other hand, give protection only against a copier and not against one who independently does the same thing.

A patent runs for seventeen years and cannot be renewed. A copyright runs twenty-eight years and may be renewed once for an additional period of twenty-eight years.

An inventor or author may himself apply for a patent or copyright. However, only persons trained in such work should prepare and prosecute the necessary applications, since it often happens that an unskilled person, because of his lack of knowledge of the law and the procedure, will do irreparable damage to the rights to which the inventor or author was originally entitled. Sometimes rights are forfeited completely through the mistakes of such unskilled persons.

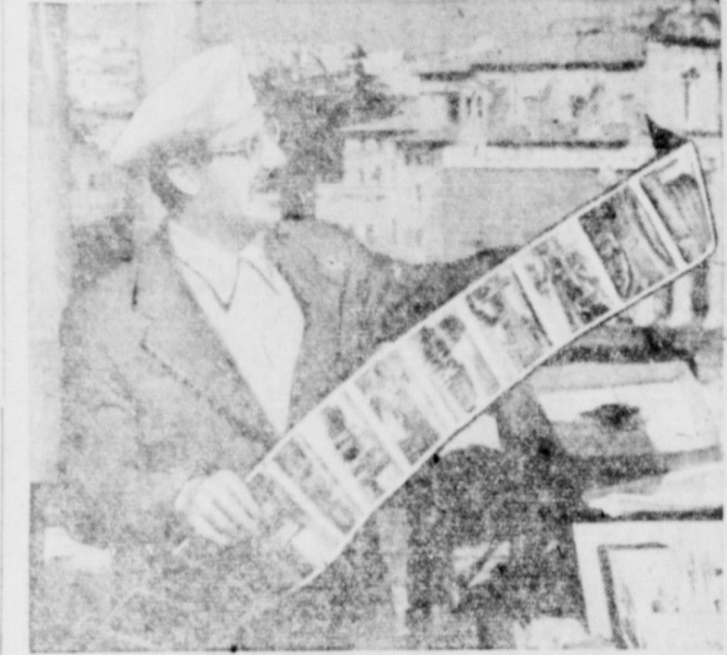
