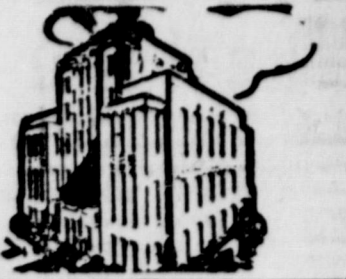

"We are way on down the road toward making a good peanut crop," County Agent J. M. Cooper said Tuesday after heavy rains had soaked most of Eastland County.

### Brother of Gov. Daniel Brings Campaign Here

Bill Daniel, brother of Governor Price Daniel, spoke for the governor's re-election in the downtown business section of Eastland Saturday.

The Liberty lawyer and former Texas Legislator pointed to the fact that his brother was the first governor to work towards crime prevention and better law enforcement in the state.

These firsts, coupled with the search and planting program came during the governor's administration, Daniel said, putting into operation a plan to eliminate sunburned pastures, ruined crops and water rationing.

He said that Texas' first statewide highway safety program to reduce the slaughter on streets and highways also has been highly beneficial, resulting in the establishment of more than 100 local traffic safety councils.

These firsts, coupled with the governor's outstanding record as speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, Texas Attorney General, and U. S. Senator are ample reasons for returning Price Daniel for a second term, his brother said.

Traveling with Daniel on his statewide tour is his son Will Daniel from Liberty.

## Sen. Yarborough to Make Main Address

Eastland will host members of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association Wednesday when peanut growers from several states gather for their annual meeting.

Two of the highlights of the day will be non-political speeches by Sen. Ralph Yarborough and State Agriculture Commissioner John White. Cong. Omar Burleson, who was to have been on the program, will be unable to attend because of pressing business in Washington, he advised Ross Wilson, SWPGA manager, Monday.

Sen. Yarborough will fly to Eastland by chartered plane from Houston. He plans to land at Eastland airport shortly before the Growers meeting is called to order at 10 a. m. in the air conditioned Majestic theatre in Eastland.

White plans to drive to Eastland Wednesday morning from Odessa, where he is to speak in behalf of his candidacy for re-election as agricultural commissioner.

The public has been issued a special invitation to attend the morning session of the meeting and hear the talks by Sen. Yarborough and Commissioner White.

Yarborough will speak on the current farm situation in Congress and White will give the state angle on farm problems.

The Murray Cox farm program, heard daily over radio station WFAA, Dallas, will originate from Eastland City Park Wednesday at noon. Growers will hold their lunch in the park.

A large delegation from Oklahoma is due to be on hand for the meeting, and Texas peanut growers from all sections of the state will be represented.

## Galia Walters Joins Church Tour of South

Miss Galia Walters, high school senior, and president of the MYF of the First Methodist Church in Eastland, left this week with a group of youngsters from the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Church for a tour of the old South.

Thirty-one young people from throughout the conference are making an extended tour of Methodist establishments in the South. They are traveling by chartered bus and will be away from home approximately 10 days.

The Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Church does not include Abilene, but it does come as far west as Rannels and Coleman counties. Although most of Callahan County is in the Northwest Texas Conference, Cross Plains and Putman are in the

Conference. The trip, held for the first time last summer, will be made up of 23 girls and eight boys. All making the trip expressed interest in Methodist Mission work by writing essays on the subject of missions.

Between Monday and July 17, the day they are scheduled to return to the Texas Wesleyan College, Fort Worth, the youngsters will have toured eight Southern states and visited numerous important Methodist Church and Mission centers.

At night, the kids will sleep in their own air mattresses in Methodist churches from Fort Worth to Atlanta, Georgia. They will cook most of their own meals in church fellowship halls in route.

The tour will take them to Little Rock, Arkansas, Jacksonville and Nashville, Tennessee, with two days to spend in Nashville, national headquarters of Methodism. They will take sacrament in The Upper Room, one of Methodism's pride and joys.

In the Smokey Mountains, they will visit the Pittman Center, a Methodist retreat and school. They will go to the Cherokee Reservation to inspect an Indian mission, and later on to Lake Junaluska in North Carolina to the Big Methodist camp there.

In Atlanta, the youngsters will visit Emory University and the E. Glenn Center for Negroes, going from there to Tuskegee, Alabama to visit Tuskegee Institute and the George Washington Carver (Continued on Page Two)

### Eastland Men Stay Busy At Guard Camp

Thousands of mechanized vehicles thundered by the Governor's review stand at North Fort Hood Saturday morning in a display of might by the 49th Armored Division of the Texas National Guard.

