**TALES OF
LOST TREASURES
IN AND AROUND EASTLAND COUNTY**

Bigfoot Wallace was an adventurous soul. His exploits in the early days of Texas have been read by many. The most widely known account of these exploits is the book by John Duval entitled simply, "Bigfoot Wallace."

Probably not to be found in this book is an adventure of Bigfoot's that occurred in this area of Texas back in 1837. It points the way to a fabulous treasure!

It all began when Wallace and a surveying party were encamped on the north branch of Palo Pinto Creek in the county of that name. Wallace, being an expert rifle man, was sent in quest for game.

Descending a deer trail, he reached the canyon's rugged floor and suddenly became aware that the Indians were gaining on him. In a desperate attempt, he succeeded in crawling into a small cave-like aperture that penetrated into the canyon's bluff some ten feet.

Here, unable to move lest he be detected, he awaited his fate. About 8 or 9 hours passed and Wallace decided to go out and look matters over. As he made ready to crawl out of the cave, his old blunderbuss shotgun barrel struck against an outcrop of rock in the cavern's low ceiling. He was showered with chunks of tiny rock fragments. In checking his firearm, his eye fell upon a tiny nugget that immediately aroused his curiosity. Bigfoot, being no mineralogist could only conjecture as to the nugget's identity. It looked like galena lead! Pocketing the rock, he examined the outcrop and found it to be shot thru and thru with the same substance!

Not in position to tarry, he left the cave and canyon somewhat reluctantly. He found the Indians nowhere in sight and so returned to camp. At camp he displayed the nug-

get to a friend who was well versed in minerals and the identification of them. True to Bigfoot's belief, it was pronounced very rich lead.

Sadly though, records do not tell to my knowledge what Wallace ever done regarding the lead croppings. Could it be that he never found sufficient time to get back and mine the rich bonanza? Back in those days Texas was no place to stay alone in the wilderness! Perhaps Wallace never returned to the cave. If not then it is surely still where he found it.

Now—as to where he found it. Northeast of Ranger, some 5 miles the country, is very rough and cut with gaping canyons. Among these is Wilds' Canyon. This particular canyon is as mysterious and weird as any you can find. Beware of what it may hold. Do not camp in this place over night for many strange stories are told in earnest about this canyon and these tales will scare the horns off a billy goat. Search by day and who knows? "The Lost Bigfoot Wallace Lead Mine" mine be found again!—Atlas Wilson.

July Fourth Overtime Is Explained

If those establishments engaged in interstate commerce give their employees a day off for the Fourth of July and require their workers to make up the day the next week, they are liable for overtime pay to employees who work in excess of 40 hours the next week.

That's the gist of the holiday weekend policy of the U. S. Department of Labor's Wage-Hour Division in Dallas, according to Regional Director William J. Rogers.

"The Fair Labor Standards Act (Federal Wage-Hour Law) requires overtime after 40 hours a week for all non-exempt employees engaged in interstate commerce, or the production of goods for commerce," he said, "so there can be no averaging of working hours over two or more weeks. Each week stands alone," he said. "For 40 hours or less the regular rate applies. For more than 40 hours

the overtime rate applies." Independence Day (July 4) may be taken as a holiday, with or without pay. So may the day following—or any other day, he said.

But to make up the holiday the next week, or some other time, will involve overtime of at least one and one-half times the regular rate, if total working hours for the week exceed 40.

Caution Urged In Water Sports

WASHINGTON, D. C. — The National Wildlife Federation urges people to exercise extra caution in the interest of safety while pursuing water-borne recreations such as fishing, boating and swimming over the long Fourth of July holiday this year.

Since July 4 falls on a Friday, many people will seize upon the occasion to enjoy a three-day holiday and usage of lakes and streams and ocean areas for recreations probably will be heaviest of the year. Crowded conditions at some locations, the Federation points out, will create extra hazards.

Drownings in recent years prompted the U. S. Congress to adopt a resolution, signed by the President, setting aside each year the week that includes July 4 as "National Safe Boating Week." Drownings during the four-day "Fourth" period last year reached a total of 210, as compared to 426 deaths in auto accidents and 99 in miscellaneous mishaps.

Boatmen should be extra cautious and avoid speeding in congested areas or where people are swimming. All occupants of boats should be provided with approved types of life-saving equipment. Overloading is another leading cause of boating casualties.

Rat Campaign To Start in Stephens County

June 26, Breckenridge. — A county-wide rat and mouse control campaign will kickoff in Stephens County on July 15, reported County Agricultural Agent Jack Gressett today.

With a large build-up of rodents over the past few months and an increase of feed storage in barns and granaries, it is imperative—says Gressett—to control the rodent population over the entire county.

Rat control demonstrations will be held in the different communities of the county on the July 15 and 16. These demonstrations will be conducted by Sid Knight of the Rodent Control Service of the Texas A. and M. College.

Gressett pointed out that an individual rancher or farmer could not, in most cases, successfully control their rats and mice unless their neighbors joined in the battle to eliminate the rodent population. That is why it is so important that the whole county joins

in the war against these robbing varmints.

Fumarin-treated rat and mouse bait will be used in the demonstrations and will be available through a local organization at cost to individuals attending the demonstration.

Fumarin is a relatively new poison which causes rats and mice to bleed to death internally. Before this can happen, however, the bait must be eaten every day for five days or every other day for ten days. Rodents are not aware of the poison in the bait and so they do not hesitate to eat it. The bait is prepared through the facilities of the Federal Fish and Wildlife Service.
