Leon River Flood Control Project Backed by Burleson

Cong. Omar Burleson told the Telegram this week that the proposed Federal Flood Control project for the Leon River in Eastland County has his backing and will remain on the active list.

"This is a project in which I am very much interested," Burleson said, "and to which I will be giving every effort and cooperation. This is a type of item of which a definite prediction is im-

possible, but I hope to see concrete action taken with a minimum of further delay."

Burleson mailed a copy of a letter he received from Brigadier General J. L. Person, assistant chief of engineers for Civil Works. In the letter Gen. Person said that since Eastland authorities had taken steps to assure local cooperation, the project would not go on the inactive list.

"I am pleased to inform you that, in view of the revival of local interest and acceptance of prescribed requirements, the Eastland project will be retained in our active program of projects eligible for consideration for future budgeting and funding," the general stated.

Eastland Guardsmen Off to Fort Hood

National Guardsmen from Battery A, 648th Armored Field Artillery Battalion in Cisco and Service Battery in Ranger, will leave Sunday for North Fort Hood and the 49th Armored Division's 11th annual summer encampment. A number of Eastland men serve in the two units.

The citizen-soldiers from this area will be among the 8,400 soldiers of the 49th Armored Division representing 115 units in 55 cities, who will train from June 29

to July 13. A rugged, combat training schedule has been planned for the Division this year with the emphasis on atomic age warfare and its defense.

Individual training and range firing will be stressed with Guardsmen shooting for qualification scores with pistol, carbine, M-1 Rifle, machine guns and rocket launchers. Training in map reading and land mine warfare will also be stressed.

1st Lt. Jack E. King, commander of the Cisco unit, says that when the unit returns from camp this year he expects every individual to be well qualified in all basic combat and individual training courses.

Governor Price Daniel will be honored by the Division July 3 at the annual Governor's Day Parade. The division, in a mechanized parade of 1,000 vehicles, will be reviewed by Governor Daniel and other military leaders.

Another highlight of Governor's Day will be the crowning of Miss 19th Armored Division, climaxing a Division-wide beauty contest. The winner will be selected from 19 entries from each of the battalions in the Division.

Besides the combat training, citizen-soldiers from battery and Service Battery will get special instructions in communications, chemical warfare, intelligence, and maintenance.

Maj. Gen. Albert Sidney Johnson of Dallas commands the Lone Star Division, and Brig. Gen. Clayton P. Kerr and Brig. Gen. Harley B. West, both of Dallas, are Division Artillery Commander and Assistant Division Commander.

LT. Col. Ralph M. Trolinger of San Angelo commands the 648th Armored Field Artillery Battalion of which two county units are a part.

Eastland men in the Ranger unit who will attend summer camp include S-1c Kenneth Johnson and Pvt. E-2 Otis Jordan.

Local men in the Cisco unit include Lt. Charles E. Layton, Lt. W. Bennett Rosedale, M-1c George Fuhl, M-1c Wilford R. Pean, Sfc. Stanley Lynn, Sp2 Alfonso R. Gaeta, Sp3 James H. Johnson, Pfc. Derrill G. Basham, Pfc. Farley E. Foy Jr. Pfc. Henry W. Sims, Jr. and Pvt. Roy D. Harris.

Pete Jon Tate and Billy Upchurch are also members of the Cisco unit, but they are now completing six months active duty.

Annual Golf Tourney To Begin Here Friday

Ninety-Six Golfers Expected to Enter

Some 96 golfers are expected to participate in this week-end's eighth Annual Lakeside Country Club golf tournament in Eastland, Emmett Powell, tourney director, announced today.

Qualifying rounds got underway earlier this week, and the top rated golfers will go out to beat or win medalist honors Friday.

Matched play in all flights is due to start Saturday, with the final two rounds of play slated for Sunday.