Among the 115 Texas units participating in the Governor's Day Parade were local Guardsmen. In a mighty display of power, vehicles from jeeps to lumbering tanks rolled past the crowds of wide-eyed spectators for almost two hours.

Governor Price Daniel inspected 8,400 Lone Star Division Guardsmen before the parade and presented trophies and other awards to several units.

This was the climax of the first week at camp. Now in their second week, Guardsmen from the local unit are busy firing Howitzers 1.55 on the range as well as high explosive rounds.

Friday, July 4, local men spent their time in a mobility training class, in land mine warfare school and in 1.55 Howitzer Canoneer classes.

At 5 a. m. each morning, the local guardsmen started off a full day full of activities and duty—including KP, special details, and sometimes—guard duty.

Lights went out at 11 p. m. Friday night, Unit Sweethearts were judged for Miss 49th Armored Division. Winning the honor and a trophy from Governor Price Daniel was Miss Pat McDowell, 18, of Bonham.

Saturday was visitor's day and the day of the big parade. Following a thorough cleaning-up of the camp site, relatives and friends began arriving at camp.

They stayed to see the show. On hand were military dignitaries, including Lt. Gen. John W. Collier, commanding general of the Fourth U. S. Army; Maj. Gen. Donald W. McGowan, chief of the Army Division of the National Guard Bureau in Washington; Maj. Gen. William S. Biddle, 3d Corps; Maj. Gen. K. L. Berry, adjutant general, Texas National Guard; and others.

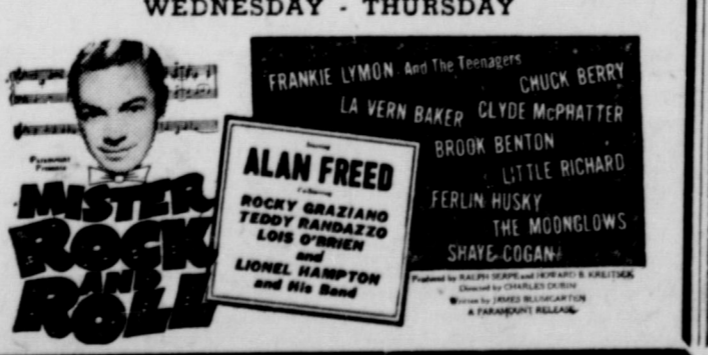

runs into general dishonesty, as the rotten speck taints the whole apple. A community whose politics are conducted by a perpetual breach of dishonesty on both sides will be trained by immorality throughout. The guile, the crafty vigilance, the dishonest advantage, the cunning sharpness; the tricks and traps and sly evasions; the equivocal promises, and unequivocal neglect of them, which characterize political action, will while the parlor remains clean.

The Congress has recently provided benefits for widows of Confederate veterans. The names and addresses of the estimated 1500 widows are not known.

The Air Force operates its own warning system. New scientific devices are used for early detection.

No way has been devised to successfully break up and scatter a tornado, but scientific research is under way towards that purpose. The new detection system, however, can warn people in time for them to take safety precautions and reduce loss of life.

**204 Officers Patrol Game And Fish Laws**  
 AUSTIN — Enforcement of Texas game and fish laws now is in the hands of 204 officers, the largest number on record, according to the Director of Law Enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission.

The number was jumped recently when 21 new men completed the Warden School at A. & M. College. They now have taken up their assignments, wearing new green uniforms with yellow shoulder patches.

There are 12 supervisors and 192 game wardens. This means that if every warden had an equal amount of Texas to patrol, he would be responsible for a 1,292 square mile area. Actually the wardens are assigned on smaller or larger areas in relation to law enforcement needs.

The addition of the salt water fishing license, effective this year for the first time, has increased the responsibilities of patrolling the state's coastal waters. At present there are 20 men employed as boatmates to assist in this coastal law enforcement.

"While we are recognized as the enforcement division, the men of this department are more interested in educational work than in making arrests," the Director said. "Wildlife is of no value when it is destroyed, even though violators are arrested. If we can prevent violations we've done a better job."

# Gray Matter

This is certainly getting to be a rainy country. Every once in a while we have a fourth of July that turns out to be read rainy or cool.

I remember one time when I was a young fellow, that is, much younger than I am now, that we had a fourth of July back then that the weather did everything it wasn't supposed to do and very little that it was supposed to do.

The Fourth of July is usually a hot dry one, climaxed with a lot of good watermelon eating.

Fourth of July and watermelons go together like ham and eggs. There used to be a lot of political speaking on the Fourth of July celebrations, too, but we didn't see as much of that nowadays as we

used to. I guess the radio and television and air-conditioned homes and a lot of other things we don't need have caused us to get away from the old-fashioned Fourth of July political rally.