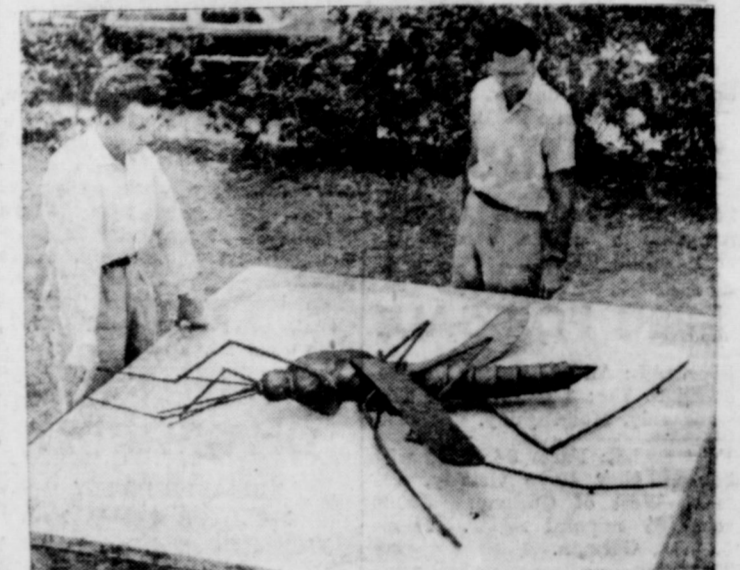
Last year's champion was Bill Carson of Abilene. The 1957 tourney drew exactly 96 golfers. Other champions in past have been Darrell Tully in 1956, Ray Ferguson in 1955, Lee Chapman in 1954, Marion Hickey in 1953, Jimmy Phillips in 1952 and Joe Ed Black in 1951.

The 3145-yard Lakeside is in excellent condition after a year of good rains. Golfers will again have to take the water haz-

ards on the course in mind this year, for the first time in several tournaments. Biggest problem this year has been keeping the fairways mowed. In past years the problem has been getting the grass to grow, but not this year. Two new pieces of equipment, a green mower and fairway mower have been purchased, and the course is probable in the best shape it has ever been in.

Far over the nine-hole layout is 36, and top amateurs in the past have found that a hard maul to shoot at, Douglas Newton of Del Rio put together 37-36-73 last year to take medalist honors.

Some \$1000 in golf equipment will be awarded to winners of the tourney. Winners, runner-ups and consolation winners in each flight will receive prizes. Irons, wood and golf carts will be given away

Former Ranger Businessman and Wife Found Dead In Houston Home

Waddie (D.) Joseph, 76, and his wife, Sharifee, 56, former Ranger residents and drygood store owners, were found shot to death in the bedroom of their Houston home Tuesday night.

A family friend, Louis Besby who is an insurance agent, discovered the bodies when he entered the residence. A .32 calibre revolver with six empty shells was found under Joseph's body.

No verdict had been returned, at last report.

Joseph owned and operated the Joseph's Department Store in Ranger for 35 years, setting up the business in 1918 during the oil boom. He retired in 1954 to make his home in Houston, where his daughter, Mrs. Ray C. Ameen, lives.

In 1904, Joseph came to this country from Syria. In 1924, he returned to his native country to marry Sharifee Abo Rislon.

Before establishing his business in Ranger, Mr. Joseph operated a drygoods store in Healdton, Okla. His first Ranger store was located on Rusk St.

Later, Joseph's Department Store was established at 206-08 Main St. He also owned Joseph's Fireproof Apartments located above the store.

Selling the building in 1954, Mr. Joseph and his wife moved to Lubbock, where they operated a store for about two years. Later, they owned a dry goods store in Haskell, prior to moving to Houston.

About one month ago, the Josephs visited with Mr. and Mrs. Joe Stie in Ranger.

Mr. Joseph was active in the Rotary Club, a past president of the organization, and a Mason and Shriner. He and his wife belonged to the First Methodist Church. Mrs. Joseph was active in Women's club activities including the 1920

County Bond Sales At 70 Percent Mark

During the first five months of this year, Eastland County purchased \$354,591 in Series E and H United States Savings Bonds, according to an announcement from Guy Parker, chairman of the savings bonds committee in the county.

This figure represents 69.9 percent of the goal for the year, set at \$507,000.

Eastland County leads District 16 in the highest percentage, and is in second place in amount of bond sales. Taylor County is first with \$1,380,000, a figure representing 52.6 percent of the goal.

During the first five months of this year Texans increased their purchases of Savings Bonds 43 percent. Nationally the sales have increased 8 percent during this period.

Texas sales for the first five months of this year were \$75,816,519 which represented 43.3 percent of the 1958 goal of \$175,000. (Continued On Page Four)

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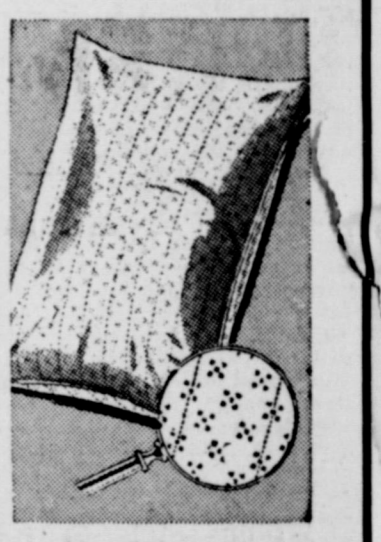

A feature story on D. Joseph, written by Mrs. Ethel Brookes Gilmore of Ranger, which was written several years ago for another newspaper—follows:

Past On Parade
By Ethel Brookes Gilmore

D. Joseph has been in the merchandise business in Ranger since early 1919. He has seen Ranger when luck was out and luck was in.

During the oil boom in Healdton, Okla. in 1918 his partner was A. Williams. After hearing oil men of Healdton tell of the fabulous oil drilling rush in Eastland County, Joseph and Williams decided to come to Ranger.

They bought the stock of a small store, owned by C. L. Williams, which was located in the back of the Ranger State Guarantee Bank Building. The floor space of this store was only 18 by 50 feet, but they were glad to get it. They did business there until Dec. 11, 1920, when they moved into their new store on Main Street. Salesmen who came to Ranger said that the Joseph store was really a credit to Ranger.

Mr. Joseph was born at Mt. Lebanon in S. W. Syria May 18, 1886. He came to America in 1904, and went into business in Walnut Ridge, Ark., and from there moved to Healdton, Okla.

In 1923 he went back to Syria to visit relatives and while there met Sharifee Abo Rislou. They were married the same year at Baysour, Lebanon.

Mr. and Mrs. Joseph have three children, Billy Gene, who married Dr. Ray Ameen of Houston; Azzette, whose wife is the former Moseda Hassen. (Her father was well known in Ranger business circles), and Freddy.

Mr. Joseph is a 32nd Degree Mason and Shriner, member of the Rotary Club for 20 years, a member of the Board of Directors of the Ranger Retail Merchant's Ass. for many years and active in the Retail Merchant's Assn. He was also one of the first members of The Chamber of Commerce.

Earlier this year Cong. Burleson notified local officials that the project was about to be transferred to the inactive list. At the time, Mayor Cyrus Frost, City Manager Jimmy Young and Chamber of Commerce representatives met with Army Engineers in Fort Worth and agreed to get right-of-way for the project.

In 1946 the U. S. Congress authorized \$245,000 to be spent for flood protection here. Nothing ever came of that, however, because of failure of local and Federal officials to get together on the project.