People these days are too busy to attend a political rally. A few years ago it was their bounden duty to go to political rallies. A citizen felt he should go to find out who the best candidate for office to vote for.

Nowadays we go down to the polling place without the slightest idea whom we're voting for, or against, and blandly mark our ballots as if we knew what we were doing. In many races we not only don't know what the candidates themselves stand for, we don't even know who is running for a

candidate for whom we voted.

A candidate for governor then, for example, didn't have to buy a lot of radio and television time at high prices to get his story over to the people of this land. All he had to do was to get out and stump the state like Jim Ferguson used to do. The First time Farmer Jim ran for governor of Texas he had his campaign managers in each county seat town at the depot with a wagon loaded with hay. Then the two of them would drive the load of hay around the courthouse square a time or two to get a crowd, then Jim made a speech.

He didn't have an amplifying system to hurl his voice all over town; he didn't need one. He could make his voice heard as clear as a bell three blocks away. One of the largest crowds gathered in Eastland in front of the South side of the courthouse. Jim had the boys to set up a platform in front of the Palace of Sweets with the south side of the square roped off for the people.

Then after the crowd had gathered he unwound on his speech. You could hear him all over town. It was a treat to listen to this man talk. It makes no difference whether one agreed with a thing; the man said, he was an orator of the old school, a type of orator that seems to be dying out.

When the few old-school orators now in business, such as Billy Graham, die out, I guess that will be all for them. They don't seem to be producing any more of the spell-bound type of oratory these days as there used to be in the past.

Radio seems to have killed spell bound orating although Billy Graham does use the radio to good purpose.

There is at present time some agitation for moving the Texas primary day to May, instead of the traditional July. There may be some good reasons for moving the election day. I doubt if the reasons for moving the day, though, will outweigh the habit we're falling into of having elections in July. If we move the day of our elections it won't seem like election day on some other date.

If things are good enough as they are, why not leave them alone? A lot of people are always wanting to change things for no other reason making a change in them. Sometimes they even try to put them back to what they used to be in ages past without realizing that they are moving things back into the former state of affairs.

There'll be plenty of time for a change in other days. We don't have to change our elections days yet.

## Why Can't Johnny Read? TEN MILLION YOUTHS HAVE TROUBLE SEEING PROPERLY

WASHINGTON — If Johnny can't read, it may be because he can't really see what he's supposed to be reading.

Ten million youngsters in school today have vision problems, and Dr. Lois B. Bing of Cleveland thinks half of these will stumble along without anyone ever detecting their handicaps.

The American Optometric Assn. has been holding its 61st annual congress here, and Dr. Bing has been around preaching her favorite doctrine.

It's up to everyone—parents, teachers and the community—to make sure that youngsters have a seeing chance at the printed word, she says.

The difficulty is that, although we use our eyes constantly, few of us know much about them. We figure that if the customary letter chart is held up in front of a youngster, and he reads it first with one eye and then with the other, he is seeing splendidly.

"Yet school achievement," Dr. Bing says, "requires clear, comfortable and efficient vision at 15 inches, not 20 feet."

Many who pass the 20-foot Snellen letter test—that is still the one given at most schools—fail miserably at close range.

"We were born without the ability to use our eyes together. Many children who can see perfectly well when tested one eye at a time have trouble focusing when using both eyes," Dr. Bing says.

What with one thing and another, the result is gloomy. At least half those who fail in reading

near-sighted should sit at the back of the room simply because he happens to be good."

Although some communities have programs to keep an eye on eye problems, Dr. Bing is convinced that not nearly enough is being done.

"Many industries long ago realized," she says, "that it pays, in dollars and cents, to make sure their workers see properly. It burns me up that we can't do as much for our children."

One final statistic which causes little joy except maybe to the nation's 21,000 optometrists and those in allied work: Sixty per cent of all adults in this eye straining nation wear glasses.

Happy bifocals to you, sir and madam.

These things are the public's business. "We have been told that the ethical concept of journalism cannot operate on the small town level. We are young enough to believe this to be untrue. Perhaps before we reach our peak, we will find that it is true. Until we do we have full intentions of printing the news as we see it and as fairly as possible. "It is our belief that a newspaper's basic function is not legal advertising, or for that matter any kind of advertising. It is not the printing business that is done on the side. The function a newspaper has that supersedes everything else is to convey information. We are common carriers. The freedom of the press was given for that purpose—and for that purpose alone. "We have made mistakes, and we will make more mistakes. We certainly always try to admit them. We have nothing against any individual, group or organization, and if we ever do we will strive to keep that falling out of our news columns. In Moore About we say what we please. In the columns of the Telegram we report what happens."