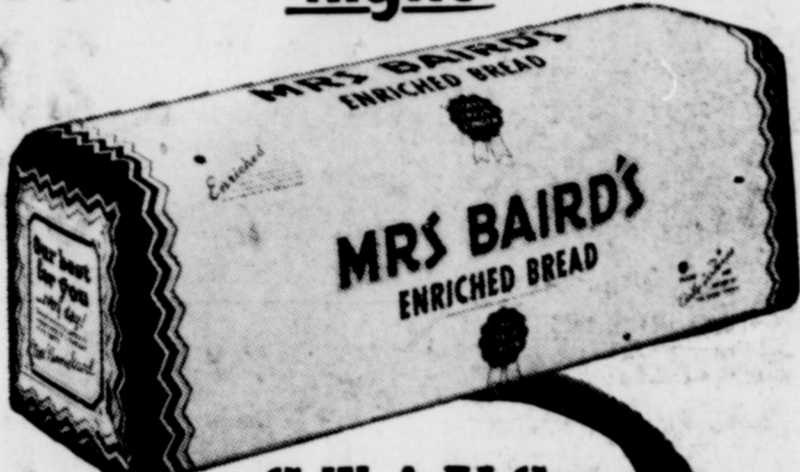



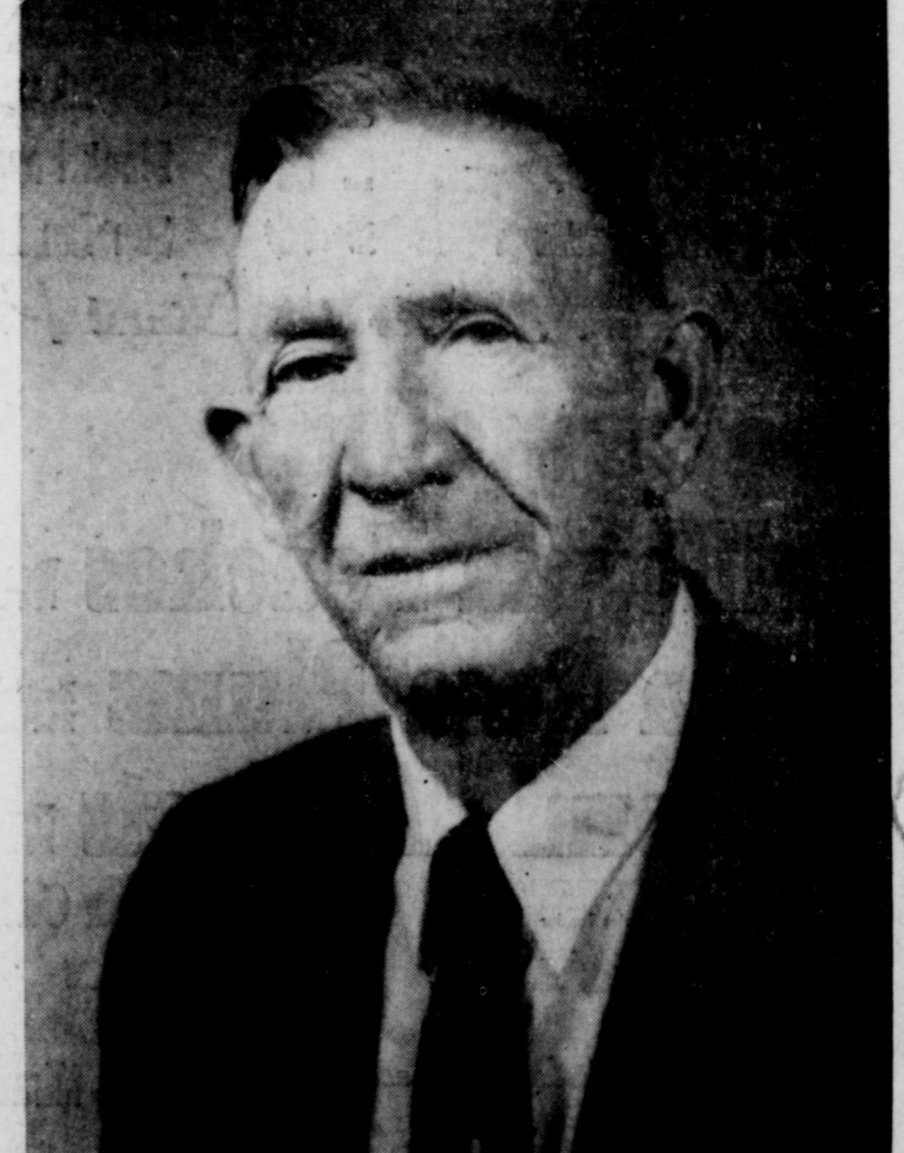
